Jury Brings in "Not Guilty" Verdict After 13 Hours

Judge Is Vicious Pittsburgh Defense to Call Big Mass Meet

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 13.—Salvatore Accorsi is acquitted. A "not guilty" verdict was returned by the jury after it was out eighteen hours, from 5 o'clock last night until 11 o'clock this morning. It has deliberated through the night.

Haiti Revolt Spreading to Santo Domingo

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—Efforts of the administration and the capitalist press to paint the situation in Haiti as "quieted down" only conceal the continued strike resistance of the Haitian masses and the continued attempt to break that resistance by jailing and deporting of supposed "leaders."

Three members of the Dominican "cabinet," which like Borno's "council" in Haiti, is composed of national lick-spittles of Yankee imperialists, are said to have visited Haiti for a secret conference with Brigadier General Russell, whose "high commissioner" seems to be extending its authority without regard to the imperialist oppression of the United States.

British Unemployed Grows

LONDON, Dec. 13.—Unemployment has increased considerably during the past month. Official figures now place the number of jobless at 1,302,909. This is a jump of 56,300 in one month.

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New Method of Leadership of the Strikes in Czecho-Slovakia

Unorganized Sawmill Workers in Battle—Shoe Workers, Too, Elect Strike Committee From Rank and File—Skoda Metal Works Forced to Grant Striking Moulders' Demands

 PRAGUE, Dec. 13.—The shoe workers of the Smichev factory are striking here against wage cuts, under the leadership of a Strike Committee of workers from the bench. (The old bureaucratic custom of strike leadership being monopolized by the union officials is being changed by the Czecho-Slovakian workers—Editor.)
 The workers of the Strazov saw mills in Slovakia are striking against the speed-up rationalization. Ninety-five per cent of these saw mill workers are unorganized, but are striking under the leadership of a Strike Committee elected by themselves.

The moulders of the great metal plant, known as the Skoda Works, struck against wage reductions recently, and after a week on strike forced the firm to grant their demands, including pay for the days on strike.

The Communist Party stands for control of strikes by the rank and file workers under leadership of their own elected Strike Committee, as one method of great aid in making strikes effective. Workers, you may not only adopt this method, but you may join and should join the Communist Party, the only Party of the workers.

New Berlin Council in Attack on Unemployed Eject the Communists

 Yesterday it appeared that the "socialist" and other capitalist party council members had decided to reverse the approval for assistance to unemployed the old council had given the day before.

When the unemployed were demonstrating before the city hall in support of the Communist proposal to grant them relief for the winter, the police attacked the workers in the streets, meanwhile the "socialist" and other capitalist council members refused even to discuss the Communist proposals.  publican politician, Braun. And the stand also climbs the former president of the Harnerville local of the U. M. W. A. to help the state fasten the electrodes on the legs of Salvatore Accorsi, a former member of his own organization. Thus the labor fakers of Western Pennsylvania have joined actively with the Mellon crowd to murder its latest victim.

A rose-tinted picture of the "amiable" activities of the state troopers was painted by Trooper Brown when he was questioned by the state. Repeating the story that he so diligently memorized, Brown told the jury his tale.

"Sedition" in Pennsylvania.
 Brown is being cross-examined by John Henry, defense counsel:

Q. You came to break up the meeting, didn't you?
 A. Yes, to disperse the mob.
 Q. Did you hear any of the speeches?
 A. Yes, sir.
 Q. What were the speakers saying?

A. I just didn't understand, because they spoke a few words in English and then drifted off into a foreign tongue.

Q. Just what did you understand?
 A. Why, they'd say "Sacco and Vanzetti" and then the mob would cheer.

Q. Apparently they approved of these two men?
 Q. There was no violence, was there, before you troopers came?

A. I wouldn't say that, the mob jeered and booed the troopers, and one time I heard a man and a woman shout, "Kill the son-of-a-bitch, kill the son-of-a-bitch."

(Gastonia papers, please copy!)
 Q. Was it then that you threw the tear gas bombs?

A. No, sir, it was when a woman in the crowd grabbed my baton. Then I gave the signal, and my men threw the bombs, and the mob began to disperse. (All the uniformed thugs referred to their "batons," a curious euphemism of their heavy, lead-filled clubs with which they slugged men, women and children at the Cheswick demonstration August 22, 1927.)

"Only Eight Bombs."
 Q. How many tear gas bombs were thrown?
 A. I can't just remember, but I imagine eight or nine.

