They expect to transform the starving millions into cannon fodder for the mass murder of the workers of one country by the workers of another. Above all, the capitalist class is driving toward a war of intervention against the victorious working class in the Soviet Union which the capitalists of the whole world hate with deep fury. Why? Precisely because the Soviet Union, through its Five-Year Plan, by its magnificant

socialist construction, having completely liquidated unemployment, and having raised the standard of living of the toiling masses, has shown to the workers of all lands, the revolutionary road for the solution of the crisis-the revolutionary way out, of escape from crises, characteristic of capitalist society.

Manchuria is an armed camp. Japan is close at the borders of the Soviet Union, ready to attack the Soviet Union at any moment. Japan has seized the harbor of Harbin as a step for war against the Soviet Union. American imperialism is shipping ammunition to Japan to supply it with weapons for war against the workers' fatherland.

#### THE BONUS FIGHT.

On the steps of the Capitol at Washington, 20,000 ex-servicemen, workers who represent the mass of three million ex-servicemen over the

over three bilion dollars subsidies to Wall Street, refuses even to give a loaf of bread to the starving ex-soldiers on its doorsteps.

In the shops and factories, all workers still "blessed" with jobs are suffering wage-cut after wage-cut, so that rapidly even the employed workers are being driven down below the starvation line. Hundreds of thousands of workers enter the shops faint from hunger, for their wages no longer suffice even to provide sufficient bread. At the same time, the speed-up grows more intense, driving the workers even faster, sucking out their life blood and throwing them out ruthlessly upon the scrap-heap to be replaced by new hordes of starving workers from the vast army of unemployed.

#### MILLIONS STARVING.

Millions of little children are going hungry and naked. Milions of women have been thrown onto the streets.

The highways and railroads of the country are covered with young boys and girls, homeless waifs, cut off from al organized social life, driven to vagabondage, crime, and degeneration, by the blood-sucking capitalist ruling class which refuses unemployment insurance and relief but pours out its treasures for the disposal of the banks and trusts.

The mass of farmers are being systematically bankrupted and driven

The government and the bankers in order to carry through its program of war is letting loose a reign of terror against the workers. The civil rights of the workers are being trampled upon. The foreign-born and Negro workers are singled out for special attacks. The Fish-Dies Bill for deportation of foreign born workers is a challenge to the entire working class. The toiling masses in the United States can and must defeat this vicious anti-labor bill and the entire deportation system now being brutaly carried through.

The bosses, fearing the opposition and resistance of the workers to their imperialist war plans, are "trying to sneak into a new world war behind a smoke screen of "peace" maneuvers. The workers must be on guard. Let us remember the lessons of the last world war. Did not Wilson and his pacifist flunkies also plunge the workers into world war with the pacifist slogans of "a war to end wars, a war to make the world safe for democracy."

#### "DISARMAMENT" SMOKESCREENS.

### Socialist "Forward" Tries to AMTER SPEAKS IN Cover Treachery With Lie BUFFALO ON TOUR

Working hand in glove with David Dubinsky, head of the International Ladies Garment Workers Union, who is at present negotiating with Acting Governor Lehman and leaders of the cloak manufacturers association in an attempt to consumate a peaceful sell-out of the New York cloakmakers, the Socialist Jewish Daily Forward, to cover up its treacherous anti-workingclass role, launched a lying, vicious attack yesterday against the Daily Worker.

The Forward said that the Communist Party stood for piece-work in the garment trade. Attempting to prove their point the Forward editors picked out a typographical error which appeared in Monday's edition of the Daily Worker, where the word "piece-work" appeared instead of the word "week-work."

The policy of the Communist Party, which is a policy of struggle against wage-cuts and for week work in the cloak trade, is well known to all workers who read the Daily Worker.

The Daily Worker, July 8, said the following: "The Needle Trades Workers Industrial Union stands for a real united front struggle of the rank and file for week work. No bootleg piece-work must be tolerated. Set up committees in the shops for this fight."

On July 13 the Daily Worker advised the workers to take the strike in their own hands to fight for week work and not rely on Dubinsky and Green.

