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ALABAMA STATE SUPREME COURT DECREES THE BURNING OF 7 INNOCENT SCOTTSBORO NEGRO BOYS! Hundreds Dying of Starvation, Mass. Congressman Says GHASTLY FRAME-UP OF

Workers! Prevent the Murder GOVERNOR of Negro Children!

THE Supreme Court of Alabama yesterday decreed that seven of the nine innocent Negro boys framed up at Scottsboro shall be burned in the electric chair on May 13.

The Communist Party calls upon the masses, Negro and white, of this country and of all countries of the world to throw this cold-blooded crime of the Alabama ruling class back into the teeth of the ruling class murderers. We call upon the working class of this country and the world to snatch these innocent children from the hands of the legal murderers of Alabama and to compel their release.

There is no man or woman who does not know that these friendless Negro lads are innocent of all crime. They were deliberately framed up, two prostitutes were terrorized and persuaded to bear false witness against them after the prostitutes had themselves at first declared the boys innocent. The capitalist-feudal ruling class of Alabama, which is already responsible for the cold-blooded murder of scores of Negro men, women and children during the past year, now decides to proceed with a brutality that would shock the worst tyrants of the middle ages to burn alive seven innocent children of the Negro people and the working class. The fact that these children are to be burned on the electric chair does not change the character of this lynching. It is identical with the many other orgies of murder when human beings are burned at the stake on the public square.

The capitalist-feudal ruling class of Alabama, backed up by the Wall Street government at Washington, is proceeding with this murder as a part of a wide campaign to terrorize and suppress the Negro masses and to crush the spirit of the working class, black and white. The decision of the Alabama Supreme Court to murder these boys is a direct continuation, by slightly different means, of the policy of lynching that has already claimed thousands of victims in this country and which has made the name of American capitalism synonymous with murder. The intended burning of these innocent boys is a continuation of the policy of shooting down unemployed Negro and white workers in Chicago, Cleveland and Kentucky. It is a continuation of the policy of unrestricted terror against the toiling masses that was shown in Detroit, where Henry Ford's policemen deliberately firing upon a mass of workers demanding employment, resulting in the death of four.

The policy of ruthless violence against the masses is becoming more open in the effort of the parasite ruling class to place upon the working masses the burden of the economic crisis by which the capitalist system is being undermined. The wave of murderous terror against the Negro people and the white and black working class is directly connected with the preparations rapidly being made by United States imperialism to plunge this country into the second imperialist world war. The regime of bloody terror over the laboring masses of the United States is intended not only to enable the wealthy parasite class to escape the crisis by throwing its burdens upon the working class and laboring farmers, but is a direct part of the preparations of this country for imperialist war for the enslavement of the Chinese people, for an imperialist world war against the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics.

NEGRO CHILDREN UPHELD: "TO DIE MAY 13"

Appeal Over Heads of Murderous Ruling Class Compel Release of Framed-Up Negro Children!

Fate Rests in the Hands of the Working Class!

The Alabama Supreme Court yesterday upheld the brutal lynch death verdicts against 7 of the eight Scottsboro Negro boys who were framed-up last March 25 on a fake "rape" charge and rushed through a farcical "trial" at Scottsboro, Ala., to death sentences. Execution of the lynch verdicts has been set for May 13. The International Labor Defense has announced its intention to carry the fight to the United States Supreme Court.

The decision of the Alabama Supreme Court upholding the lynch verdicts was announced yesterday, exactly two months after the hearing on January 21 and 22 of the arguments of Gen. George W. Chamlee, Joseph Brodsky, Irving Schwab and other defense attorneys on the appeal filed by the International Labor Defense.

of the Alabama Supreme Court to murder these innocent Negro boys is clearly revealed by a long succession of events. Nearly all lynching and frame-up cases are immediately connected up with developing struggles, especially struggles between Negro share-croppers and their white landlord exploiters as in the case of Camp Hill, Ala., where Negro share-croppers were shot to death for organizing a union, and also in the case of Orphan Jones and Mathew Williams in Maryland, the case of Barney Lee Ross in Texas, in which the capitalist governor of that state, in approving the legal murder of the innocent Negro, declared:

"It may be that this man is innocent, but it is sometimes necessary to burn a house in order to save a village."

This is the attitude of the white capitalist and landlord classes of America. The burning of Negro children, even though the whole world knows they are innocent of crime, is necessary in order to save the rotten capitalist wage slave system by terrorizing the working people and reducing them to the status of dumb driven cattle.

