Foster Assails 'Suspension' Of C.I.O. as Great Crime Against the Working Class

STATEMENT BY WILLIAM Z. FOSTER

William Z. Foster, national chairman of the Communist Party and leader of the great 1919 steel strike, denounced the "suspension" of the Committee for Industrial Organization unions as "a great crime against the working class," in a statement to the Daily Worker yesterday.

Foster's statement on the "suspension" reads in full:

The action of the A. F. of L. Council against the ten C.I.O. unions is a great crime against the working class. It is a fitting climax to fifty years of incompetent betrayal by the Gompers-Green bureaucracy. Seeing themselves unable to defeat the present surging progressive movement aimed at making the trade unions into organizations capable of defending the interests of the great masses of workers, these hidebound reactionaries would split the labor movement and thus play into the hands of the worst enemies of the working class, rather than to let the movement move forward.

These A. F. of L. leaders have defeated many progressive movements in the past. They have prevented the organization of a Farmer-

HITLER has replied to the French government's proposal for neutrality in the Spanish civil war. The reply is unofficial, but none the less clear.

To France's attempts to maintain peace, the Nazi regime answers with: THREATS OF WAR. Not content with furnishing arms and planes to the rebels, the

German fascists are now planning direct military intervention. They have manufactured a new Sarajevo: the alleged shooting of four Nazis by the Spanish government forces. "Four Germans murdered in Spain!" shrieks the Deutsche Allge-

meine Zeitung, organ of German heavy industry. "Nothing could more plainly demonstrate that the Spanish government is no longer in a position to fulfill the most primitive requirements for the protection of people living there. The news not only will produce resentment in Germany, but also will make a strong impression everywhere in the world, especially since other countries are likewise compelled to take measures for the rescue of their nationals. 'Neutrality' must not degenerate into promotion of wanton Bolshevism."

This is Hitler's answer: no neutrality, but preparation for war against Spain (which means war against France, against Czechoslovakia and the Soviet Union) on the pretext that responsible government no longer exists at Madrid and that "Bolshevism" is running riot.



Use Court Decision to Cut Wages Fought

Stubborn fighting against attempts of the curtain, drapery, bedspread and Venetian blind employers to take advantage of the Supreme Court's decision against the minimum wage law for women was pledged yesterday by the Curtain and Drapery Workers Local 45-B of the Upholsterers' Union.

Secretary Charles Cresanti of the local said that the union was alengaged in a counter-attack, in the form of a wide organization campaign throughout the industry.
The majority of the workers in such trades are young women, he said, and there have been indications that the employers intend to begin reducing wages and lefigin-ening hours. Wherever such attempts are made the workers should immediately report all details to the union offices at 114 West 14th St., telephone Chelsea 2-9803. The information will be very useful in the present drive for membership and the struggle to maintain the 40hour week, said Cresanti.

today face the greatest crisis our country has seen since the Civil The most powerful capitalists in the land, collectively known as Wall Street, have organized themselves behind the candidate of Hearst and the Liberty League Landon, to wage war against the people. Their aim is to seize con-trol of all governmental machinery, moving toward a full-fledged fascist regime which would saddle the entire burden of the crisis upon the people, and on a world-scale would put the United States on the side of Hitler, Mussolini, the Japanese imperialists, and the war-makers everywhere.

It is this menace of extreme reaction which shapes the platform and policy of the Communist Party in the 1936 elections. That is why our Party's platform says that the peace, freedom and se-curity of the people are at stake. That is why we declare that democracy or fascism, progress or reaction, is the central issue in

the elections this year.

Everything that is happening in the world, at home and abroad, serves to emphasize the correctness of this Communist approach to the election issues. Inevitably the election will play a big role in determining whether in the next period our country shall suffer under the full sway of greedy and ferocious monopolists, who will drive down living standards and systematically deprive us of our democratic rights, dragging us toward world war, or whether we shall begin to move in the con-trary direction, toward building the political power of the broad masses of the people, improve our living standards and extend our democratic rights, while co-operating with the peace forces of the world to prevent a new slaughter worse than that of 1914-1918. It cries against "dictatorship"—but by this it means everything which checks even the most outrageous abuses of predatory capital. It by which it means even the commising liberalism which would relieve mass starvation in order to preserve the capitalist system. The reactionaries even try to exploit the real grievances of the people against the compromising liberalism in Washington in order to drag the people into support of a thousandfold worse reaction. There is no truth and no clarity to be found from the reactionary camp-it lives and grows by sow-

