Roosevelt Calls Up 900,000 In **New Draft**

Invokes Full Manpower Provided Under the Law

HYDE PARK, N. Y., June 29 (UP) .- President Roosevelt, acting by Executive order in "The National Interest," today authorized mustering of 900,000 new conscripts into the Army in the year beginning July 1 to replace draftees whose year of service and training

The executive order, for the first time, invokes the full manpower authorizations of the selective service act in calling for 900,000 men. The law fixes 900,000 as the maximum number of men who may be inducted during any annual training period. The authorization for the year ending tomorrow was for only 800,000, of which 650,000 actually have been inducted into the armed

The selective service executive order authorizes Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson to call up for service and training the new manpower levy as he sees fit over a period July 1, 1941 to June 30, 1942. The order assumes that men now in training will be reelased at the end of their year of service, although General George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, has disclosed that "some" conscriptees, presumably only a fraction of the total, might be required to remain longer than a year.

Extension of the year's service required under the selective service law would require an act of Congress. Thus far there has been no move by Mr. Roosevelt's administration to seek such an extension from Congress.

Seize 29 In Biggest Roundup Of Spies

Twenty-nine persons, 22 of them German-born, have been seized in the greatest spy roundup in the nation's history on charges of conspiracy to undermine national defense, J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investiga-

tion, announced tonight The suspects, believed to have worked together as an organized ring, were seized under the Anti-Espionage Act of 1917 by a picked group of G-men which Hoover described as "an intensive counter espionage" body.

The arrests culminated more than two years' work by Federal agents and as a comparison, he noted that there have been only 19 convictions under the Anti-Espionage Act since its passage.

22 SEIZED HERE

Twenty-two of the suspects were taken in metropolitan New York four in New Jersey, and one each in California, Michigan and Wisconsin Members of the ring have been employed by the German consulate in New York, the German Library of Information, Germania Book and Specialty Co., the Sperry Gyroscope Co. which manufactures the secret Sperry and Norden bomb sights for the United States and England, the United States Steamship Lines, Westinghouse Electric Bendix Associates, Ford Motor Co. plants abroad, Chrysler Motor Co plants abroad, and Pan-American Airways.

Of the 29, two were born in the United States, 18 had become naturalized citizens, and two had taken out their first papers.

THE PEOPLE'S PROGRAM OF STRUGGLE Mass Tank Battle Still FOR THE DEFEAT OF HITLER AND HITLERISM Rages in Luck Sector

The following manifesto was unanimously passed by 145 delegates at the National Committee meeting of the Communist Party now meeting here. The delegates came from every state in the Union. The National Committee concluded its sessions last night.

To the American People:

The people of our country are facing a new world

Hitler fascism has brazenly attacked the Soviet Union, in flagrant violation of a treaty of non-aggression and despite the peace and neutrality policy of the USSR. This has immeasurably increased the menace of Hitler and fascism to the national existence of all peoples, to the social and national security of the people of the United States. The involvement of the Soviet Union in the war has changed the character of the war. The glorious and mighty defense by the Red Army and the united peoples of the Soviet Union, their valiant struggle to drive out and crush the aggressor, creates the opportunity for the people of the United States and for all peoples to unite and assure the complete and final annihilation of Hitler and

The American people hate and abhor fascism. They have seen for themselves that fascism means unrestrained oppression of the masses at home and aggressive war for

Prior to the outbreak of the war considerable numbers of the American people sought to stop the fascist aggressors by supporting the policy of collective security—the policy advanced by the Soviet Union. But the statesmen of the capitalist countries threatened by fascist aggression refused to accept this policy. This they did because they feared that resistance to aggression would strengthen the democratic forces of their own peoples and the position of the Soviet Union. Instead, they adopted the shameful Munich policy of appeasement, betrayal and surrender.

They hoped in this way to divert the attack of the fascist aggressors from themselves to the Soviet Unionthe land of Socialism, the truest champion of peace and equality among nations. Instead of peace the capitalist statesmen brought on war among the imperialist powers themselves for the redivision of the world. The people of the United States rightly had no confidence or trust in this kind of a war. They remained overwhelmingly in favor of keeping out of it.

