Berger's bill provides that a bureau of industries shall be created by Congress to manage the acquired indus-

The acquisition shall be by a joint commission of Congress which is to appoint a receiver for the condemned plants and the appraisements of the actual physical valuation of the tangible property of the plants shall be decieded by a jury of twelve experts appointed by the joint commis-

The receiver is to issue bonds in denominations of \$50 bearing interest at the rate of 2 per cen per annum and shall offer these in exchange for the property of the trusts. These

They were held in much the same light as anything else which men needed in their work, but recently has the idea of their being directly concerned in the government of society gained any foothold. It is acknowledged now that there is a "Woman's Question." It is even understood that there is a 'Woman Movement." The press is giving a place to this "Movement" The magazines are runing aricles about it. There is an equal suffrage campaign in full swing, and there has recently been organized an anti-suffrage society. And it is very significant that the membership of this society should contain the names of so many eminent citizens who are well known as employers of cheap labor and who stand for the open shop, child labor, and all the other horrors that to give women the ballot will inevitably result in the working women giving their attention to political quesions, and so to economic probtems. They realize that working women who study these questions will inevitably be led to Socialism. So their fight against equal suffrage is as well a fight against Socialism.

The opponents of Socialism can foretell what will happen when the women have the ballot. The equal suffrage movement is a part of the Socialist program. Socialists have always stood for equal suffrage. It is time to make a loud noise about it. Nothing we could do at this time would more strikingly and favorably bring it public attention than to send this huge petition to Congress.
