

CHURCHMEN AND THE WAR

The question as to why the church was so utterly impotent to prevent the war now raging in Europe, if indeed it had any real inclination to do so, is at least partially answered in the revelation recently made in England, showing that the most prominent churchmen there are stockholders in the gun works and in the concerns which manufacture armament and munitions of war.

Here we have a truly edifying state of affairs, and one well calculated to make innocent Christians sit up and take notice.

In the disclosure just made it is shown that "Canon Inge, Dean of St. Paul's Cathedral, is a heavy stockholder in Armstrong, Whitworth and Company and the Vickers-Maxim Armament Company, as are also the Bishops of Adelaide, Hexham, Kensington and Newport, and the Arch-Deacons Campbell, Clarke, Watkins, Richardson and Seagrave, the president of the Y. M. C. A.", and others too numerous to mention.

These are the pious gentry who are looked up to as godly and who pray for peace while they draw the dividends of war and thrive

in the profits of murder.

Is there greater hypocrisy than this conceivable?

THE INTERNATIONAL

That the international socialist movement is being tested as never before by the European war is undoubtedly true, but that it is or can be permanently disrupted, or even retarded, is simply out of the question.

That the war will have its lessons for the socialist movement goes without saying and that there will be a realignment of forces along more thoroughly revolutionary lines is equally certain, but whatever the outcome of the war may finally be, or its immediate effect upon the movement, there can be no doubt that when the smoke of war has cleared away the international will stand forth more powerful than it ever was before.

An accounting of responsibility there will certainly be when all the facts are known and when sober judgment may be pronounced upon those who have failed in their loyalty to the international

movement.

But however long the war may last or however shocking and disastrous its results may be, the one thing certain is that the international movement, tried by fire, will remain unscathed and with power increased and enthusiasm renewed, will march on to glorious victory.

Returns are still far from complete as the RIP-SAW goes to press, but enough is known to cause general rejoicing in revolutionary circles. The campaign was distinguished chiefly, so far as the socialists were a factor in it, for its revolutionary spirit and for the intense

ardor and enthusiasm with which it was waged.

In this as in every other campaign it is not the mere votes that socialists are seeking, but the unity and solidarity of the workers, and this was expressed in the socialist vote this year as never before.

But the socialist vote does not begin to express the strength of the socialist movement in the United States. At a conservative estimate a million of socialist voters at least who are out of jobs and are disfranchised from one cause or another, had no chance to register their vote for socialism at the recent election. It is probable that two million would not be too great an estimate for the number of disfranchised socialist voters in the United States.

But whatever the number of disfranchised revolutionists may be it is quite certain that the complete returns will show a largely

increased socialist vote throughout the country.

And now that the voting is over we are to enter upon the new campaign without loss of time and with greater energy and activity than ever before.

THE CRISIS IN COLORADO

The situation in Colorado is more critical than at any time since the strike of the miners began over a year ago. It is now quite clear that President Wilson and the national administration have sided with the mine owners and that the federal troops have been sent into Colorado for no other purpose than to protect the property of the mine owners and to stock the mines with scabs.

Incidentally, the union miners are to be driven out of the state been saved.

or starved into submission.

When President Wilson submitted his peace plan to the operators and miners, the latter promptly accepted it. The operators on the contrary rejected it and there the matter stands.

Since the operators turned down his peace plan President Wil-

son has had nothing to say.

It thus appears that the mine owners are at the head of this administration and that President Wilson dare not refuse their bidding.

President Wilson has the power to bring the Colorado mine

owners to terms in five minutes, if he will but exercise it.

But he will not because he dare not, as the president of a capitalist administration, turn against the class that financed his cam-

paign and placed him in power.

We have heard much about the great advantages of having a union man in the office of President Wilson's cabinet, but just what good Secretary Wilson of the department of labor has been to the Colorado strikers, members of his own union, is not apparent. He has parleyed gently with the operators, pleaded with and coaxed them to please make some little concession to the miners, but this is practically all. If he has any power to bring the operators to time he has not exercised it, any more than has his superior, the President of the United States.

