Tryng to Lay Blame for Slaughter at Plant on "Reds"

70,000 PROTESTED IT

Hunger Marchers Deliberately Shot

DETROIT, Mich., July 1.-The murderous Dearborn police are whitewashed for the death of the four hunger machers in the parade which police shot up March 7, at the gates of the Ford Plant. The Wayne county grand jury has published a statement declaring that all the fault lies with the hunger marchers, and recommending that the prosecuting attorney "invenstigate" and persecute the Unemployed Council which led the hunger march.

The grand jury, made up of the local business men and agents of the Ford Motor Company, seeks thus to explain away the killing of unemployed workers by police in a company owned town, with Edsel Ford heir to the Ford auto millions standing on a raised place in the plant and watching his hirelings slaughter his slaves.

The grand jury reports admit that the shooting might have been avoided, but holds it was "necessary to the protection of the property" at the time it took place.

Closes Night Schools for Foreign Workers

NEW YORK .- Citing "economy" as an excuse, the Board of Education has suspended the summer term evening school for foreigners at P. S. 25, Fifth St., between First and Sec ond Ave.

Following an announcement made earlier in the month, 200 workers, many from the Bronx and Brooklyn, came to the school only to find signs announcing that the session would not open. School officials "explained" that it would cost the city \$30,000 to keep two schools going for 18 nights, an indication of the cost of running the schools by the Tammany grafters.

Indignant at this high-handed action, the workers collected more than 400 signatures on two nights, and presented them to the Board of Education with the demand that the school be opened. After evading the committee which brought the petitions with various excuses, the board finally sent letters to the signers telling them that classes are now being formed at the Hebrew Technical High School.

When the workers, many of them unemployed, came there, they were told they could attend the classes provided they paid \$3 each.



SOCIALIST FARMING VERSUS AGRICULTURAL ANARCHY IN U. S. BLAZE PATH TO

BETTER WORLD No Crisis on Huge Col-

lective Farms in Soviet Union

Holmetsk, U.S.S.R.

Dear Comrades: We are members of the "Ray of Socialism" Collective Farm at Holmetsk. Dorogobujski County, Western Province. At a general meeting, we decided to write to you and describe life now in the collective farm.

Our village used to have 12 home steads, and the area of land of all kinds, useful and useless, was about 300 acres. The big landlord of the village had 1,650 acres, and he used to rent it out on the most oppressive terms. For working on his land, he used to pay at the rate of 50 kopecks a day for a reaper, and 25 kopecks a day for women doing field work.

Though we lived in terrible conditions, we were forced to buy 290 acres of land from the landlord, for which we had to pay 10,700 rubles. In order to make the first payment of 3,000 rubles, we poor farmers had to sell our last cow and even much of our food. In addition to the oppressive conditions under which we lived, we had to hire land from the landlord, for which we had to pay 125 rubles every year, to give him hay, etc. The landlord was rolling in luxury, but we farmers and hired workers were terribly poor.

The Hand of the Priest.

We suffered equally at the hands of the priest, Vassiliev, who made us pay for funerals, weddings, etc. In the autumn he would come into the village and take rye, oats, etc., and there were cases when he took the last grain from poor farmers, saying that God would care for the poor. No one dared refuse the priest, as he frightened them with hell fire.

By the time we had paid the priest and the landlord we had hardly anything left. In order to live we had to go into the town to look for work, while our families remained in the village and almost starved.

Then Came the Revolution.

Such were the conditions under which we lived until October, 1917. Then the October Revolution swept away all the exploiters, landlords, priests and officials.

For the older children there s not only the school, but they have the possibility of going to the university. Many of them attend courses in bookkeeping, stock rearing,

At intervals a doctor comes to the collective farm to examine all the members, including the healthy ones. We collective farm members value

the achievements of the October Revolution, and we shall not let them be taken from us. We keep a close watch on the doings of the wreckers who want to restore capitalism. Our path is not the path of capitalism but that of Socialism.



Taxes are increasing, but the state budget is not balanced and the deepening crisis is increasing the deficit. A so-called "Reconstruction Corporation" created by Hoover, has as its aim to save and enrich the individual groups of the financial oligarchy. The Reconstruction Corporation gave the possibility to individual representatives of finance capital to seize from the state treasury over two billion dollars for their salvation and strengthening.

