

WASHINGTON, July 31 .-Through the Anti-Imperialist League the following letter was sent to the White House: "Mr. Calvin Coolidge:

"President of the United States. "Esteemed Sir:

"At the present time, I, along with 18 other American citizens am a prisoner of General Sandino: We request that you withdraw the American troops from Nicaragua permitting that country to administer its affairs as an independent government. While American troops emain in Nicaragua, neither our lives nor our property are safe. During the recent disturbances American lives and property were safe. Our present difficulties are a result of the maintenance of American troops in Nicaragua. All that General Sandino asks is that American troops be withdrawn and that Nicaragua be permitted to solve its political questions without foreign interference.



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



EVIDENCE SHOWS CLERICAL GUILT

Mexican Police Seek to Blame Labor

MEXICO CITY, July 31.-Proof of the responsibility of the clerical forces for the assassination of Obregon was seen here in the arrest of Sister Concepcion Acevedo de la Lata, a catholic nun, on charges of having induced Jose de Leon Toral, the young slayer of the president elect, to commit the murder.

In a formal statement issued by the police it is declared that the plot to assassinate Obregon was worked out at the convent of which Sister Concepcion was mother superior. The nun refused to deny her part in he crime and admitted having told Toral that elimination of Obregon yould solve the problems of the eatholic church in Mexico.



Our party must appear in the election campaign as the single revolutionary working class force, as the sole fighting force against the reactionary trade union bureaucracy, as the organizer of the unorganized, as the deadly enemy of the socialist party. "The campaign should not re-

strict itself to our immediate demands, but we should stress all our final aims before the working class. We should raise issues of a workers' and farmers' government, the overthrow of capital-ism, the problems of a Communist society. We have to throw all forces of the party into the campaign and at the same time have to guard ourselves against all kinds of parliamentary illusions. To gain seats in the various legislative bodies is very important for our party because we can utilize them as mass tribunals to reach out for the workers, but we should not forget that our basic aim in this campaign is the mobilization of the broadest possible masses."

At the National Nominating Conention a resolution was adopted on building the party during the election campaign, reading in part as follows:

"The presidential campaign gives the Workers (Communist) Party an excellent opportunity to reach the broad sections of the American working class with the slogans and program of Communism. . . .
