SACCO: "I know that the sentence will be between two classes, the oppressed class and the rich class, and there will be always collision between one and the other. We fraternize the people with the books, with the literature. You persecute the people, tyrannize over them and kill them. We try the education of people always. You try to put a path between us and some other nationality that hates each other. That is why I am here today on this bench, for having been the oppressed class. Well. You are the oppressor."

VANZETTI: "This is what I say: I would not wish to a dog or to a snake, to the most low and misfortune creature of the earth-I would not wish to any of them what I have had to suffer for things that I am not guilty of. But my conviction is that I have suffered for things that I am guilty of. I am suffering because I am a radical, and indeed I am a radical. I have suffered because I was an Italian, and indeed I am an Italian. I have suffered more for my family, for my beloved than for myself; but I am so convinced to be right that you could execute me two times, and if I could be reborn two other times I would live again to do what I have done already.'

MOSCOW, U. S. S. R., Aug. 21.-The Chinese Trade Unions at the Pan-Pacific Trade Union Conference yesterday issued a joint declaration with the Central Committee of the Soviet Trade Unions, stating that the present conflict in the Far East is not a conflict between the peoples of the Soviet Union and China, but between the toilers of both countries, on one hand, and the Chinese feudal reactionaries and militarists plus the foreign imperialists, on the other.

They further pledge.. themselves to continue the struggle until the native and foreign exploiters are driven from China and a workers and peasants republic has been established.

HARBIN, Manchuria, Aug. 21. - Reports were received here today that the Japanese government has begun to move troops along the Southern Manchurlan Railroad in a position to concentrate against the Soviet Union at the first possible opportunity.

### Summary of the Case of Gastonia Workers

December, 1928, Fred Beal, Southern District Organizer of the National Textile Workers Union, begins organizing . Union local in Charlotte and Gastonia.

April 2, 1929, 2,500 workers of the Loray Mill in Gastonia of the Manville-Jenckes Company strike under the banner of the National Textile Workers' Union when several union members are fired.

April 18, the Workers' International Relief Store is raided by a band of masked men breaking down the building and destroying food supplies under the nose of the miltia.

Grand Jury "investigation" results in whitewash for mob.

May 16, strikers write a letter to Governor O. Max Gardner serving notice that they built their own headquarters and will defend it.

July 3, threats of attack on colony bring textile workers from far and wide to defense. Police attack "Red" Hendricks on way to speak to newly hired Loray textile workers who plan to strike. Postpone attack on colony.

July 27, texile workers from five states of the South praise action of arrested in defending colony and pledge support. Call for Charlotte Conference October 12 and 13.

June 7, drunken Gastonia police attack and fire into Workers International Relief tent colony in Gastonia, after breaking up a picket line by force. Police Chief Aderholt is killed, two policemen and one union organizer are

wounded. The same night the colony is raided again, 71 men and women thrown in jail, gassed and beaten. Of these 22 are held for murder or murderous assault.

In this statement he repeats that national and international protest of millions of workers can save himand not a reliance on the "fairnes of the courts." He had already suffered too much at the hands of the capitalist system to have any illuions about capitalist "fairness."

And his words resound like peals of thunder to drown out the lies spread by such institutions at the Nation, the New Republic, the New York Times, the New York Volkszeitung. . These latter have repeated time and again a "fair trial" can be expected—that mass protest is unnecessary—that the methods used by the Gastonia Joint Defense and Relief Campaign to mobilize the workers are "detrimental" to the cause of the prisoners. The letter follows:

"As I wrote you before I repeat again today, only an international clamor - a protest can free us. And yet, while we are so near the tomb your letter amazes me with its unwarranted optimism, saying 'you must not despair, dear Nicola, for though the suffering belong and weary, it is soon to end in

"How you are deluded. This is not even common sense, comknow the ends to which the defenders of this decrepit old society will go? Under the circumstances it pains me to see such blind optimism in a comrade. Are you waiting to see them kill us first so that you can build us a monument?"

To Sacco's young son Dante, Vanzetti wrote the following warm touching farewell:

"Remember, Dante, remember, always these things: we are not criminals; they convicted us on a frame-up; they denied us a new trial; and if we will be executed after seven years, four months and seventeen days of unspeakable tortures and wrongs, it is for what I already told you: because we were for the poor and against the exploitation of the man by the man."

This is a reproduction of the first page of the Daily Worker of August 9, 1927, calling the masses to strike against the murder of Sacco and Vanzetti. Today 23 Gastonia strike leaders stand in danger

### Summary of Sacco and Vanzetti Case

May 5, 1920, Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti are arrested on a street-car while going from West Bridgewater to Brockton, Mass. By August 1, Vanzetti is sentenced to from 12 to 15 years by Judge Thayer in Plymouth for attempting to rob a cashier in Bridgewater on Dec. 24, 1919.