It is in such a situation of a deepening economic crisis that the pre-election struggle is taking place. The manouvers of the old bourgeois parties—the Republican and Democrats-begin, which are calculated upon the deception of the masses.

Repeal Fight

Through the combined efforts of both parties of the bourgeoisie, the struggle of the "wets" and "drys" becomes almost a central problem whereby a number of bootleggers, smugglers, speculators and bandits who derive tremendous profits from desperate struggle against the repeal of the "dry" law which has brought them such large benefits.

Another problem which is troubling the bourgeois minds consists in how to better organize the further robbery of the state resources by the largest banks and trusts under the guise of the struggle with the crisis, under the subterfuge of the struggle against unemployment. The Republicans, with Hoover at their head, are putting forward a pre-election program which forsees: the balancing of the budget by means of the lowering of expenses and increased taxation: the ceasing of the emission of treasury notes; the broadening of the credit the introduction of public works which do not require an emission put them in the hands of the voters of new state loans; the financing of individual enterprises; the introduc-

In capitalist circles there is as yet no ser*ious tendency for the creation of a third party. The discontent of the farmers of the agricultural states is as yet seized upon by individual "insurgents" of the old parties.

The Conference for Progressive Labor Action, with Muste at its head, is attempting to crystallize itself into an embryo of a "labor" party along the type of the British. This group puts forward a program of a labor government, of planned

group which is strenuously covering itself with left phrases, attempting thus to utilize the revolutionary sentiment of the masses.

Along with the necessity of exposing the Socialist Party and its left groups, the Communist Party of the U.S. A., says Pravda, is confronted with the task of unmasking the Muste group, which attempts by means of demagogy to capture the workers who are moving towards Communism.

It is necessary, however, to acknowledge the fact that the politworking masses from the bourgeois parties is not by far accomplisshed

The Communist Party counterpoises to the bourgeois program of the capitalist way out of the crisis, the proletarian program of the revolutionary way out of the crisis, leading the struggle against the capitalists and the bourgeois agencies within the working class, utilizing the election campaign for the mobilization and organization of the masses against the dictatorship of the bourgeoisie and against a new imperialist war, for the dictatorship of the proletariat.

The entire pre-election struggle in the United States is proceeding under conditions of the rapid decaying of bourgeois "democracy." A fascist tendency is being born within the frame-work of the old reactionary chauvinist and black hundred organizations of the bourgeoisie.

The problem of the foreign policy of the American imperialism plays in the pre-election campaign a comparatively minor role. financial oligarchy which determines the policy of the United States prefers not to carry the serious questions of war and peace into the noisy pre-election arena. Meanwhile dollar imperialism is being confronted with every substantial problems.

In the Far East Japanese imperialism has put pointedly the question of the partition of China. The Washington treaty between the United States, Japan and England has been blown up. The letter of Stimson to Borah signifies the ism to strengthen its armaments. The concentration of the military maneuvers in theh Pacific Ocean, the extension and strengthening of air and navy bases of the United States in the Pacific Ocean, serves to foreshadow the growing war danger, they foreshadow the strengthening of the Japanese-

American contradictions. This does not prevent certain imperialist circles in America from furnishing ammunition and war materials, and military equipment to its future antagonist, Japanese imperialism. This policy is being carrried out in connection with the attempt to incite Japan into war with the Soviet Union in the hope that the war of Japan against the Soviet Union will weaken Japan and give the possibility for American imperialism to warm its

hands. Simultaneously the economic crisis has led to the crashing of the Young Plan. The reparation payment and together with that the agreements in regard to the Inter-Allied debts are hanging in mid-air.

France continues its attacks against the gold reserves of the United States. The financial oligarchy of the United States would readily agree to decrease military expenses of other lands in order to weaken its rivals and secure the payment by them of their debts. Stimson, however, has left Geneva without attaining, as is known, any results in this respect. In the same manner the collapse of the Lausanne conference is assured so far as the actual solution of the rep-

Hundreds Arrested.