The Colorado miners are having to fight it out for themselves and if ever a body of men have been brave and have stood staunch and true, they certainly have, and in this crisis they well deserve and should freely have all the support, moral, financial and physi-

cal, of every unionist and every socialist in America.

MODERN INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

The transformation of Japan into a modern industrial nation in the short space of a single generation is one of the marvels of our age. Eugene Brieux, the French writer, has paid a recent visit to Japan and in writing of what he saw there he says: "Industrial development here, as elsewhere, has created socialism, and misery has given birth to revolt."

In this terse utterance the famous Frenchman has described the process of the social revolution. Capitalism, being based upon exploitation and the use of modern machinery, necessarily creates the conditions which make socialism inevitable, and as a logical sequence socialism follows in the wake of capitalism all around the upon the face of it, and this is the great measure of relief and jus-

Where capitalism penetrates, socialism is bound to follow. The exploited and displaced workers are forced into misery and finally driven to revolt.

One after another the nations of the far East are succumbing to the conquest of modern industrial development and one after another they are recruiting the international socialist movement.

Modern industrial development is rapidly paving the way and preparing the peoples of all nations for the International Socialist Republic.

THE WAR IS SPREADING

The outlook in Europe is anything but assuring to those who look for peace. On the contrary the area of the conflict is widening and all indications point to a grim and relentless war to the bitter end. Eleven nations are now involved and more are expected to follow soon. At this writing it seems highly probable that Italy and the Balkan states will soon be drawn into the vortex. Neutrality in the present situation is becoming more and more difficult and all Europe threatens to be embroiled before the conflict that effect was issued by the corporation.

FORWARD IS THE CRY ALL ALONG THE BATTLE so important, but this much is certain, that if the four million socialists and union men in Germany had absolutely refused to go to war and in the last extremity had ordered a general strike and their representatives had voted solidly against the war credits, the war craze could have been throttled in its inception and humanity spared the slaughter that is now disgracing civilization.

> Undoubtedly the leaders would have been shot and perhaps a good many others, but the moral influence of their loyalty to the cause of peace and of civilization would have been incalculable, and for every one of the lives thus sacrificed, ten thousand of their comrades who are now perishing upon the field of war would have

Had the 110 members of the German Reichstag stood immovable against war and been shot by the Kaiser for treason, the tragedy of their taking off would have aroused the moral sense of the whole world and they would have passed into history as humanity's greatest heroes.

THE CLAYTON BILL

Very much has been said and written about the Clayton bill, the administration measure recently enacted to amend the antitrust law and incidentally to exempt labor unions from prosecution under that law and to curb the power of courts in dealing with labor unions engaged in strikes.

The much heralded principle of the Clayton bill is to be found in section six and reads as follows: "The labor of a human being

is not a commodity or article of commerce."

Much ado has been made about this statement and some prominent union leaders have gone so far as to pronounce it a new de-

claration of independence.

But as a matter of fact there is nothing in the Clayton bill to give the least comfort to any intelligent union man. The bill was so amended before its final passage that it was practically emasculated and there is nothing in it as it now stands that is in the least objectionable to the corporations or that will be of any real advantage to union members when their rights are contested in capitalist courts.

Congressman Martin B. Madden of Illinois, himself a union man, delivered a speech in the house denouncing the bill as amended

as a fraud upon the working class.

Under the Clayton bill union labor stands precisely where it stood before. It has no rights previously denied it and no power or standing it has not hitherto possessed. A labor union is lawful under the Clayton measure just as long as it confines itself to activities that are unobjectionable to the ruling class, and no longer.

As for the declaration that labor is now no longer a commod-One after another the nations of the far East, so long dormant ity, or an article of commerce, that is the sheerest buncombe. Labor is bought and sold in the labor market today just as it was before the passage of the Clayton act and just as it always will be while capitalism lasts.