July 14, 1921, Sacco and Vanzetti are convicted of murder in the first degree as chief participants in the murder which occurred in South Baintree on April 15, 1920.

October 12, 1921 the workers of Paris conduct a huge protest demonstration against the verdict, in which 20 workers are wounded. Tens of thousands of meetings and demonstrations take place thruout the world in soli-

darity with Sacco and Vanzetti. December 24, 1921 Judge Thayer refuses to grant a plea for a new trial.

February 16, 1923 Sacco begins a hunger strike in the Norfolk County jail which lasts 30

October 1, 1924 Judge Thayer denies five motions of the defense to challenge the verdict of

January 10, 1926, Celestino Madeiros, a sentenced criminal declares that he knows the murder was committed by the Morelli

May 12, 1926 The State Supreme Court denies a new trial to Sacco and Vanzetti, maintaining that they were legally convicted.

November 19, 1926 twenty thousand workers gather in Madison Square Garde , New York, to demand a new trial for Sacco and Vanzetti

April 5, 1927 the state supreme court denies all pleas for a new

April 9, 1927, Judge Thayer hands down a decision that Sacco and Vanzetti shall die in the electric chair on July 10, 1927.

April 10 International Labor Defense issues call for demonstraions of protest throughout the United States and appeals to the labor movement of the world to join in a final movement to save Sacco and Vanzetti from being murdered.

April 23 Governor Alvin T. Fuller institutes his star chamber investigation committee to give sanctity to the legal execu-

July 29 Governor Fuller postpones the execution to August 10. July 7 a quarter of a million workers strike in protest in New York, Over 25,000 attend a demonstration in Union Square July 17 Sacco and Vanzetti be-

gin a hunger strike. In the meantime, strikes, demonstrations and meetings are taking place in every part of the world, demanding the release of Sacco and Vanzetti, or the granting of a new trial. Tens of millions of workers are set in motion. Fuller's office is swamped with thousands upon thousands of letters and telegrams and

cablegrams of protest. August 10, twenty minutes before the time set for the execution, and while millions of workers are demonstrating, Governor Fuller postpones the cate of execution to August 22. August 22 Rose, wife of Sacco,

and Luigia, sister of Vanzetti, approach Governor Fulle: for last minute action. He declines to act. The execution takes place a few minutes after midnight.

# WORLD DEMONSTRATIONS TWENTY-THREE STRIKERS

N. Y. Workers in Big Meet; Many Other Rallies in U. S.; General Strike in Rosario

Workers of USSR, Germany, England, France, Join Huge Wave of Protest

BULLETIN

ROSARIO, Argentina, Aug. 21.-A general strike, called in sympathy with striking street car workers, went into effect here today. No disturbances were reported. The strike is also called to commemorate the murder of Sacco and Vanzetti and to protest against the Gastonia conspiracy.

The downtown streets of this city, second most important in the republic, were almost deserted. Business houses kept heavy sheet-iron night shutters over the show-windows. Practically no omnibuses, which had been used to help break the street car strike, were on the streets. The number of street cars operated by strikebreakers was perceptibly reduced.

More than 800 police and troops patrolled the business section, with motorcycle officers guarding the outlying districts, prepared to do their utmost to help break the strike.

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 21.—The convention of the militant Mexican Unitary Confederation of Labor, meeting here, telegraphed a protest to President Hoover against the brutality of the police and courts of North Carolina against the Gastonia strikers. The convention condemned "the plans to assassinate 16 workers of Gastonia, N. C., charged with murder," and demanded their immediate release. The convention is being attended by delegates representing more

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 21.—Acting on orders from the police, the owner of the hall here that had been engaged for the Sacco-Vanzetti-Gastonia Defense and Relief meeting has barred the meeting.

The meeting will be held Saturday at 7:30 p. m. at the corner of Broadway and Park, despite what the police may do.

### MASS STRENGTH MUST OPPOSE BOSSES OF N. C.

Exposes Hypocrisy of "Chivalry"

The following is the address made by Vera Bush, one of the 16 whom the Gastonia bosses are attempting to railroad to electrocution. The address was made to the thousands of workers who attended the huge Gastonix Defense and Relief demonstration in New York recently.