The Communist Party calls the attention of the masses of Negro people and working class black and white to the shameful part that the so-called "National Association for the Advancement of Colored People" and the so-called "Socialist Party" are playing in this bloody crime against the Negro masses. In order to preserve the capitalist system, and in order to serve the interests of their white masters, Negro agents of the capitalist class such as Walter White, William Pickens and other leaders of the NAACP, as well as all of the spokesmen for the Socialist Party, have actively intervened to help in the murder of the nine Negro boys of Scottsboro. The NAACP deliberately caused the shooting and arrest of many Negro workers for daring to protest against the Scottsboro murders. It has, thru the renegade Negro leaders Pickens and White, actively called upon and aided the Alabama State authorities in violent suppression of protest meetings of Negro and white workers in Alabama who met to protest against the frame-up. The NAACP and Socialist Party have deliberately tried to prevent any organization of protest and have even stolen the funds of the Negro workers who wished to contribute to the legal defense of these innocent boys. Without the help of these agents of capitalism, it would not have been possible for the Alabama ruling class to proceed so complacently with this indicial murder

But the fate of these innocent Negro boys still rests in the hands of the masses! All nine of the boys would already have been murdered if the working class and Negro masses had not already raised their voices in protest. But the protest has not been sufficiently strong! The masses now must move. The working class, Negro and white, must organize such a mass protest of tens of millions as will compel the bloody-handed ruling class of Alabama to desist from this hideous crime.

The fate of the nine innocent Scottsboro boys is in the hands of the working class.

Workers, Negro and white, support the International Labor Defense and the League of Struggle for Negro Rights in the fight against the effort of the slave system to burn alive our innocent children!

It is a part of the struggle against slavery! It is a part of the strugle against lynching! It is a part of the struggle for the right of selfdetermination for the Negro masses! It is a part of the struggle for equal rights of Negro and white! It is a part of the struggle against slavery, starvation and imperialist war.

Every working class organization, every sympathetic group, every meeting of workers must thunder their protest against this lynch verdict and demand the immediate and unconditional release of these innocent victims of class justice and national oppression. The struggle against the Scottsboro verdict must be an integral part of the militant anti-war demonstrations on April 6.

Workers! Voice your anger against this murder! Voice your determination to save these Negro children-victims of capitalism!

Smash the lynch terror against the Negro masses. Smash the Scottsboro lynch verdict. Build a fighting alliance of Negro and white workers against imperialist oppression.

Steps for starting mass colonization of Manchuria by Japanese reservists were announced in Tokyo yesterday. This is part of the openly announced plans of Japanese imperialism to convert Manchuria. into an armed base against the Soviet Union.

Under the pretext of giving its members a chance to 'inspect" on the ground the possibilities for colonization, the association has called its annual conference for Mukden, Manchuria, in

In the meantime, agreement was reported to have been reached with Austria, Hungary and Czechoslovakia on the French proposals for a Danube bloc. trial before a juvenile court, and have that court declare him an incorrigible, thus facilitating his legal lynching through the adult courts.

Another gesture intended to deceive the masses is the reported dissenting of Chief Justice Anderson in the decision upholding the lynch verdicts against the other seven children.

The eight boys, together with 14year-old Roy Wright in whose case a mistrial was declared at the original "trials" were arrested on March 25, 1931. They were at first charged with fighting against some white boys on the freight train on which they were traveling in a hunt for workers. When, however, it was discovered that two white hoboes on the train were girls wearing overall.

the southern bosses realized that all the elements were present for a nice lynch frame-up, and at once raised the lynch issue of "rape."

The two girls at first denied the boys had molested them, but under pressure by State officials changed their stories. The boys were rushed to trial on April 6, a few days after their arrest without being permitted time to arrange for their defense or to notify their parents. Within 73 hours death sentences were handed out to all but Roy Wright, while a band furnished by local mill bosses played outside the court house. They were sentenced to die on July 10, but the storm of working class protest throughout the world forced the bosses to postpone the execution and to permit an appeal.

The ILD is appealing the death verdicts. It will also demand a change of venue for Eugene Williams, nad an immediate hearing in the case of Roy Wright who has been held in the jail for over a year, while awaiting a new trial. In carrying on the fight against these brutal lynch verdicts, the ILD faces a tremendous task. Workers are urged to immediately rush funds to help carry on the fight. Morgan and His Billions

WHO is this J. P. Morgan who wants the workers, now living on starvation rations, to feed themselves through the "Block-Aid" system? He is a mysterious figure, member of a family who have been sucking up the wealth produced by the American workers for nearly a century. He is the outstanding figure of American imperialism, typical of capitalism which concentrates huge masses of wealth into the hands of a few, leading to crisis, unemployment, starvation and, imperialist war. Mr. Morgan is the most powerful force in the American government. He and his clique speak, not Hoover. Hoover is the mouthpiece, the figurehead.

