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## There Is No Time to Be Lost

ONGRESS has rushed through a piece of vicious legisla-Ution directed against the workers of the United States, native and foreign born, Negro and white. The Dies antialien bill which has just passed the House of Representatives and has gone to the Senate forges a new weapon for the capitalist onslaughts on the standards of living of the toiling masses. This bill, which has among its most emphatic supporters the rabid reactionaries and fascists Fish and Bachman, the notorious strike-breaker Doak, and the capitalist lackey Matthew Woll, is intended to provide an instrument for more effective attacks upon the workers, to divide their ranks, to intimidate them, to attempt to incite the native workers against the foreign born.

The Hoover government and its miserable creatures Doak and Co. have in the course of the last year unleashed a furious campaign of persecution against the foreign born workers. More than a thousand alien workers each month are being deported from the United States. Hundreds of workers' clubs have been raided without warrants. By means of the present anti-working class legislation and even in direct violation of existing laws, the Hoover government has mercilessly persecuted the foreign born workers, hunted them down, singled them out, intimidated and deported them. Such aggressive working class fighters as the textile workers' leader, Edith Berkman, and the leaders of the miners, Borich and Kamenovich, are being held under threat of deportation. But, in spite of all this, the resistance of the workers have been growing to these reactionary attacks.

The capitalists feel the need for more efficient and more effective weapons to crush the resistance to the capitalist attacks and against the fight carried on by the workers under the leadership of the Communist Party against preparations for an imperialist world slaughter. And the Dies Bill has been created to meet this need.

The bill is broad and far reaching in its terms. It excludes only those workers whom it succeeds to intimidate and terrorize into declaring "that on account of fear, duress, compulsion or fraud" they joined militant organizations. This bill oils the bureaucratic repressive apparatus of the capitalist government. Though wrestling with the budget for six months and raising a great outcry of "economy," these henchmen of the capitalists will set up through this billl a stil greater bureaucracy and will spend millions to persecute the workers. The whole sham of "economy in the interests of the country" is disclosed by the passage of this bill.

It is needless to say that the bill is directed in the first place against the Communist Party, the fearless leader of the struggle against the capitalist offensive. It is also directed against the revolutionary unions and their fight against wage cuts. It is aimed at the unemployed councils and their struggle for unemployment insurance.

The bill itself and surely the execution of it will strike at all honest workers that dare to put up a firm front against the parasitic master class.

It is not an accident that the adoption of the new bill occurred in the last days of Congress. It has been sneaked through in order to avert an outburst of indignation by the workers. The anti-working class character of this bill is further revealed by another "coincidence," by the circumstance that its passage occurred at a moment when the Capitol was surrounded by American workers demanding in forceful terms the granting of immediate relief to the millions of hungry and starving workers. Nor was it an accident that the notorious Doak brought to the Capitol his marauding immigration agents to spy on the ex-servicemen and to single out veterans for deportation notwithstanding the fact that service in the United States army automatically naturalizes foreign born workers.

The passage of the bill should call forth the most indignant protest. The workers, native and foreign born, Negro and white, whose interests are threatened by this measure must respond immediately to the task of a stern and unrelenting fight. By the struggle against the Dies bill, the weakness in the fight for the protection of the foreign born workers which has been only too evident in the past, must be wiped out. A storm of resolutions and telegrams must descend upon the U.S. Senate. Demonstrations, small and large, must immediately be held. A wide united front mass movement embracing the trade unions, unemployed councils and workers' organizations and workers at the bench, must be created against this fascist action. Mass pressure and vigorous working class action can defeat this anti-working class bill.

There is no time to be lost. The fight against the Dies bill is a fight for the rights of the workers. It is the fight against hunger and starvation, a struggle against imperialist

The Daily Worker publishes herewith the leading article of the Isvestia, organ of the Soviet Government, published on May 23.

### (Conclusion)

ON April 29, 1932, the "Vozrozhdenie" again stresses "the historical significance of terror" against foreign statesmen, a terror which might produce a war against the Soviet Union, and

### "Self-Sacrificing" Terrorist

In No. 153 of "Dni" Kerensky pursues his train of thought still further:

"Here we have a classified case of a voluntary self-sacrificing terrorist act in the interests of the defense of the rights of the people. Stern has not died in vain. Stern is not alone. The sacrificial flame of individual terror has been

The "Molva," which is edited by Filosov, and which appears in Poland, writes in its number of April 17, 1932:

"It is necessary to point out the important circumstance that the whole emigration from the mensheviks to the monarchists appreciate the heroism of Stern, and realize the real significance of his action. "We believe in the great spirit of the French people. France has the floor!"



It should declared once and for all that an end must be made of the criminal machinations of the Russian White Guardists, and above all, of their military organization, which inspires the terrorists and supplies them, and which daily commits new acts of provocation with a view to undermining the peace of the world.

The question must be raised: Why are not the murderers, the instigators and organizers of the assassination of President Doumer arrested? Why is General Miller and his satellite Semenov, the editor of the "Vozrozhdenie," still at liberty? Why is Kerensky, and the editor of the "Molva," Filosov, not arrested?

Why are the instigators and accomplices of the criminal white guard machinations, the propagandists of the terror, the inspirers and accomplices of Gorguloff and all future Gorgulofsf not only at liberty in Paris, but permitted to assist the authorities who are conducting the "investigation," to stamp the white guardist assassin who murdered the President of the French Republic in order to provoke war against the Soviet Union as a "Bolshevik?"

