The new contract runs for two years, all terms retroactive to April 1, and provides \$7.00 a day for miners, vacations, seniority, and the elimination of the old "reject" clause which allowed the mine owners to deduct for faulty coal from the miners' pay envelopes.

#### Why Railroad Workers Are **Demanding Wage Increases**

In justification of their demand for substantial wage increases, the railroad workers' unions point out that during the depression the employees took a cut of \$600,000,-

Edward Keating, editor of Labor, railway brotherhood weekly, points out that "Now the railroads are out of the 'slump' and on the high road of unparalleled prosperity.

Profits Up 73%

"For the first three months of 1941 the gross revenue of Class I carriers went up from \$968,366,-000 to \$1,152,107,000, an increase of 16.8 per cent. During the same period, the railroads' operating expenses rose only 8.2 per cent. As a onsequence, the carriers' profits rose from \$115,904,000 to \$201,-503,000, an increase of 73.9 per

"This increase in profits is not a emporary spurt. Railroad traffic s increasing by leaps and bounds; carloadings are expected to cross the 1,000,000-a-week mark very soon. Undoubtedly railroad profits will be smashing all known records in the very near future.

"Are the railroad workers enitled to a part of those profits? Their wages are lower than those paid in any comparable industry. Furthermore, the efficiency of railroad workers has increased 43 per cent in the last four years. That's a staggering fact.

"The railroad workers shared the carriers' poverty at the bottom of the depression. Are they to be denied the privilege of sharing the carriers' prosperity when the depression makes way for good

#### CIO Spokesman Scores FDR For Aiding Anti-Labor Bills

"Support of the (Roosevelt) administration for the Vinson Bill has become increasingly apparent," John T. Jones, CIO legislative representative, told the CIO legislative conference held July 7th in Washington.

"Majority leaders have refused to express any opposition to the measure publicly . . . . More direct respon-

sibility for the revised Vinson bill, however, is to be found in the fact that this revision was drawn with the advice and consultation in sev eral conferences of Sidney Hillman, Harry Millis, chairman of the National Labor Relations Board, Dan Tracy, assistant Secretary of Labor, and William H. Davis. Vinson, the sponsor of the bill, was referred by President Roosevelt to these administration representatives for the express purpose of revising his original bill. Indeed, the revised version was written by William Davis, chairman of the National Defense Mediation Board.

Local 544-CIO this week mailed a communication to the chairman warning the bosses anew that the nation's courts have handed down decisions, in cases very similar to

Text of the letter, signed by Kelly Postal, union secretary-

"We want to remind you again that Motor Transport and Allied Industrial Union Local 544-CIO has been designated as their collective bargaining agent by a majority of the employees, working for the employers whom you represent.

"During the past several weeks hearings have been conducted by Alfred P. Blair, state labor conciliator, upon our petitions for secret elections to determine by whom the men want to be represented. Our membership cards and representation petitions would warrant us in asking the conciliator to certify our Union as the representative of the employees working for the employers whom you represent. Nevertheless we believe that the men should have the opportunity to secretly select their collective bargaining agent. That is why we are pressing for the earliest pos-

sible elections. "Please understand that in this interim, any contract you might sign with a union which is later turned down by the men will be attacked with all the vigor at our command

once our union is certified. "In this connection we believe you will be interested in a very recent decision of the National Labor Relations Board, the case of Vincent Steel Process Company and International Union et al. (32 NLRBB 158), decided June 21, 1941.

"'Closed shop contracts between company and nationally-affiliated Union constitutes no bar to representation proceedings where company has knowledge of rival nationally affiliated unions' claim prior to signing of contract and prior to date when original contract to which it was supplementary automatically renewed itself."

"Our attorneys also advise us that the National Labor Relations Board and the State Labor Relations Board have made repeated rulings of identical effect. As typical illustrations, they refer to National Distillers Products Corporation appearing in Volume 7. Labor Relations Reporter. page 525 and the case of Insuline Corporation of America appearing at Volume 7, Labor Relations Reporter, page





#### Why Tobin Fights the Elections

Over one month has passed since the regular June membership meeting of Local 544 voted overwhelmingly to disaffiliate from Tobin's union and join the CIO.

The record of both Local 544-CIO and of Tobin's forces since that date is crystal clear, for all workers to see and understand.

From the very first day, Local 544-CIO has demanded and fought for democratic industry-wide secret elections where the workers themselves can decide their choice of union bargaining agent.

From the very first day, Tobin and his agents have stubbornly and bitterly, through the most violent and unprincipled methods, resisted this democratic demand for secret elections.

Local 544-CIO has demanded elections because this union knows the motor transport and allied workers of this city, has faith in them, and is confident that this union will win the elections hands down.

Tobin KNOWS that such a fate awaits him. Tobin KNOWS that in a show-down such as an election will constitute, that the drivers will have a chance to register freely their honest convictions about Tobin's vicious and brutal brand of bureaucratic unionism. Tobin knows he faces defeat in the elections. And Tobia is looking beyond that. And what he sees frightens him half to death.

The elections will establish before all people the right of Local 544-CIO to represent the motor transport and allied workers of this city. This will not only be a triumph for Local 544 and the Minneapolis drivers. It will be a triumph for clean and modern industrial union-

ism, as represented by the CIO. Even better than we, Tobin knows that his dictatorship over the organized drivers of America is crumbling in hundreds of cities and towns. 