Can anyone deny that Wall Street, monopoly capital, is the chief center of all reactionary deny that it is the chief enemy of the peace, freedom and prosperity of the American people? Can anyone deny that Wall Street supports, with unprecedented unanimity and energy, the Republican candidates, Landon and Knox? It is these undeniable facts that must be repeated again and again, that must be shouted from the housetops of America, to smash through the lies and fakeries of the reactionary politicians, by which they hope to enslave the

American people. There are still people who would "laugh it off," who say "it can't happen here," who rely upon tra-ditional habits and institutions as sufficient guarantee of our rights and liberties. Such light-hearted indifference to the growing threat of reaction is a great danger. So argued the Germans until it was too late, until Hitler's bloody axe swung upon the necks of every opponent and even critic.

Reaction in America is strong. ferocious and unscrupulous. It controls all the chief avenues of expression and communication. It spending millions upon millions to gain undisputed control of government, to elect Landon. is no trick too low, no threat too vile, to confuse and demoralize the people and draw them into reactionary channels. Against this enemy, headed by that arch-reac-tionary exponent of every attack on American liberties. William Randolph Hearst, the people need all their strength, wisdom and organization. Above all, the com-mon people need unity, unity of purpose and action, if they are to preserve their liberties, and defeat the man of Hearst and Wall Street, Landon

Everyone in America should be interested in the unprecedented but not entirely suprising development in Colorado. A few hours after Mr. John M. Hamilton, generalissimo of Wall Street forces, visited the Colorado Republican convention, that body endorsed the Townsend plan. This is an even more rapid tracing of Hitler's path than had been expected. Wall Street's Landon will promise all things to all men just as Hitler did anything to get power. What would follow if this fascist coup should succeed is another matter, for which we must also look to Germany for the an-

We Communists declare that fascism is not inevitable, that reaction can be defeated and democratic rights can be preserved. But to achieve this aim, which is the aim of the overwhelming majority of the people, it is necessary that labor, the farmers, the impoverished middle classes, all progressives, shall come together and create an enduring alliance. It is necessary to have what the people of France and Spain found necessary to defeat fascism—a people's front.

We see such a people's front arising, taking shape, growing stronger, in the United States, where we call it the Farmer-Labor Party. It is the chief aim of the Communist Party in this campaign to hasten the building of the Farmer-Labor Party into a factor in American politics. We want to speed up the process of the people breaking away from the old capitalist par-

Where can we find the forces build the people's front in America, strong enough to defeat Wall Street and its Landons, Hearsts. Liberty Leagues and Black Legions? The most important of these forces are to be found in the trade unions, the farm organizations, the organized unemployed groups, in the progressive groupings in the old parties, and in those organizations influenced by the Socialist and Communist Parties.

All these groups comprise a

variety of opinions as to when, how and to what degree we shall replace the present social order with a better one. But all of them agree upon certain fundamental aims and demands which, when taken together and clearly stated, constitute a program upon which these otherwise diverse groupings can even now be united. They all agree that the living standards of the population must be raised that old age and unemployment insurance adequate to maintain decent living must be provided, that a powerful trade union movemust be built to include quickly the whole working class, that the farmers must be saved from ruin and enabled to produce what the country needs with an adequate return, that social and labor legislation must not ed much further, that the budget of the rich, that the necessary finances must be taken out et the profits of the exploiters, out the accumulated riches of Wall Street. All these groups to curb the usurped powers of control over the government, deextend democratic rights, and maintain peace in the

The only way in which reaction can be decisevely defeated is through building a broad people's front, a Farmer-Labor Party, upon such a program. That is the aim of the Communist Party in the present election campaign. That s why we say the issue today is democracy or fascism-the people's front against Wall Streetan issue for which the peopleare prepared, which they can un-

derstand, around which they can be organized to fight and defeat reaction. That is why we say that the issue today is not between socialism and capitalism, as some ican fascism.

