

Of course this socialist publication, "The American Freeman," carefully omits the words "the American Federation of Labor and their SOCIALIST tools." Nor do they quote from that section of Comrade Foster's speech on page 18 wherein he correctly designates the Socialist Party as the third party of capitalism. The Girard, Kansas, socialist publication is silent on that part of the speech wherein the Socialist Party leaders of the United States are compared to the socialists in Germany who are helping the capitalists establish a fascist regime. Does anyone need an answer to the question why the "American Freeman" did not print that part of the speech of the Communist presidential candidate which said: "The Socialist Party is an enemy of the working class. It is a part of the capitalist exploitation machinery."?

In the election campaign the Progressives- the Pinchots, LaGuardias, LaFollettes, Murrays, etc., will make a demagogic show of opposition to the Hoover government for vote-catching purposes. But they have supported every basic policy of that government. They are the representatives of the smaller capitalists and the rich farmers. Today these boys who were promised everything are now men who face policemen's clubs, tear-gas and bullets when they ask for a crust of bread.

More "Nationalizaton" Deception

Mallalieu, general manager of the national board of fire underwriters, delivered a radio talk in which he said young people coming out of school had less opportunity to start in business for themselves because the government is engaging too much in business. The socialist sheet instead of exposing the fact that decadent capitalism has no place for millions of youth, utilizes the incident to elaborate on the reformist Socialist Party's "nationalization program," and sermonizes thus:

"Our friend of the board of fire underwriters is all wrong in what ails the young folks just out of school. They do not suffer from too much government in business-they suffer from not enough government in business."

One of the most elementary principles of Marxism is the fact that nationalization within the frame-work of the capitalist state only strengthens the capitalists. All this talk emanating from yellow socialists, liberals, insurgent republicans and democrats about nationalization and state control over industries and banks meets with considerable favor among many capitalist elements. Especially is this so with regard to ventures hard hit by the crisis. In many instances governments, particularly in Europe, take control of industry and banks for the purpose of shouldering their bankruptcies upon the taxpavers. The former owners are reimbursed with bonds which draw guaranteed interest from the government. This is, as Comrade Manuilsky recently said: "the nationalization of losses, the nationalization of economic downfall, leaving the profits to capitalism."

In general this slogan means greater concentration of power in the hands of the capitalist state power, which exists only to enable the capitalist class to impose by force its rule over the working class. It is an institution for perpetuating slavery that the socialist leaders would strengthen by their nationalization schemes.

It has nothing in common with the Marxist-Leninist position which insists that the only way industry and national wealth can be made available for the masses is by the destruction of the capitalist system and the ent of the rule of the proletariat.

How American imperialism gets its strangle hold on Latin American

countries is revealed in the article "U.S.A. Imperialist Investments in South America," by Robert Dunn, based on the recent Senate investigation, whose object was to save the higher ups from the anger of the small investors.