The Soviet Union tried in vain to prevent this second imperialist war. Rebuffed in this attempt by the conspiracy of the Chamberlains to divert fascist aggression towards the land of Socialism, the Soviet Union accepted the proposal of the German government for a treaty of non-aggression. It adopted a policy of consistent neutrality towards both sides in this war and exerted all its efforts to prevent the spread of the war. It strove to bring the war to an early end and to establish peace. This policy of peace and neutrality was in the interest not only of the peoples of the Soviet Union who desired peacefully to build their socialist society, but also corresponded to the best interests of the peoples of all lands.

All of this proved conclusively that the war was not really a war against fascism but a struggle between rivals for imperialist aims. The stand of the Soviet Union only strengthened the conviction of the majority of the American people that this was not their war and that the United States like the Soviet Union, should keep out of it. That is why the advanced sections of the labor movement and of the people regarded as their main task the organization of the people's opposition to the imperialist war and an imperialist "peace" of violence, calling for a genuine people's peace without annexations or indemnities, with full security to the national independence and freedom of all peoples. They realized that this was the only genuine way to fight against reaction and fascism.

Why did Hitler attack the Soviet Union at this time? He attacked because the very existence of the mighty and free Socialist state constituted a threat to Hitler's plan to enslave the peoples of the world. He attacked in the hope of arousing in his support in the United States and England the reactionary elements, to evoke again the old Munich betrayal of the peoples of England and America and of the countries he has enslaved in Europe. He was driven by a fear of the rising people's movements in the occupied countries as well as in Germany. He attacked the Soviet Union as the outpost of world progress and with the hope of acquiring the boundless resources of the great Soviet Union to strengthen his hand against Great Britain and the United States and to further his plans for the conquest of the world.

Hitler's attack upon the Soviet Union imparts a new and sinister aspect to the menace of Hitlerism for the American people, the British people and the people of the world. It shows conclusively that German fascism is determined to continue at all costs its fight for world conquest, to impose upon the world a regime of complete destruction of the independence of nations and of all elementary rights of the masses. There can be no peace for the peoples of the world without the complete destruction of Hitler and Hitlerism. Hitler fascism stands exposed as the greatest and main enemy of the peoples of

This is the new world situation. Hitler's smoke-screen

of a holy war against Communism will not and must not deceive or divide the American people. The issue is not Communism. German fascism has set out to enslave all nations and all peoples-to conquer the world. That, and only that, is the issue.

The Soviet Union is fighting the brutal assault of the fascist aggressor in defense of its land, its peoples, their freedom and independence. It fights to drive out and crush the Nazi aggressor - the hateful, barbaric, imperialistic, fascist dictatorship of Hitler. In this struggle, the American people are by no means neutral or unconcerned. They cannot but strive for the defeat of Hitlerism. They cannot but adopt a policy that favors and gives to the Soviet Union ALL SUPPORT to insure the decisive military defeat of Hitler and fascism. Through their organized efforts the American people must make the policy of the American government a genuine policy of friendship and collaboration with the Soviet Union, a policy that gives ALL AID TO THE SOVIET AND BRITISH PEOPLES. The American people must throw in the full weight of their might and power to defeat German fascism.

The defeat of Hitlerism, which means the defense of the liberty and independence of all nations, calls for the world-wide unity of all peoples in the struggle against Hitler fascism and in defense of the Soviet Union. The building of such a front requires the collaboration of the peoples of England, the United States and the Soviet Union, together with all peoples. This is the desire of the British people. This will become the expressed desire of the German people, the Italian people, and of those now under the heel of the fascist conqueror. This is the desire of the peoples of Latin America, who are struggling for democratic liberties and national independence. This is the desire of the Chinese people so bravely struggling against the Japanese aggressor. But such collaboration requires the speedy adoption by the United States of all measures to secure victory over the common enemy of mankind and

The struggle of the Soviet Union to drive out and defeat the invader will be crowned with success, even though the struggle is hard and requires many sacrifices. In this struggle Hitler will meet his doom. The people of America are beginning to realize that to defend the Soviet Union means to defend the United States.