> The reactionary camp, in order to confuse the people, does everything to avoid facing squarely this issue of democracy or fascism. The fascist-minded men of the Liberty League and Republican Party try to carry the nation on the road to fascism by declaring that the only alternative is immediate socialism and violent revolution. In this way they hope to stampede all those who are not ready for socialism into the fas-That is why Hearst, cist camp. Landon, and the Liberty League, denounce the New Deal and Roosevelt's course as socialistic and even communistic, although all intelligent people know there isn't an ounce of socialism in the Washington administration. They thus aim to discredit socialism by smearing it with the failures of the New Deal, while at the same time they would frighten the nonsocialists into the fascist line-up by declaring this election would decide the choice between capitalism and socialism

Role of Thomas

In this situation, Norman Thomas, presidential candidate of the Socialist Party, has brought forward the same slogan as the reactionaries, socialism or capitalism, demanding that the fundamental line-up in 1936 shall be on this issue, and refusing to associate himself with other progressive forces. He refuses to see any immediate menace of fascism, and is indifferent to the need for a reactionaries. As a consequence of this ostrich-like attitude, of this failure to confront the pressing danger of reaction, the Socialist Party has refused immediate participation in the immediate political struggles of the people; it rejects the people's front; it comes into head-on collison with the progressive labor movement; it drifts into sectarian isolation. The leadership of the Socialist Party does not see that there can be no effective fight against capitalism without defeating the immediate menace of reaction, that socialism cannot be won unless we defeat the reactionaries.

Norman Thomas showed what dangerous company such a wrong policy will bring one into, when in the past weeks he performed two stunts which earned him the enthusiastic cheers of Hearst, the Liberty League and the Repubhis appearance at the Townsend ond was his notorious correspondwhile to examine both incidents in some detail.

Father Coughlin had appeared spectacularly before the Townsend convention, apparently on behalf of Lemke, but in reality as the whole world knows, in the interests of Landon. He made that very interesting remark about the "unholy trinity" which he identified as "Roosevelt, Landon and Browder." But the convention would not perform, according to demand: a diversion was needed, to gain time and to stop the delegates from taking any step toward the Farmer-Labor Party movement. A brilliant meneuver was hatched in some fertile mind, whether that of Gerald Smith or Father Coughlin is not disclosed. Before acting on Lemke, a motion was adopted to invite other candidates also to speak. But the motion named, not Coughlin's 'unholy trinity" but a different combination, in which the name of Norman Thomas had taken the place

of Browder. Why the change? Because the reactionary gentlemen manipulating the Townsend convention knew that a speech by Browder would make their task more difficult while a speech by Norman would make it easier. And the event proved them cordid help them. Instead of attacking their misleaders he made a head-on attack against the whole movement for old-age pensions; he raised the issue of socialism instead of oldage pensions; he denounced the Townsend plan, not for its reactionary sales-tax feature, but for its progressive feature of promise of comfort to the aged; he conveniently forgot that the Socialist record for the Workers' Old-age. It was a most illuminating and educational incident, showing how the slogan of socialism, as used by Thomas, can be used to help elect the most anti-socialist and pro-fascist candidate in the

The second incident was Thomas's correspondence with Landon. Everyone who knows polities at all, knows that Landon's labor policy is that of the people who made him candidate, Hearst and Wall Street. The Republican platform on labor policy consists of a few nice words which for years have been known to mean open shop" in the sense of the U. S. Steel Corporation, enforced club, gun and poison gas, as well as blacklist. The Steel Instatute had just emphasized this by using the identical words of the platform in its half-million dollar advertising campaign de-claring war upon the effort to unionize the steel workers. In this setting, Landon made his acceptspeech, more bluntly and openly for company unions than the Steel Institute advertisements That political blunder was immediately pointed out to him, and he was urged to "explain" this a little in order to avoid driving even the reactionary Republican trade union leaders into such a position that they would be forced

to desert him. But how was Landon to quickly find a pretext for this camouflage? It was an embarrassing situation. Norman Thomas came to the rescue. He wrote Landon a polite letter, in which he assumed that Landon was a free agent, unconnected with Hearst, Wall Street, and the U.S. Steel Corporation, that Landon laid out his labor policy by his nice words and not through the action of his backers. It was a gift from heaven for Landon, and he quickly used it. Thomas helped further by replying to Landon, accepting his response as a fundamental change in his labor policy, favorable to labor. Again Hearst and the Republican press overflowed with praise for Norman Thomas and his "courage" in boldly rushing in where angels fear to tread and while flying the banner of social-

Such are the results that flow frem the Socialist Party policy which began by refusing a joint campaign with the Communist Party, which continued by refusing to help build the Farmer-Labor Party, which then went head-on in opposition to the progressive trade unions in Labor's Non-Partisan League, and which now culminates in winning the preise of the Wall Street press.