> The mere declaration that labor is not a commodity does not change the commodity nature of labor in capitalist production.

Quite as consistently and as truthfully could the same measure have declared that labor is now no longer exploited and that poverty no longer exists. As long as the working class has no tools of its own and is compelled to sell its labor power to capitalist exploiters labor will be a commodity and a thousand Clayton bills will not make it otherwise.

The Clayton bill is simply a sop to the discontent of the worktice the Democratic party hands to the working class for having

LABOR WAR IN ARKANSAS

President Wilson has ordered the federal troops into the coal fields of Arkansas to aid the mining corporations in that State to crush the striking miners. This is the sole object of the government in dispatching the regulars to the scene of the strike.

The trouble in Arkansas began in March last when the Bache-Denman corporation, which had a time contract with its employes. deliberately annulled and repudiated its contract and served notice

on them to "clear out."

There was no charge brought against the miners and they did. not know that their contract was to be made void and that they were to be ordered out of the mines until the day the command to

The next move of the corporation was to swear in a lot of thugs The longer the war lasts and the more its horrors increase the and murderers as "mine guards" and then of course trouble began, more profoundly it is to be regretted that the socialist movement as the mine owners intended. Their object was to kill the union and to this end they did not scruple an instant about repudiating notice and in direct violation of its provisions.

In all the preliminary skirmishes that followed, the corporation and its thugs were worsted, and then a strategic move was made by the mine owners to secure the federal government, its courts and its armed man-killers, as allies, in the fight precipitated by themselves to defeat the miners and wipe out their union.

As to the issue involved in this conflict there is no need of any bill of particulars. The issue is the same as it is in Colorado and was in Michigan and West Virginia, namely, the right to organize

and to living conditions.

The miners in Arkansas, like those in Colorado, are making a heroic struggle with all the powers at the command of the millionaire mine owners solidly arrayed against them.

Needless to say that the federal soldiers here, as in Colorado, will not only protect the property of the mine owners, but they will also stand guard while the mines are being scabbed.

President Wilson might as well have manned every mine on strike with scabs directly, under protection of the federal troops,

so far as the effect upon the striking miners is concerned. Attorney General McReynolds who as early as May last took a hand in the strike in behalf of the mine owners and authorized the United States marshal to swear in deputies to guard the scabs, has since been appointed by President Wilson a member of the United States supreme court, where he rightly belongs, having qualified by servile obedience to the ruling class his fitness for a supreme judicial lackevship.

The workingmen who recently voted the Democratic ticket, thereby approving the democratic administration, are with the mine owners and the federal soldiers in Arkansas in breaking the strike of the miners, destroying their union, and starving their families, and if in some day to come they find themselves out on strike against inhuman conditions and their jobs are taken by scabs backed by soldiers, they will be reaping what they have sown.

But federal administration or no federal administration, soldiers or no soldiers, we are with the striking miners in Arkansas and we shall tack them up in their fight in every way in our power. They are not the kind who can be cowed by uniformed scab-herders, but the kind who will fight with all the greater determination in the face of increasing odds and keep it up until the day is won.

Cotton, the best and biggest crop the country has ever known, re-California mains unsold. citrus fruits must find a market in America or rot. The bottom has literally fallen out of the price of the apple barrel, because England and Germany were the great buyers of American apples. Apple dealers, in fact, will hardly quote foreign prices.

"In New York eight thousand stenographers are out of work. Round Wall Street and the exporting houses it is estimated seventy thousand man clerks have been laid off; and on the shipping front one hundred thousand

men are idle."

Multiply the conditions of New York by every other city in the United States and you can realize to some slight extent the condition of the American working class.

Cotton unpicked in the fields. potatoes rotting in the ground, apples decaying under the trees, oranges, prunes and grapes wasting in orchard and vineyard, cotton mills idle, woolen looms stilled, shoe factories rusting, empty houses, freight cars shoved on the sidings and engines going to scrap in the roundhouse, millions of idle men, millions of naked and starving women and children, crime on the increase, everywhere.