The declaration of President Roosevelt pledging all possible aid to the struggle of the Soviet Union expresses the will of the vast majority of the American people who expect this pledge to be translated into deeds. But the realization of these deeds by the American government is seriously endangered. It is endangered by the great influence and pressure of the most reactionary circles of the American bourgeoisie which seek to come to terms with Hitler at the expense of the most vital national interests of the American people. Within the Roosevelt administration itself there are those who would conciliate and compromise with the friends of Hitler and fascism.

This is a cause of the greatest concern to our nation. What is needed is speedy and effective aid to the Soviet and British peoples. To bring this about the American people have to wage a determined struggle against all the treacherous influences of the most reactionary circles of the bourgeoisie. They, the American people, will support every action of the government to prosecute the struggle to defeat German fascism and to aid the Soviet Union, and they will not fail-they must not fail, to speak out plainly against every tendency of the American government to conciliate the enemies of the nation-to appease the appeasers.

The Hoovers, Lindberghs, the Wheelers and Norman Thomases, the Coughlins and Hearsts, these are the spokesmen of the most reactionary circles of the bourgeoisie. These constitute the core of the 5th column. They pursue the policies of the Chamberlain and the Cliveden set in Great Britain, the policies of the betrayers and capitulators of France. They therefore represent the greatest menace to the American people. This menace must be exposed and fought against relentlessly, because only thus can the people secure effective aid by the American Government to the Soviet and British peoples for the successful struggle to defeat Hitlerism.

Organized labor and the whole working class are the sworn enemies of reaction, fascism and Hitlerism. In this new and critical world situation the working class therefore faces the duty to assume leadership in the people's fight against the fascist menace-in the fight to bring speedy and effective aid to the Soviet Union. It is the duty of the working class to lead the fight to establish American-Soviet-British collaboration for the defeat of Hitlerism and to make this the official and active policy of the government.

This is labor's great responsibility.

Having outgrown its swaddling clothes and representing a strength of more than ten million organized workers, labor, the backbone of the nation and its future. should further strengthen its positions in the industries, in the life of the country, in influencing the formulation and execution of national policy.

The liberty loving masses of the American people have always been ready and are ready now more than ever to make all necessary sacrifices to defeat fascism.

They will insist that the interests of the people shall not be sacrificed to the narrow and selfish interests of the war profiteers, the reactionary monopolists and Wall Street imperialists. These selfish interests who refuse to grant labor a living wage are the ones responsible for the strike struggles that have taken place in the country.

The true defense of the American people against its enemies at home and abroad demands a conscientious policy of steady improvement of the economic standards, the health and the general well being of the masses. It demands that the democratic liberties of the people be guarded, preserved and extended. These are basic requisites for a successful struggle to defeat German fascism.

All of this is made fully possible by the great wealth of the nation, its great productive capacity and by the skill of the people. This demands that the millions who are still unemployed be put to work, that there be equal opportunity of employment in all industries for the Negro people and for the foreign born, that the farmers be guaranteed cost of production and economic security. It requires a complete reversal of the present policy of systematic curtailment of the people's rights and liberties, and the adoption of a policy of steadfastly preserving and extending the democratic rights of the people. An end must be put to such instruments of fascism as the Dies Committee, the school witch-hunts, the Voorhis Act, the proposed Vinson anti-strike bill, the use of troops for strike-breaking purposes, and all other restrictions of the right of collective bargaining and of the right to strike. A stop must be put to the persecution of the Communist Party. Earl Browder, leader in the people's fight for the defeat of Hitlerism, and all working class political prisoners must be released immediately. There must be an end to Jim Crowism, lynching, and all forms of discrimination against the Negro people. A stop must be put to the cultivation of anti-Semitism and the persecution of the foreign born through registration of non-citizens, the sedition laws and the threat of concentration camps.

The chief guarantee for the successful realization of this program is the struggle for the united front of the working class and the unity of the American people in a genuine people's front. Such a united and people's front would be broad enough to embrace in fraternal collaboration all honest opponents of Hitlerism, both here and abroad, all those who are willing to join in this common struggle. Such a united front will have to combat those reformist and social democratic leaders who are now obstructing the people's struggle against Hitlerism by their persistent slanders and attacks against the Soviet Union.

We, on our part, speaking in the name of the Communist Party of the United States, pledge our all, to work and struggle as a part of the American people for the realization of this program. Inspired by the best interests of the American people, by working class internationalism, and guided by our fundamental Communist principles we shall march in the front ranks of the working class and the people for the defeat and destruction of German fascism.

