ple! With one explosion of his mighty mouth, Bryan, the idol of all the mossbacks, and upon whose classic: form the pajamas once worn by Jefferson and Jackson have fallen, has settled the economic question for all time to come.

Before the wisdom of his wondrous words the awful nightmare of the high cost of living goes glimmering, and the minimum wage seale, that has so troubled our masters and benefactors, is established forever and ever, amen. Before the New York Federation of Churches, on December 10th last, and in the presence of the Clerical Conference of this reverend body, William Jinny Bryan boldly declared that \$30,000 a year is the correct standard of wage to those who work for a living and that every toiler should receive this amount each year for his toil. That's what Bryan said, as reported in the columns of his own truthful democratic press.

This is by long odds the most liberal minimum wage estimate that has been offered the suffering workers. What th'ell do the workers care for the high cost of living with \$30,000 a year pouring into their pockets? Thirty thousand a year-that's about \$600 a week, or \$100 a day. Indictment of Socialism

JOHN BASIL BARNHILL.

It is a manly and magnanimous impulse which moves the editor of The National Rip-Saw to permit me to state the grounds of my opposition to Socialism in the columns of his magazine. Permit me to say, Mr. Editor, that such an act appears to me to constitute a complete demonstration of your sincerity. In this connection it is both a pleasure and a duty to add the weight of my testimony to those who say that Socialists are terribly sincere. Having held over three hundred debates with the leading American Socialists; a Chautauqua debate with Mr. Debs after his nomination for President in 1904, twelve debates with Father McGrady, fifty Chautauqua debates with Walter Thomas Mills, twenty debates with Dr. T. E. Will, thirty debates with Mr. Mc-Devitt, twelve debates with Mrs. Ida Crouch Hazlett, and a series with Kirkpatrick, Fieldman, Gaylord, Murray King, W. S. Dalton, J. W. Slayton, G. Lowther, J.B. Osborne, etc., in addition to many with prominent English and Irish Socialists, I ought to be able to speak with authority on this subject and I declare my firm conviction that no body of men was ever actuated by more sincere motives than are the rank and file and most of the leaders of the Socialist party. After paying them this tribute, I feel justified in proceeding with brutal frankness to the destruction of all their most cherished dogmas.

A Definition of Socialism.

I accept this definition of Socialism, given in "The Quintescence of Socialism" by Schaeffle, who is recognized as high authority both by Socialists and non-Socialists: "The Alpha and Omega of Socialism is the transformation of private and competing capitals into a united, collective capital." THE FRISCO FINANCIAL FIASCO---MORAL.

Thieves! Swindlers! **Grafters!**

That's what the stockholders of the Frisco railroad are yelling at their head officials, and the poor common people, who own nothing-not even the farms or jobs that feed them—are taking up the yell to beat the band. The common people have been grafted and robbed all their lives by bigger pirates than B. F. Yoakum and his Frisco pals ever dreamed of being, and the common people, instead of making a roar, have, in the large majority, voted to be grafted and robbed some more.

So long as the money magnates steal only from the common people there is not much said about it, but when they get to stealing from each other, there is always some of the bunch ready to register a kick. It is a long storytoo long to tell here, but everybody knows that the Frisco Railroad Company has been in hard straits for money for several years; that is, everybody that lives in the territory traversed by the Frisco lines and its "feeders."

It was shown a few weeks ago, before the Interstate Commerce Commission which made an exhaustive inquiry into the Frisco failure, that Mr. Yoakum and his friends, who were paid enormous salaries to represent and protect the interests of the "widows and orphans" who owned, in part, the Frisco Railway, had made profits by building and buying short lines for themselves, and selling the same to the hitherto mentioned widows, that made these salaries look like three dimes with a hole punched in every one of them.

When this bunch of boodlers saw that the profits which they had absorbed was about to result in failure for the Frisco Railway, and that a receiver would be appointed, they got busy and had one of themselves appointed.