"Back to Grandmother's Cook-

Listen you poor silly Ribs, while this divinely appointed male oracle tells you how to run your household.

"We are going back to the simple economical cooking of

our grandmothers.

"Let me show you exactly how cheaply a family can live nutritiously on homemade food. For a family of five you buy a quart of milk a day for eight cents; the cereal will cost ten cents a box and last a week—that is, the daily cost of cereal will be one and three-sevenths cents for the whole family. Divide the milk into three portions for the three meals, and it costs two and twothird cents a meal. Potatoes can be bought just now at twelve and a half cents a peck. Potatoes for one breakfast will cost half a cent. Bought bread will cost five cents for a small loaf; ten cents for a large one-big enough for a family of five. If a woman bakes her own bread that bread will cost three cents. Let me show you how this works out: Three pounds of flour make five pounds of bread. Now, a barrel of one hundred and ninety-six pounds, even at war prices, will not cost more than seven dollars and a half, or about four cents a pound —that is, twelve cents' worth of flour will make five loaves of bread-or cost, including yeast and fuel, three cents instead of ten paid at the

store. Put down five cents for butter, coffee and sugar. Your breakfast of cereal, coffee, toast and fried potatoes totals, for five people, only a little over twelve cents. This is not a matter of theory. I have provided such meals hundreds of times.

"Handle a midday dinner in the same way. You have the same cost, plus soup and meat. If you buy a porterhouse steak, or a sirloin, or mock duck, that meat cost will send the price of a dinner up to a dollar; but do not buy expensive cuts. the housewife go to market and do her own marketing, and pick out a neck bone for soup, or a joint, or a boiling piece. A boiling piece costing forty cents will supply soup and meat for three dinners-or make the dinner cost only thirteen cents higher than that of the breakfast.

"Supper can be supplied at the same cost as breakfast; so your family of five can keep their living down to forty-eight cents for food a day-or less than fifteen

dollars a month.

"When times are so hard there are multitudes of boys and girls out of a home who would gladly pay twenty dollars a month to board in the home of such a family. That would in many cases pay both rent and fuel.

"Let us put our foolish pride in our pockets, resole our shoes and turn our dresses. When women like the Duchess of Sutherland roll up their sleeves and swash round in boiling soapsuds, helping in European hospitals, why should not our women-on another kind of firing linebe bucking right up to the necessities of this winter?"

There you are, you extravagant women, it takes the Saturday Evening Post to show you how to feed your family on forty-eight cents per day, but I wonder why Mr. Laut did not tell us where to get the forty-eight cents when daddy is out of a job!

Mr. Laut not only shows us how to feed our family cheaply but also proves that we have been eating far too much in the past. A quart of milk divided into three parts is five and onefifth ounces for each meal, divide that by five and each one of a family of five would have one

I had just concluded a lecture in Grand Junction, Colo., when a burly railroad man stepped forward and introduced himself. I forgot his name, but remember well what he said. Here it is, about word for word:

"I was an engineer years ago, as I am today, but in those days Debs was my fireman. Having a little better job than he, I naturally thought I was the smarter man. We used to sleep in the same room. We would both turn in all tired out from the long trip and I count ten. After I had slept three or four hours, I would wake up about 2 in the morning and there would be Debs with a candle shaded so as not to disturb me, reading away at a book as if everything depended on his understanding all there was in it. Many a time he got only one or two hours' rest before going to work again.

"I told him he was a d-d fool, and

III. The Position of the International

War the International Workingmen's Association, the parent of the Socialist Party, had established branches in every modern country, America included. The General Executive Committee resided in London and was directed by the master mind of Karl Marx. Nearly all of the manifestos and proclamations which follow here were written or inspired by the founder of scientific socialism.

