THE WAR DEVIL

It is not often that a minister has the courage to tell the truth about the church. The reason for this is too obvious to require the socialists with being godless and irreligious and with being bent elucidation.

The church of mammon will tolerate no priest or preacher who is not absolutely subservient to its ironclad rule. He may mouth as hypocrites and destructionists, of the real atheists and the real demany pointless platitudes and engage in as many meaningless ceremonies as he will, but he may never remove the cloak which hides the real nature of the institution and boldly point out its hypocrisy and false pretenses.

But now and then there is a recalcitrant who speaks out and cannot be silenced and such a one was Rabbi Stephen S. Wise when he arraigned the church in an address recently in Carnegie Hall, New York, in which he declared that "Failure of the churches and synagogues to maintain leadership over the people was the cause of the farmers found Person innocent of the charge made against him and present war."

Rabbi Wise charged that the church was "feeble, faltering,

halting and timid" and then he proceeded as follows:

"THE CHURCHES DO NOT TAKE THEMSELVES SERI-OUSLY * * * * THEY ARE MUZZLED AND THROTTLED INTO SUBMISSION. THEY ARE LIKE A DUMB DOG, OLD AND TOOTHLESS, THAT CAN NO LONGER BITE."

The utter moral impotency of the church to prevent the war it is now praying to God to end, is an object lesson of the gravest import to the working class. It is this church that is the bulwark of the class in power, the class that robs the workers and producers of all nations and incites nation to war upon nation for loot and pillage, for profit and plunder.

Discussing the destruction of the cathedrals at Rheims and elsewhere, Rabbi Wise very pertinently declared that "Our souls are wounded when we read of the destruction of these cathedrals, yet these cathedrals were destroyed long ago and it is only their outer walls that have now fallen. War gods, money gods and power gods have been destroying these edifices century after century."

In a word, the church of Christ, so-called, has been mammonized and it is not strange that Rabbi Wise concludes his arraignment by saying that "It would be better for missionaries to teach Christianity

at home first."

THE "BELGIAN RATTLESNAKE"

An American engineer named Lewis invented a machine gun that literally mows down human beings as grass falls before the scythe. CARL PERSON ACQUITTED

Every reader of the Rip-Saw will rejoice to learn of the acquittal

of Carl Person by a jury of farmers at Lincoln, Illinois.

The Illinois Central brought every particle of its influence to bear to secure his conviction, but failed. Despite this criminal corporation, the case was venued from Clinton to Lincoln and a jury of sent him back into the world a free man.

Carl Person was charged with murder for having slain a gunman of the Illinois Central in self-defense. The case was so clear that the verdict of the jury was unanimous and when it was announced the people who crowded the court room broke into cheers and for an hour Person was made the recipient of their most hearty congratulation.

Thus has the conspiracy of the Illinois Central to murder a labor leader who could not be bought or bullied, been defeated, and this mainly, if not entirely, because of the publicity given to the case by the socialist and labor press. Had Person been tried at Clinton, where the Illinois Central is in practically complete control, as originally intended, there is scarcely a doubt that he would have been convicted. But the wide publicity given the case by the labor press compelled a change of venue and a fair trial with the result that our comrade was found innocent and set free without a blemish

Upon his release Person issued a statement in which he said: "We have reached a crisis in our industrial struggle. The appeal of the hour is to the manhood and courage of the workers; my faith is reborn. We will win. We must win. Every drop of blood in my body is at the service of the movement."

This is the inspiring message of a man. Carl Person has grown in stature and in power behind prison bars and he will now return a thousandfold in service to the workers the service they rendered him

in saving his life.

Now that Comrade Person is free let us turn our attention to Rangel and Cline and their comrades in Texas; to Ford and Suhr in California; to the miners held in jail at Trinidad and to other comrades who are in custody for loyal service to the working class. Let us have the manhood to stand by them and to work for their release until they, like Comrade Person, breathe the free air again.

JAURES' LAST GREAT SPEECH

Jean Jaures' tragic and untimely death at the hands of a warcrazed wretch is an irreparable loss not only to the socialist movement but to the cause of humanity. He was in the very prime of his transcendant powers and his fame as an orator was wide as the world.

Jaures combined in an extraordinary degree all the elements of a great moral leader. He had character, personality and intellectuality in super-abundance. His naturally fine mind had the benefit of a thorough philosophical training. He knew history, economics, sociology and politics and was the master of them all. He had a massive head, keen and kindly eyes; the power of a giant, yet, gentle as a child.