A lawyer by the name of Niles, who lives in New York City and owns 600 shares of Frisco stock, became dissatis-

fied with the way in which the Frisco crew of financial free booters "of the wooly west," consisting principally of B. F. Yoakum, James Campbell, W. K. Bixby, Thomas H. West, Edwin Hawley, and other Frisco officials were providing their own pockets with enormous profits which of a right should go to the owners of stock and bonds of the company's lines.

Since the government is now operating the railroad under a receivership, which it always does when the private owners fail from incompetency or corruption to do so, this man Niles went into court and asked permission to sue Mr. Yoakum and his fellow conspirators and grafters, for a sum of nearly four million dollars, which he avers that the said grafters have, with deliberation, premeditation and malice aforethought, and contrary to the peace and dignity of the state, and of the United States, and of the hereinbefore mentioned "widows and orphans" in general, and of William Niles in particular, put down in their own private pockets, to be appropriated for their sole use and benefit. Selah!

When Mr. Niles decided to let the "cat out of the bag," so that the public could see her perform, he came "loaded" with facts and figures that made Rome howl, and extracted wails of anguish and tears of regret from the "poor widows and orphans" who owned so much of the stock and bonds of the Frisco Railroad Company; but Mr. Niles, with all his facts and figures of the wholesale robbery carried on by the Frisco boodlers, is as pale as a tallow candle light beside the sun to the facts and figures of the world-wide robbery of the working-class by their capitalist masters, that the Socialists have laid bare.

There is a big moral to this, if you can get it through your head.

BACK TO THE LAND.

I have just finished reading the old Rip-Saw, and among the good things that was in it was "Back to the Land," by Comrade Kate O'Hare.

I have lived in the Baby State and members will be added to the local old Greer county many years, and for several years before Oklahoma was a state. I have seen things as they are, but I have not the language to tell that every statement that Comrade Kate has made is true.

I was here when most everybody owned their homes. Scarcely no renters at all. They owned from eighty to three hundred and twenty acres apiece. Now at least half of them are renters and not more than one-fourth of them actually own their farms. The farms are mostly owned by merchants, bankers, doctors, preachers northern capitalists. With real estate agents to represent them, the loan companies will own four-fifths of the balance of the land in old Greer county in the next five years.

There are only six farms of one ten miles square where I live that hasn't loans on them, and what she said about the crops is as true as the Gospel of Christ. Just a little patch along the rivers on the sandy land is all there is here. I could get a sworn statement signed by everybody in this county, except "City Ikes" or a few old "stand pat" Democrats or Republicans. Yours for the revolution,

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

We'd shoot the dog, and thus remove the cause of hydrophobia.

There is, however, a mad dog loose in this free land of ours that for all-around cussedness has the hydrophobia-distributor skinned by an Arkansaw mile. And an Arkansaw mile, be it known, is measured with a coon skin with the tail thrown in. But so far we haven't heard of some highbrow, muddle-head statesman, journalist or reformer who advocates the killing of the beast. While all muddle-heads agree that the result of the activity of his dogship is very deplorable, they also agree that we must proceed very slow, easy and careful against the animal, so as not to hurt its feelings.

ing an article and what the consumer pays for the article. This being the case, Mr. Capitalist is naturally anxious to buy labor cheap and to sell goods high. Now the lowest possible wage for labor is a sum sufficient to allow the worker to produce the energy, or power to work, and to raise a new generation of workers.

Labor power is produced with food, protected by clothing and sheltered by dwellings. However, there are different kinds of food, clothing and shelter. Potatoes are food, and so are lobsters. Blue jean overalls belong to the clothing family, and so do fur coats. A two-room shack is a dwelling, and likewise is a seven room, steam-heated flat a dwelling. Inasmuch as the cost of labor power depends on the cost of living it follows that the worker who can work with the least amount of food, clothing and shelter also can work the cheapest. In other words, the worker with the lowest standard of living is most likely to survive in the struggle for jobs in an environment where, even in the most prosperous times, there are always more men than

The current of free competition in the labor market is always in the direction of the minimum of subsistence, that is, the lowest possible standard of living. In good times this current flows slow and easy so as hardly be noticeable. While in hard times it tears downward with the velocity of a mountain torrent.