The fact that no attempt is being made to punish them shows clearly who is behind the white guards, and who is holding the bomb which is to explode and plunge humanity into a historical catastrophe. No other conclusion is possible. World public opinion must be perfectly clear on this point,

## Toward Revolutionary Mass Work (THE, 14TH PLENUM)

## Sitting in a Sectarian Chamber

F we say we are the leaders of the workers and yet stay away from them, we commit the crime of isolation. Isolation, commonly speaking, is staying away from the workers and failing to organize them and letting them starve to death without a struggle to eat and live.

And, when we, the leaders of the workers, isolate ourselves from the workers, we make ourselves criminals of isolation and are at the same time pussy-footing the class struggle.

Isolation and Pussy-Footery Exposed

Here in Birmingham we had the opportunity again to criticize ourselves severely in our failure to work among the workers exploited by the Red Cross. Several hundred white and Negro workers are working on Red Cross jobs for small and measly amounts of food in place of pay. These workers are given the "blue tickets' instead of the original "white slips." With the "white slips" the workers can get their groceries where they choose, but with the "blue slips" they can get their groceries only from the Red Cross stores -- supply houses from which they receive whatever rotten stuff the Red Cross bosses choose to give them.

The Negro workers are working under armed foremen and superintendents, are cursed and ordered around as if they were dogs. The white workers are driven in the heat, bellowed at by the overbearing foremen. They are also receiving their "blue tickets" with which they cash in and get their canned goods and other refused goods just as the Negroes get. The groceries

obtained won't last a week. These workers are indignant at these conditions. The indignation of these workers was expressed a few weeks ago when a group of Negro workers who were receiving their groceries from one of the down-town supply stores, became mad at the clerk, when he threw their food to them and abused them. When the Negro workers threw the stuff back at him, and started raising hell, and dared the Red Cross to cut their groceries off, the "riot squad" was immediately called but the workers raised hell right on. No arrests were made. The cops tried to be "nice."

White and Negro Workers Fight Together Shortly after that, a group of white workers beat up a foreman, and at the same time white and Negro workers are whispering to one another about getting together and march on the Red Cross and City Hall-the white workers are

expressing their regret for not marching with

the Negroes to the City Hall on May 13.

Previous to the date on which the Negro workers threatened to fight in the supply store, we had not made one single step toward organizing the Red Cross workers by electing special committees to organize Red Cross workers Grievance Committees-we underestimated the importance of preparing these workers for a strike. In fact, we did not see them in particular, but after the workers attracted our attention to the fact that they were not satisfied with their conditions on the jobs and attempted to develop some kind of struggle despite our remote distance from them, at last we elected committees to go on the jobs and speak to the workers, find out what their grievances are, and to organize them to put up a fight for what they wanted. As a result, we were able to hold a mass meeting at which approximately 250 white and Negro workers were present-Red Cross workers were the majority.

But can we say, that we ourselves took the initiative to organize and lead these workers: No. Not by a long shot. Then why did we move to action? Because we were forced to. We were so "self-initiated." We were sitting

The above quoted sentences are in many respects the clearest expression of the deadly internal routine, the sectarianism which prevents the development of genuine mass work. It shows also that in practice how seriously the war danger is under-estimated.

The lessons are so obvious that we will not comment any further, but merely to remind the comrades of a few sentences of the Plenum resolution, which states:

"The bureaucratic methods of work which are expressed in the circular letter method of leadership, and in an excessive number of paid functionaries at the head of the Party and the auxiliary organizations paralyzes the work of the lower Party organizations and side-tracks them from genuine mass work onto inner Party and routine work, and hinders the development of cadres and the initiative of lower organizations."

ourselves. We need more FIGHTERS, NOT MARTYRS. Unless we eliminate this suicidal planlessness, this anarchy caused by a hopeful fatalism or adventurism our demonstrations will be murderously smashed. Let us organize a defense that is at least worthy of the paper on which it is written.

Mass self-defense—against police provocations -must be the line and keynote of our defense. The police terror and brutality must be defeated by proletarian self-discipline.

## The Result of Formalism

By S. MIROKOVICH (Akron, Ohio). OUR activities must teach us lessons: either how not to do things or how to do things.

In this town we had a May Day occurrence that must teach us a lesson. Here is an example of lack of personal contact.

Ten or more Party members, the entire Party unit, in a proletarian section of the city, gathered with one sympathizer at one place, which was decided on as a point of concentration of this unit, to march to another main point to meet other marchers. This unit met at this point with the number and marched more than ten blocks with the same number: all Party

members with one sympathizer, a Negro worker. The unit organizer said that the point of gathering was announced at open-air meetings called for preparation for May Day and that he personally called upon Negro workers to come

Well, even if this was done, there is something basically wrong with these Party members. Ten Party members got only one worker to march on May Day! It is possible that some of the workers from this section came directly to the central demonstration. But this is not enough. This unit should have had at least a number of non-Party workers, rallied through personal contact, march to the demonstration.

Here the purely formal approach to workers is clear. Party members consider their duty is to spread leaflets and nothing else. Why should not we learn to talk to workers and personally invite them? And talk to them not only once! And not only talk, but talk in the way that workers will understand that the Communist program is their program, that demonstration s necessary as part of the struggle for the need of workers!