Q. You used your clubs quite freely, too, didn't you?
 A. Why, yes, when necessary. . . . Q. Quite considerably? And you beat women and little children, didn't you? I guess that's all, Mr. Brown.

Brown, on the stand, had insisted that there were but few women at the Cheswick meeting, and no children. But unfortunately, the Pittsburgh "Sun-Telegraph" on the evening of the 22nd, carried a three-column picture, taken by their staff photographer, showing hundreds of women and children in the crowd. Many nine strikers were there; it was a pleasant summer day, and mothers had brought their children, many with babies in arms. To the picnic grounds they had brought lunch baskets, and planned to stay in the grove the full day.

The picnic, however, was transformed into a massacre. A protest meeting of miners, workers! What an opportunity! Not content with unleashing the tear-gas bombs, the uniformed thugs began their pogrom, mercilessly beating men, women and children. Workers' heads cracked under maces. The miners, fleeing from

the overwhelming blows were snaggd on barbed wire fences, blinded by tear gas bombs and beaten into insensibility.

The cops grabbed babies by their hair and threw them to the ground. Mothers running with children at their sides were trampled to the ground.

Daily, into the offices of the International Labor Defense and the National Miners Union, in Pittsburgh, come workers who relate the story of Cheswick. They give names, places, details. "Go to see Mike Zepich and Mrs. Mitchell, and Joe, and Bill and John," they urge, "and they will tell you of the things they experienced and what they saw—all never to be forgotten!"

The Frame-up at Work.
 "Did you see the man who fired the shots at Downey?" Brown was asked. "Yes," Brown answers, rising from his seat in the witness chair to "identify" Accorsi. "I drew my revolver and fired two shots at Accorsi," he continued. "Accorsi then fired two shots at me. None of the four bullets took effect."

Brown is being cross-examined by Attorney Henry of the defense:
 Q. You now positively identify Accorsi as the man who shot Downey?
 A. Yes.
 Q. I ask you whether you swore to an affidavit at the coroner's inquest, in September, 1927.
 A. Yes.
 Q. And at that time you could not describe the man who shot Downey?
 A. No, I couldn't at that time. . . .

A "Perfect" State Witness.
 When the state placed on the stand Andy Coplan, who claims once to have been a miner, it made good its promise to produce the "mystery witness" talked about in the Pittsburgh capitalist press the day before.

Mooney has his McDonald, degenerate "star" witness brought up by Fickert; and Accorsi has his Andy Coplan, who squirmed, scraped, and shuffled even when questioned by his own prosecutor. A coal miner is on trial for his life. But what is a frame-up without at least one witness who isn't a county detective or state trooper!

Andy told a quaint tale. Although he lives five miles from Cheswick, he made his way to the scene of the meeting. But, hearing that the "troopers were coming" he fled to a nearby store where he remained, according to his testimony, from ten o'clock in the morning until three o'clock in the afternoon. And, conveniently enough, just about 11 o'clock he saw a trooper having an "argument" with a man. The trooper, he testified, as the state attorneys looked troubled, had dealt the man a vicious blow on the temple just over the left eye with his club. The trooper was about to hit him a second time when the man drew a revolver and emptied three bullets into the body of the gallant John J. Downey, Pennsylvania Royal Mounted Police.

"Sure, I Know Him!"
 All this did Andy see—from the dirty store window, at a distance of more than 25 feet. And in those fleeting seconds, he saw a side view of the man who was clubbed on the

Here Are Some of the Reasons Why the Ill. Miners Strike

(By a Worker Correspondent)

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (by mail)—Here's some of the things that have made the Illinois Miners determined to carry out the strike to a victorious finish, under the leadership of the National Miners' Union.

There have been thousands of men thrown out of the mining industry because of machines. In 1925 there were 21 mines around Springfield. Since then eight of the largest mines have been permanently closed down. The mines that do not or cannot install machines must close the shop. The following figures give an idea of the efficiency of the machine:

The average production of coal per man in this field—pick mining—was 5.25 tons. He was paid, before the reduction in wage wages, \$1.05 per ton. Of course, in addition to this, he was paid for dead work—horse back (clay veins), etc.

With the machine, today one man produces 25 to 30 tons for which he receives \$8, when by the old scale he would receive \$27.00 to \$35.00 per day. A man today, with the aid of the machine, does the work that formerly required four and five men to do. He also does this for a third or fourth of the wages formerly paid. They conveyor type of machine is a success—for the bosses—and they are being repeatedly installed.