Feliow Workers and Comrades: Your wonderful demonstration tonight has fully justified the faith in the working class of this country which we without exception felt even our most trying and abandoned times. This demonstration here justifies the faith in the working class which we felt even when we sat in our cells down there in Gastonia after the raids of June

If Amy Schechter and myself are able to be here tonight to speak to you after two months in the jails of Gastonia, we owe this to the hypocritical gesture of southern chivalry, that famous chivalry toward women on the part of the prosecution, who want on the one hand, to cover up their weaknes, the mistake they have made by dragging three women into this case, realizing what an asset our presence is to the case, wishing to cover up on the other hand their intentions to the fullest extent to railroad these thirteen boys-their intentions of stopping at nothing, to sent them to the electric chair, as many as possible to long prison sentences.

The prosecution did not change this indictment against us-indeed it stands as it was made in the beginning. We are indicted also for first degree murder. 



### OFFICIALS PLAN TO JAIL WORKERS IN ARMY PRISONS

'Enforcement" Plan Extended by Hoover

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.-Working class prisoners can be forced to undergo repressive discipline of the military Jails, according to an agreement concluded today between president Hoover, War Secretary Good and Attorney Mitchell. Under the plea of "relieving overcrowding in Federal penitentiaries," the agreement provides for the transfer to the State Justice Department of military prisons not yet full.

The first move in the new plan will be to turn over the notorious Leavenworth Military Prison to the Department of Justice. The vicious discipline at Leavenworth has been told more than once by soldiers and particularly by friends of John Porter, young Communist League organizer imprisoned for deserting the army and becoming active in the New Bedford textile strike. Governor's Island and Alcatrez, where Paul Crouch was imprisoned for activity in the Hawaiian Communist League, are also included in the transfer plan.

While the move is inspired largely by the recent wholesale prison revolts against terrific overcrowding, NY Workers to Protest volts against terrific overelowding, the use of military jails for the civilian population fits well into the Hoover "law enforcement" plan, designed primarily as an extension of repressive measures against the

To the Workers of the World: I wish to say a few thing about three letters, the three letters I wish to write about are W. I. R. These three letters stand for the Workers International Relief, which was established in the year 1927. It is an Organization that stands for "Solidarity" and not "Charity." They believe in taking care of the workers who are on strike to better the rotten conditions, that they have to work under. When they come out on stike the W. I. R. then show solidarity with them, by coming to their strike and fighting along side of them. When the workers strike you know very well that the mill owners are not going to feed them | and are going to put the workers out of their homes. The workers realy ought own these houses, for they have paid the mill owners high rent for the houses and may have paid for their houses two or three times. But they are thrown out just the same. Here is where the W. I. R. comes in and helps. They take the poor workers and feed them and give them shelter. They fight with the workers in this way to help them win their strike. Let's take for instance the strike in Gastonia. The N. T. W. U. learnt about the condi tions in the Loray mill and comes down to show the workers that they did not have to slave for the mill bosses. The workers woke up to the facts, and realized the only way they could better their condition would be to join the union. They did this and by joining the union they were fired out of the mill. On this account the mill was called out on strike. You can imagine the poverty of the workers, for the W. I. # REOPENED SOON

Charlotte Poisoned by Lies of Press

The trial of the sixteen Gastonia strikers will re-open in a few days, Monday, August 26, in Charlotte, N. C., a city which has been poisoned by the flow of malicious lies by the Charlotte press, especially since July 26, when the trial opened orig-

This is the city to which the trial of the Gastonia strikers had been changed by the judge allegedly on the supposition that a 'fairer' trial could be secured here.

Charlotte Press Spreading Lies. Since the change of venue the Charlotte yellow press has been pouring forth a stream of lies that vie only with the Gastonia Gazette's frenzies during the first stages of the strike-when an open call for blood, for lynch law, was made.

The trial of the sixteen Gastonia strikers charged with first degree murder will re-open in the small city of Charlotte, but the eyes of the world will be focussed on the court-

Every country of the world, the masses of these countries, the working class of America, have been roused by the International Labor Defense, the Workers International Relief, and the National Textile Workers Union, now functioning on a united front in the Gastonia Joint Defense and Relief Committe whose national offices are at 80 E. 119th St., N. 

### Two Years After the Murder of Sacco and Vanzetti

BETWEEN nightfall and dawn two years ago tonight the capitalist class of the United States, in the face of worldwide protests and demonstrations contemptuously hurled at the feet of the working class the shattered and burned bodies of Sacco and Vanzetti. These two workers, guiltless of the crime charged against them, were fiendishly tormented for seven years, and finally led to the electric chair where bolts of chained lightning were sent surging through their tortured bodies. Sacco and Vanzetti were victims of one of the most frightful class murders in history.

In the long struggle for their liberation these two Italian workers had become symbols of the organization and struggles of the working class against the capitalist class of this country. Their murder was an attempt on the part of the ruling class to terrorize all who dared to challenge its ruthless exploitation of the wage workers of this country.

