Workers' organizations and lib-eral groups continued pouring a flood of protests on President Roose-velt and Gov. Clyde Tingley of New Mexico, yesterday, denouncing the brutal assault on Robert Minor and

brutal assault on Robert Minor and David Levinson, who were kidmaped by hooded vigilantes early Thurs-day night in Gallup, New Mexico. At San Diego, Calif., A. L. Wirin, American Civil Liberties Union at-torney, telephoned a protest to Gov. Tingley, and announced his inten-tion of proceeding immediately to Gallup to aid Levinson, Interna-tional Labor Defense attorney, in the defense of ten miners held on a framed-up murder charge.

Ferret Out and Punish the Perpetrators of the Gallup Outrage! AN EDITORIAL

Kidnaping, brutal beating and secret murder of organizers and leaders of workers' organizations have now been definitely adopted as methods of suppressing movements for trade union organiza-tion and defense of framed-up workers.

The slugging, blindfolding and kidnaping of Robert Minor and Attorney Levinson is connected directly with the nation-wide onslaught up on labor's rights gaining impetus throughout the country-under the auspices of big capital and its or-ganizations, and without protest from the official leaders of the American Federation of Labor and the Railway Brotherhoods, although the rights of their members are the target of this attack, as well as the Communist Party. These kidnaping atrocities are a central issue

for the entire labor movement-especially for the unions in the basic industries, steel, coal and metal mining, auto, rubber, heavy machinery, oil, tex-

tiles, chemicals-because they are only one feature. of a general policy of fascist force and organized reaction being put into play as the crisis becomes more acute, by the main body of the American ruling class and its various government and semiofficial agencies.

The Gallup kidnaping-cynically denied by the district attorney and the sheriff-has aroused mass resentment all over the country. It was a direct outgrowth of the strikes of the Gallup miners, employed by the Gallup-American Mining Company, dominated by the Guaranty Trust Company of New York City. It was a direct outgrowth of the struggles of the unemployed miners and other work-ers against hunger relief.

Robert Minor, head of the Gallup Defense Committee, and Attorney Levinson, militant labor at-torney, had gone to Gallup to organize the defense of 10 miners, members of the United Mine Workers

of America, who had been palpably framed up on murder charges as a result of these struggles. (Deputies had shot without warning into a demonstration of unarmed unemployed workers, killing two and injuring an unknown number. As is not mmon, they shot one of their own force in the excitement. To cover up their crimes they promptly arrested more than 600 workers and charged 42 with murder. Ten of these are held for trial.)

These are the established facts. They make the Gallup case clearly a labor case-a case in which every member of every union and all other workers' izations should make his own. It is a class organ

It was for these reasons that the Central Committee of the C.P.U.S.A., in the Daily Worker for Saturday, May 4, called for a nation-wide united front defense of Minor, Levinson and the ten worker

defendants-as well as for unity of action of all workers against the general campaign of fascist reaction now being carried on with ever increasing intensity against the Communist Party and the whole labor moveme

That the C. P. had not overestimated the nature of the reactionary drive is shown by the fact that on May First Robert Wood, district secretary of the International Labor Defense in Birmingham, Ala., was kidnapped, beaten and thrown in a creek and told to get out of town. The Slogan "For a Soviet America" Question: Has the Communist Party abandoned its slogan "For a Soviet America" as the result of

bringing forward the idea of a class struggle labor party?-B. B. Question: No! The Communist Party will strive more than before to agitate and propagandize the toiling people about the necessity of fighting for

the destruction of capitalism, and the establishment of a Soviet America. Far from dropping the slogan, the Party will talk about it even more, and will carry the slogan into the ranks of all the workers until they adopt it as their own.

The proposal for a mass labor party is not meant to be a substitute for the slogan "For a Soviet America." On the contrary, the fight to build a class struggle labor party is a struggle to draw millions of workers under the influence of the Communist Party, and in this way set them on the road to the seizure of power under the leadership of the Communist Party, and the establishment of a Soviet America. Through developing the struggle around the issues of the labor party, Communists are taking a long step forward to ward rallying the working masses around the fundamental revolutionary slogan of "For a Soviet America."

Question: What was the distribution of income in 1929? Has the concentration of wealth been increased by the New Deal? J. H.

Answer: Detailed figures cannot be presented here. A few statistics will serve to illustrate the mal-distribution of income. According to Dr. Mordecai Ezekial, of the Department of Agriculture, the lower 60 per cent of American families in 1929 received only 25 per cent of the national income, while the top 1.2 per cent received a fourth of the national income. And the conservative Brookings Institution in a stu ly found that in 1929, seventyfive per cent of American families were living on incomes that were on or below a minimum standard of health and decency. Even in that year of so-called prosperity, the 0.1 per cent of the richest families received as much income as the poorest 42 per cent of families at the bottom of the economic scale.

During the crisis, wages fell 40 per cent. But the income of the coupon clippers held to the highest levels of the twentles. In 1933, the first year of the New Deal, real wages fell, and small incomes also declined. But corporation profits and dividends rose to the highest point since 1931, and the number of million dollar incomes increased from twenty in 1932 to forty-six in 1933. The tempo of the concentration of wealth was accelerated by the monopolistic drive of the New Deal.