In other sections in Illinois, where the coal is much cleaner and where the roof is good, they have scrapped the conveyor type of machine and installed the more modern type, the Jay Loader.

Three men on this machine receive \$25.07 wages, directed as follows: \$10.07 to the machine operator, and \$7.50 each for the helpers. They produce a daily average of 300 tons and displace fully 80 men. And now there is being installed a more modern machine whereby 150 men will be able to produce more coal than was formerly produced by 750 men. G. V.

The workers face 10 years' imprisonment under the Flynn Anti-sedition law. Workers in this area are forming I. L. D. branches to fight the terrorism of the steel octopus.

head and who shot Downey. That man, Andy is certain, is none other than Accorsi. Besides, with the help of Sergeant Tomek, a fellow-countryman, Andy had "identified" Accorsi in the line-up in the Richmond jail in Staten Island last June.

And miners, present in the courtroom today, reported to the I. L. D. that Coplan is a notoriously disreputable character in his community, having been arrested on numerous occasions charged with assault and battery; and that during the past six or seven months Coplan has appeared flushed with cash. This is particularly puzzling in view of the unemployment and low wages prevailing in the coal mines at the present time.

Curiously enough, both Trooper Brown and Andy Coplan agreed to the letter on the description of the alleged slayer. Black slouch hat, dark mustache, blue shirt, black shoes, and unshaven. In the two minutes during the shooting, the two "star" witnesses had had time to observe all this. But questioned as to the color of Accorsi's trousers, when they "identified" him during the leisurely half-hour in the Staten Island jail, their memories, for some reason, failed them.

Toledo Plants Are Making Shells for the Coming Imperialist War

TOLEDO, Ohio (by mail)—One thing is happening in Toledo which is very instructive to those workers who actually believe that Hoovers, Kellogg's and MacDonald's so called peace plans and pacts are sincere. Three of Toledo's largest plants, the Autolite, Overland and the Doehler

Die Casting Co. recently entered into a contract with the federal government at Washington to begin making shells in their plants with the coming of the New Year. Workers in these plants have been remarking upon this, and the newspapers have also published items to that effect. Militant workers understand that the unemployment crisis in Toledo was hastened by the flooding of

America's markets with goods, and that the only way out for the American bosses is to attempt capture of the foreign markets of other capitalist nations. This contract to produce shells for American bosses is simply a proof of the inevitability of the coming imperialist war, and the workers of Toledo are beginning to understand this fact.

The workers of the Marvel Bindery woke up. The first revolt ended with success. When two scab window cleaners came to clean the windows, the workers got mad. The first window the scabs started on was the one I was sitting at. I asked them if they believed in the union, and if not why not, and why did they scab. The boss came over and wanted to know what was wrong, and said he sent them down.

By this time the rest of the workers had stopped working. Seeing the sentiment against him, especially when he was told in "low and soft tones" by one of the workers, that scabbing didn't go, he gave in. It was the first time the workers demanded something here, not begging, and got it.

All-round men here make \$30-\$35.

A boy working here about two years makes \$14. When one comes two minutes late his wages are cut.

The workers here, like the workers the world over, are waking up under the speed-up and miserable conditions. The boss feels the revolt and therefore we are already having a spy in the place. But this won't stop the revolt, the flames from bursting out.

WOMEN SLAVE IN LUFKIN RULE

(By a Worker Correspondent)

Saginaw, Mich.—Dear Comrades: The Lufkin Rule in this city employs many women and young girls. The reason for this is that they can hire us at lower wages than the male adult workers.

We work nine hours a day and get 20c per hour. And they speed us up right along. Where wood rules are made 15 to 20 girls work in one department, now one machine makes it possible to do the same work with two girls. There is no protection on the machines, which makes the work very hazardous.

Besides receiving these low miserable wages we are compelled to pay ten cents a week to "charity." It is therefore necessary to build a strong union so that we can fight for better conditions.

ants carried through the court and threatened arrests if the demonstration continued.

The crowd of workers present greeted each other on the failure of the Mellon gang's frame-up against Accorsi.

Accorsi, overjoyed at the successful defeat of the attempt to railroad him to the electric chair, joined his family which is now staying with relatives in Pittsburgh. Capitalist newspaper photographers spent half an hour taking pictures of Accorsi and his family.