Hundreds upon hundreds have been arrested, several comrades assasinated, hundreds of striking oil workers have been evicted, thrown out into the streets with their families at the point of bayonets. The strike of the meat packing workers has also extended to the Anglo in Fray Bentos, Uruguay, and is expected soon to embrace the packing nouses in Cerro, Montevideo

The special significance of this truggle lies in the fact that the meat packing houses and the oil industry in South America are essential to the war plans of the imperialist robbers of the United States and Great Britain, to the carrying out of the imperialist massacre now going on against the Chinese people and the impending attack on the Soviet

The strikes take place in imperialist enterprises and all the forces of reaction, the lackey governments their paid press and reformist agents are mobilized to break the workers' united front of struggle which has taken an international character.

As the strikes spread rapidly in Argentina, Uruguay, and Brazil all the forces of reaction strive to crush in-blood the militant struggles that are under the leadership of the revolutionary Latin American Confedera. tion of Trade Unions and to illegalize the latter, which is becoming a powerful weapon of the working class of the whole continent in resistance to the attacks of the imperialist and native exploiters.

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More Injunctions

THE use of injunctions against striking workers is on the increase. The passage of the Norris Anti-Injunction Bill gives no relief from this menace to the interests of the workers. The great "victory" which was hailed by the A. F. of L. officialdom in the passage of this bill is clearly exposed as a sham by the issuance of two sweeping injunctions against the Shoe workers in New York.

These workers have been carrying on a stubborn and militant fight against one of the most reactionary bodies of employers in the country, against company union control, an entrenched spy system and a host of strike breaking agencies in their struggle against continuous wage cuts and starvation conditions. They have already won a number of victories in the shoe shops. The battle is particularly fierce against two of the key shops in this industry. Thus far the workers have been able to repel all strike breaking attempts.

The effectiveness of the strike in the I. Miller and Andrew Geller shops has been telling upon the employers, particularly as the season is now approaching and for that reason the employers have resorted to their choice weapon, the injunction, in order to crush the strikes. What they could not do through their Constitutional League and other paid strike breaking agencies, they hope to accomplish by means of the injunction.

The desperation of these employers is to be seen not only from the fact that the Federal Department of Labor has been called in in order to secure this injunction, but also from the sweeping terms contained in it. It restrains strikers and the union from picketing; orders the strikers to keep within five blocks of the shops; directs the police to break up any congregation or groups of strikers; prevents the workers from talking to any employees in an effort to persuade them to leave the shop and even goes to the extent of restraining the calling up of workers on the telephone or visiting workers at their homes.

The employers know through experience that the militant shoeworkers will not surrender to the injunction menace, but they hope to be able to split the ranks of the workers and to make the job of their paid

Against this new blow of the employers the shoe workers will respond as they have to others. By united mass action they can, under the leadership of their fighting industrial union, win the battle.

But the struggle against the injunction is not only the fight of the shoe workers. The injunction menaces all sections of organized and unorganized workers. The possibilities for a wide united front against the reptile injunction was indicated in the debate around the passage of the Norris Bill. Ex-Senator George Wharton Pepper of Pennsylvania stated that the bitterness of organized labor against the federal courts because of the question of the injunction, "if unchecked, might easily develop

into revolutionary sentiment." The dictatorial capitalist courts, whose corruption has been recently exposed in the scandals in New York are fiercely hated by the working class. On the basis of this menace to the interests of the working class, connected with the struggle against wage cuts and unemployment, it is possible to organize the broadest united front struggle. To this task not only the shoe workers of New York must devote themselves, but all revolutionary trade unionists. The workers must strike this vicious weapon out of the hands of the employing class.



Methods of Work and Some Tasks of the Party in the South

By HARRY JACKSON AND NAT ROSS.

THE economic crisis in the territory covered by District 17 (Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee, Mississippi and Louisiana) is sharper than in other sections of the United States. This is true because of the existence of semi-feudal remnants in Southern economy on which is superimposed a highly rationalized industry. Second, because of the traditional lower social standard of living of the masses which was established primarily by the super exploitation of the Negroes in industry and in particular in the Black Belt and the maintenance of the separation of Negro and white workers on the basis of Negro inferiority. Finally, because of the chronic and deep agrarian crisis, the main base of Southern economy, which is intensified by a backward agrarian technique.