Change the World! By MICHAEL GOLD -WITHOUT a sound revolutionary theory,

there can be no sound revolutionary action, said Lenin. He meant this in the realm of politics, but his words apply to the development of proletarian literature : as well.

For years the health of our proletarian literary movement in America was enfeebled by the inof a whole mass of wrong, leftist theory. I had thought the harm done by this bad doctoring had been sufficiently proven, but in the current debate on Albert Maltz's play, "Black Pit," the bad theory appears again.

Joseph North, of the New Masses, thinks the play a mistake, because it emphasizes the problem pol-pigeoning, instead of presenting a positive type of militant leader. Jack Stachel, Communist trade union leader, believes that the play is important and useful, in that it teaches a burning esson to workers that will strengthen them against very temptation to betray their class,

How far we have gone in a few years! The active organizer and trade union leader, Comrade Stachel, sees proletarian literature as a great, broad current that should reflect all of the working class world. But the proletarian intellectual, Comrade North, wants to keep it as narrow as it was years ago; he wants to impose a formula on it, a formula, that be it good or bad, is sure to strangle all future growth.

It reminds one of the literary debate in the Union a few years ago, when Comrade Stalin and the Communist Party had to intervene to save literary freedom from the leftist excesses of some of the literary intellectuals.

Workers are Human Beings

VES. Comrade North, without a doubt our proletarian literature needs to be reminded that the time has come to produce strong positive types of workers and leaders whom the working class can emulate.

But such types have been portrayed; was not the Theatre Union's play, "Stevedore" a gallery of such figures? Would you ask that every playwright imitate "Stevedore"? Supposing that Peters and Sklar, the authors of "Stevedore," were to spend the rest of their lives imitating themselves in "Stevedore"? How dull and boring that would become, and what a thin, false, and incomplete picture of the working class world, which is broad and rich as life itself!

We don't want the strike formula made the sole pattern of our proletarian literature. The workers do not spend all their time striking; they also have their personal problems; they have children, they make love, they suffer doubt and weakness, they overcome these doubts, they are human beings. Everything the workers feel and do is material for proletarian literature. If it cannot give us a complete picture of the American worker and American life, it will be worthless to us, and will not help us understand the psychology of America, and how to move the masses in a revolutionary direction.

Strange Logic

ALBERT MALTZ'S play, "Black Pit," to my mind, is one of the landmarks of our proletarian literature, in that it makes a decisive break with the leftist formula. It enriches the future of our writing by going deep into psychology. Don't the critics realize that the happy young stool-pigeon in this play is a portrait of the petty-bourgeois filth that has been pumped into the American workers' mind? Carried out to its logical extreme, the petit bourgeois ideology leads to stool pigeoning and moral ruin, and the play is a wonderful lesson to every worker to stick to his class. Don't the literary critics know that scabbing and stool pigeoning are among the gravest ethical problems working class life? But they object to a play

For Industrial Unions

THE masses of members of the American Federation of Labor are pressing upon their leaders for industrial unions, so as to abolish craft lines which split the workers and weaken their struggles. This pressure for union organization and industrial unions, which are basic questions now before the workers, has forced John L. Lewis and one or two others to take a stand ostensibly for industrial unions at the present meeting of the Executice Council of the A. F. of L.

The workers in the A. F. of L. unions demand industrial unions because they see the need of unity to combat the open shop drive of the employers and the government, and to defeat the company unions and win their demar

But John Lewis, ajor Berry and other A. F. of L. bur crats will never unify the trade union movement. These men are themselves splitters, who through their refusal to prepare strikes and their "red scares" keep the workers divided, and weaken the fight against company unions.

Only the rank and file can smash the craft barriers and achieve unity in the trade union movement. To attain industrial unions which are not an empty husk, means to smash the whole policy of cooperation with the employers, of accepttrayed the Auto-Lite strike, and made no criticism of the top A. F. of L. bureaucrats in their leaflets. Meanwhile, they tried to split the workers' ranks by attacks on the Communist Party.

They are playing the same game now. The Trotskyists, to capture a few members, will split the unity of the workers and block the united front support of the auto strike if they get half a chance.

Support the Colt Strikers WHILE frantic efforts are being made in Washington to effect a "settlement" of the Colt's Patent Fire Arms strike in Hartford, Connecticut, the strikers are determined to settle the strike on the picket line.

The established mass picket lines every Monday morning should be transformed into a daily practice. Every day should become a day of mass picketing. Every Colt striker should be on the line every day. The strike strategy committee and the strike committee should lose no time in calling on the workers in all other shops in the city as well as the unemployed to be on the picket line every morning. This will tie up production completely and force the owners to come to terms.

The full cooperation of organized labor regardless of union and political affiliation should be mobilized behind the strikers for a victorious settlement. Such united action has been established at a recent conference for mobilizing relief.

Omaha Chief of Police To Press Syndicalism Charge Against Pickets

OMAHA, Neb., May 5.—Police Chief Robert Samardick declared that he intended to preas criminal syndicalism charges against 10 of the street car skrikers who were arrested following the large picket demonstration last Tuesday. He declared the workers defied his or-der against picketing. Samardick made the announcement despite the opinion expressed by the County attorney that there are not suffiopinion expressed by the County attorney that there are not suffi-cient grounds for such a charge. Criminal syndicalism carries a sen-tence of from one to ten years. The strike against the Omaha and Council Bluffs Street Railway Com-pany is now in the third week.
