Purchases for the Soviet Union and sales of Soviet products in the United States in the nine months' period ending June 30, 1927, amounted to \$55,000,000. American-Russian trade in 1913 totaled \$48,000,000.

"While a new record for Soviet-American trade was reached during the nine months ending June 30, 1928, the composition of the trade emained about the same as last year," stated M. G. Watt, secretary, issued here yesterday a ringing denunciation of the action of the Lewis machine of the United Mine Workers' Union at the recent Indianapolis session of Lewis' policy committee which repudiated the so-called "no backward step" declaration of the last United Mine Workers' Convention. Outline Tasks.

In a long statement to the labor movement and to the mine workers, Watt and Toohey, speaking for the National Arrangements Committee, outline the tasks before the coal here, growing in membership by diggers and call upon them to redouble their energies for the leaps and bounds despite the active building of a new union to replace the one destroyed by Lewis. The statement follows in full:

LEWIS COMPLETES BETRAYAL

Abandons Jacksonville Scale-Defeats Pennsylvania and Ohio Strike-Destroys National Agreement. MINERS BUILD THE NEW UNION

Elect Delegates to the Pittsburgh Convention, September 9-16.

The Policy Committee and the International Executive? Board of the United Mine Workers' of America, headed by John L. Lewis, has decided to abandon the Jacksonville scale. The national agreement and national wage scale has been finally and completely destroyed. Wage cuts will now take place in all districts. Union conditions will disappear.

This is one more act of a treasonable career of the Lewis machine. Deliberately, and in the most base connivance with the bosses, step by step, the miners have been sold out. The union has been torn to pieces and is now wreck. The miners are facing "open-shop" conditions and starvation. The future of the miners lies only in the throwing overboard of the last remnants of the Lewis machine and uniting in building the new union—a powerful union to embrace all the traditions of the past heroic struggles of the coal miners. That must now be the next step upon which every effort should

Climax of Lewis' Treason.

Many are the sell-outs of the past. In 1919, John L. Lewis betrayed the national strike; in 1922, he betrayed 100,000 unorganized miners who came out on strike and joined the union. He betrayed the anthracite miners, the West Virginia miners; he destroyed the Districts of Kansas, Nova Scotia and other districts. Last fall he put into effect the beginning of the separate agreement policy, took several districts out of the fight, leaving the Pennsylvania and Ohio miners to battle alone against the united coal operators. This recent action of the International Executive Board finally completes this series of betrayals. It is even in distinct violation of the last packed International Convention decision not to permit any recession from the Jacksonville scale.

In order to cover their sell-out and the fact that the union is completely destroyed, the International Executive Board is making a pretense of negotiating separate district agreements. In this situation the Lewis machine can obtain no other agreements from the operators than those based on the "open-shop," on conditions worse than slavery. For the miners any such agreements will be fake agreements, further splitting the ranks of the miners, pitting the districts against one another in competition for lower wages. "Union" Officials Help Blacklist Union Miners. That the Lewis machine has no confidence in obtaining even

district fake agreements is evidenced by the fact that the International Board is instructing officials to send men back to work to the mines before such agreements are negotiated. By this the corrupt officials hope to collaborate with the operators in their black-listing and boycotting of active rank and file members. To the Pennsylvania and Ohio miners this means the strike is betrayed by those who are paid high salaries out of the sweat and

blood and countless sacrifices of the rank and file miners. These strikers were stabbed in the back while fighting against the operators, their evictions, their injunctions and their police terror. Could a scab peform a more base, degrading function? The Pennsylvania and Ohio miners' strike is now definitely lost. The union is destroyed. Lewis, Murray, Fagan, Hall, Fishwick,

Cappillini and all the other henchmen have completed their treach-Fifteen months ago the operators set out to destroy the union, concentrating first on the Pennsylvania and Ohio fields. They were ardently supported by the whole employing class. They found court and police ready at their disposal. But their most formidable allies were their faithful tools-the officials of the U. M. W. of A.



(Special to The DAILY WORKER) MANILA, Philippine Island (By Mail) .- Modification of the land laws to permit large-scale develop-ment of the rubber region in Mindahao and acquisition of large estates by Americans was advocated by the governor-general of Philip pines, H. L. Stimson, at the opening session of the new legislature. He explained to the representatives of the Philippine people that their economic misfortunes are due to absence of large landholding. He said:

He recommended such revision of the laws governing the creation and regulation of corporations, and the laws under which capital comes in contact with government" be revised "so as to insure the people who are willing to lend money to you that the enterprise in which they in vest will be fairly, justly and equitably treated by your public officials and that the title of the securities which the investors receive in exchange for their money will be sound and safe."

Stimson explained to the Filipinos that their own way to independence and liberty is to hand the country over to American capitalists. 





WASHINGTON, July 21 .- The fourteen nations invited to participate in the "Kellogg "peace" conference, scheduled to be held in Paris towards the end of August, have all replied favorably, it was announced here today.

The governments are Germany, France, Italy, Poland, Belgium, Great Britain, the Irish Free State, Canada, India, Australia, New Zealand, Japan, Czechoslovakia, and the Union of South Africa. The Union of Socialist Soviet Republics was not invited.

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

The destruction of the union is the result of a policy so treasonable in character as hardly to have been matched in the records of the labor lieutenants of American capitalism.

The last blow of Lewis is a death thrust aimed at the whole organized section of the American working class.

Events of the past show plainly that the decision disclosed last Wednesday by the high salaried bureaucracy to abandon the Jacksonville scale and forever to give up all pretenses of a national agreement was a last deliberate act in a cold-blooded, treasonable conspiracy with the union smashing operators. Even hese operators, in their own journal, "The Coal Age," say so. In the March issue we find the following bold admission of that fact. Speaking of the views of "certain of the best informed operators," it says:

. In the event of the failure of the Senatorial investigation to benefit the union's position it is expected that the miners' officials will permit the next move to come from the rank and file of the Illinois membership. .

"It is considered the only way out for the union leaders. If the miners demand employment a conference of the policy committee of the Mine rkers' Union can be called and informed that the miners of Illinois wish a reduction. Such a move would eliminate the stigma of the 'no backward step' of the union officials, it is declared."

While this language is sufficiently adroit to fool the "public," to make them believe that the rank and file and not the officals want a wage cut, the meaning of this statement is nevertheless unmistakable.

Yet deeds speak louder than words. It is not necessary to recite the whole history of the Lewis betrayal. The prof is conclusive in his strike-breaking during the last fifteen months.