Billions were made by him and his class in organizing the steel trust; billions were made out of the blood and slaughter of the last world war; and, when the crisis hit, Mr. Morgan insisted that the steel workers pay by wage-cuts, just as he tells the unemployed to feed themselves now, to save Mr. Morgan's billions.

J. P. Morgan never speaks in public. Only the most momentous crisis, when his millions are not growing fast enough, when banks begin to collapse, when whole national finances are crumbling, does Mr. Morgan appear in public to say anything. The last time Mr. Morgan spoke was in London. Then Britain went off the gold standard. Ramsay MacDonald and the "labor government" handed the British workers a cut in the "dole," a cut in wages that has today netted the British capitalists million in profist

Now Mr. Morgan speaks again-to the 12,000,000 starving unemployed and their families in this country, to the 1,000,000 workers in the United States Steel Corporation whose wage-cuts went into the pockets of Mr. Morgan; to the workers on the railroads, whose wage-cut of \$220,000,000 mainly found its way into Mr. Morgan's pockets.

Why did the great J. P. Morgan, the keystone of Wall Street, the leader of the "39" who rule the United States, decide to speak for the "Block-Aid" campaign at this particular time?

Hadn't Senator Bingham said that there was "no starvation" in the United States? Then why need Mr. Morgan take the momentous and unparalleled decision to speak to the "masses" about how to stave off hunger-by leaving the profits of the rich intact?

The fact is that the economic crisis is growing so deep, the com plete collapse of a so-called spring revival has been so striking, the growing, gnawing hunger among millions has been increasing so rapidly, the capitalists are going to extreme measures to keep the unemployed from organizing on a working-class, militant basis to demand relief.

Mr. Morgan remembers what happened in Michigan, where the un employed faced death to demand jobs or food. They know bullets will not stop the jobless from organizing. They know unemployment relief is being cut, and they know that new millions are joining the struggle for unemployment insurance. Mr. Morgan does not want to part with one cent of the \$74,000,000,000 in the corporations he and his fellow bankers own. Mr. Morgan does not want to part with the hundreds of millions he wrung out of the blood of the workers in the last world war. He does not want to provide one centofunemployment insurance from his billions in foreign investments.

Morgan, a close friend of the fascist Mussolini, whom he has losned hundreds of millions to enslave the Italian masses, has learned from the master fascist

ONE-FIFTH OF THE POPULA-OF YOUNGSTOWN IS ON HUNGER RATIONS

MISS Anna M. Woodward, Allied Council Director, reported that 5,000 families are now on the list for food and coal and the number of applicants is increasing from thirty to sixty families per day. The average number of persons in a family is Five"-Report in the Youngstown Telegram, March 8th.

. . . The above report, although far from from the correct estimate of the number depending on charity for their livelihood, shows that the miserable hunger conditions among the steel workers and their families in the Mahoning Valley. Let us examine the above report more closely to get its full meaning.

The reported "5,000 families" means a total of 25,000 persons (five per family) and the "increase of 30 to 60 new applicants' means a total of three to five hundred new applicants for relief per day. An earlier survey showed that there are over 3,000 single men and youths, many of them without homes, on the city soup lines. Thus a very conservative estimate shows that one-fifth of the whole population of Youngstown are already on hunger rations and the number is increasing at a rate of 300 to 500 persons per day.

How They Lie!

The next question is what kind of relief are the poor and unemployed getting from the city. First let us consider the report of some fat society matrons of the Taxpayers League who made a round of the seven city soup kitchens in a swell high-powered automobile to investigate the conditions of the unemployed. Mrs. Cartwright, the head of the Committee, reports the following after "careful" investigation:

"The food is clean, wholesome, and nourishing (!) at the city soup kitchens."

But not one o fthe investigating committee dared to even taste the soup! And the above report was brazenly published the day after the newspapers were full of news items by the City Health Inspector who found the meat and vegetables with which the soup is made to be rotten and poisonous! Thus the day before the buxom society matrons' round of the soup kitchens the soup had to be dumped into the city garbage dump and the unemployed went without food that day.