The living conditions of labor are best when wages are high and the cost of living is low. On the other hand, capital is most prosperous when wages are low and

For the purpose of eliminating competition among the workers and to raise wages they organize unions and seek to enforce their demands by striking. To eliminate competition in the goods market the capitalists organize trusts in order to obtain the highest possible prices, while at the same time they employ every power in their command to break the ship of the means of production | unions, thereby forcing the workers to compete for jobs.

Low wages, long hours, speeding, woman labor, child labor, disease, crime, prostitution, political corruption, panics, unemployment festering poverty and insane-luxury are necessary products of the capitalist system. All, or nearly all of these evils are the result of the driving force of Capitalism,

the desire for profits.

The evils may be denied, hidden or ameliorated, but they cannot be abolished unless we abolish the cause-Capitalism-and the fundamental difference between the Socialist and the-muddle-head reformer lies in the fact that the Socialist recognizes the cause, and seeks to eliminate the effect by striking at the cause, while the reformer, disregarding the cause, strikes at the effect.

As a result of low wages and high prices the workers are unable to buy the product of their own toil. Goods accumulate in stores and warehouses. Factories are shut down. Men are laid off. The workers who cannot buy starve. The storekeepers who can not sell go into bankruptcy. It's a panic. And the remedy, "Hang the men who cause the breakdown high, as high as Haman." So sayeth the Muddle-head in Chief.

Factories are closed. The merry whirl of industry has ceased. The fires are out under the boiler. But there is a boiler that insists on fuel. The human stomach must have food, else men will die. And before men die they will steal and murder. A crime wave is sweeping the country. And the remedy? Build more jails.

Women, too, grow hungry. But they are too weak to become burglars or highwaymen. However, the capitalist still has money. Any woman, provided she is young and beautiful, can still sell her body. Prostitution increases. Streetwalkers multiply. Remedy? Chase the women from Chicago to St. Louis, and the women from St. Louis to Chicago.

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

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


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An Address By Rev. Dr. Williamson, St. Louis, Before the Ministerial Alliance.

a brief paper to give even the briefest outline of the modern Socialistic movement which engages the attention of the thinking world as no political or social movement in history has done, and equally unreasonable to expect a man in the work of a busy pastorate to instruct men who perhaps have read far more widely than himself.

"It may be said at the outset that the theme is now an open one. Even the most timid need not fear the fullest investigation, and the fullest expression of his views. Any abuse which was uttered against Socialism a generation ago by men who identified it with anarchy and the overthrow of all cherished institutions is forever a thing of the past. We have seen within our own time many of the views of Socialism adopted into laws, and not only without loss to society, but in every case with distinct gain. Indeed, practically every forward movement as expressed in the platform of the great political parties is a decided victory for Socialism. No party could hope to win on the economic platform of twenty years ago. The nation is fast becoming socialized, and those who regard themselves as the strongest enemies of the movement are often unwittingly contributing most to its success.

"Considered historically, Socialism is the direct line of industrial evolution and naturally follows our present unhappy commercial state. Man began his career in the world alone with his hand against every other man. Then follows the family life with its ties as the unit of society, next the tribe and the beginning of communistic life. Slavery came next, and

"It is difficult within the limits of the establishment of the rights of private ownership. The overthrow of the Roman Empire was followed by the feudal system, but the workman was largely protected in his industrial rights and served the feudal lord only for political and physical protection. The peasant family was able within itself to provide for practically all its material needs.

"In the dissolution of feudal society there came into power the capitalistic employer, whose success depended upon the freedom of labor from any hindrances of liberty of contract. This was affected by bringing into the hands of capital the land and the tools of industry. By the beginning of the nineteenth century in England the land had come into the control of an impoverished nobility and the humble farmer had almost wholly disappeared. The poor left the farms and crowded into the towns and villages, later to become the employes of those who owned the means of production. The invention of machinery began to the shareholders. The realization about this time, and soon passed into of this final stage of industrial de-

only natural of industrial life, but progress they are now insistently claiming that the time is near at hand for the establishment of industrial brotherhoods, in which each shall share more equitably in the result of his toil, and in which the struggle for self-advancement shall be modified by the desire to lift one's brother. Socialism contends that this result can be brought about as the whole people come into possession of the tools of production. This they claim can be done without injustice to any, and they believe that an increasing support is being given to their views. They point to the teaching of the universities, to the increasing number of philanthropists who are giving large sums for the education of the people in Socialistic themes, and to the easy way in which the change can be made, or rather is being made.