Landon's Backers

Let me emphasize the Communiss estimate of Landon. He is the candidate of the most reactionary forces in America. He and Knox were handpicked over a gear ago by William Randolph Hearst, the enemy of all progress and decency, chief exponent of ascism in America and friend of Hitler and Mussolini abroad. He is supported by the Liberty League, by Morgan, by the duPonts, by the Rockefellers, by all the kings of monopoly who oppress and exploit the workers and farmers. His platform is a program of attack against the living standards and

liberties of the people, it is the program of reaction, which would carry us a long way on the road to fascism and war. Landon and Knox are the main enemy who must be defeated at all costs.
The case of Roosevelt and the nocratic platform is not simple. Roosevelt also stands for capitalism. But as between reaction and democracy, Roosevelt is striving to follow a middle course. He therefore wavers between the pressure from the reactionaries (both Republican and Democratic) and the pressure from the prohe retreated steadily before the tionary attack; but in the election platform and his acceptance speech a progressive note was struck. Thus the Roosevelt administration combines forces of both sides, and follows a zig-zag

Is is against this indecisive po sition of Roosevelt that the reac-tionaries rage. They demand a frontal attack against the living standards and democratic rights of the people. They demand de-cisive steps toward fascism and war. At the same time, it is this indecisiveness of Roosevelt which shows clearly that he is no bulwark against reaction and fascism.

It shows how impossible it is for Roosevelt to defeat reaction. The progressive forces must organize for independent political action in a Farmer-Labor Party, which is the specific American form of the

If there had been a Farmer-Labor national ticket this year, the Communist Party would have thrown its support behind these candidates and not put forward continue to be, ready to unite our strength with any really effective progressive political action of the masses to keep the reactionaries out of power. In the absence of a Farmer-Labor ticket, with no effective efforts at national unity of the progressive forces, we bring forward our own separate ticket and platform, using them always in such a way as to advance and strengthen the Farmer - Labor Party movement throughout the country, and supporting all loca and State Farmer-Labor tickets.

We have seen him make concessions to the reactionaries, precisely because there was not sufficient counterpressure from the left by the independent action of the progressives. We have seen that to rely on Roosevelt leads to passivity and prevents the rapid building of the peoples' front the Farmer-Labor Party. We have seen how the failure to build the Farmer-Labor Party, and the failure to press forward with independent action and organization left the way open for Coughlin and Lemke to exploit the desperation of millions of suffering people with their half-fascist Union Party, an adventure which in reality has but one purpose, the election of

Landon. The platform of the Union Party which was cooked up by Coughlin and Hearst, makes use of vague phrases designed to attract the farmer and worker, but it is silent on the most important questions of higher wages, trade union organization, old-age pensions, relief to the unemployed and the needy farmers, in its abject submission to the irresponsible rule of the Supreme Court, and in its war-provoking jingoism it is more openly reactionary than the Republican platform. The best indication of the real program of Coughlin and Lemke is their savage attacks against anything with the slightest tinge of progressivism. In fighting for liberty and for their daily bread, the people will learn those deeper lessons which will eventually prepare them for that necessary reorganization of our social life which can be achieved only by taking the road to Socialism. The doctor said he could cure the catarrh, but could not say whether he could stop the head poises or improve my hearing. I tried his three month treatment but have not improved so far as my hearing and head noises are concerned.

> THERE is no precise knowledge concerning either the cause of the onset of ear noises o. its treatment after onset. In many in-stances the condition is labelled "catarrh," simply on the basis of the patient's complaint, rather than on the findings on examination.

There are many cases which, routine examination reveal drums which are typical of catarrhal ears yet the patients do not complain of ear noises or deafness. On the other hand, there are patients with normal appearing ears, who complain

When our unit broadened out into a branch, it became essential that many new comrades take positions as leaders. I was elected a leader in both my branch and section. To refuse one office did not occur to me.