The relief on the city soup lines, on which men, women and children depend for their living, consists of a bowl of soup and a half loaf of white bread. When families were getting cash relief (long since exhausted) the amount consisted of \$1.50 per week. This is a picture of the relief system in Youngstown. On top of hunger rations the workers are faced with the brutal force of the police department which enforces the "law" of shutting off the water supply: lights and gas; and evictions from homes by those who cannot pay their bills. Scores of workers and their families are forced to live in hovels like the infamous "Hoover City"-the city garbage dump. On March 18th, the courts handled eviction cases which effected sixty children. And the merciful court (?) ruled that time would be given to the families to place their children in the Juvenile Home before the evictions would take place.

Deprive Workers of Water The most vicious ruling and decision handed down by the Youngstown courts was the decision that WATER, a necessity next only to AIR, is private property just like bread, autos, and money. Thus anyone caught turning on the city water supply, shut off for non-

stantial relief from the city. Many of them are on the leading committees for relief and turn the thoughts of the unemployed to prayers instead of bread. Prayers for relief and jobs for the unemployed are the schemes of the preachers to prevent a militant movement of unemployed. And after the usual Sunday "relief" prayers the preacher hurries to his chicken dinner and the unemployed go hungry. Many of the churches have also gone into the restaurant business. With free food contributions from their congregation and other sources they prepare meals at "cost"-charging practically the same as the restaurants. Unemployed who have applied for food at these church dinners have been driven out and told to go to the soup lines.

Terror and Discrimination Against Unemployed There has been house to house canvass in many working-class neighborhoods by city officials warning the unemployed "not to have anything to do with the Reds or we will starve you to death." At meetings of the unemployed the police openly tell the workers if they listen to the speakers, they will not be permitted to get relief at the soup lines. The American Legion in its drive for "jobs for the unemployed" are more interested in the recruitment of new members into their fascist band and campaign against the Communists than in getting jobs for the unemployed. Many unemployed who supported the program of the Communist Party against hunger in the last elections have been told to starve and wait till a Communist wins the elections. Militants have been singled out and used as an example to terrorize the unemployed.

Immediate steps must be taken to counteract the moves of the enemies of the unemployed:

a) The abolition of mass meeting and branch appeals for the struggle against hunger and evictions but rather taking the program of the unemployed council to the homes, soup lines and flop-houses. The registration of the endorsers of the Unemployed Council program and election of block and soup line committees will insure immediate reaction of the unemployed to fight against evictions and the general program of the unemployed councils.

b) Immediate organization of Workers Defense Groups to defend the work of the block committees and the councils.

c) The activization of the Red Trade Union and Communist fractions to win the support of the unemployed for the program of the TUUL and the Communist Party. The masses of unemployed must form not only the basis of unity of the unemployed and employed for economic strugggles but also the strong support for the Communist program in the coming presidential elections.

And a real live salesman these days is lucky if he averages \$25 after working three days from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. and three days from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., with a week's vacation each month. If things do not pick up during April, there will be plenty of salesmen walking the streets.'

Fakers Are Busy among the Unemployed

Scores of fakers, some residents of the city, others just passing or visiting hoodoo-doctors, offer all kinds of fake schemes and promises for the benefit of the unemployed. At the head of the list is the demagog Mayor Moore. He and his gang in the City Hall are the biggest aggregation of fakers assembled in one city. Their election into office was won directly with promises of jobs and better relief to all who would vote for them. And today Mayor Moore and his Council have to meet behind closed doors because the angry unemployed are storming the City Hall at every meeting demanding that the fakers live up to their promises. Several times the doors of the City Council chambers have been torn from the hinges in a wild rush for jobs and relief.

The Negro Councilman, Mr. Vaughn, who won his seat in the Council by promises to the Negro people is today in the forefront demanding that the unemployed be put to work on city jobs, without pay, before getting any relief. This forced labor scheme amounts to actual slavery of both the white and Negro workers.

The city has also proposed a registration of all the unemployed. This registration includes the question. "Would you consider it your duty to report any act or deed of a fellow worker, thought harmful to the city, to the police?" This registration is nothing but a large scale spy system against the workers.

A. F. of L. Aids Bosses

The American Federation of Labor is doing its bit to confuse the workers in the struggle for unemployment insurance. The members of the A. F. of L. unions raised the question of the right of the unemployed to remain in the unions without paying dues. The business agents (and nothing but business-F. R.) rejected the proposal. But so many dropped out due to unemployment and inability to pay dues that today the business agents are running after the unemployed members begging for them to remain in the unions. With the union leadership closely connected with the city officialdom there is much discrimination in giving out jobs. The political line up includes the A. F. of L. leadership.