"One of the best-informed modern writers on Socialism has this to say: Every industry that has reached its trust stage of development is eminently ripe for appropriation by the community. It is useless to say that an enterprise cannot be managed by society, when it is now being managed by a group of capitalists. The board of directors, who do not, as a rule, own the capital invested, cair as readily be made responsible to society as

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the hands of the employers, continuing the impoverishment of the laboring class. The invention of the cotton gin and the spinning jenny marked a revolution in the realm of industry. The great number of inventions soon made it more difficult for the small producer and in a multitude of cases caused his economic destruction. There has been no check in this progress except the brief pause given by the cheapness and boundlessness of our American lands, and the richness of its mines. The casual student of present conditions can see that the strong are becoming stronger, and the weak weaker, and that the process of elimination of weak owners of the land and the destruction of the small capitalist will be complete. It is useless to attempt to answer this by a reference to the old saying that it is but three generations from shirt sleeves to shirt sleeves, and by calling attention to the large number of great fortunes that are becoming scattered. It is sufficient to say that in the scattering process the proletariat gets but little of the spoils, and judged by classes the tendency of the rich to become richer and the poor poorer must continue under our present capitalist system. The condition of the laboring man was made scarcely less difficult by the formation of joint stock companies and the organization of trusts. This makes any financial competition with capital absolutely impossible.

"Mr. Spargo is responsible for the statement that 'in 1897 there were in round numbers one million two hundred thousand firms doing business in the United States and Canada; fifteen thousand of these, 85 per cent of which had a capital of between five and twenty thousand dollars, were driven into legal bankruptcy. It can be seen from this that the struggle is becoming more fierce each year, and can only ultimately result in the elimination of what we now call the middle class. But even in the capitalist class the tendency to concentration and power continues. This class constitutes 9 per cent of the population, and is composed of 1,000,000 families who hold an aggregate of forty-three billion dollars, or 75 per cent, of the nation's wealth. There is no other outcome of the present system than that the day will come when society will be composed of two classes of people, a few enormously wealthy families on one side, and the mass of the struggling proletariat on the other.

"Socialists make many claims, utopian they may seem to some, nevertheless it must be admitted that these views are being adopted by a surprisingly increasing number of people from all walks of life, the rich as well as the poor. cannot be aligned in a party vote. "I will enumerate a number of these claims, as given by their writers from Karl Marx and Engels to Spargo.

"First, it would mean the larger production of necessary commodities, sufficient for the needs of all, and not restricted as now in the interest of prices. Destructive and wasteful competition would be eliminated, and an army of middle men turned into producers. This is most clearly illustrated in the present agricultural Under independent farming, the last stand of the army of those who rest under their own vine and fig tree, the waste through lack of cooperative management, and the marketing of commodities, and the host of middle men, is claimed to be enormous. One needs only to stand an hour on any prominent street corner in St. Louis and watch the business vehicles go by to see the énormous waste through duplication of effort. In one morning in a residence block in this city containing not more than eighteen houses I witnessed six laundry wagons collecting bundles, each wagon representing a different firm.

"This seeming waste in the distributhrough practically the whole of our industrial life. Think of the waste of millions spent in advertising wholly due to the competitive system. The same is true in all natural monopolies where railroad tracks are duplicated, telephone lines unnecessarily multiplied and many thousands of people used in administrative and executive offices to maintain and manage the wasteful competition.

