The struggle of the Communist Party against the republican, democratic and socialist forces is nothing else but the class struggle of the toilers against the bosses.

The real issue in the present election struggle is the issue of class against class, the working class against the master class.

The issues raised by the capitalist parties and by their small brother, the socialist party, are either of secondary importance or fake issues.

FIVE BASIC ISSUES.

Five basic issues loom up before the toilers of America in the present situation, and nothing better characterizes the nature of the resent election campaign than the fact that the political parties of big and small business are maintaining a deadly silence about these real fundamental issues.

The first issue is imperialist war. But not one of the candidates or parties of big and small business tells the truth about it to the working masses. With empty phrases and brazen lies they try to cover up the danger of the next imperialist world war.

Wage slavery, capitalist exploitation and oppression is the second basic issue. But not one of the capitalist parties-neither the socialist, or republican, or democratic-challenges the existence of wage slavery.

'The oppression of the Negro masses is the third basic issue. But not one of the political parties of big and small business raises the issue of virtual Negro slavery, which is one of the props of present-day American democracy.

Fake capitalist democracy is the fourth basic issue. But democrats, republicans, and socialists alike, accept the present constitution of the United States as the basis of their platforms, and refuse to expose its class nature, its "checks and balances" for keeping the rich in power and keeping down the toilers.

The fifth basic issue is the existence of the Socialist Soviet Republic in Russia. Eleven years of workers' rule over one-sixth of Continued on Page Three







ONLY ONE PARTY FIGHTS CAPITALISM. Only the Communist Party is raising the issue of the next imperialist world war. It denounces all imperialist preparations. It demands the immediate independence of all American colonies, the withdrawal of United States troops from China and Nicaragua. The Communist Party is fighting imperialist war, and will do everything to help defeat the United States government in its next war, will, do its utmost to transform the imperialist war into a civil war against the United States capitalists.

Only the Communist Party challenges wage slavery. The Communist Party fights for the abolition of wage slavery. It has as its aim the overthrow of capitalism, the establishment of a Workers' and Farmers' Government, the establishment of a Communist society in which the means of production will not be the private property of the few, a society which will not be based on profit but on labor, which will not be founded on class divisions, which will eradicate both imperialist wars and class wars, which will be able to eliminate poverty.

The Communist Party raises the issue of Negro oppress.ul in all its length and breadth. We fight for the abolition of the whole infamous system of race discrimination-for the full racial and social equality of the Negro masses, and for the right of the Negroes in the South to self-determination. The Negro race must understand that capitalism means racial oppression, and Communism means social and racial equality.

The Communist Party exposes bourgeois democracy, which is in truth the dictatorship of the trusts. Government by injunction, raids and deportations, penitentaries for political prisoners, troops crushing strikes, frame-ups and lynchings, disfranchisement of millions of Negroes and foreign-born workers-these are the realities of American "democracy."

The Communist Party pledges itself to defend Socialist Republic of the Soviet Union, the fatherland of the workingclass of the world. Soviet Russia is building socialism now, has the most complete system of labor protection and social insurance, is the only power which has reduced its military forces and is working for peace.

THE CURE FOR WAR.

Workers! Comrades!

Don't believe the lies of the parties of big and small business. The Kellogg pact cannot prevent war. The League of Nations is an instrument of imperialism preparing for war. All pacifist phrases of the socialists are good only to distract your attention from the looming war danger. War, under imperialism, is inevitable. Only the revolutionary class struggle of the working class can prevent it.

Don't believe the brazen lies about exterminating poverty under the rule of capitalism. Poverty cannot be exterminated in a class society in which the means of production are the private property of the few, in which the huge masses of people are forced to sell their only property, their labor power. Only Commanism will be able to eliminate poverty as well as class domination.

Don't believe in fake promises about gradually improving capitalist democracy. Capitalist democracy means 102 years in prison for New Bedford strikers, means the execution of Sacco and Vanzetti, means ruling the Communist Party off the ballot in a whole series of states, means government by injunction, means company towns, means boss terrorism to force workers to vote for the capitalist parties. Real democracy for the toiling masses can be established only by the revolutionary overthrow of the present government. The working class cannot reform or "take over" the present apparatus of government. The proletarian revolution will destroy this huge machine, and will build its own government based on the factories as units of production. The state form of the rule of the working class will be councils of workers. The Soviet form of government constitutes the only real democracy for the overwhelming majority of the people, for the toiling masses.



The letter, a photographic copy of which is printed above, is a useful study for all workers during these days when the minds of all are still fixed upon the election. It was written some weeks ago by the secretary of state of the state of Washington to an organizer of the Workers (Communist) Party.

The Workers (Communist) Party participates in the "democratic" elections which, in the pretense that "the people are selecting their representatives," American capitalism conducts.

But the revolutionary Party knows that "the people" are not selecting "their representatives." It knows, and it tells the working class that the great financial capitalists, high in power above the masses of exploited workers and farmers, are the real governing power. The revolutionary party of the working class knows that these "democratic" elections under the capitalist state are only a mask behind which the iron dictatorship of Wall Street operates. When the historical conditions of struggle between these overlords and those whom they exploit reach such a stage as to endanger the continued rule of the exploiting class-then the mask of "democracy" is cast aside and the real dictatorship of the capitalist class is exposed in all its nakedness. Even now such a situation exists in Nicaragua, where a war of imperialist conquest has been waged for the past two years and where only candidates subservient to Wall Street are permitted to appear on the ballot. So fearful was the imperialist government of the United States that even then the Nicaraguans would write the name of Sandino across the ballots that an invading horde of marines guarded the elections while death-dealing bombing planes droned menacingly through the air above the polling places. The election in Nicaragua Sunday showed the American working class and impoverished farmers precisely what is to be expected from the government when the revolutionary forces in this country are as great a menace to capitalist rule as are the forces of rebellion against Wall Street rule in that Latin American country. We are fortunate to be able to show so plainly as the above letter, written with an unwise frankness by Mr. Hinckle, secretary of state of Washington State, that the real attitude of the capitalist government of this country to the working class here is in no essential way different from its attitude toward our brothers in Nicaragua. Although containing nothing new to Communists, the letter is noteworthy inasmuch as it exposes in the sharpest way the fraud of capitalist class democracy. It exposed the fact that the representatives of the capitalist state violate with impunity their own forms of "demo-cracy," their own laws, when to abide by them is not advantageous to the ruling class. Parliamentary action is useful only as a means of carrying the revolutionary message to the masses, of mobilizing the exploited workers and impoverished farmers against the capitalist state and of registering the

growth of class consciousness among the masses-only that and nothing more. This action of the secretary of Washington state emphasizes the fact that the ruling class will not only not surrender their power until decisively beaten by a revolutionary mass struggle, but they will not even in all cases permit their so-called democratic electoral machinery to be used to register the sentiment for a change in the system of wealth production.

The ruling of the supreme court of Washington state reversed the decision of which the letter tells, and the party of the working class is on the ballot in the State of Washington. The ruling cannot by any means be interpreted as evidence that the supreme court judges are more "liberal" or "tolerant" than the secretary of state, but simply that they feel that it is necessary to conceal, for the time being, the real role of the government as the dictatorship of the capitalist

They sought to explain away these evils by saying that the "poor whites" are responsible for them and that the "better" class of whites, unable to control the mob, is against these practices.
