The liberal party, which controls the British parliament, is losing its grip. The Socialist and Labor members are encouraged at the result of their first tussle with the government is supported by the very small ma-
jority of 49 . The vote was taken jority of 49. The vote was taken after many speeches on a labor amendment, regarding which the
king said, in iew of the lack of em ployment in the county, the government could not recommend that it be passed. The Irish members, mos of the unionists and a few radicals

was defeated by a vote of only 195 to 146 .

power in the body for his own busi ness interests. Dunsmuir is charged with having contracted the Canadi an-Nippon Co. for 500 Japanese coolies to work in his mines. A