The vile instruments that the American capitalist class used to carry out this murder, Governor Fuller, Judge Thayer, President E. Lawrence Lowell of Harvard University, Judge Grant, S. W. Stratton, president of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, knew these two workers were innocent, but they had their instructions and carried them out.

Today, two years after the murder of Sacco and Vanzetti, milions of workers, who first began to perceive the real meaning of capitalist class justice at that time, now understand that capitalist laws, courts, judges, police and all other social institutions of the ruling class are maintained for the purpose of mercilessly suppressing the working class in order to enable the capitalist class to continue to pile up wealth through the exploitation of labor.

Sacco and Vanzetti have joined the list of labor's martyrs and will always be remembered and honored by the workers of the world. Today throughout the whole world untold millions of workers in the imperialist nations and the masses in the exploited colonies and semi-colonies will honor the memory of these two brave working class fighters. The agents of the United States government in foreign countries dare not today openly appear. The American embassies are regarded as houses of shame and are objects of loathing and contempt.

For the workers of the United States and of the world, this anniversary of the murder of Sacco and Vanzetti has special significance, because the identical ruling class that so contemptiously challenged us by murdering them, is today endeavoring to railroad to the electric chair 16 striking mill workers and strike leaders in Gastonia, North Carolina.

The Gastonia prisoners are today, as Sacco and Vanzetti were for seven long years, in the shadow of the electric chair. charged with murder, because they dared defend themselves against an assault of police thugs and gunmen who attacked their tent colony with the object of destroying it and murdering the strikers and their families.

From the beginning of the attempt of the capitalist exploiters to send the Gastonia victims to the electric chair, the defense has been conducted along clear class lines. The meddling liberals, the yellow socialists who in that case aided the murderers by sowing all sorts of illusions about capitalist justice and who, even up to the last day, tried to sabotage mass demonstrations and strikes and tell the workers to have faith in "the orderly process of justice" to save Sacco and Vanzetti, will not be able to repeat their treacherous performance in the Gastonia cases. To the end the Gastonia fight must be and will be continued on class lines. There must be the most intensive mobilization of the working class in the United States and throughout the world to save these work-

All workers everywhere who have to slave to pay tribute to the Uncle Shylock, imperialist loan monger of the world, must recognize that the Gastonia victims are today in jail because they participated in a drive to organize and lead in struggles the workers of the "New South" which abounds in war industries. Just as bankers and industrialists of the North murdered Sacco and Vanzetti in order to terrorize labor in the textile mills and shoe factories, so the same outfit with investments in the South, are trying to repeat their dastardly acts on a still greater scale to stop the working class struggle against rationalization.

Today the New York masses demonstrate at Union Square at five o'clock in the afternoon in a combined Sacco-Vanzetti memorial and defense of the Gastonia victims. In every other city and industrial center in the country similar demonstrations will be held.

The workers and peasants of the Soviet Union and all revolutionary workers everywhere who demonstrate in memory of Sacco and Vanzetti today will recognize that the same malignant imperialist power that is inciting the Chinese bandit government against the Soviet Union, is the identical ruling class that murdered Sacco and Vanzetti and is now striving to burn alive the Gastonia prisoners.

In Latin America there will be tremendous demonstrations and strikes because the class-conscious workers in the southern republics know only too well that the same class that exploits them, that sends marines and bombing planes against them in order that Wall Street may realize superprofits through their exploitation and degradation, also murders workers in the United States for daring to challenge the same imperialist oppressor.

Throughout the world the masses must take up the battle cry:

Remember Sacco and Vanzetti!

Stop the bloody hand of Yankee capitalism now raised against the Gastonia victims!

Free the Gastonia prisoners! Down with Yankee imperialism! SAVE THE GASTONIA STRIKERS!

FURTHER on, at a round meeting-point in the trenches, where the parapet was flattened out, a tree, standing out, was suddenly blasted; close at hand, came the shell's terrific iron thresh; you saw the flash, like a clenched hand, shaking, smashing, rending.

Amidst the foulness and ferocious mechanical din of war, where thunderclaps and shreds of steel and copper nails about for men, Joel became a professional abuser of slaughter, and even of patriotism (he was actually heard to say that commissioned officers and ministers were not of finer clay). But Martin was unshaken; he remained the prince of jesters. Joel was marked down as a maker of trouble and kept under observation by the gilded officers; here was a fellow who made heavy weather of things and pitied the men, till they began to think of things that they would never have dreamed of otherwise! But when he had had his way, Martin would pass by, wipe out the effect of his poisonous jeremaids with one or two well-timed jokes that stopped the fellows thinking too much about their own skins.