What do the Forward editors want to achieve with the obvious lie? It is piece-work that the Forward editors want-bootleg piece-work. of course, with a fake week-work agreement. Communists and militant members of the Needle Trades Workers Industrial Union are organizing committees of workers in the shops to fight against piece-work, bootleg or otherwise.



The Hcover proposals for disarmament are a smokescreen for the increased armaments by Congress and a challenge to its Japanese and British rivals. While the capitalists, with their government in Washington spending billions for war, concluding secret agreements for war, they use pacifist phrases and talk of disarmament in order to cover up the war plans, to take the workers by surprise and plunge the country into a new war. To defeat the war plans of the capitalists, the workers must fight pacifism which hides the danger of war and dulls the watchfullness of the workers.

#### SOCIALISTS BLESS WAR PLANS.

The Second Socialist International, and the American Socialist Party endorsed the League of Nations and the Disarmament Conference. ## The Third Degree

A TWENTY-YEAR old youth, Hyman Stark, was beaten to death by a gang of police in the Nassau county police headquarters, one of the increasing number of victims of the third degree in this country. An "inquiry is under way that has for its purpose the covering up of the fact that the third degree is an established institution. The courts, the prosecuting attorneys, the capitalist newspapers and the police would have us believe that the torturing of helpess prisoners in the jails of this country are isolated events, a "perversion" of police powers.

Such was also the purpose of that section of the Wickersham report, dealing with "lawlessness in law enforcement," which showed that in twenty-eight of the largest cities of this country the police inflicted tortures upon prisoners that would arouse the envy of Torquemada, the dungeon-builder of the "Holy Roman" inquisition. Investigations arising out of such "exposures" are only for the purpose of fooling the public: the elimination of certain policemen and police officials are calculated to more effectively cover up the institution of prison torture.

The third degree is no new thing in the United States. For decades there have been campaigns aainst this practice-but still it goes on because it is a component part of the institution of capitalist democracy. Its increasing used today is a sign of the times—one of the many weapons used against the toiling masses to bolster up through excesses of violence the decaying capitalist ssytem.

The third degree is a class weapon against the toiling masses. The fact that atrocities committed in jails never become the subject of official investigations is proof of the determination of the ruling class to conceal its class character


For example the St. Louis police slugged and tortured Thomas Breezly. one of the 48 workers arrested in connection with the unemployment demonstrations, until he was driven to suicide. The police have hushed up and whitewashed this cold-blooded class murder. In Tampa, Florida, class war prisoners were subjected to the torture of the "sweat box"that precious symbol of American democracy.

The Third Degree, which is used against the whole working class is applied with special ferocity to Negro workers, both in the North and the South. Consider the case of Yuel Lee (Orphan Jones) who was tortured by Maryland police who reported that they had obtained a "confession" of the murder of Jones' white employer and his family. Another monstruous example of this terror against Negroes was the shooting in a Birmingham jail of Willie Peterson, framed-up Negro worker and ex-soldier, by a white lawyer, Dent Williams, while the prisoner was being subjected to the third degree by the sheriff, police and the family of the Ku-Kluxer,

It is this capitalist democracy that maintains the third degree as a weapon against workers that the Socialist Party calls "political freedom." The socialists too will add their voices to the deceptive talk about "police excesses." In this way they will make their contributions to the covering up of the ghastly face of American democracy, so they may continue to babble about "political freedom."



"Unfortunate and prejudicial sentiment"-what language to describe a deliberate cold-blooded institution of murder against the Negro masses! The Scottsboro verdicts arise not from any unfortunate "prejudice" (by which this Negro misleader means accidental, avoidable prejudice) but is an expression of the whole system of brutal and hideous national oppression of the Negroes. The Scottsboro lynch verdicts are but a crowning act in a long series of oppressive acts. Who but Negro misleaders that have gone over into the camp of the enemy would dare to conceal the fact that Negroes are day in and day out treated like outcasts denied the most elementary rights, fleeced and robbed at every turn, and held down in the bondage of a lynch system.

