DEFEATED

Social Democrats Meet With Reverses in Haverhill. Republicans Carry City, Electing Mayor and Board of Aldermen

FRASER AND BELLEFEUILLE ARE ELECTED

COMBINATION OF POLITICIANS, PRESS, RUM SELLERS, CHURCHES ETC., TOO STRONG FOR SOCIAL DEMOCRATS

The election in Haverhill on Tuesday last resulted in the defeat of Mayor John C. Chase for re-election, and the full Social Democratic ticket, with the exception of two councilmen, two assistant assessors and one member of the school committee. Isaac Poor, ostensibly the republican nominee, but actually the candidate of the republican and democratic rings, the prohibitionists, rum sellers, etc., was elected by a plurality of 1077 votes. The complete republican ticket for aldermen was also elected. The common

GOULTER RE-ELECTED.

Carries Brockton by a Small Plurality, but Only Slight Decrease From Last Year's Vote.

SHOWING A FLATTERING VOTE

SOCIAL DEMOCRATS LOSE ALL ALDERMEN AND COUNCILMEN, BUT ARE ELATED OVER VICTORY.

After a most determined struggle and with tremendous odds against them, the Social Democrats of Brockton re-elected Charles H. Coulter mayor by a plurality of 35. His plurality last year was 1544, and while this seems to be a most radical increase yet the figures show a decrease in his total vote of only 470 under last year.

VALEDICTORY.

As I shall leave Haverhill within a few days, I sever my connection with the Haverhill Social Democrat in an editorial capacity with this issue.

During my stay in Haverhill I have experienced the sensation of passing through four campaigns of heated and intense political warfare against capitalism.

I leave the comrades of Haverhill with real regret. I know them because I have had a chance to know them. The longer I stayed here the better I understood them and the deeper appreciation I have had of their earnestness, their faithfulness and their devotion to Socialism.

To those of the readers of the Social Democrat who have from time to time encouraged me with kind and appreciative words, I return thanks, as well as to those who criticized me in a fair manner.

As a closing word to the Socialists of America, I say: Unite! The cause demands it, let the personal cost be what it may.

THE ELECTION RESULT. With the unmistakable evidences of temporary defeat staring them in the face, the Social Democrats of Haverhill have one reason for congratulation.

Most of those outside of the Socialist movement and some within it fall to realize the profound difference that exists between the Utopian Socialism of fifty years ago and Modern Socialism.

THE GREAT EXPONENTS OF UTOPIAN SOCIALISM were Robert Owens, Saint Simon, and above all Fourier. They were men of broad sympathies and clear insight.

a miracle for the Social Democrats to have won. To those who had carefully weighed the situation, the result comes not so much as a surprise as a disappointment.

We are disappointed because we had believed that the majority of the people of Haverhill had learned enough about the aims and objects of Socialism to realize, to a degree, at least, its true significance.

It should also be understood that while the Social Democratic party secured victories in Haverhill in the past, these victories depended to some extent upon a sympathetic vote, a vote which is uncertain at all times.

It is thus seen that the founders of modern Socialism, our Socialism, were the first to point out the absurdity of these colony schemes, and every new colony failure is but an additional proof of the soundness of the Socialist position.

But, though the organized proletariat, the Socialists, of the world realize that they are engaged in a political class struggle, and that the workers' emancipation is to be accomplished by the political action of the workers, we still have outside the Socialist movement, related Fourierist Utopians who still dream of saving society by founding co-operative colonies.

Those who know the Social Democrats of Haverhill best know that that work and that education will be forthcoming. It is to be feared that the effect of Tuesday's election will serve to discourage the Socialists of the country more than it will those of Haverhill.

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adopt much as a man puts on a new suit of clothes. Owing to the fact that class distinctions have just begun to be recognized in America, that modern Socialism is only now taking root here, we have in this country today many Utopians who are no further advanced than were the Fourierists of fifty years ago.

"The undeveloped state of the class struggle as well as their own surroundings cause Socialists of this kind to consider themselves far superior to all class antagonisms. They want to improve the condition of every member of society, even that of the most favored. Hence they habitually appeal to society at large, without distinction of class; nay, by preference to the ruling class.

