## MOYER-HAYWOOD CASE

| Resolution adopted by the Montana Federation of Labor at the Thirteenth Annual Convention Held at Helena, Mont., August 20th to 25th, 1900. <br> Whereas, The assassination of Governor Steunenberg of Caldwell, Idaho, has been made the occasion for the arrest of Charles H. Moyer, President of the Western Federation of Miners, and Wiliam D. Haywood, Secretary of the same organization, and George Pettibone, and <br> Whereas, The public press has in many instances assumed that these men are guilty and that they com mitted the murder in consequence of a policy of terrorism adopted by organized labor; and <br> Whereas, The manner of the arrest of Brothers Moyer, Haywood nad Pet tibone in Denver and their extradition from Colorado was in the nature of a conspiracy to kidnap, and unworthy of the officers of the great states of Idaho and Colorado, therefore be it <br> Resolved, That we denounce the murder of Governor Steunenberg as a cowardly and dastardly affair and demand that every effort be made to find the guilty murderer. We have a double reason for this demand. First, as citizens of a common country; and, seceond as members of organized labor, we have had obedience to law inculeated by teachings and we have been pledged by our obligations to the support and defense of our country. <br> That we denounce the attempt of organized greed and lawless combinations of capitalists to "railroad" these men to the seaffold as a crime unworthy of this age. <br> We denounce the actions of the publie officials in support of these conspirators and their attempt to conviet these men before trial. <br> We call upon all men to remember that the murder of Governor Steunenberg was a horrible murder, but at the same time a violation of law with which our courts are competent to deal, and that the manner of the arrest of these men was an infraction of the liberty of the people on the part of the government and hence the establishment of a tyrannical form of government and the abrogation of all law. <br> That we declare our belief in the innocence of the officers of the Western Federation of Miners and pledge them our moral support and financial assistance of their defense. <br> A. They have entered homes, insulted women and have proven their worth to the master class by suppressing with arms any peaceful attempt of their rebellious slaves to better their miserable condition; therefore be it <br> Resolved, By the socialist party of Pennsylvania, in convention assembled at Allegheney, May 21, 1906, that we point out to the working class not only of Pennsylvania but of the entire world, that they can expect nothing but betrayal from the old political parties composed of and controlled as they are by the master class, and call upon them to vote for and support the socialist party, which is the only working class political party of the world, which when triumphant will abolsh industrial slavery and exploi tation for the perpetuation of which the master class now employ organiza tions such as the Pennsylrania State Constabulary. <br> Pennsylvania is putting up a most aggressive campaign. The book is sold at all meetings for a cent a | REPORTS CONVENTION <br> Kootenai Socialists Coin Phrases in Convention - "Democrats Are Republicans ont of Office'"-Score Gooding and Name Ticket. <br> Coeur d'Alene, Idaho,-A red hot socialist county convention was held here lock secretray. Two sets of resolutions titled to seats as delegates. This privilege was accorded all bearing red cards which might be procured at the secretary's desk and simply indicated the bearer to be a "true blue socialist." This membership card cost 25 cents a month, to be paid into the organization's treasury. John Koch of Rathdrum was chairman and J. H, C. Scurloek secretarw. Two sets of resolutions were presented, taeked together and acepted. They pledged the party to support the government as it is until it may be changed. Some striking expressions were these: "labor produces all wealth and all wealth belongs to the producers." "There are two classes, the producers and the parasites. They have nothing in common." "Democrats are only republicans out of office." "Socialists have nothing to lose by acting, except chains." "There is the worker and those who work him." Several proclaimed "no-thing to radical for me," They charged that the government was on the verge of anarehy due to the "idler class." On orator stated "socialists are upholders of principles and not hero worshippers." He grew eloquent and cried "we have no heroes no Nan Patterson who can shoot a gambler; no Teddy Who ean shoot a gambler; no Teddy Roosevelt wh can climb San Juan hill, out of the reach of bullets, and no Jeffries, the pugilist.' <br> Governor Gooding's position in re gard to Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone was severely attacked and he was bit terly-arraigned. The governor was charged with finding the prisoners guilty without a trial, while the con- vention deelared them innocent.
