Mechanisim of Thought

Socialists Must Study Science---Research Takes the Place of Tradition.

written a paper on the "Mental Mechanism," which was read before the Montana Medical Association. and which has recently appeared in the Medical Sentinel.

Briefly speaking, the paper is an analysis of the mechanism by which what is admirably spoken of as thought is produced. His first sentence gives the key to the treatment.

"Psychology must be based on mental physiology else it is a deduction from suppositions more or less false, or an induction from phenomena illy understood, generally misconstrued and often misleading."

The demonstration goes on to show that the brain functions through a division of labor among the cells forming it; that is certain cells are specialized for the purpose of receiving certain impressions, as surface appearance, flavor, language and so on. The intellect cells are set apart, and receive no direct impressions from the outside world -all comes to them second hand from the deposits of the sense cells through connection effected by nerves, or vibratory waves. Memory is an impulse wave from a sense the latest deductions of science. and woman that is not based upon afcell to an intellect cell. This wave motion is an electrical impression of what the cell has received through the external sense.

"Chicawful consequences to infants and ory was present in all the adulterated samples contained imitation coffee, consisting of broken lumps of a brown color made of wheat flour or middlings, and 'another contained pellets made of pea hulls and other ingredients." Chicory, it should be noted, was for a long time the main if not the only adulterant of coffee. It is expensive, however, and the need has arisen of mixing it with a cheaper substance. Competition, in its lauded process of furnishing the "best and most rapidly improving supplies," has thus brought about in this instance the adulteration of an adulterant.

> It is in the mixture known as 'coffee compounds" that the adulteration graft mounts to a crime which might well, in Mr. Kruger's phrase, "stagger humanity." Of eleven samples of these mixtures partment in 1897-98, six contained no coffee whatever, and none concontents ranged from pea hulls (64 per cent in one instance) to bran and the husks of cocoa beans. The Ohio reports contain similar testi-