The depth of the crisis and the unbelievable starvation and misery among the Southern masses has already sharpened the class struggle, despite the weakness of the revolutionary movement in the South. The bosses realize that their rule is loaded with dynamite which may flare up any moment under the pressure of mass hunger of the fighting Southern toilers. The revolutionary organizations have to work under semi-legal conditions, with frequent outbursts of violent terror against them. There already izations who try to bolster a sharp nationalist-patriotic spirit and who preach a special increased terror against the Negroes in an attempt to keep Negro and white workers divided. They know full well that the entire structure of Southern economy is based primarily on the super exploitation of the Negroes and the continued division of Negro and white workers. At the same time there is an increase in social demagogy in an attempt to chain both Negro and white workers to capitalism. Struggle. N this situation our Party in the South is faced with important tasks. Our fundamental task of winning the majority of the Southern workers means precisely the uniting of Negro and white workers and the oppressed masses in struggle against the Southern landlords and capitalists. This task is clarified by our three years' work in the South. which was chock full of mistakes because of our inexperience and the difficulties under which our Party worked. As a result of our agitation and work carried on quite sporadically in the Black Belt and among the factory and unemployed workers and our activity in the Scottsboro campaign, the Party has gained a widespread support among the Negro masses which has been insignificantly organized. At the same time our support among the white workers has been far less widespread (except for Kentucky which we dont treat in this article) and our organizational results have

did not develop correct methods of work under semi-legal conditions. Our few leading comrades working under terrific difficulties did not try sufficiently to develop local cadres. Our form of organization was not simple enough. We failed to make a real fight against the treacherous Negro reformists and fakers. But the basic reason for our poor results has been the failure to develop joint struggles of Negro and white workers for their common interests and specifically for equal rights for the Negroes. Here we must say that it was the solidarity struggles in the North that were a contributing factor in organizing the Negroes in the South and also influenced the Southern white workers. Our Northern comrades should not forget this.

Therefore it is clear that one of our important immediate tasks is white workers for joint struggles with the Negro masses. In the past we didn't orientate clearly on this. We capitulated before the difficulties of organizing the white workers who after decades of skillful boss propaganda on Negro inferiority did not readily respond to our program of Negro equality. We approached the white workers abstractly and in a humanitarian way (early editorials in Southern Worker) on the question of unity. We thought that spreading thousands of leaflets would get the white workers to smash their main objection to the Reds. We did not accept in our mass organizations white workers who still had traces of race prejudice because we did not see clearly enough that not abstractly or in a humanitarian way, but precisely by struggle would we unite Negro and white and break the prejudice of the Southern white

United Action On Mass Starvatioo.

TODAY with the crisis gripping

millions of employed and unemployed Negro and white workers and farmers our main immediate task is to develop united struggles on the basis of the burning needs of the masses. At the pres ent moment our success in the South depends on our ability to develop these united struggles. otherwise both Negro and white workers will sink more and more deeply into the morass of starvation. And not only will we fail to win the white workers, but the Negro masses will lose confidence in our movement unless we prove to them that the white Southern workers will take the initiative and sincerely join in the struggle for Negro rights. While the struggle for the economic needs of the masses gives us an excellent instrument for linking up the struggle for Negro rights and for the Scottsboro defense, we must utilize every act of oppression against the Negro masses as an instrument in itself to develop solidarity protests and struggles. It is a fact that one of the key questions in saving the Scottsboro boys depends on our ability to win the white Southern workers to join with the Negro masses in the fight for the freedom of the Scottsboro boys, because only united action can help to smash lynch and all Negro oppression.

Our Organizational Forms Must Reach the Masses.

ANOTHER basic qustion in our work in the South is the devel-

ers to capitalism. Despite the narrow social base for social fascism, they A New Crime of the Bulgarian **Fascists**

THE Macedonian fascist organi-zation termed IMRO has perpetrated a new crime in Sofia, the Bulgarian capital. On June 8th, five individuals armed with revol- vers and bombs attacked the wellknown Macedonian fighter for freedom, Simeon Kavrakiroff, a member of the Executive Committee of the Union of Salonika Emigrants in Sofia, struck him to the ground and then made off with their victim in the direction of the Petritch district.

Crime Arouses Indignation This crime has caused a wave of indignation to sweep over the Macedonian masses in Bulgaria and the whole Bulgarian toiling population. Protests have come from all sides. A delegation of forty Bulgarian lawyers has protested to the Home Minister and demanded the immediate liberation of the Macedonian champion. More Than 2,000 Murdered by Fascist Band

The terror organization of Ivan Mikhailoff is notorious for the brutal crimes and bloody terror which it has enacted against the working masses, Macedonian and Bulgarian.