It is ten thousand pities that this great soul could not remain to pressed, the staunch champion of the poor, and the inspired evangel of brotherhood and peace. But, since even the greatest have their day and Jaures has had his, it is fortunate that he was struck down in the very hour that he had expanded to his grandest proportions and had delivered the master oration of his life in protest against the cruel war now raging in Europe and in pleading for the brotherhood and

Friend and foe alike were swept off their feet, and burst into hurricanes of applause."

Marvelous man and marvelous orator! It is only the universal appeal that could have so inspired its most eloquent and gifted apostle and the burning speech that was to be his last will echo and reecho throughout the world until at last war is no more and peace

prevails among all the children of men.

A NATION OF HYPOCRITES

A little while ago President Wilson issued a proclamation calling upon the American people to unite in prayer for the cessation of the war that is desolating Europe.

A nation that supports capitalism and is therefore in favor of war, is guilty of the most arrant hypocrisy in praying for peace.

That prayer did not rise higher than the market price

of musket balls and bayonets.

God was not at home when that prayer was delivered. On the Saturday before the pious American people assembled in their churches and synagogues to pray to God for peace, a ship left the New York harbor with sixteen million rifle cartridges in her hold for the wholesale killing of the soldiers engaged in the war they had the audacity to ask God to end.

Prayers are cheap, but there is profit in rifle cartridges. To pray to God to send peace while furnishing the armies with shot and shell for their mutual destruction, is not only the rankest of hypocrisy but the vilest of blasphemy.

Capitalism, based upon profit, extortion, robbery, is essentially a system of war and pillage, of murder and devastation, and they who support this system and are responsible for war could with far more consistency appoint a day for thanksgiving to the devil than to set apart a day of prayer to the God of peace and love.

INTERNATIONAL PATRIOTISM

We socialists hold in scorn and contempt the narrow, mean and contemptible "patriotism" surreptitously inculcated in the minds of unsophisticated workers by their crafty and unscrupulous masters.

But for this false and vicious "patriotism" which has poisoned the minds and hearts of its millions of victims the war now deluging the nations of Europe with blood would have been impossible.

It is "patriotism" for the workers of one nation to fall upon and foully murder the workers of another nation to enlarge the possessions of their masters and increase the piles of their blood-stained power on earth can save them from their sodden fate.

We socialists are not wanting in genuine patriotism but we are deadly hostile to the fraudulent species which is "the last refuge of the scoundrel" and which prompts every crook and grafter and every blood-sucking vampire to wrap his reeking carcass in the folds of the national flag that he may carry on his piracy and plunder in the

name of "patriotism."

Ours is a wider patriotism—as wide as humanity. We abhor murder in uniform even more than we do midnight assassination.

"It is from the woman of the new age and, above all, from the culprit hidden up somewhere above the corner of the platform, thrashing young mothers, that we may hope for a spiritual transformation. Many men and women now regard it as their highest contribution to culture to be the parents of the new generation. They feel it to be blasphemy against life that the beings their love has called into if he were hauling his argument or his audience up with a cable. Most heartily do we agree with the Swedish writer when she says: "Ought not all the limbs and brains shattered on the battlefield, all the power and resources sucked up by armaments, to have been utilized in making our race better fitted to hold its place in nature, in the face of whose terrestrial and extra-terrestrial revolutions it is still powerless?"

Yes, it is a thousand pities that all these limbs and brains that are so essential to the progress and development of the race should be ruthlessly sacrificed in international slaughter to gratify the greed and vanity of titled parasites who profit by the slaughter of which

themselves should be the victims.

Be it said to the lasting credit of woman that she had no voice in declaring this or any other war. The mother and wife and sister of the soldier is never consulted. Her loved ones are torn from her and dragged forth to be slain or mangled beyond recognition with no more consideration for her than if she were a mummy. Her heart is broken, she sobs in silence in her crushing bereavement, but the war lords heed her no more than if she were not on earth.

A Protestant Church Paper's Opinion of Socialism—And the Deadly **Parallel**

The New York "Independent," one of the oldest and most influential Protestant church publications in the United States, in its issue of October 12 last, loudly exploits as its leading article, "Socialism's Moral Collapse." This article is blazingly advertised on the front cover page, and is impudently reputed to be "by an American Socialist."

