

On August 19, 1906, we, the hoisting engineers of the Frisco, Standard Heela, and Tiger mines, presented to our respective managers through the master mechanics a petition which reads:

"To the managers through the respective master mechanics of the mines: Gentlemen-Whereas, in view to grant an increase of wages by reducing the number of working hours around the Coeur d'Alene mines;

And we respectfully request you to grant us such r raise.

> 'A petition similar to this has been presented to the management of each interested company, and each petition has been signed by all union shaft hoistmen requesting the increase in wages.