Were this case some mere miscarriage of justice, were it a simple mistake of a "fair and democratic system" one might discuss the question of the technical ways to rectify the error. But the Scottsboro Case arises because the Negro masses are virtual slaves-because from the standpoint of the capitalist system "Niggers" have no rights that the white master is bound to respect, because the Negro masses have for centuries been in the grip of the wildest reaction. And for that reason the policy of the N.A.A.C.P. to place confidence and trust in the normal workings of capitalist justice is nothing but downright treachery. Nothing but the fist thrust into the face of the capitalist lynchers will force them to release their deadly grip.

Pickens not only betrays the ideology of a servant of the white ruling class in attacking the major weapon to be used for the freedom of the Scottsboro boys. He virtually denies the existence of the whole hideous system of lynch oppression. He conceals facts that are written in the blood of the Negro masses, the special oppression of the Negro masses. And thus to the criminal sabotage of the defense of the Scottsboro boys Pickens adds the additional crime of betraying the liberation struggle of the Negro People. The mass fight has been rewarded by the partial victories gained thus far. Negro and white masses will not be deflected from their course by the bourgeois reflections of Mr. Pickens. They will strike more firmly toward their goal-to a powerful mass movement to free the Scottsboro boys and to destroy the shackles of capitalist bondage.

### Beautiful Ohio?

OHIO is wonderful country, but | under the present system it lies like a corpse in the claws of those carrion crows, the capitalists

The flat fields which raise fine truck, grain, fruit and dairy products are as good as shriveled breasts to the hundreds of thousands of unemployed workers throughout the state. Boats are rotting at the piers of Lake Erie. Hundreds of freight trains are empty in their intricate web of railroad tracks.

Farmers are seldo many better off than the jobless in the cities. Go out on the country roads. Milk will not get them at the best more than three cents a quart. Off the main roads, the farmhouses are unpainted shacks. You can se echildren, knee-high to grasshoppers. ticking all day under the fierce sun with hoes too heavy for them to handle. Near Trilby, in northern Ohio, children work in the green-

houses for five cents an hour. Farmhands, however, can not even get a job for board. Eggs sell for

eleven cents a dozen. Truck is dirt cheap. In Toledo, where the farmers sell much of their produce in the Civic Auditorium, prices are away down. The unorganized farmers are helpless before the hucksters and racketeers.

Conditions in the cities are unbearable. One out of three of the population are dependent on public charities. Toledo offers the jobless six cents slop for seven to fourteen hours of grueling work. The slop consists of beans and prunes hard as leather. In Cleveland the Associated Charities keeps a wavfarer's lodge in the backvard of the American Legion building. You are fed soun three times a day. stuff the worst kind of belly wash. The men are handled like sheep stroved."

about to be dipped against bugs Thehospital is full. All day long the men mill about, dragging their swollen legs and feet. Their faces seemed to have turned to ashes. The legionnaires rush about in

their helmets and fine uniforms. lugging flags and bayonets. Mass terrorization is in full blast. In Millersburg two brothers were found guilty of stealing a refrigerator and selling it for \$3. The judge ordered them to be given 20 lashes at the whipping post in the public park. Two whips were broken before a "blacksnake" (a woven leather whip) could be found to do the work without breaking.

In Toledo demonstrations under the leadership of the Communist Party and the Young Communist League take place frequently. At a Hooverville in Cleveland a Negro watched the American Legion men after their poorly attended parade rushing around like cockroaches.

"Getting ready for another war?" asked a white worker. "If it's war, it ain't going to be across the sea,' said the big, strong Negro. "We ain't got nothing against the fellows across the sea. Appears to me like it's going to be a war right here. And I got a notion against who, too. I got a good strong notion and suspicion." He looked at his hands, two tough oak knots, and then at the legionnaires as if sizing them up. Such is the feeling of the oppressed. Bitter hatred against war. Of course these fel-

lows will be gotten if war breaks out. But they want to fight. The proletariat, black and white, is seething from below.



Yes, this is Socialism, Socialism as practized by Ramsay McDonald, Noske, Scheidemann. It misleads the workers, by making every kind of social promise, then fulfilling not one.