For vituperation, billingsgate and bald lies it would put to shame a ward-heeler. In the face of all the public demonstrations and heroic efforts made by the Socialists of Europe, who, as everybody knows. are still in a hopeless minority, to prevent the war, this loudly advertised article in the Independent unblushingly charges the Socialists as being morally and actually responsible for the human slaughterhouse that Capitalism has brought about!

Under the compulsory military laws of the European countries, after the war was started, it was simply a question with thousands of Socialists, whether to obey the law or be shot for treason. When Austria heard of the impending war of independence under the auspices of Prussia, it smelled a rat. The Hapsburgs had not lived for nothing next door to the Hohenzollerns for eight centuries. If there was any independent state laying around, Austria wanted to be near enough to shout. "I saw it first" and thereupon rushed to the support of Prussia with the fervor of one dog helping to bury the other dog's bone.

The combined armies of Prussia and Austria had little trouble in loosening the strangle hold of the Danish tyrant. Independence being happily consummated the two powers promptly forgot what the war was started for. Each held on to what he had and dared the other fellow to come and take it. In the excitement they even lost sight rightful ford and master of Schleswig-Holstein. The two houses finally struck up a compromise by which Prussia was to hold Schleswig and Austria, Holstein. Had the people known then, what we know now, that this was not a war for German independence, but for conquest and the aggrandizement of Prussia they would, docile as they are, have rebelled against it.

The one man against whom the war

was directed, Napoleon, surrendered at Sedan. There are strong reasons to assume that he had manoeuvered his army in the blind ally of Sedan to save his hide from the French people. In the meantime, his right hand bower, Bazaine had been bottled up in the fortress of Metz where he later surrendered with 150,000 men.

The grand army which was to march to Berlin in less than a month to repeat the stunts of Napoleon the First was not even fit to put up a decent defence of the fortified frontier. The utterly corrupt regime of Napoleon the Third resting, as it did on the support of adventurers and get-rich-quick swindlers had resulted in a paper army marching on paper-soled shoes. From the mil-lions the people had paid to the support of the army only a small-portion found its way to military equipment. The greater bulk was put aside for a rainy day by the generals and war ministers of Napoleon. 

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The Bankers' Pool

As a general thing, the cotton farmer is poor. He runs a store bill during the spring, summer and fall while making his crop, and settles up once a year when the cotton crop is sold. Usually his crop is mortgaged far in advance of its harvest. The merchant carries his account and in turn the merchant operates on credit importers feel that they can expect or on capital borrowed from the to squeeze the very last cent out of bank.

The cotton crop totals about fifteen million bales, of which ten million are manufactured in this country, and five million bales exported.

When the European War broke out, the cotton exchanges closed. Cotton had absolutely no price. There were no buyers. A terrible condition ensued, terrible for the farmers and for the merchants, staggering under their loads of debt. Here was a bumper crop, enough to clothe the entire white race, and in other parts of America was plenty of food for all, plenty of lumber to build shelters for all, plenty of labor to do all the nec-

was as helpless as an automobile in a sand pit with the engine dead.

At this writing the situation is made clear by the following press dispatch:

"Sir George Paish takes the position that English cotton manufacturers do not wish to go into the market now and buy cotton unless they are satisfied that it has reached the bottom

price. The American manufacturers, according to information available at the Treasury Department, apparently feel about the same way and in con-sequence but little cotton is being sold."

In other words, the spinners and the cotton farmers, and will wait a while longer before buying.


With the market for cotton closed, the wholesalers in the cities immediately felt the pressure. The "Buy-a-baleof-cotton" movement was started for their relief. But the city people who could each put up fifty dollars for a bale of cotton were few. The results were puny and pitiful.

Direct Federal Aid

Then a few Southern congressmen thought of a way to solve the problem. If Europe would not buy the surplus cotton, Uncle Sam could, and a bill was introduced in congress for the government to buy five million bales cessary work, no need for anyone at \$50.00 per bale, issuing therefor to worry, but everything came to a standstill. Cotton could not move. Capitalism had broken down. It ners eventually to buy the cotton back from the government, and the bonds to be cancelled.

This was in line with the act of the English government in buying a year's supply of sugar for the nation, in order to prevent speculators robbing the English people. The Bankers' Pool.

About this same time the great financial interests got busy and another plan was proposed. Capitalists





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were to chip in \$150,000,000, to be loaned on cotton at the rate of \$30.00 per bale, the capitalists to be guaranteed SEVEN PER CENT interest on their loans.


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

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