The IMRO organization has continually acted in the service of the Bulgarian fascism and imperialism. During the last nine years this band has been responsible for the murder of more than 2,000 Macedonian workers, peasants, intellectuals and artisans.

The Government Is Responsible It oppresses and terrorizes the Macedonian population in the Petritch district, levies taxes by force and with the aid of its weapons suppresses every protest against these crimes or against the general fascism ruling in Bulgaria.

Since the present government calling itself a "People's Bloc," has come into power, this band of murderers has committed dozens of murder attempts against Macedonian fighters for freedom who have led the struggle for the independence of Macedonia and for the Balkan Federation.

Intellectuals and Workers' Organizations Protest

The kidnapping of the Macedonian leader Kavrakiroff has aroused the utmost indignation in all progressive circles. A number of eminent persons, such as Karin Michaelis, Albert Einstein, etc., as well as organizations such as the Red Aid, the Union for Free Balkans, League Against Imperialism, have sent protests to the Prime Minister in Bul-

ization. The Southern workers have a poor organizational tradition, their main experience being the church and bourgeois controlled lodges. At the same time there is a strong militant spirit along individualistic lines and our task must be to collectivize it.

Under the prevailing semi-legal conditions, the small committees in the neighborhoods and factories are the main organizational forms with which to develop a mass movement. Here it must be said that the conception of one of our leading comrades in Chattanooga that we can be legal only if we do not develop a mass movement is a rotten liberal approach which was sharply condemned by the Party. The block committees of the unemployed are one of the avenues through which we can feel the pulse of the masses, initiate joint activity and develop a mass move-

ment and leadership from the ranks. The unemployed committees must develop the committee form of fighting for needy families and tie this up with city-wide joint committees and demonstrations on burning issues (such as cutting relief, etc.), which concern every worker, Negro and white. The I. L. D. in most Southern cities must be built on a neighborhood committee basis and has the particularly important task among others of winning the support of the workers in capitalist controlled organizations and breaking the hold of the fakers, particularly on the Scottsboro campaign and local defense struggles. In the election campaign a wide network of election clubs must be established, bringing the issues directly to the masses, breaking the hold of the Democrats, Republicans and Socialists on the workers in the mass organizations. Here, too, a fight must be put up for the right of all Negro and white workers and farmers to vote. In Alabama, in order to vote, a person must own \$300 taxable property, or 40 acres of land. Our election campaign, linked with the immediate struggles, must be used to break through the underground position of our Party. Alongside of these clubs must go women and youth social and sport clubs, which can also help in the Party campaigns through patient work and guidance, in this way breaking the hold of the church and the boss-controlled organizations.

Into the Shops By Patient Everyday Work.

AT the same time all our energy A must be centered on our basic task of geting our organization in the big factories and mines. Otherwise all our work is spoiled. Without committees in the big factories we cannot work effectively under the occasional outbursts of police terror nor are we able to mobilize our forces to lead strikes and to fight against capitalist war.

The work requires hard plugging, due to the organizational inexperience of the Southern workers. It means day to day personal contact, convincing the workers, showing them how a small committee can grow and fight for better conditions, showing them that we are trying to protect them from spies, and utilizing every concrete issue and grievance to politicalize the struggle for Negro rights, against fascism and social fascism, for deHAIL THE STRUGGLE OF THE CHILEAN MASSES!

Resolution proposed by the Anti-Imperialist League for and adopted by the State Nominating Convention of the Communist Party in Schenectady, Sunday, June 19.

HUNDREDS of Communists in Chile have been jailed by the fascist Junta led by Davila. Strikes have been forbidden. These measures are aimed to stop the mass demonstrations already led by the Communist Party of Chile; the revolutionary trade union center, the Chilean Labor Federation; and the Anti-Imperialist League of Chile. These acts prove the fascist nature of the Davila Government. The recent declarations of Davila prove that he and the other leaders of the movement which overthrew the Montero Government used "radical" phrases and a "radical" program to win support among the masses of Chile. But their Government is not anti-imperialist; it is not a working class movement. The Davila Government is an effort of the bourgeoisie of Chile to retain control of the Government, to stem the rising tide of revolutionary struggle.

