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

A RIGHT HAPPY NEW YEAR is the greeting the RIP-SAW sends to its army of readers spread over the American continent. It may be a trite way of phrasing our New Year's message but there is nevertheless heart in it and we earnestly wish that the year upon which we have just entered may bring peace to the race, light where there is now darkness, and blessings manifold to the children of men.

The RIP-SAW has a peculiar attachment for its readers which only they can understand and appreciate who know with what fidelity and devotion these readers have stood by it in all its trials and supported it in all its struggles.

Three hundred workingmen at Seattle and Everett were arrested, thrown into jail, and charged with murder. The whole affair is monstrous enough to stagger the imagination, but the latter part of it is simply unbelievable. And yet it is absolutely true. The fellow-workers of the murdered victims are in jail charged with the murder by the murderers themselves. Could anything possibly be more astounding and infamous?

There is not space here for detail. Our readers are more or less familiar with this latest crime of monopolized wealth against the working class and it should arouse their most intense indignation. The dead may not be brought to life again, but the wounded must be cared for and the imprisoned must be defended. For this purneeded.

THE SHAME OF EVERETT

Everett, Washington, stands disgraced before the United States and the world. On November 5th, the ruling authorities of that corporation-ridden community, led by its sheriff and backed by its "best citizens" perpetrated a massacre upon unoffending persons that will cover their names with infamy forever.

It was on that day that a party of I. W. W. members and their sympathizers started by boat from Seattle to join others at Everett who had arranged a meeting there to protest against the suppression of free speech by the lumber trust. When the boat attempted to land the sheriff and his gang of assassins opened fire. Five workingmen fell dead in their tracks. THE CRIME OF LYNCHING AND "WHITE SUPREMACY"

It is the boast of American people that they believe in law and order, that they are opposed to violence, and they are swift to condemn as anarchists and criminals all who fall under their displeasure for the real or fancied violation of their law and order code.

And yet, strange as it may appear, these same people are not greatly disturbed when innocent negroes are lynched by blood thirsty white mobs. Their serenity in such cases is no doubt due to the moral influence of "white supremacy."

The fact is that lynching under any circumstances is shocking and disgraceful, an impeachment of civilized government, and the utter repudiation of law and order, and when the victims are innocent, lynching becomes an atrocious and revolting crime, and as long as the American people suffer this crime to be perpetrated they have no moral right to raise their voice in protest against crimes committed against Belgians, Armenians and other victims by other nations.

A record has been kept of the crimes perpetrated in recent

In commenting on the lynching outrages in the South the Terre Haute Star, referring to specific instances, has this to say:

"There was, for example, the lynching of the Lake family in Lee County, Ga., a few months ago. A negro farmer, named McQuinn, shot at by a mob, ran for his life and took refuge in the Lake home. When the sheriff came for him the Lakes being out of the house, he was shot by McQuinn. The latter was then taken out and hanged. THE NEXT NIGHT A MOB CAME AND TOOK THE LAKES, FATHER, THREE SONS AND A NEPHEW AND HANGED THEM TO ONE TREE, THOUGH KNOWING THAT THEY HAD NO CON-NECTION WITH THE SHOOTING."

This was simply cold-blooded murder of innocent people in its most abhorrent form and upon this basis the mob established its claim to "white supremacy."

The Star also cites the following instance of brutal murder of innocent colored people by a mob of white brutes:

"In Florida a negro, charged with hog stealing, shot the sheriff and escaped. In retribution the mob hanged the man's wife, James Dennis and his wife and son, neighbors, and one Baskin, a colored preacher, also to teach white supremacy."

Suppose a negro mob should be guilty of perpetrating such an infamous outrage upon innocent white people, what would be the effect upon the "white supremacy" of the South? The whole country would see the with the mob spirit and there would be a frantic uprising and insistent demand for the summary extermination of the whole colored population.

