ConferencePressAgent Denies Secrecy But Forgets Facts

One Session Is Public

Bolivia Leaves the Conference

(Special to the Daily Worker) WASHINGTON, Dec. 11-Secretary of State Kellogg, now chairman of the Pan-American Conference for Conciliation and Arbitration, and Charles Evans Hughes, another representative of American imperialism at this meeting of 18 Latin-American states with the United States, have ordered a veil of secrecy cast over all proceedings. The representative of the Daily Worker and correspondents of Latin-American papers were barred in the important morning sessions and

only admitted in the afternoor. Immediately after Hughes walked into the meeting today, which is under the direction of American big business taking measures to see that the present war between Bolivia and Paraguay turns out to the greatest profit of U. S. oil and mining companies in Bolivia, the door was slammed in the face of all newspaper representatives except those strictly subservient to the dictates and following the policies of American imperialism,

A certain McDermott, a press underling of the Pan-American union, informed Harrison George, the properly credentialed representative of the Daily Worker, and the reporters of the Latin-American newspapers present, that they could not have cards. Harrison George was informed that his name would be taken and his paper, The Daily Worker, would be "looked up."

The Pan-American War Conspiracy

The selection of Secretary of State Frank B. Kellogg as chairman by representatives of the corrupt, puppet and paralyzed governments calling themselves the Pan-American Conference on Arbitration and Conciliation dramatizes the real character of that assemblage which opened in Washington on Monday. At the Havana conference last winter the present conference was authorized. Its objective is to create machinery that will enable the United States imperialist government to intervene in disputes between the Latin American nations and impose compulsory arbitration upon them. This conference is dominated by Kellogg and his predecessor as secretary of state, Charles Evans Hughes. These two imperialist spokesmen in the government of Harding and Coolidge are adepts in the game of duplicity, bribery, forgery and terror being carried out against the peoples of Latin America.

The conference now going on at Washington has a two-fold purpose. (1) To drive its imperialist rival, England, out of Latin America, and is symptomatic of the growing antagonism between these two powers. (2) To secure mastery over Latin America and consolidate its power.

This present conference is of such a shady nature that were the facts known to the peoples of Latin America they would rise in unrestrained fury against the representatives of their governments who are trying to prepare the way for Yankee tyrants to reduce them to chains and silence beneath the yoke of imperialism. Such monstrous infamy is being prepared at Washington that, in order to protect its Latin American puppets, American imperialism has excluded from the conference sessions the representatives of the Daily Worker and all the writers of the Latin American press. Only those kept journalists who submit to the censorship of Kellogg are permitted to attend the conference. If the full sessions are of such a nature that the light of publicity is extinguished, what must be the character of the intrigue that takes place in committees?

While the Latin American marionettes are aiding Kellogg and Hughes at Washington the bloody hand of American imperialism is reaching down into Bolivia and inciting a war against Paraguay over territory that is alleged to have been in dispute for a hundred years or more. The cause of the outbreak of hostilities between the two countries is not to be sought in the fact that the governments have suddenly gone on a war rampage, but in the fact that a year and a half ago the Carib oil syndicate, a concern that has been working hand in hand with the Gulf Oil concern of Andrew W. Mellon in Colombia and Venezuela, discovered rich oil lands in the disputed territory.

American imperialism deliberately fomented the Bolivian attack on Paraguay in order to annex that territory to Bolivia, whose government is one of the Wall Street puppets in Latin America. It is a piece of international banditry that ranks with Roosevelt's Panama steal and Bryan's Haitian swindle under Woodrow Wilson. It is a part of the world imperialist struggie for oil. It is part of the preparations for the next world war.

The same rapacious imperialism, through its lackeys in Colombia, is carrying on a campaign of wholesale murder and terror against the workers of Colombia who are striking against the slave-driving United Fruit Company. Forty thousand workers are striking against the refusal of the American concern to comply with protective legislation placed upon the statute books by the government in response to pressure from the masses. But when American imperialism speaks the Colombian government, like a jackal, turns upon its own people.

Meanwhile Hoover continues his imperialist tour of Latin America, receiving the homage of imperialist flunkeys while preparing new and more frightful forms of slavery for the Latin Americans and forwarding the war conspiracies. This trip is accompanied by along the line in the aggress American imperialism. In its struggle for world imperialist hegemony the fortifications of the Panama Canal are being increased while the fake elections in Nicaragua have paved the way for permanent occupation of that country by American armed forces and for the building of a new canal connecting the Atlantic and Pacific as a part of the program of the imperialist war-mongers.

POLISH TERROR GROWS; ARREST **40 UKRAINIANS**

Framed on Charges of Bombing

WARSAW, Dec. 11 .- Forty Ikrainians have been arrested by olish police on the charge of being implicated in the recent bomb exolosions in Lodz and Cracow" and ut through the severest of third legree grillings to make them "conless" to the bombings. The prisoners did not collapse under the "investigation.'

The police charge, without any evidence except what the government and the police officials could manufacture, that the Ukrainians have embarked upon a plan to bomb every Polish newspaper which backs the government in the oppression of the Ukrainian minority. The police are also trying to trace the shooting at the palace of Marshal Pilsudski to the prisoners.

The Answer of the Furriers

It has now been almost two years since the reactionary officials of the American Federation of Labor, their socialist assistants and their boss and police allies, launched a concerted offensive against the left wing Joint Board Furriers Union by establishing a dual company union. Thru the economic pressure of the bosses and the helping hand (and fist) of police and thugs they hoped at that time to destroy the militant workers organization.