This Nominating Convention exposes the reactionary nature of the Davila Government before the masses of New York State, and of the Socialist Party, which hailed the "Davila Socialist Government" as a movement in the interest of the working class. We send our fraternal greetings to Elias Lafferte. Secretary of the Chilean Labor Federation, twice the Communist candidate for president of Chile, and in April of this year for the Chilean Senate, and to the hundreds of other Communists thrown into jail by the fascist Davila regime. We demand from the Chilean Government and from the United States Government the release of all enti-imperialist fighters now in the fails of Chile. We pledge to raise this demand throughout the election campaign.

We raise our voice on behalf of the immediate and unconditional independence of the Philippine Islands, Porto Rico and other coldenounce the Hare and Hawes-Cutting Bills as maneuvers to keep the Philippine Islands under the permanent control of American

imperialism. We denounce Santiago Iglesias, the Socialist Party leader, and the other Porto Rican bourgeois lead-

ers as agents of American impe-

rialism to preserve Porto Rico as a colony of American imperialism. We demand the withdrawal of American warships and marines from China, where the "Oahu," an American gunboat fired on 2,000 Chinese; from the Philippines and Hawaii, where they constitute a threat against the Chinese people and the Soviet Union, and from Latin American waters, where they are used to maintain the supremacy of Wall Street in Latin Am-

employed against the anti-imperialist elements in the Philippine Islands, in Peru, where hundreds are still in jail as a result of the Peruvian naval revolt, when 8 sailors were executed and fourteen others sentenced to from ten to fifteen years, and in the other colonies and semi-colonies, and particularly in Cuba, where the terror increases daily. We demand the stopping of the war against Sandino's Army, and the withdrawal of American marines from Nicaragua. Recognizing the special responsibility which the revolutionary workers of New York State have assumed toward the revolutionary movement of Cuba, this Nominating Convention pledges that it will, during the campaign link up the question of Cuba and other colonies with the other issues in the campaign.

fense of the Soviet Union, etc. Our form of organization in the factories (and for that matter in all our work in the South) must be such as not to hold back the militancy of the Southern workers but rather to organize this fighting spirit and lead it into a conscious and higher plane. This also means that we must especially carefully prepare and organize our strike struggles in the South. An example of our failure to utilize every little struggle of the factory workers in order to unite Negro and white workers and to lead it into a bigger struggle is the recent department stalks of nine Negro workers in a sawmill employing about 50 Nerro and white workers to which we gave very little attention.

Against Underestimation of Black Belt.

ONE of the fundamental tasks of the Party in the South is the work in the Black Belt. This is neglected in a criminal way because of a lack of understanding of its revolutionary potentialities. In the Black Belt the Negro share croppers, agricultural laborers and tenant farmers are emploited in the most brutal manner and already they have shown their determination, courage and revolutionary loyalty in the Camp Hill struggle which despite our weak leadership had a tremendous effect on the entire Black Belt. Our task now is to establish the small committees on the plantation, develop struggles for local demands, and link this up with the basic struggle (which is so terribly neglected) for self-determination and confiscation of the

land in the Black Belt. At the same time work must be done among the white croppers to feel their sentiment, to organize them, etc., otherwise the landlords will try to use them for the lynch mebs against the fighting Negro croppers. We must also raise the question of self-determination sharply in all industrial contern in the South, particularly those linked up with the Black Belt as one of the fundaproletarian revolution in which the industrial workers play the leading parts

Build the Party. OUT of all these activities and

struggles, the building of the Communist Party and the Young Communist League stands in the forefront. The Party must in practice become the most disciplined. organized and militant section of the Negro and white workers in the South. So far because we have not led many struggles we have not as a rule won the best southern work. ers and poor farmers for the Partty, although we have some splendid Negro cadres who are developing very well. But this only means that when we develop struggles still better mass workers both Negro and white can be drawn into the Party. Alongside of this must go the theoretical development of our new workers on the most simple lines of study linked up with their actual experiences. At the same time collective leadership and selfcriticism from top to bottom will help in developing leading cadres of Southern workers and a mass Party capable of doing its duty in the gigantic class battles.