The Star in further comment on these unspeakable atrocities against innocent persons for no other reason than that their creator gave them black skins, black as the hearts of their cold-blooded assassins, says:

"The negro association mentioned, has a photograph of the five Georgia victims as they hung from the tree and are putting it in circulation as an illustration of white man's civilization. It is a ghastly picture which should cause every decent American to hang his head in shame. When you read the further record and note that five men in one year, 1915, were burned at the stake and that out of the eighty in that year who were lynched in one way or another only nine victims were charged with the crime against women commonly made the excuse for mob violence, he may well ask himself by what right we assume to criticise the acts even of the Mexican bandits while our own record is so evil."

If, as scripture teaches, they who take up the sword should perish by the sword, then they who stain their hands with innocent blood by committing the cowardly crime of lynching should themselves fall victims to the same ignominious fate.

The community that tolerates lynching, especially of an innocent victim, is still in the brute stage of its development. It is even lower than that for there are no brutes in the animal kingdom that wantonly kill their own kind for the mere sake of gratifying the brute lust of killing.

Oh, yes, we are a Christian nation and we are highly civilized; we have our pieus faces set like flint against violence and anarchy, for we believe, we who have established "white supremacy," we believe in LAW AND ORDER !

FALSE LEADERS OF THE WORKERS

The labor movement has suffered more from false leadership than from any other one cause. Leaders, so-called, have from its inception been a curse to organized labor. This does not mean that all leaders are ignorant or dishonest, nor does it mean that leadership can be entirely dispensed with, but it does mean that until the rank and file understand the true function of leadership and vest such leadership in those only who are fit and worthy of it, they will continue to be betrayed and see their best efforts as organized workers come to naught.

Some of the men who have in the past led (?) and are now leading (?) organized labor are utterly ignorant of the labor movement and its mission, others are reactionary without themselves knowing it, others are ward politicians and utterly corrupt, while still others there are who have the intelligence and ability to serve but who are lacking in moral stamina and use their influence as leaders to further their own selfish and sordid ends. These latter ones are the most plausible and the most dangerous of all. They are radical to the radicals, conservative to the conservatives, and they know exactly how to keep themselves on good terms with the bosses without arousing the suspicion of their dupes. When the real test of their leadership comes it is always found that their influence is on the side that furthers their own individual ends without reference to the welfare of their followers. Such men are utterly lacking in conscience, for of all base-born time-servers there are none more contemptible than those who pose as leaders of labor and traffic in the confidence of the rank and file who place them in office and pay them liberal salaries to safeguard their interests.

We are led to these reflections by some specific instances of false leadership which came to our attention during the recent national campaign. There was one Stewart, president of the United Mine Workers of Indiana, who just prior to the election issued an appeal to the workers in general, his dupes in particular, to vote the republican ticket whose candidate for congress was the attorney of the traction company which had forbidden its employes to organize, and who are still unorganized, and when they went out on strike had its cars equipped with electric man-killers to shock them to death if they attempted to board the cars they had been running. This so-called leader betrayed and outraged, if he did not actually sell out, the members of his union, but through the friendly support of the coal operators he so well served he has been re-elected to office.

The republican traction attorney, the deadly enemy of organized labor, was elected to congress by Stewart and his ilk and dupes, backed by the operators and other exploiters of the working class.