MY parents, who had only com-plained occasionally when I came in late, became very concerned about the state of my health. A short time later they were the typical nagging parents who do not agree politically and therefore cannot understand. My health was soon so run down I was compelled to abandon all activity.

For some time I was at a loss, Anything not connected with the movement seemed shallow and stupid. My family exerted every influence to induce me to leave the Young Communist League.

When I was well enough to be around again I found that I must make a definite decision. Naturally I reentered the branch.

THIS time, however, I decided to arrange my life systematically. No longer a novice, I realized that I had been under an unnatural strain. Shakespeare: A Marxist View

THE Critics' Group, under the able editorship of Angel Flores, is to be commended for its efforts to broaden the cultural scope of Marxist interpretation in this country. Its first pamphlet, on Cervantes and Don Quixote, by the Soviet critic, Pavel I. Novitsky, is a brief but searching analysis of the socio-historical factors which contributed to the genius of one of the major creative writers of the Western world. Today, with all eyes turned on Spain, the problems and achievements of Cervantes struggling against a feudal reaction whose ideals are still upheld by the Spanish fascists—these problems and achievements have for us a significant revolutionary importance.

Now, in its second pamphlet, the Critics' Group presents us with a study of Shakespeare by another Soviet writer, A. A. Smirnov. Those who read Donald Morrow's little book. Where Shakespeare Stood (reviewed in this column last December) will certainly enjoy Smirnov's more detailed analysis of the man whom his own class (the bourgeoisle) has had to reject as "too revolutionary."

Smirnov takes the position (supported by a considerable body of economic and historical knowledge) that Shakespeare was "the humanist ideologist of the time." He divides the work of the great dramatist into three periods, each of which is closely linked with certain stages in the destiny of the new social class. The first period (to 1601) witnessed "a coalescence of all the foremost forces of the country: upper middle class, the monarchy, the gentry, and even part of the landed nobility." Optimism and confidence was the keynote, with undertones of pessimism: and we have such contrasting plays as Midsummer Night's Dream. Comedy of Errors, Romeo and Juliet, and Julius Caesar. The second period (to 1609) drew the class lines tighter, and forced decisive action amid a chaos of vaciliation and despair: Hamlet. King Lear. Macbeth and Othello helped to bring Shakespeare forward as "champion of the heroic ideals of bourgeois humanism." With the third period (to 1611) and the rise of the Puritan fanatics Shakespeare retreated into a "reconciliation with life" whichdespite the praise of many bourgeols critics, amounted actually to a weakening of his genius.

Smirnov says of Shakespeare that he "did not permit resignation and apathy to enter the soul of man; struggle was to him the whole meaning and content of life-creative struggle for the realization, if not of the highest ideals, at least of the organic desires inherent in his individualist character." And he concludes that "Shakespeare became a threat to that class which had given him birth. The bourgeoisie have never been able to understand or accept the revolutionary elements in Shakespeare's work, because these immeasurably transcend the narrow confines of bourgeois thought. . . . And so, the bourgeoiste have crowned him with the empty title, 'The Universal Man'." (Emphasis in original.)

Ireland: An English View

MELAND is something of a British Poland."


Heckle and quibble as you will, that terse phrase which Lenin wrote back in 1913 (apropos of the Dublin Transport Strike) is still so true that it hurts. But do not expect to find either the phrase or the spirit which prompted it in Cicely Hamilton's smoothly written, well-mannered and patronizing book, Modern Ireland as Seen by an Englishwoman. The qualifying clause is by itself quite expect: charming travel scenes; Irish home life in town and country; Ireland's "interesting" past, her stormy ups and downs, her poetry, culture, language, customs—everything, in short, which a sophisticated tourist wants to know, short of the facts which would show the Irish people as victims either of British imperialism or of their own bourgeois rulers -or both in combination.