They, therefore, endeavor, and that consistently, to deaden the class struggle and to reconcile the class antagonisms. They still dream of experimental realization of their several Utopias, of founding isolated 'phalanxes' of establishing 'home colonies' of setting up a 'little Icaria'—duodecimo editions of the New Jerusalem, and to realize all these castles in the air, they are compelled to appeal to the feelings and prejudices of the bourgeoisie."

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that the Social Democratic party was not entitled to hold caucus under the law, and the only way open to them was to nominate their candidates by convention. The anti-Socialists objected strenuously to the city officials being "controlled by the section," declaring that it was contrary to individual liberty, etc., etc. These same people do not object to being controlled by a few ringsters, obligated solely to the interests of the capitalist class, but they oppose a system that would enable the rank and file of the voters to reach them and bring them to account when they violated their trust.

Third, nomination papers filed for candidates from ward six were alleged by the board of registrars to contain names of men who had not signed, or authorized to be signed, their names thereto. This resulted in suspicion being thrown upon the Social Democratic party, although new nomination papers with sufficient names were filed within two hours after the first papers. At this writing, the whole truth about the matter is not yet public, but it should be unnecessary to state that the Social Democratic party did not have to stoop to dirty work to get its candidates on the ballot, nor would it countenance such methods under any circumstances.

A French Socialist has suggested that if we all had to take a hand at it turn and turn about, that it would not be more than a week after the eminent chemist Pasteur had put in his four hours in the sewers of Paris before he would have invented a process by which the sewers could be cleaned without any unhealthy or disagreeable work. Certain it is that scientific invention and improved mechanical devices will obviate the necessity of much work of this character. If any work of this kind remains to be done, to permit one hour of such work to count as much as two or three hours at an ordinary occupation will secure plenty of volunteers for it.

These are all matters of detail to be settled in the future. These few suggestions are thrown out merely to relieve the insomnia of our friends who are so afraid "Socialism won't work."

"Mother" Jones is not talking in the good work. Besides continuing the agitation among the coal miners in Pennsylvania, she is taking a hand directing a controversy at the Hess-Goldsmith silk mills at Wilkesbarre, where the women employees have been shamefully treated.

The Newburyport Daily News says Senator Lodge "has broad views as to what the duties of the United States is," etc. When Senator Lodge entered politics some years since there was great talk all over the country about the new era to be inaugurated by the "scholar in politics."

Rev. Father Lavelle, the rector of St. Patrick's cathedral in New York, recently said: "It is the birthright of every American citizen to demand everything the heart can desire, and if he cannot get it he must organize and insist on having it. He must not be refused, and if he insists, he will secure it."

The question of reorganizing the democratic party is now giving way among the reorganizers to the question whether any democratic party exists to be reorganized.

Our army in the Philippines is now being supplied with frozen beef and mutton from Australia. This will be pleasing news for the farmers and ranchmen and cattle feeders who voted for expansion to secure a larger market for their products.

"That joint debate on Socialism the night before election may be diverting to those who listen to it, but it will not affect the vote. These joint discussions are profitless as vote getters."

The Social Democrats of Haverhill and Brockton are indebted to the Socialists of the country for the generous support given them in the campaign this year. Had it not been for unselfish response to the appeals sent out, it would have been impossible for the party to have made near the showing they did.

The official returns of the state and national election gives the Social Democrats a smaller vote than was estimated. Debs and Harriman polled 9607 votes and Bradley for governor, 12,260 votes. Wrenn polled 10,920 votes, Barr 11,532, O'Shaughnessy 12,746, Walsh 12,260 and Billings 12,791.

No movement worth being successful but what has suffered reverses. The nobler the cause, the grander the motive, the harder the struggle will be.

Real estate will, of course, resume its former price and go still higher. Oh, yes, the millennium is just a few weeks off.

Now that Haverhill is "redeemed" from Socialism the workers can prepare to enjoy prosperity all the year 'round.

It will be interesting to note just how often Mayor Poor walks under his own hat during the coming year.

Socialism needs no religion imposed upon it from without, and the less it has of such the safer will be its course. But it does need to be shot through with that spiritual passion without which, as Hegel says, no great move-ment can prevail.

Let me close with the proposition with which I began: that only a fac-tional and divided Socialist movement can defeat Socialism.