The International Labor Defense immediately after its successful fight against the frame-up of the Mellon coal and iron police and the courts, issued a statement hailing the acquittal as proof of the necessity of a strong labor defense organization which was able to expose the crude frame-up plot of the Pennsylvania bosses who attempted to vindicate the brutal attack of the state police against the Cheswick Sacco and Vanzetti demonstration.

Trooper Downey, for whose death Accorsi was tried, was killed by enraged workers when he viciously and murderously attacked a crowd of men, women and children.

After the rendering of the verdict, the prosecutor dropped the manslaughter charge, realizing the shallowness of their frame-up.

The Pittsburgh International Labor Defense is arranging a mass meeting Monday night at Carnegie Auditorium on the north side of the city to celebrate Accorsi's release. Salvatore Accorsi will be one of the speakers. Sinclair Lewis will address the meeting. Max Salzman will be chairman.

The prestige of the International Labor Defense, as a result of its successful mobilization of the workers for the defense of Accorsi, is very high with the workers in Pittsburgh.

ers in the United States as well as in foreign lands. It is with reason that the lords of Wall Street and Washington do everything in their power to keep Negro and white workers here from uniting in their daily struggles.

"Now the Haitian masses are in revolt. They are no patient sufferers, these proud blacks, whose forebears led by Toussaint l'Ouverture drove the invading armies of Napoleon III into the sea. It is truly the masses—the exploited toilers of Haiti—who are rising today against the Wall Street invaders and their satellites.

"The puppet president, Louis Borno, assured his imperialist masters that he would have an easy time disposing of the students' strike at Damien. But it has been followed by risings of peasants throughout the island. And now the workers in the marine-guarded customs houses are on strike.

"Five Haitian peasants are admitted to have been shot down by the marines, their deaths going to swell the total of thousands of reported and unreported murders since the imperialist occupation began. In the language of imperialism, these martyrs are described as "leaders of a mob." Meantime the United States government is sending additional marines to Haiti, with field guns, bombing planes, etc. In this war of occupation against the Haitian people, Hoover has forgotten all about the Kellogg "Peace Pact," which he invoked as a threat of alliance against the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics a few days ago!

"This time Hoover raises the specter of an "investigation." He will show the Haitians first and have his congress "investigate" later.

"Negroes in the United States! American workers, white as well as black! All who are sincere enemies of imperialism! We call upon you to expose this hypocrisy of "investigation" as a cloak to divert attention from the continued slaughter of the Haitian masses! No investigation is necessary to get the marines

the mere formality of national boundary lines, to meet imperialist needs. The "president" of Santo Domingo, like Borno of Haiti, and Moncada of Nicaragua, is a vengeful wretch of a servant of the U. S.

While he is now in a hospital in Baltimore, the report that the Dominican masses are threatening to rise just because the "president" is absent, is putting the "power" of this ridiculous puppet above the social force of masses who are beginning to resist misery and oppression.

A Worker-Peasant Party!

In Haiti, where it is now learned that a Workers' and Peasants' Party was recently formed, thirty-three are reported as held for trial by court martial. More arrests are made daily, seventeen Haitians of Port-au-Prince who were arrested yesterday are being forced to leave their homes and families and be deported to other parts of the country.

It is now admitted that twice the number of peasants were killed at the Aux Cayes massacre by marines, than what was reported by the "High Commissioner," or given to the press by the State Department. Ten were killed and forty wounded, it is now said. Perhaps the figure is still higher.

A swarm of stool-pigeons are being sent among the people, whose dirty work is officially covered as "intelligence men to reassure the people," but whose job is to detect and inform the marines of who should be arrested as leaders.

Election a Fake.
 The effort of the capitalist press to make believe that the "elections" coming in April are even as "democratic" as those in Chicago, is an outrageous swindle, since the alleged "election" will be by the "council of state" the high-sounding title of which only shelters a gang of kneebenders and relatives of the scoundrel Borno.

The workers and peasants have had no vote since Yankee "democracy" was established in 1915, and will have no vote in the April "elections." Not that it would make much difference if they did, since the "guaranteed democracy" used in Nicaragua merely resulted in giving a color of legality to American occupation. But the American capitalist press chatter about the "aspirants" for office is absurd, since by one means or another, American imperialism will have its man, Borno or one like him, in office, unless the Haitian workers and peasants drive the marines and marine-bossed National Guard into the sea.

A mass demonstration to protest against the reign of terror set up in Haiti will be held this afternoon at 1.15 in front of the Federal building at Park Row, corner Broadway. The Communist Party, New York District, calls upon all workers to participate.