"Socialism would also eliminate strikes and enforced idleness, which cost our people, both the ployer and employe, many millions annually. Socialism would tend to the abolition of a large amount of poverty by restoring a just share to the laborer, and by making it impossible for a small class to exploit the labor of the multitude in the quest of unnecessary personal gain. Of course, it would also ultimately do away with all idle classes in society, whose necessities and luxuries must be provided by the toil of others. Socialism claims that every life should return to society a reasonable service for what is They believe that under received. Socialism the family life would be greatly exalted. With a few exceptions, their teachings insistently deny that Socialism means free love and the breaking of all beautiful domestic ties. They hold that the present competitive system is responsible for much of the misery of the modern home by the children, in the years when they should be gaining physical and mental strength for the battles of life, are forced to unnatural tasks for the purpose of producing the bare necessities of the home. "Unquestionably the advocates of Socialism are possessed with a spirit in business and political life. Socialof enthusiasm and sacrifice much akin to that possessed by all parties in history whose principles have untimately triumphed. In their zeal many unwise and intemperate things have been written and said, and yet their fundamental principles are challenging the attention of all thoughtful people.

"Socialism does not teach the abolition of all private property nor the actual equality of man. It pleads that the actual tools of production should be owned by all the people, and that while men will differ in their ability and achievement as flowers and fruits differ, yet each must be left unhindered to come to the largest fulfillment of the life which the Creator made possible. It is objected that Socialism will fail because men musts have the incentive of private ownership, and the privilege of large fortunes, in order to bring them to the largest development, but it is quite easy to notice that the greatest heroism and self-sacrifice in society is displayed by those who never hoped to gain large fortunes. This is true of editors, inventors, teachers, the members of army and navy, the fire and police departments of cities, and the thousands engaged in helpful professional service. Indeed, most of the progress of the world has been through the men and women who have worked from other than motives of material gain, and these motives have always been stronger than greed. Inventors under whose genius and sacrifice vast systems of machinery has been made for lightening the tasks of the world have usually died in poverty, and have seen the machinery give its largest benefits into the hands of a few.

"We have an example now at hand. A horse-power of electricity is the amount of energy which will do the work and support a family of five. The Keokuk dam has a capacity of two hundred thousand horse-power, or sufficient to free from toil one million inhabitants of the Mississippi Valley, or to enrich by ten per cent the material needs of ten million people. The actual result, however, will be quite different, and yet no one doubts that the brilliant men of genius with their splendid capacities who can bring such a mighty enterprise to pass would find at least as much happiness in seeing ten million people lifted to larger happiness through their entercreating such an unequal distribution prise than they could ever secure of the product of labor that the mother through the actual money made for and children are placed in an themselves. 

Beautiful England.

This is quite the most beautiful country I ever saw. The grass is just as green as summer, there are some flowers still blooming and everywhere are canals. Your papa will explain to you what a canal is. On these canals are hundreds of the most picturesque canal boats being drawn by tiny, shaggy ponies. Little boys about ten years old drive them, and these little lads wear funny short jackets, tall round hats and wooden shoes. There are thousands of geese and swans on the canals and they are beautiful. Sometimes the train stops very near the canals and we throw crumbs out of the car windows for them.

In America we eat three meals per day, and build big fires and have hotair furnaces and steam-heating coils to keep warm in winter and we keep the rooms at a temperature of from 65 to 80 degrees, but over here the well-to-do eat five meals a day, and they keep warm that way. The fires here look like a joke. 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

I affirm that it is Monopoly, and the issue is clean cut between us.'

Karl Marx predicted the birth of this "monster," Monopoly, long before the animal came, and at a time when men of the Barnhill school laughed at Marx for his prediction. But Marx disclosed the already pregnant mother of Monopoly so clearly that about every scholar in Europe admitted the Monster would surely be born in due time. Today the school boy of average intelligence knows who spawned Monopoly—it was Competition, the very thing that Barnhill wants to back up into again in order to make us all happy. As this is about as easy a proposition as turning the oak tree back into. the acorn, or the chicken into the shell, it is puerile to even discuss it. Nobody on earth but a democrat would think of it. Competition naturally produced partnerships of small capitalists that they might thus handle industry on a larger scale, and these combinations of partnerships just as naturally at last produced monopolies. This has gone on in the economie field until today the great modern machines, that sprang from the brains of the skilled mechanics and workers, are by far too immense and costly to ever be owned by any indi-·vidual. Modern production and distribution-carried on by the mammoth factories and great railway systems—are entirely too big for any single individual even Mr. Barnhill-to privately own and operate. Even the most deluded mossback ought to realize that there is some difference between an old-time individually owned ox-cart and the modern trans-continental railway systems. The world today stands confronted with two, and only two, possible propositions, to-wit: Either its vast, modern industries shall continue to be a Capitalist Monopoly, conducted for the private profit of a select few, or shall become a nationally owned and nationally operated Blessing, conducted for the public welfare of the nation. If some darn fool did have the power to shove us back to the competitive days of our granddaddies it would only result in the race traveling again the same long, weary journey it has come, and the competitors would once more combine and at last give birth again to Monopoly. But the sorriest part of it all is that the minds of such men as Barnhill are a blank regarding phases of Socialism. As it is he

