## This La Follette Red Herring Also Distracts Labor From Real Fight

By J. LOUIS ENGDAHL.

TODAY, the LaFollittes are furnishing a little comical sidelight to the presidential campaign by trying to expose the financial support of its opposition. What a confession of bankruptcy of principle! Nothing to do but grab off a little campaign publicity from a carefully nurtured "sensation."

LaFollette is a defender of capitalism. But he does not want the muti-millionaires, whom capitalism produces, to defend themselves thru the judicious use of their stolen wealth. Perhaps he would have them use their gold in a game of flipping coins in a back alley somewhere. But that would be forbidden, no doubt, under the anti-gambling

One of LaFollette's most enthusiastic publicity men, Laurence Todd, the Washington correspondent of the Federated Press, recently spread the story that the Communists were raising a million dollar fund to promote the campaign of the Workers Party ticket, Foster and Gitlow. Todd went on seriously to inform the world that 25,000 Communists were contributing \$40 each to the Workers Party campaign

It is to the credit of Carl Haessler, the managing editor of the Federated Press, that he dumped this nonsense into the waste basket when it reached Chicago. It is significant also that the LaFollette probers have made no effort, as yet, to investigate the Workers Party campaign fund. If they did they would find that it is made up exclusively of contributions from workers in the United States; that the sums are exceedingly small due to the unemployment that is ravaging the land, the increasing cost of living and other scourges that LaFollette's capitalist system is continually visiting upon the plundered masses.

It is interesting to behold the array of millionaires backing LaFollette. The only complaint the Wisconsin senator can have is that Coolidge's parade of plutocrats is a little longer than his own. Otherwise they are both in the same political puddle.

There is Samuel Untermeyer, the millionaire New York lawyer, big holder of stock in the Steel Trust, who has been called in to aid Attorney Frank P. Walsh conduct the La-Follette grill of millionaires backing "Cautious Cal."

This is the Untermeyer who believes in using the antitrust laws against labor unions while his steel stocks bring him in huge profits from this Caryized industry. It should not be necessary again to name Rudolph Spreckels, the sugar magnate; R. C. Rawleigh, the patent medicine millionaire, and other wealthy supporters of the LaFollette campaign. LaFollette has not rejected any contributions from millionaires. In this respect he is exactly in the same boat with Davis and Coolidge.

In the words of Lawyer Untermeyer, addressed to Samuel M. Vauclain, head of the "open shop" Baldwin Locomotive Works, "Money Talks." That is why the millionaire are using it; to make the next administration at Washington parrot their orders.

Money wants Coolidge It could get along with Davis. It would accept LaFollette in a crisis, just as it accepted Ebert in Germany, Herriot in France and MacDonald in Great Britain.

The big capitalists will spend just as much money as they have to. It is mere nonsense to investigate how much or how little they spend. If money will not make the elections go the way the big capitalists desire, then they have resort to other methods. Elbert H. Gary, head of the steel trust, is supporting Coolidge, but he has greater admiration for Benito Mussolini, the bloody Fascisti dictator of Italy.

If the Morgans, the Rockefellers, the Garys, the Schwabs, the Vauclains, the Stotesburys, the Grundys and the Folwells, cannot maintain their rule by buying up elections, they can set the elections aside and rule by their own might, thru their own Capitalist Dictatorship. In that hour LaFollette will be at Morgan's side; just as the LaFollittes in Italy lined up side by side with Mussolini against the Communists.

The big fact for workers always to remember is that LaFollette is for the capitalist social order that enslaves

Money, the army, the navy, the state militia, the whole police system of capitalism, are all weapons of the Capitalist State: Wall Street's Dictatorship.

LaFollette's investigations are mere sham battles. They do not hurt. They merely provide a Roman circus for a duil electoral struggle. In this instance they constitute another LaFollette red herring to distract the workers and farmers from their real struggle against the whole capitalist system.

Only the Communist candidates present the working class issues clearly. Only the Workers Party, rallying labor, in the cities and on the land, to the Communist standards, builds the power that will abolish capitalism and all its evils. Only the victory of the workers in the class war against the capitalists will feed the mouths of the hungry and bring about the great change—that will usher in the Communist era-when both the use of money in elections, with LaFollette's investigations, will constitute equally interesting studies of how capitalism ruled in the days of its chaos and approaching collapse.