Instead of being driven out of the industry, the left wing Joint Board conducted a fight so successful that after this bitter period the union succeeded in gaining the allegiance of every important local in the International Fur Workers Union, from which they broke away preparatory to establishing a new international at the convention in December.

While plans were under way for the convention and the new union's simultaneous amalgamation with the new national organization of the cloak and dressmakers, who had gone thru a similar struggle, a new obstacle presented itself which the battling fur workers must overcome before their convention delivers the death blow to the degenerated hulk of the A. F. of L. scab union.

This event was the announcement of Fur Trimming Manufacturers Association that they would terminate their agreement with the left wing union Jan. 31 and conclude a fake agreement with Matthew Woll's scab union.

When the fight against the left wing began, the left wing succeeded in splitting the ranks of the employers. The big Associated Fur Manufacturers withdrew recognition from the Joint Board while the smaller trimming employers organization maintained relations with the left wing union.

With the large Associated having a fake A. F. of L. agreement which permitted the most inhuman exploitation, while trimming bosses were compelled to live up to their pact despite the Joint Board's weakened condition, their present action was to be expected. The most important reason for their action, however; was the specter seen by the bosses in a Joint Board that was ready to begin the final drive for complete control of the industry and its consequent wiping out of the scab union.

Although its official announcement was made only yesterday, this news was known over two weeks ago, and the expected demorali ation of the furriers' fight failed to materialize. On the contrary, long before the bosses were ready to admit the fact openly, the workers united behind the Joint Board in a statement announcing the immediate beginnings of mobilization for a general strike in the industry. No one who reexamines the two years of struggle, bitter struggle, against the most savage and traitorous of enemies can come to the conclusion that lack of recognition by the smaller association means a serious setback to the Joint Board. The Joint Board now stands at the end of two years of struggle and cannot be discouraged by such tactics. Instead determination is now greater than ever. The A. F. of L. company union is almost completely shattered. The United States and Canadian locals it still controlled two years ago are now waiting to officially affiliate with the new left wing national union. And most important of all-tens of thousands of cloak and dressmakers will also be members of the same amalgamated needle trades union which will conduct the final fight against the weakened

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The mobilization is going on for a general strike in the industry. The great majority of the fur workers realize that only thru this measure will they regain the union conditions they once possessed. In this way, only will they drive from the trade the A. F. of L. and socialist thieves who have robbed thousands of families of their means of a livelihood. Only by militant struggle can all the various divisions of bosses in the industry be brought to time.

"Socialists" in Colombia

No matter where the adherents of the policies of the second (socialist) international are found they never miss an opportunity to stab the movement of the working class against imperialism in the back.

Whenever workers are struggling against terrific odds, whether it be in a strike in the mines, the textile mills or the garment industry in the United States, a general strike in England, an insurrection in Vienna, or in the lines of the embattled strikers facing the murderous fire of soldiery in Colombia the role of these spurious socialists is always the same-the most depraved allies of the enemies of the workers.

Colombia, where 40,000 workers are on strike against the United Fruit Company, there exists an organization calling itself socialist. It is composed, for the most part, of small business men and confused professional hash, salted down and colored over with a "pro-labor" camouflage, including a few right wing labor officials.

This strike is led by the Communist Party of Colombia, which there goes under the name "Socialist Revolutionary" because of Colombian criminal syndicalism laws, and this party is not to be confused with the Socialist Party of Colombia. By WILLIAM Z. FOSTER In jail Boyle was treated like a prince. He had, so it was reported, a private office, a secretary, and ousiness visitors. Often he was allowed to slip out at night to visit his home. While in jail he remained business agent of his union. Im-mediately after his being jailed powerful influences, such as highpriced lawyers and conservative labor leaders, were set on foot to secure his release. Simon O'Donnell went to Washington about it. Gompers wrote to President Wilson and secured a special hearing before the attorney general. A. Mitchell Palmer, the notorious "red" baiter and general reactionary, took up the case and induced President Wilson to pardon Boyle. Upon his release from jail Boyle was presented with a \$4,500 automobile by his admiring friends. Boyle is a pal of Governor Small

of Illinois. When in 1922 the latter, charged with misappropriating state funds, was acquitted, Boyle was accused of having bribed the jury. He fled, but turned up six weeks later and was haled before the grand jury. He refused to testify and was given six months for contempt of court. He jumped \$2,000 bail and disappeared. Recognized by a woman in the millionaire Rainbow Club at Tomahawk, Wis., he was eventually, after many adventures, brought back to Chicago and sent to jail. Whereupon he was promptly par-doned by his friend Governor Small. "Umbrella Mike" then returned triiumphantly to Chicago, where, at the head of his union, he still flourishes.

Like other building trade officials, Boyle controls his union by bribery and force. By judiciously distributing political and industrial favors, placed at his disposal by capitalist politicians and employers, he has built up a solid clique of supporters. If this group cannot control a majority of votes peacefully then "rough-house" methods are used. On April 28, 1924, two men were killed and four were injured in an election fight in Boyle's union. Boyle returns the employers' favors by laying all possible obstructions in the way of organizing the 50,000 unorganized Chicago electrical workers of the Western Electrical Co., Chicago Telephone Co., and Com-

monwealth-Edison Co. Boyle is one of the many actual capitalists among Chicago building trades officials. He is heavily interested in real estate. Hhis real estate business is the Boyle & Hendricks Co. He is also the head of the Boyle Valve Co. By 1914 he was known to be worth \$350,000, which he amassed in eight years on a union salary of \$40 to \$50 per week. He is now popularly considered to be worth well on to 1,000,000.