Miss Hamilton (who has written also on "Modern Russia") reveals the basic weakness of her whole approach in her emphasis upon the subjective factors which seem to her responsible for most of Ireland's misfortunes. Take, for example, her chapter, "Agin the Government," Here she attempts to find the secret of Irish pugnacity and "violence" in the fact that—like Sicily and Sardinia -Ireland is an "island community" and, she states, "human nature being what it is, Irish immunity from outside conflict meant Irish liability to internal quarrels." It would be hard to find a more thoroughgoing misunderstanding of a country most of whose great fighters rose out of the need of the Irish masses to throw off the yoke of England. (For proof, read those two excellent books by Brian O'Neill, Easter Week, and The War for the Land in Ireland.) She speaks of "Irish lawlessness," "this long tradition of lawlessness," which exists, "even today, under an administration free from British interference": as though Great Britain, by making a few empty gestures, has relinquished any of the political control which now finds its "national" expression through the bourgeois Irish Free State of Eamonn de Valera! And when she can say (referring to the United States) that "Tammany is only one of the results of Irish activity in affairs of local government" she not only, by implication, slanders millions of honorable Irish men and women who want a genuine democratic freedom for their own country, but also encourages a race chauvinism ideally suited to the perpetuation of imperialist rule and the growth of fascist reaction.

It is necessary to be sharp with this book because, under cover of a great deal of very interesting information on conditions in Ireland today, such false ideas are slipped over on the unsuspecting reader. And, because of these ideas, the book contains a very inadequate treatment of the revolutionary movement in Ireland. Miss Hamilion, indeed, appears to share the inability of many so-called "liberals" to comprehend the difference between Fascism and Communism. Writing on the sestion of "compulsory" Gaelic she says, "To Hitler's Germany the school is a factory for massproduction of the National-Socialist mentality; in Soviet Russia it is a factory for mass-production of the Communist mentality.

Well-forewarned is forearmed.




How Workers Fought in Barcelona

Treason of Green-Woll-Hutcheson Machine Stirs Labor Movement

CRAFT UNIONISTS ARE CALLED UPON TO DENOUNCE CRIME OF A. F. L. COUNCIL AND ANSWER LIBERTY LEAGUE FORCES

WHITE hot indignation swept the labor movement yesterday, against the treason of the Green-Woll-Hutcheson machine.

From every corner of the country came denunciations of that clique's criminal assault upon trade union

The Wayne County Federation of Labor, of Detroit in the heart of industrial America—hastened to take the lead in this wave of angry protest. By unanimous vote of its delegates, it condemned "suspension" of the Committee for Industrial Organization unions.

Workers in mines, mills and factories swelled the chorus of denunciation against the little coterie of saboteurs in Washington.

The feelings and opinion of these workers were well expressed by Earl Browder, candidate of the Communist Party for President, when he branded the executive council's act as "a colossal crime" against all American workers,

"It is at the same time a clear violation of the

laws of the A. F. of L.," Browder stressed, "and shows with what contempt the little group of reactionary leaders, who arrogate supreme power to themselves, look upon the democratic rights of the union member-

In this "suspension" order, the Greens, Wolls and Hutchesons have shown the same callous contempt for the democratic rights of all trade unionists as they have exhibited throughout their entire careers. Racketeers within the unions they encouraged by soft words and even open alliance. To every militant and progressive proposal to build and extend the trade unions they have been opposed.

When William Green whines that the C.I.O. unions are attempting to foist "minority rule" on the A. F. of L., he falsifies the issues.

It is he and his reactionary bosses in the executive council who have imposed the rawest of clique rule. It is they who have sought to defeat the will of the Tampa convention.

The cold, hard fact is that they dare not submit this C.I.O. issue to a full convention of the American trade unions. They know that they would be defeated in such a convention. That is the reason for their illegal "suspension" action at this particular time.

When William Green whimpers about "minority rule" and says that the issue is not industrial unionism in the basic industries, he is simply resorting to the tricks of a cheap political shyster. It is precisely industrial unionism-in steel, rubber, automobile and like industries-which is the point at issue, William Green. You know that very well.

Beyond that, it is the Morgan-duPont gangsters of the Steel Trust-Liberty League combine who rejoice at the criminal policies of their tools in the council. It is William L. Hutcheson, head of the Landon-Liberty League "labor committee," who makes the motion to "suspend." It is the Herald Tribune, organ of the same gang, which gloats with

glee over the "schism" in the labor movement.