Another instance of false leadership is that of John H. Walker of Illinois, all the more reprehensible because he is lacking in neither intelligence nor capacity to lead the workers in their struggle against their oppressors. Walker who is now the president of the Illinois Federation of Labor has in the past been signally honored by the Socialist party. He was once its candidate for congress of Illinois. In the recent campaign Walker went over to the democratic party and appealed to the workers of the country to turn apostates to themselves and their class by giving their political support to the party of their bosses and exploiters. This act of treachery on the part of Walker, and it is not his first one, should fix his status as a When one reads of these unspeakable crimes in the high noon false leader and make it impossible for him ever to betray the workers again. It was Walker who tried to save Mitchell when the miners got tion and who stuck to this reactionary leader to the last on the ground that he "used to play marbles with him." And it was Walker who went to the rescue of Farrington, another false leader, now president of the United Mine Workers of Illinois, when he was charged with corruption and about to be exposed by the honest men who were seeking to purge the organization of such vicious leadership. Walker and Farrington! There is no differeence between them. Both are of the brand of leaders that organized labor must get rid of if it ever expects to develop actual power and make real progress toward emancipation. Walker was the competitor of John White in the recent election for the national presidency of the United Mine Workers. At this writing the returns are not yet complete but the indications are that Walker is defeated. We hope so. The election of White is bad enough. That of Walker would have been worse. White at least never posed as a socialist. He is quite consistently a union reactionary and a political supporter of the capitalistic democratic party. As between White and Walker, the one thoroughly reactionary and the other hypocritically revolutionary, White is the fitter if such a word is applicable to such alleged leadership.

Do you sometimes feel discouraged? That is the very time for you to brace up and speak a word of cheer to your discouraged fellow-man.

TICHENOR'S "CREED OF CONSTANTINE"

The complete title of this latest book of Harry Tichenor, the best contribution from his virile and versatile pen to current radical literature, is "The Creed of Constantine; Or the World Needs a New Religion." In its opening chapters it is a companion volume to "The Life and Exploits of Jehovah" and every one of the many thousands of readers of the latter work will be interested in the "Creed of Constantine."

The style of the author lends itself readily to the popular treatment of almost any subject, however dry it might appear to other writers, and in this latest work he has invested the early history of the Christian church with the liveliest interest and with all the glamor of romantic literature. He opens his narrative with the following novel statement which he proceeds to prove by quotations and facts from contemporary history and from the writings of commentators down to the present day:

"The prophet of Christendom is not the gentle Jesus; neither is the gospel of brotherhood and peace the Christian creed. The prophet of Christendom is the Emperor Constantine, and the Christian creed is the decision of the First Council of Nice."

The Council of Nice was held in the year 325. This was a few years after Constantine's "conversion" to Christianity, or, more properly speaking, Christianity's conversion to Roman paganism. The manner in which the early Christian movement founded by Jesus was captured by the wily Constantine and converted to a ruling class "religion" is narrated in detail and supported by copious extracts from many of the ablest writers and commentators of ancient and modern history. It is a thrilling story, also a tragic and revolting one, and the author of the "Creed of Constantine," in his own graphic style and with irrefutable logic, scathing satire, withering sarcasm, relieved by flashes of wit and ridicule, does it entire justice.

The story, in the telling of which Gibbon, Froude, Comte, Darwin, Haeckel and other historians and scientists are freely quoted, must be read to be understood and appreciated. Scarcely more than a hint of its interest and value can be given in the space of an ordinary review.

But it is in the closing chapters in which the author presents his "New Religion," that the solid worth of his work appears. In these pages he reveals himself as a prophetic soul with a social vision and he writes as one inspired. Listen to him:

"Once, long ago, came one who voiced the hope and longing of the race with infinite love and passion. He told of a Source of Life and Love that the world had never known, of a common Father of a common humanity. He dreamed of a society strange and beautiful-the Brotherhood of Man. His teachings were garbled and doctored by the priests that wrote of him years after his tragic death, yet will we but search the sweet message that he taught, the burden of his soul can be found. He was not the tortured god of the dogmatic his soul can be found. He was not the tortured god of the dogination creeds—he was the lowly carpenter, the brother of the workers, the friend of man and the lover of woman. 'Call no man master,' said this sweet-souled carpenter, 'for ye are all brethren' * * * He wrote no book, he formed no creed. He simply trusted that the words he spoke and the dream he dreamed would some day find correspondent of his class, the working class. * * * expression and life in the soul of his class, the working class. He had come to set the captive free. Again and again his tender heart bled for all who bore the heavy burden, but with more anguish than all for woman, the doubly-chained captive. * * * The few preserved sentences that fell from his passionate lips—the scathing denunciation of the master class and the infinite love of the out-cast—these are all I want. I turn from the dogmatic epistles, half ancient Judaism and half Greek mythology, and I go again with the Peasant of Palestine down the beaten path to Bethany, where in an humble beaten lived Martha. in an humble home lived Mary and Martha. There I can still hear the music of his voice, the simple story of love and brotherhood, as on the vine-clad porch he told it time and again. And the little children, how they swarmed to meet him! He was their comrade, their lover and the companion of their childhood. And now another voice, perhaps more stern than his, cries glad tidings to the woman and her child. It is the world-wide call of Socialism. Women, children, when every chain is broken yours shall be the greater freedom, for yours has been the greater slavery!"