HOOVER TOWN

T the edge of the industrial section of Los A Angeles, one hundred and forty families are living on a large barren tract of land, in the crudest makeshift tents and shacks that a human being can live in and call by the name of shelter. These workers' families, many of them 100 per cent Americans, are the ones who have toiled all their lives producing the tremendous wealth of this country. These are the people who have built the railroads, mines, factories, palaces, mansions, estates of this country. They and their ancestors fought America's wars and were murdered and mutilated in them. Now the capitalists no longer needing their labor have cast them out of their industries and forced them to join the

ranks of the unemployed.

These workers, who for the last year or two, have been frantically looking for work, are now reduced to the state where they have lost their homes, their furniture, every possession for which they sweated and toiled. Now these people are living in Hoover town. Hoover town, model city, has no water, no toilet facilities, the crudest kind of latrine patched together from pieces of boards and scraps of tin. Bathing is an unknown luxury. No lights. Night finds the people in Hoover town huddled in their tents and shacks, which are lighted by candles, oil lamps or by an auto's headlight. Some are completely dark. Water must be carried in pails from a gas station on the outskirts of this piece of land.

How do they live here? What do they eat? One woman said:

"The children here do not know what meat is. They have never tasted it." The men go out with a truck and make the rounds of the wholesale fruit and vegetable markets, and the stuff that is thrown away as unfit to sell they are very magnanimously permitted to take. They say they went to the wholesale groceries hoping to obtain some canned goods, but were not able to get any. Sometimes, a bakery, having a large stock of stale bread on hand sends it to Hoover Town and the bread is doled outone loaf to a family per day, for as long as the supply lasts.

I said to one woman lying on a bed sick, "The capitalist papers say you have enough to eat here. That no one knows hunger in Hoover 'Town." The sick woman motioned towards a cardboard box. "Look in there. That's what we get." In the box was some molding cabbage, rotten lettuce and four apples that were so decayed that when we picked them up they oozed from our fingers. Bugs, ants and flies are everywhere. Tiny babies lying in stuffy, crowded tents are exposed to them as well as the adults. The sick

woman lying on the bed said, "Today everyone got fish. Aimee sent it."

Aimee Semple McPherson, who works for the salvation of the workers' souls, and more so for her profits filched from the worker's pockets can afford to send occasional barrels of food to the starving workers of this "model" tent city. Her meals are not composed of rotten cabbage and uneatable lettuce. Her wealth is steadily increasing. For Aimee there is no depression. She is planning a new limit height apartment-hotel building, to be built on the latest architectural designs and containing all the newest conveni-

In her hotel-apartments will be found soft. luxurious furniture, but in Hoover City the only furniture to be seen is beds. Beds that sometimes must hold entire families. Chairs and tables are scarce. Stoves, even the camp variety, are rare. Most of the workers do their cooking on scraps of tin, or in tin cans. One woman had none of these but was cooking on the earth near her tent. Inside her tent it was dark and close.

One young woman was lying on a bed, a bed which was not in a shack, not a tent, but in the open with merely a tarpaulin stretched over it, She is an expectant mother. For months her husband has been out of work. Evicted from their home, they slept in their car for weeks, At last they came to "Hoover's Haven". Still they had no tent, not a table or a chair. Due to the woman's condition a bed was finally obtained for them. But they had no shelter for it. They have only a piece of canvas stretched over the bed. They too, had no stove, but cooked the little food they got on a strip of rusty tin. This man looked at his wife and said: "What am I going to do? I am a war veteran. Was wounded in the world war. But what did it get me? My home and everything gone, everything taken away from me. Why don't they give me a chance to work for my wife and the baby we're going to have soon? That is what I want-work-not charity!

Another woman, also pregnant, contracted oneumonia and was finally taken to the County Hospital. Through the complications of her sickness she had a miscarriage and-three days later was sent back to camp in this weakened condition.

This is the city which one of the Los Angeles papers facetiously describes as the only town which knows no depression. With the stark misery, glaringly obvious everywhere, the paper treated Hoover town in a smart-alecky, wisecracking way. Of all the monuments, bridges, buildings and roads named after our President Hoover, not one is more truly a tribute to him than this Hoover Town-"model city that knows no depression!"