## True and False About Soviet Russia

By M. A. SKROMNY. Every time new prospects for recognition of the Soviet government appear, a howl goes up in the lying capitalist press the world over.

A few days ago it was announced that the French government was getting ready to recognize the Soviets. The same day appeared "special cables". about riots, strikes and famine in Russia.

Tribune Beats Them All.

The murderous press is telling about the bolsheviks shooting down the peasants or peasants killing bolshevilts. The arch enemy of the workers' re-

public, the Chicago Tribune has outdone many of its competitors in printing the biggest and most ridiculous lles about Russia.

At the beginning of the revolution we read in this paper that the bolsheviks were preparing to proclaim the Prince Alexis Czar of Russia. The next day we read about them being in the pay of Germany's late kaiser. Today we read in the same sheet. what purports to be a quotation from the Odessa Izvestia:

"Our Red Army last spring filled the mouths of 18,000 peasants and workers in the Kharkov district with earth because they killed the local commiscariats and robbed the grain houses

At the same time, The Seaman, official organ of the Seamen's Union of that district (published in Odessa). reports that the grain for the aid of the stricken districts was collected a WEEK ahead of the schedule!

In the Moscow Izvestia of October 5, 1924 (the last one to reach us), Comrade Rykov, chairman of the People's Commissars, and chairman of the special committee to combat the results of the bad harvest, publicly thanks all workers and peasants who were connected with the collection, transportation tion and distribution of the grain for sowing purposes in the stricken districts, for the prompt and vigorous

"Within a month it was necessary to collect and transport over 9.000.000 poods of grain for sowing," says Com-

rade Rykov. "With unparalleled energy and swiftness the peasant committees prepared the grain, the railroad and water transport workers took up their task and about a week ahead of the sched-

#### ule the work was finished. Grain Delivered on Time.

"I traveled all over the affected disricts and convinced myself that the grain for sowing was delivered in time. The peasants see in that a great aid from their Soviet government. They have more self-confidence. This timely delivery of the grain will not only save the sowing area but will increase it in compari-

son with last year." In the report to the All-Russian Central Control Committee (Izvestia, Oct. 4, 1924), Comrade Kujbyshev touching

upon the harvest states: "The general figures of the harvest are 2,642 million poods against 2,759 million poods of last year. To this figure we have to add 162 million poods left over from former years.

Thus we will have 2,804 million poods. "The needs of the rural population" are 2,286 million poods and of the cities-314 million, a total of 2,600 million poods. Thus we have a sur-

plus of 204 million poods," Does that look like a terrible famine with food riots and killings by

wholesale! These official figures given to government institutions of Soviet Russia for their guidance are also available to the brass check correspondents of the prostituted press. But they don't wait for authentic facts. What they want is stories about rebels buried alive, dogs feasting on bodies of the executed, disorders and riots, or bomb plots of the stool pigeon Daily News

And it is not only the enemy press in the English language that is conducting this poison gas barrage against Russia, but also the so-called friendly press in the foreign lan-

#### guages. Forward Still Busy.

The most notorious of the yellow sheets, the Jewish Daily Forward, is competing with the Tribune, and the local white guard Russian sheet is reprinting the lies of both and adding 'home made" stuff to it. Thus the Rússian sheet had a few days ago an editorial bemoaning the "requisitions" of grain from the peasants, conducted according to the Tribune by the bolsheviki. And this dirty sheet is receiving the Moscow Izvestia and has the facts in its possession!

The LaFollette program accepts capitalism as its starting point. It completely ignores the fact that all the ills of the working class spring only be abolished with the system that causes them. Capitalism is stronger today by a hundred times than it was when La-Follette began his work, and his measures, so far from weaking the capitalist dictatorship have strengh ened it.

Take, for example, the direct election of senators. Formerly senators were elected by the legislatures, and sale of votes by means of which the capitalists determined who should fill the offices. constituted a festering sore and an incitement to revolt to this sore, but did the capitalist lose complete and undisputed control of industry—the capitalist class continues its dictatorship, undisturbed, while the masses are fooled into thinking capitalist system, fitted out with a new dress by LaFolletteism.

It is a great mistake to suppose ecause the big capitalists oppose La Follette now, that this proves LaFol lette represents the workers. Capitalism is still arrogant, and thinks it can rule thru a Coolidge.