all past history. There are thousands reading this page who well remember the old days of competition. No workingman with enough brains to want to eat when he is hungry yearns to return to those days. This is bad enough, but those "good old days? were worse. If Barnhill wants to really know something about the conditions of the workers those days, I advise him to read O'Neal's "Workers American History." He will find that the little tin-horn competitors, that he so dearly idolizes, were as heartless and mercenary a bunch of pirates as ever filled the land with misery. Workingmen and women were looked upon as beasts of burden by these petty competitors for "trade." Chattel slavery-both white and blackwas considered a divinely ordained institution when Competition ruled supreme. We are not in heaven by a long shot, but anybody acquainted with past history knows we are a little farther away from hell than we were then.

Pipedream of a Golden Age.

Mr. Barnhill refers to the downfall of ancient nations—of Rome, Greece and Assyria—and charges the reign to "Monopoly." My God, does this gentleman wish to infer that at any time in the history of these nations the condition of the great masses—the workerswas anything but hell? Does he not know that these were slave epochs in which the master-class were but brutes, and the lives of the workers-the slaves-were one life-long horror? Does he not know that this was an age of hand production and that the only possible monopoly was the ownership of the "hands" that did the producing, which, with the ownership of the land by the patrician class, was the only social system that Rome or Greece ever knew? Did Barnhill ever read anything outside of Bryan's speeches? These ancient nations declined and fell from their own rotten decay-fell to make way for Feudalism, which in its turn has given way to Capitalist production, and which, unless the everlasting law of Evolution is to be supernaturally smashed by some jaw-bone of a democratic ass, will give way to Socialism, wherein will be no Roman master and his slaves, no Feudal baron and his serfs, and no Monopolized Machine and its exploited wageworkers.

What Socialism Is Not.

Mr. Barnhill talks about Socialism being a concentration of political power in the hands of a few men. As an authority on "What Socialism Is Not," Barnhill sure holds the belt. If he had any conception of what Socialism really is he doubtless would have shot his wad at some other point than the economic and political

If a capitalist government, in the interests of the Capitalist class, can build and operate a Panama canal, can successfully and economically run immense stores there for its employees and make the feverbreeding swamps of the Isthmus one of the healthiest places in the Western Hemisphere, I can see no earthly reason why a Socialist government cannot do things that require no more genius than this. Nobody but a dreamer would deny for a minute but that a Socialist government may make mistakes. Socialists do not claim to be able to immediately evolve a race of angels. There is too much republican and democratic ancestry in us to hope for this. But we Socialists do claim that a working class government can collectively own and operate the modern machines of production and distribution just as practically and efficiently as the Capitalist class government owns and operates the vast machinery of destruction—the armies navies. 



FLORIDA TO THE FORE

For every hundred persons who were even thinking of Florida ten years ago, a thousand persons are now studying the state with a view to making it their home.

In the past people thought of Florida mainly for its ideal climate, its outdoor life amid flowers and palms in the winter months when biting, blasting blizzards made life almost unendurable in other sections.



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The Socialist Party

BY F. P. O'HARE.

Editor's Note-Two years ago Comrade Frank P. O'Hare conducted a series of articles appearing monthly through twelve issues of the RIP-SAW explaining the Socialist Party organization. Each article was contributed by a different writer. The series accomplished much good in informing both the party membership and the non-Socialist of the great work of the Socialist party-its peerless form of organization, its remarkable devotion and its efficiency. I have asked Comrade O'Hare to prepare or have prepared another series of "Party Articles" to run through the year. He opens this series by an introduction to the National Socialist Party.-PHIL WAGNER.