BULLETIN

LONDON, Monday, June 30 (UP).—The Soviet night communique, heard here early today, claimed that Germany has lost more than 2,500 tanks, about 1,500 planes and more than 30,000 prisoners in the first week of the war.

The communique said that the Soviets had lost 850 planes, 900 tanks and about 15,000 soldiers missing or taken prisoner.

"The German hope of achieving a lightning victory has utterly failed," the communique said.

German and Finnish troops began an offensive on Sunday along the front from the Gulf of Finland south to Baranovichi, the communique said. Repeated attacks were said to have been repulsed and Russian territory "completely cleared" of the enemy.

MOSCOW, June 29 (UP) -Soviet armies have halted the main German drives toward Minsk and Kiev with the aid of the Red Air Fleet which rained "devastating blows" on the Nazis in a continuing two-day battle of thousands of tanks, the High Command reported today.

Admitting the infiltration of German tank columns in the direction of Baranovichi and Minsk on the central front, a War Communique said the Russians had repulsed infantry units trying to move up and consolidate the pentrations, inflicting heavy losses on the Germans.

The mechanized battle in Southeast Poland, where 4,000 tanks were reported engaged, still was inconclusive. The communique said that while the main advance toward Luck and Kiev in that sector had been stalled, the result of the battle "is being ascertained."

The High Command said the German infantry units not only were unable to advance in the Minsk and Baranovichi sectors, but that the Russians launched counter-attacks and all along that part of the front the main German drive bogged down.

Hostilities gained momentum along the entire Soviet-Finnish front, the High Command reported. There the enemy conducted intensive land patrol sorties, most of them accompanied by artillery fire. All attempts of enemy scouts to penetrate the Soviet frontier were reported repulsed.

There was no mention of operations in the Lithuanian sector around Vilna and Siauliai, towns which a previous communique had

Cops Slay 11, Arrest 200 in Indian 'Riots'

Likewise lacking was an account of the situation on the Southern front, where the Russians had claimed they were holding the Germans and Rumanians to a standstill at the River Pruth and in some instances thrusting offensive salients across the river.

A communique, issued through the Soviet Information Bureau, said an offensive by tank units of German vanguard columns had been stopped and that the Germans sustained great losses.

Fierce fighting was in progress as Soviet troops battled German infantry units seeking to join the tank vanguard, the communique said. The latter fighting was in the directions of Minsk and Baranovichi, the communique said

"By stubborn resistance and counter attacks in these directions," the communique said, "our troops held back the advance of the main enemy forces, inflicting upon them heavy losses."

The communique said large tank battles were continuing in the direction of Luck and that the Soviet air force had dealt several devastating blows to enemy

Along the entire Soviet-Finnish frontier, it was said, the enemy conducted intensive land reconnoitering with some artillery action but all attempts of enemy scouts to penetrate Soviet territory were repulsed.



NEED GREATER UNITY "The Negro people have only gotten. themselves to praise for this great step forward in their fight for complete democracy," the Negro Congress said.

"The lesson of this is that even greater unity of the Negro people must be accomplished if we are really to achieve a 'second Emancipation Proclamation."

"It is clear that this acton of the President was induced by the growing unity and militancy of the Negro people," the Negro Congress statement pointed out.

Negro Congress leaders pointed to the fact that their organizations had advocated the issuance of an executive order barring discrimination in defense industries for almost a year, and that the Congress had in some localities made important strides toward eliminating discriminaton.

LISTS LOOPHOLES

Examining the loopholes in the executive order, the Negro Congress said:

"The order itself establishes no policy for persons who disregard the exact policy of the order.

"It is not erotroactive as to the nearly \$16,000,000,000 already let by the government in contracts to private industry.

"It affords no simple device by which the individual discriminat-

ed can have redress." The Negro Congress also called on the Negro people "to press militantly forward to demand of the President-as Commander in Chief of the armed forces of our country-for the immediate abolition of Jim Crowism in the Army, the

Navy and the other military forces. "The signing of the order should be the signal to the Negro people to exert every combined effort they have to demand that the President recommend to Congress immediate passage of anti-Poll tax and of anti-lynching laws and to demand that these laws be passed now," the Negro Congress said.