When Jesus entered the little home he included Mary in the conversation and treated her just as if she were a man. Martha had no doubt trotted out before the last Amen and hurried home to get the dinner cooking. She could not understand why Mary should be so forward as to tarry with the men on the front gallery and so néglectful as to forget that there were more than a dozen hungry male animals to be fed. Quite naturally Mary asked Jesus to send Martha about her business, for it would have been most impolite for her to have left without permission. Then Jesus no doubt told Martha to never mind about the food, just give us a cold hand-out and sit down and discuss the real things of life: "Mary hath chosen that good part which shall not be taken away from her."


In no other way did Jesus show the tender, loving soul and the great, women taken in adultery should be stoned to death. And all the respectable members of society, the scribes and priests and Pharisees and money changers knew it also. These respectable gentlemen also knew just how much contempt Jesus had for "law" and they thought they might trap him into making a statement that might be used against him. (St. John, 8: 3-11.) These smug, self righteous churchmen brought to Jesus a woman taken in adultery, and with pious mien and godly bearing said: "Master this woman was taken in adultery, in the very act. Now Moses and the law commanded us that such should be stoned; but what sayest thou?" It is entirely in line with masculine logic and justice that the godly churchmen did not mention the man in the case, though how a woman could be "taken in the very act" without a man being present is beyond me. Then the story runs that Jesus made an appeal to their sense of justice. He said:

Then Jesus knew that an appeal for justice was without avail for pious men rarely know justice and he took another method of reaching, not their hearts but their respectability. He stopped and wrote something in the dust at his feet, and as he wrote every pious and godly churchman sneaked off down the alley like the curs they were. And Jesus said unto her, neither do I condemn thee: Go thy way and sin no more." In my Sunday school days I was much perplexed over this story. I always wanted to know what it was

that Jesus wrote in the dust that had such marked effect on the smug saints. I remember that I made a nuisance of myself asking my Sunday school teacher and my pastor to ex-plain what the magic words were, and they rebuked me for my curiousity and told me it was woman's besetting sin. I am older now and know more of smug saints and "fallen women" and I understand. My pastor used to tell me that if it were best for us to know what Jesus wrote, St. John would have told us. This might be true, but there is a more reasonable and logical explanation and that is that St. John and all the men who translated and edited the Bible were men, and men never tell on themselves or each other. It seems very possible to me that the smug saints disappeared so quickly and did not stop to argue the matter because Jesus wrote in the dust at his feet the name of the bawdy house the smug saints had crept out of about two o'clock that morning.

In the seventh chapter of St. Luke we read more of this woman who was called Mary of Magdelene. A pious old Pharisee invited Jesus home to dinner, but knowing He belonged to the working class, none of the courtesies with which the Pharisee would have welcomed one of his own class was offered Jesus. He gave Jesus no water to wash his feet, nor oil to annoint his head and neither did he give a kiss of welcome. Then Mary came with a box of ointment and she washed the feet of Jesus with her tears, wiped them on her hair and kissed the bruises that the stones of the road had made. She expressed in the only way she knew such love and gratitude as only a harlot can know for the man who gives her justice.