Progressive political parties have some forms of national organization, and some forms of procedure, and some ways of raising campaign funds, and some ways of expending campaign funds. But so far as the general public is concerned, little is known of these political machines. "Membership" in one of the capitalist parties is rather an indefinite thing. The man at the bottom; the humble worker in the ranks, has no voice in the control of the old parties. He takes orders from above. Like the soldier, he does not think-he obeys. He is held to his organization, sometimes by conviction—usually by the hope of being appointed a dog-catcher or postmaster. The managers of the old parties are of two classes-politicians, with offices in sight, and plutocrats who want laws in their favor to protect their business interests. The plutocrat furnishes the finances; the politician, when elected to office, then delivers to him the laws, the courts and a bound and gagged public. The rank and file of capitalistic parties are not asked for advice or contributions by the party managers, only for their votes. They belong to the party but the party does not belong to them.

The Socialist Party is organized on exactly the opposite basis. No one joining the Socialist Party has any hope of a "job.". If he were regularly employed by the Socialist Party he would probably suffer financial loss. There are no perquisites, passes or pelf for him. He is held in the Socialist party by his convictions. He understands that if the working class is ever to be free, if it is ever to receive its full earnings, if the specter of unemployment and a pauperized old-age is ever to be banished it will be by political control of the country and its economic resources by the producers and for the producers.

The characteristic of the Socialist Party is democratic government in its highest sense. The two classes, plutocrats and politicians, are missing from its membership. The National Committee of the Socialist Party is composed of representatives elected by the direct vote of the rank and file, and is always subject to RECALL by the rank and file. Its collective acts, its commissions or omissions are modified to suit the will of the 125,000 members of the National Party through the INITIATIVE and the REFERENDUM.

The funds of the Socialist party are raised by a monthly dues system levied | sive? on all members. The National Office issues RED CARDS and DUES STAMPS. When a man or woman is admitted to a local of the Socialist party by vote of the local organization a RED CARD is issued. For each month in the year a DUES STAMP must be pasted on the RED CARD. It is an automatic receipt system. The stamp tells the member that out principles. of his local dues, the National Organization has received its five cents, the State Organization has received its share, the County Organization has re-

The Republican, Democratic and ceived its share and the Local has re-

ceived its share.

The National dues support the various departments of the permanent national office of the Socialist Party; they also pay the traveling expenses and hotel bills of the International Secretary, representing the American Socialist Party in the International Bureau, and the expenses of the delegates to the International Socialist They cover the ex-Conventions. penses of the delegates to the National Socialist Convention, the mileage, and hotel bill of the meetings of the Socialist National Committee, and the mileage and hotel bill of the meetings of the Socialist National Executive Committee. Thus the best talent can be selected for Socialist Party work, regardless of the individual's financial condition.

Every month the Executive Secretary of the Socialist Party publishes an itemized statement of the receipts and expenditures of the National Socialist Party, and at frequent intervals expert accountants audit the books of the National Office and make sworn statements of their audits. How different from the capitalistic parties, which close a campaign by BURNING THE BOOKS and which never yet have made a statement to the public of the sources of their funds, or of their disposal.







Kate Richards O'Hare's Story of Calumet in the December Rip-Saw Confirmed by U. S. Senator Ashurst of Arizona.

UNITED STATES SENATE, Washington, D. C., November 29, 1913.

Mr., Frank Brown,

Bisbee Miners' Union No. 106, W. F. of M., Bisbee, Arizona. My Dear Mr. Brown:

This will acknowledge the receipt of the resolutions signed by you on behalf of the Bisbee Miners' Union No. 106, W. F. of M., in which you direct attention to the injustices and outrages that have been perpetrated upon the miners in the copper districts of Northern Michigan, who are so heroically trying to maintain their rights against the organized mine owners. If I understand the situation correctly, the men are striking for the following demands:

First. A minimum wage of not less than three dollars per day for all un-

derground workers.