At the third congress of the International held in Brussels in 1868 the clear-headed Internationalist already perceived that the policy of Bismarck and Napoleon must inevitably lead to a war between Germany and France. The German delegates introduced a resolution which said: "We must regard a war between German toilers. Germany and France as a civil war for the BENEFIT OF RUSSIA. The International demands of all workers to raise their voices against every war and to oppose with all means their participation in the systematic murder and to carry on a propaganda for the enlightenment of the unhappy people who are forced to wage war.' In the end the Congress recommends the general strike as means of preventing war.

At the same congress delegate Tolain of France urged the adoption of the

following resolution:

"In consideration, that the relation between natural groups, races and nations, as well as between the individual citizens must be regulated by justice; that war only brings forth the right of might and not the consecration of justice; that it is but a means to bring the nations under the subjection of rulers and privileged classes; that it strengthens despotism and smothers freedom; that it brings sorrow and ruin to families; spreads demoralization, immorality, ignorance and misery; that the money and blood of the nations only serves to perpetuate the brutish instincts of primeval men; that under the present conditions all countries our enemies. in Europe the governments do not workers; the congress declares that it protests with the greatest energy against war."

The International remained true

to these principles.

On July 9, 1870, the government of Napoleon convicted twenty-seven members of the Paris section of the International for high treason. The prison sentences ranged from two months to one year. But before the sentences of the last of the twenty-seven peacemakers had expired the throne of Napoleon had fallen. *

Three days after the arrest of their leaders the Paris section issued another

proclamation against war.

"War, as a question of racial preponderance as for dynastic interests is in the eyes of the workers criminal absurdity. We protest against the systematic destruction of the human race, against the pillaging of the national wealth which should serve to fructify the soil and industry; the spilling of blood for the satisfaction of the vanity and the conceit of egoistic monarchs. We raise our protest with all energy against war, as human beings, as workingmen, as citizens. and national hatred. It is a disguised iod. means of the governing classes for the suppression of popular freedom. War is the destruction of wealth, the result is the destruction of wealth, the result of our daily labor. German brothers! In the name of peace do not hearken to the voices of the subsidized and servile scribes who desire to deceive you in regard to the true spirit prevailing in France. Remain deaf to the insane provocations. The war between us would be a brother war."
The General Executive Committee

At the time of the Franco-Prussian issued a manifesto on July 23d containing the following expressions of highminded statesmanship:

"We define the foreign policy of the International Workingmen's Association in these words: 'MAKE THE SIMPLE LAWS OF MORALITY AND JUSTICE WHICH SHOULD REGULATE THE RELATION BE-TWEEN PRIVATE PERSONS THE HIGHEST LAW FOR THE INTER-COURSE BETWEEN NATIONS. * * "When the German workers

permit that the present war loses its strict defensive character and degenerates into a war against the French nation then victory or defeat will be alike fatal."

The splendid spirit of the French workers found a counterpart in the

At a mass meeting held in the city of Braunschweig on July 16th the workers disavowed the idea of national antagonism and adopted a resolution which said among other things:

"We are against all wars, and especially against dynastic wars.-With sincerest regret do we accept the unavoidable evil of a defensive war, and we demand that the recurrence of such a social calamity be made impossible for all times to come by vesting in the people themselves the power to decide

over war and peace."

At a delegate meeting in Chemnitz representing about 50,000 members of labor organizations, a resolution was accepted containing the following:

"In the name of the German Democracy, and especially in the name of the members of the Social-democratic Labor Party we denounce the present war as purely dynastic.—Cheerfully grasp we the hand offered by the French workingmen. Remembering the slogan of the International Workingmen's Association: 'Workingmen of all countries unite,' we shall never forget that the workers of all countries are our friends and the despots of

"With heart and hand we join in your protest. We promise solemnly that neither the blare of trumpets nor the roar of cannons, neither victory nor defeat shall swerve us from the common goal, the union of the workers of all nations."