Then the Pharisee sneered at Jesus because he had not recognized Mary understanding heart so vividly as in his attitude towards the "fallen her with the vindictive hatred that women" of his day. That Jesus had contempt for the social conventions of his day is shown by the fact that he esteemed his women friends just as highly as his men, and associated with them on terms of perfect equality. This was a frightful breech of etiquette, for in the days of Jesus as in my own childhood, it was the portion of the "mothers of Israel" to stay in the kitchen and wield the pots and pans and provide the "comforts of the inner man" when the preacher came home for Sunday dinner. It was Mary the mother and Mary the Magdalene that filled the last lucid moments as the tortured life passed out of the pain racked body.

The beautiful, tender, sweet mes-sage and spirit of Jesus was far beyond the comprehension of the men who lived nearest him and those who have followed after. There is nothing to show that the disciples and apostles ever comprehended it, nor has Christian civilization ever recognized the economic teaching of Jesus, nor his attitude towards women.

Paul was a lawyer and an old bachelor and that tells the whole story of his attitude towards the working class and women. He always exhorted the workers to be obedient to their masters, and the masters to be merciful to their slaves and was the sum total of his conception of human justice. He had so little respect for women that he insisted that the best and most pious thing for a man to do was not to marry at all. But if they found the unmarried state too uncomfortable, then as a lesser evil they might get married. In the eleventh chapter of Corinthians Paul says: "Forasmuch as he (man) is the image and glory of God; but the woman is the glory of the man. Neither was the man created for the women; but the woman for the man." In the fifth chapter of Ephesians Paul says: "Wives submit yourselves to your husbands, as unto the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church, and he is the saviour of the body." In the fourteenth chapter of Corinthians Paul says: "Let you women keep silent in the churches; for it is not permitted unto them to speak, but they are commanded to be under obedience, as the church, but that's "agin" nature. also saith the law. And if they will learn anything, let them ask their husbands at home; for it is a shame new commandment unto thee, but for a woman to speak in church."

"Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this; to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction and keep himself unspotted from the world." Peter was a pacifist also exhorted his brethern in this manner: "But the wisdom that is from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle and easy to be entreated, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality, and without hypocricy. And the fruits of righteousness is sown in peace of them that make peace.

James was more vitriolic in his condemnation of the rich than the most rampant I. W. W. agitator that ever graced a soapbox. In bitter wrath he cried out against the injustice of the rich. (James: 5: 1-6) "Go now ye rich men and weep and howl for your miseries that shall come upon you. Your riches are corrupted, and your garments are moth eaten. Your gold and silver is cankered; and the rust of them shall be witness against you, and shall eat your flesh as it were fire. Ye have heaped treasures together for the last days. 



For many years this was a much mooted question, which was finally settled by the union adopting a 'dead-line'a degree of competency-and workers my heart.' must make good, or, if discharged, the

most competent reached the dead-lines but never over it, unless extra compensation was forthcoming.

"The union's strength depended upon the solidarity of the drafts membership, and it would have been suicidal to have placed the dead-line at too high a standard, else the incompetents should be mustered and used to^{*} dissolve the union in case of a strike.

"I will admit that the average degree of competency is not high among American mechanics, but that is accounted for from the fact that the average boy is forced into a trade for which he has no particular fitness simply because an opportunity or opening in that trade happens and he sees a chance to make a living. Decline of the Socialist Vote

the complete returns from the methods of capitalist parties. several states are not yet in at this writing we are unable to state the exact extent of this decline but it appears to be not less than twenty-five percent from the vote cast four years ago, and this notwithstanding the woman's vote in the several states which granted the franchise to women since the last election, and which increase amounted to perhaps a couple of million votes.

It was freely predicted by prominent party leaders and by the party press that the vote of the Socialist party would reach the two million mark and few there were so pessimistic as to predict an actual decline instead of an increase in the vote.