Second. An increase of thirty-five cents per day for all surface workers. Third. The eight-hour day for underground workers, which already obtains in every other copper producing section of North America.

Fourth. The employment of two men on all machines.

Fifth. The recognition of the union, giving the workers the same right to speak through their representatives, that the stockholders have.

In my judgment, these demands are just, reasonable, and should be recognized, and you may be sure that in every proper way I shall assist you in your efforts to aid your brother workers. I am especially glad that you gentlemen in Arizona are extending your sympathy and assistance to your oppressed brethren in Michigan, for until every workingman recognizes and realizes that an industrial wrong committed against another worker is, at least an indirect injury to him, the workers will never be able to accomplish much in the way of securing their demands and legitimate reforms. For example; when the workers in Pennsylvania realize that an injustice done to the workers in Arizona is an injustice to the Pennsylvania workers; and when the miners in Arizona realize that injustices and outrages done toward the miners in Michigan, are in reality outrages and injustices toward the miners in Arizona as well, then by reason of your combined influence, you will be able ultimately to demand and obtain a just share of the wealth of the country, which your brawn, muscle and brain produces.

The conduct of this copper company in Northern Michigan seems to me to be especially reprehensible and deserving of severe condemnation, for if I am correctly advised, this corporation not only protests against meeting the committees of the workingmen, but refuses to accept the good offices of the Department of Labor in its attempt to settle the difficulty. I wonder what the property of this vast corporation would be worth had it not been for the workingmen? This corporation forgets that when it was organized in 1870, only \$1,250,000 in cash was actually invested, and that, since that time the workers have taken out in profits nearly \$200,000,-000 for the benefit of this company,

\$121,000,000 of which has gone into the pockets of the stockholders as dividends, and \$75,000,000 out of the earnings have been reinvested, thus making nearly \$900,000,000 of actual net profits for the corporation in a period of 42 years, on an original investment of \$1,250,000, and then, this corporation after such munificent return on its investment, after having all the wealth created for it by and through the efforts of the miners, objects to these reasonable demands made by these workmen.

I have written the Hon. Secretary of Labor as follows: 'Hon. Wm. B. Wilson,

Secretary of Labor, Washington, D. C. "My Dear Mr. Secretary:

"I have read newspaper accounts of your address in Seattle, Washington on November 12th, 1913, in which you stated many plain truths with reference to the conditions in the Calumet, Hancock and South Range copper mining districts in Michigan; and I desire to express my approval of your speech. You are correct when you say that the Department of Labor, as it is now organized and di-

rected, will be utilized to co-operate with the trades union movement in its efforts to elevate the standards of

human society.

"I have observed from time to time reports in the newspapers, to the effect that in the minir; districts in upper Michigan, the mining corporations have been so powerful that they have, it is alleged, influenced the action of the Governor of the state and the sheriff of the county in trying to break up the strike which has been heroically conducted by the miners who are contending for just demands. I have also received letters and petitions from the Globe, Arizona Miners' Union No. 60, W. F. of M., as well as letters and petitions from the Bisbee, Arizona, Miners' Union No. 106, W. F. of M. These organizations have called my attention to the gross injustices and abuses which these mining companies have perpetrated upon these laboring men; and these petitions further allege that hired thugs and gunmen have beaten, clubbed, and in some instances murdered workmen in cold blood. The petitions also allege that nearly 1,200 thugs and gunmen have been secured through the Waddell-Mahon Detective Agency.

'I know that you may be depended upon to do everything within your power to bring about a settlement of this strike without any further effusion of blood, and, if possible, on a basis which will recognize the de-

mands of these miners.

"Request has been made of me to do what I can in the matter of aiding the workingmen, and I am anxious to comply with the request, hence I address this letter to you, in order that I may have the benefit of your information and suggestion as to how I should proceed in the premises.

"Congratulating you upon your success in the Cabinet, and upon your honest and faithful services in the cause of labor, I am, sir, with great

esteem,

"Respectfully yours. (Signed) "HENRY F. ASHHURST. "United States Senator."