Jubilantly, this organ of the Steel Trust seeks to drive a wedge between the rank and file of the craft unions and the industrial unions' rank and file. It declares that their interests are opposed, one to the

That argument is false; it is a union-smashing argument. The future of the craft unionists is bound up with the successful organization of the great basic industries—and these industries can be organized only through industrial unionism.

Craft unionists are called upon to answer these schemes of the union-hating Liberty League forces. They are called upon, more than ever, to denounce the crime of the executive council.

As Earl Browder says: "This attempt to split the ranks of labor must be repulsed and defeated"-and that can be done by the prompt and decisive action of the local unions everywhere.

Let the voice of the unions be heard-against the council's action; for a powerful, united A. F. of L.

For Negro Rights

REPUBLICAN Party forces are displaying a sudden solicitude for the Negro and his vote.

Of late the Republicans have been making a concerted drive to win Negro support for the Hearst-Landon ticket. The Herald Tribune, Republican - Liberty League organ, reflects this concentration in its article yesterday on Missouri and the Negro vote.

The Negro people can well ask themselves: What will be our fate should Landon come into power? As an oppressed minority, they will be the butt of the profascist forces of discrimination and race hatred. Fifty per cent of the Negroes in St. Louis are now on relief, the Herald Tribune admits. It is against these very people that the Hearst-Landon-Liberty League combine has lashed out most viciously.

At the Landon acceptance speech ceremonies, the Negroes present were subject to jim-crow discrimination. When the Afro-American - Baltimore Negro newspaper - queried Landon about lynching, the Hearst candidate side-stepped the issue. Upon this great crime against the Negroes, Landon refused to comment.

The election of Landon would be a calamity for the Negro people. To prevent such a calamity, they can join to defeat this pro-fascist tool, by similar steps to those taken by the people of Harlem. Through the All-People's Party, they have there begun a fight for Negro rights and against those forces of reaction and oppression which Landon and the Republican Party represent.

'Independent' Candidates

WHAT is an "independent candidate"?
Judging from yesterday's N. Y. American, it is one backed by America's leading fascist, William Randolph Hearst. Hearst's American hastens to take unto its bosom Frank J. Prial, candidate

for the Democratic nomination as president of the Board of Alderman, hailing him as an "independent candidate." Undoubtedly Prial, who is running

against the regular Tammany nominee, Sheriff William Brunner, is no less independent than Governor Landon, who was picked by Hearst and presented to the American people wrapped in du Pont cellophane.

Equally independent, no doubt, is the choice of the Republican chieftains, Newbold Morris. All three are thoroughly independent of any control by the people of

The Republicans are, of course, under no illusions as to Morris's chances of election. They are chiefly interested in using his candidacy to boost the national Hearst-Liberty League ticket of Landon and Knox. In fact, with a reactionary Tammanyite and a Hearst "independent" as their so-called opponents, the possibilities are manifold. The N. Y. Times of July 21 hinted editorially about a possible deal between the Republicans and Tammany on local offices in return for the latter's support of the G.O.P. national ticket.

All of which emphasizes that Mayor La Guardia cannot back any of these three men without openly aiding reaction. And again we ask:

Will the Mayor join with the newly formed American Labor Party in putting forward a genuine people's candidate for Aldermanic President?

Nazi Dumping Tactics British Labor Party Congress Admiral Gaunt on Morocco

HERR SCHACHT, Nazi eco-nomic dictator, has opened his big financial guns on the United States in order to batter down the wall of tariff regulations that prevent dump-

ing of German goods here. Three heavy broadsides were fired this week against U.S. Treasury countervailing tariff impositions on German imports. First the German fascist government prevented the use of (Aski) discount marks in American Trade. Next, it prohibited all forms of barter. And just yesterday, the Reichsbank blocked American business men from paying for German imports with the regimented marks, specifically created for the purpose.

THE object of the Fascist is, with the assistance of the Republican-Landon-Liberty League forces, to break down any mutual trade agreements between the United States and other countries that bar the Nazi's way to free dumping on the American markets under a general tariff arrangement.

As usual Hitler and his man Schacht pick the right time. The Hearst-Landon-Liberty Leaguers in their election campaign strenuously attack Roosevelt's reciprocity trade agreement policy. Hitler has always opposed this policy because it interferred wit hthe peculiar Nazi methods of financing foreign trade, and hemmed in dumping moves.
