Montana Supreme Court Declares For Eight-Hour Law

The Supreme Court of Montana has rendered a decision sustaining the eight-hour law. The decision was made by Justice Halloway and concurred in by Chief Justice Brantley and Associate Justice Milburn. The court reversed the decision made by Judge Henry of Livingston some six months ago, reviewing the case in the opinion handed down.