FOR SOCIAL NEEDS

In addition, the Negro Congress urged that the Negro people "insist upon immediate federal aid to education, enlarged low-cost housing program, extended public health, child welfare and old age assistance service as the only means by which some of the grave handicaps they face may be reached. Dr. G. Lake Imes, prominent lecturer and former field agent for Lincoin University, endorsed Welles' statement expressing sentiment for aid to the Soviet Union

"The statement of Secretary Welles fully expresses the sentiments of every loyal American concerning the armed conflict which has just broken out between Germany and Russia and has my hearty endorsement. In the present world situation the choice is not between dictatorships but between dictatorship and democracy. Up to this time the greatest progress of the mass of Negroes has been made under me. Now the fascist venom of the man Pegler and his master Howard has included the Jewish people and the Irish-Americans in their orbit of hatred. In his Saturday's column Pegler, who writes what Howard wants written, revives the Hitlerite fiction that Communists and Jews are one and the same. He does this by seeming to refute the Nazi ravings, and then in his usual manner shows that there is "much truth" to the Nazi lies.

But Pegler is not content with stirring up hatred against the Jewish people. Pegler's device is to present Communism as something evil and degrading, just as all progressive movements have been libeled throughout history by the mouthpieces of those in power. Then, he turns upon the national groups, and serves as a finger-man against them. He uses Coughlin and Hitler against the Jews, and the KKK psychology against the Irish and the Catholics.

Well, the Irish-Americans and the Jewish people can give their answer to Roy Howard and his lickspittle Pegler. They can denounce these men as the proponents of fascism that they areno more clearly revealed than in their incitement against minority groups in

As to the Communist Party, it has within its ranks men and women of all national origins. MOSCOW, June 29,-In a manifesto addressed to the entire world, the Soviet Union's greatest scientists and academicians this week urged all men of science and cultural leaders everywhere to rally in support of the USSR in its war on Hitler fascism which, they declare, menaces all nations, all democracy, and the accumulated riches of thousands of years of human thought and endeavor.

Following is the complete text of the appeal:

"Today, when the aggressions of fascist rulers is drenching the earth with new streams of human blood, the USSR Academy of Sciences addresses to scientists of all the world, to all friends of science and progress, a call to muster all forces against the Hitlerite barbarians.

"Can anyone of us - men of science-look calmly on while the fascist boot threatens to crush throughout the world humanity's bright light—the liberty of human thought, the right of peoples to develop independently their own culture?

NO COUNTRY SAFE

"Can even one country consider itself safe so long as Hitlerismthe source of wars and violenceis not destroyed?

"Fascism is the worst enemy of science and culture. Fascism means permanent war. For eight years. Hitler and his clique have been tormenting Germany. Into what have they transformed this country which gave mankind great geniuses of science and art?

"What has become of the German scientists? They have either been wiped out or are wandering in foreign lands. What has become of German science? It has been replaced by anti-scientific, misanthropic racial hallucinations alleging that the 'German race' is 'choosen' and that this gives

Urge All to Combine Called to the Front

MOSCOW, June 29 .- In a thousand different ways Soviet women are rising with united and supreme faith in their just cause to play an honorable role in the great patriotic war of the Soviet people to defend their country and to smash the fascist

Conscious of the difficult struggle ahead but supremely confident of a complete victory, the women. not only in medical service and in other duties at the front and behind lines but in factories and collective farms in every city and community, are actively engaged in defense and first aid activities, in replacing men who have been called to the Red Army, in every kind of work which is necessary to supply the Red Army with weapons and other necessities.

You approach one big house and you see a figure moving in the shadows and a calm voice of a woman asks who you are and what do you want. She steps out and you can see her clearly, a slender woman with a gas mask over her shoulder. She is taking her turn standing watch over the house just as women are doing all over in Moscow and in all other cities.

REPLACE MEN

The sons, husbands and fathers have been called to the Red Army and the women are the heads of the house now. "I sent two sons to the front," she tells you in a calm voice. "We Soviet women, the only really free women in the world, don't hesitate at a time like this when all gains we made in the past 23 years are threatened by the fascist dogs." She stops and you can see the hatred burning in her face.

