The corrupt republican legislature of this state at its last session enacted a so-called Primary Law that will compel the party to raise \$500 to put a state ticket in the field, and \$5,000 to put county tickets in the various counties of the state. The movement is new and weak in this state and it will be absolutely impossible for us to comply with this extortion: besides, our state constitution guarantees any citizen the right to be a candidate for office without paying for it.

At a recent meeting of the Lawrence County Central committee of the Socialist Party with the approval of the state committee, the emmencement of a mandamus suit to test the constitutionality of this vicious law was authorized.
