To all Trades and Labor Unions -Ciger Makers Union No 77, of Minneapolis, on April 8th, 1903. went on strike against the open shop of the Hooker Mfg.Co., and after 60 days we were successful in bring ing the Hooker Co. together in a conference which was of little consequence. In 30 days thereafter we again met and after making a contract which was carefully drawn, and of which we were unable, as men of honor, to viplate. But such was not the case with the Hooker firm. Practically every portion of which they violated as we were following a conservative course owing in a large measure to trade conditions throughout this territory, and believing that in a short time the general conditions would improve, that we may again appeal to our sister unions for thet moral support.