"We didn't want this war," she continues. "We didn't ask for it. We only wanted to work, to live a free and happy life. But when Hitler's fascists crossed our borders like bandits in the dark of night and bombed our cities I was glad I had two sons to give to our army. I can't go to the front but there is much that I can do here and I want to have a part in the victory that is sure to come."

These are the sentiments of all Soviet women, young and old. In this fight for the defeat of fascism every woman and girl is doing her job in one way or another ready and glad to make any sacrifice in this war against the fascist barbarians.

Moscow is covered with flaming posters and slogans calling on the people to carry on the fight to wipe out

WORK WITH PASSION

We saw a group of girls this morning with a bunch of new posters. One of them is a replica of the nonaggression pact and shows Hitler breaking though the pact, met by a bayonet of a Red Army man. The girls finished pasting up the posters and stood back to look at it. "Let us mercilessly rout and destroy the enemy." One of them read the slogan on the poster. "We will destroy you," she addressed the caricature of the monster Hitler. "You haven't as yet had even a taste of what our army can do."

Every day new groups of women take the place of the men in factories, plants, and the women are among the most active in the campaign to increase the production in the industry.

Early in the morning Ludmila Vasilieuva who is employed in one of the factories' offices was going over the lists of men who were leaving or were in the Army. She knew them all for she worked in the factory many years. As she said good-bye to the last of them, a skilled lathe operator, she asked: "Who is going to take your place?" and immediately answered her own question. "Why we will, of course, we women!"

SIGN VOLUNTARY PLEDGE

A few minutes later a long sheet of paper was passing from hand to hand. It was signed by Dora Gurevich, employed in the planning department, by Asya Hartushova, statistician and by dozens of other women employed in the offices. All pledged to learn to work as lathe operators.

"I will take my husband's place." These words resound throughout the country, in plants, in mines, on trolley buses, street cars, on state collective farms, and they are not empty words. They are accompanied by immediate action.

"Look at our broad fields of grain ripening in the sun," said a collective farm woman in Kiev Province in Ukraine where it is harvest time now. "Look at our splendid horses and cattle. Stop to think of our homes, our schools, our libraries, our happy life. It is against all this, all our achievements and our happiness, that the fascist murderers have raised their bloody sword and it is for all this that we must fight. Our husbands have changed their combines and tractors for tanks and armored cars. We women will take their places we will harvest the crop and we will have a hand in breaking the neck of the vile snake that dared te crawl onto the soil of our fatherland."

LETTER TO SONS

The Top Third of the How the Socialist Red Army Historic Film Cycle Top Third Isn't You Brought Liberty to Bessarabia Opens at Art Museum

I think I've pointed out before that the American "middle class" is not in the middle, but among the top-third of American families.

The term "middle class," as established by magazines and movies, implies not rich and not poor, but comfortably well-off. Nobody is well-off in the

lower two-thirds of our population. the better, worth-while people, ilies that have total annual incomes under \$780-less than \$15 per week.

The middle-third of our families has incomes of \$780 to \$1,450 a year

-or \$15 to \$27.88 per week. The top-third includes all family

incomes higher than that. These figures are supplied by the National Resources Committee of

the Federal Government. Even among the top-third, all are not enjoying the cottage-car-frigidaire standard of middle-classdom as pictured in movies and magazines. For a family to maintain that scale it would require an income of \$2,500 a year or more. Only 13 per cent of American families have it. That is, total incomes of \$48 a week or more.

The top-third comprises 33.5 per cent of our people. Those capable of middle-classdom or better are only 13 per cent. In other words, the "middle class" is not even in the middle of the top-third. It's the top-third of the top-third.

Hardy Family Isn't Typical

The rest of the population, 113,-100,000 persons, range all the way from plain, ordinary poor to des-

Few people, either lower, middle or upper class, realize this. From schools, movies and magazines we gather the impression that our country's average population is the "middle class"—that above them is a minority of wealthy people, and on the bottom a minority of the poor. We go to see movies like the Hardy Family Series and accept them as typical American, not stopping to think that Judge Hardy's family scale of living would require \$5,000 a year or more. Only 3 per cent of America's families have total incomes of \$5,000 a year or more.

Wealthy families having incomes only one per cent of the population.
