## COMPULSORY ARBITRATION

## AS SEEN BY SAMUEL GOMPERS, ET AL

A recent press dispatch from Washington, D. C., says:
The President's message has brought quick answer from the American labor movement, voiced by Samuel Gompers, President of the American Federation of Labor, who, on reading Woodrow Wilson's address to congress, which contained what is practically a dictum in favor of compulsory arbitration, had this to say, when asked to express his views:
"Yes, I have read it, and I can only repeat to you what I said to Professor John R. Commons, when we met at the call of the National Civic Federation to discuss this very questioncompulsory arbitration.
"Professor Commons maderthis statement to the representatives of the railroad brotherhoods, the representatives of the employers and myself. Said Commons: 'There is nothing in the constitution of the United States prohibiting the passing of a law making strikes illegal.
"I took instant issue with him, holding that there is a constitutional provision prohibiting involuntary servitude, compulsory service, except as a punishment for crime after trial and conviction, and, therefore, this provision was a prohibition against any attempt on the part of congress to enforce onmpulsory labor, no matter for how brief a time.
"I questioned him first as to whether I understood him correctly. He said I did. -
"To tell the truth, I was surprised, for, if I mistake not, this has not always been the viewpoint of John R. Commons.
"Finally, he expressed the opinion that the supreme court would,
without doubt, regard such a without doubt, regard such a "Then I called his attention to the fact that the supreme court of the United States held slavery to be constitutional in the Dred Scott case, and that it took four years of sanguinary war, costing

this decision of the supreme court.
"And now I repeat what I. said to Commons-this: 'It is my purpose to prevent such another revolution. It is my purpose to prevent any such legislation and possible decision of the court'". Sitting in his office, on the seventh floor of the new American Federation of Labor building, the elected spokesman of nearly 3,000 ,-
spoke quietly, but with an em-
phasis that left no doubt of the determination in his mind, a determination which voiced itself at the recent Baltimore convention, when he said:
"It is not we who make the attack. We are going to act on the defensive where we can, whenever it may be politic on the defense; but, if the fight is to be made to take from the men, women and children of our time the advantages which we have secured, then these employers and corporations had better look out. We are not going to be forced back. The men and women of labor are not going to be forced back. We will resist and resist to the utmost."

All of which proves the logic of Marx and Engels, who clearly foresaw and foretold that capitalism would be forced to dig its own grave, and that the workers would be at last driven to Socialism, no matter how many blunders they might make.

It also proves that every vote that the "near-Socialists" cast for the Democratic ticket, was recklessly thrown away. It was even worse than that. With the prospect of compulsory arbitration coming fast on the heels of the last election, the workers that voted the Democratic or Republican ticket simply voted another link in their chains. This may be hard medicine to take, but necessary for the cure. Maybe the chains must be made to gall them to the limit of endurance, before the workers can be induced to arise in their strength and burst them to fragments.

## THE NEW YEAR AND THE RIP-SAW

A RIGHT HAPPY NEW YEAR is the greeting the RIP-SAW sends to its army of readers spread over the American continent. It may be a trite way of phrasing our New Year's message but there is nevertheless heart in it and we earnestly wish that the year upon which we have just entered may bring peace to the race, light where there is now darkness, and blessings manifold to the children of men.

The RIP-SAW has a peculiar attachment for its readers which only they can understand and appreciate who know with what fidelity and devotion these readers have stood by it in all its trials and supported it in all its struggles.

The year just closed has to the RIP-SAW been a rather eventful one and it has taxed the resources of this paper to the limit to maintain its position in the working-class struggle under the multiplying difficulties that surrounded it. First of all the war in Europe and its temporary effect upon the Socialist movement has been of a demoralizing nature and all Socialist papers have suffered accordingly. As a result of the war the recent capitalist national campaign absorbed to a considerable extent the radical and progressive sentiment which had been created by Socialist agitation and education, and the Democratic party, the chief beneficiary of such absorption for the alleged reason that its candidate for president had kept the nation out of war, received the votes of many thousands of misguided persons who would otherwise have given their support to the Socialist party. For this and other reasons the Socialist campaign lacked enthusiasm and it was not surprising when the returns came in to find that the vote of the party had fallen several hundred thousand short of expectations.

In addition to this the unprecedented cost of paper and the difficulty of obtaining it even at the highest price added to the RIP-SAW'S troubles and served to make 1916 a trying year, and yet we have not the slightest discouragement about the present nor the least misgiving as to the future. These trials and reverses are but temporary. The RIP-SAW, with the backing of its army of loyal supporters, is equal to them all? When things go wrong it is just then that the RIP-SAW feels it must be strongest and most steadfast.

And so, bidding farewell to the old year and giving our hearty hail to 1917, we are serene and content, filled with the spirit of the revolution, and determined to fight during the coming year as we have never fought before for SOCIALISM AND EMANCIPATION.

## THE SHAME OF EVERETT

Everett, Washington, stands disgraced before the United States and the world. On November 5th, the ruling authorities of that corporation-ridden community, led by its sheriff and backed by its "best citizens" perpetrated a massacre upon unoffending persons that will cover their names with infamy forever.

It was on that day that a party of I. W. W. members and their sympathizers started by boat from Seattle to join others at Everett who had arranged a meeting there to protest against the suppression of free speech by the lumber trust. When the boat attempted to land the sheriff and his gang of assassins opened fire. Five workingmen fell dead in their tracks. Thirty others were more or less seriously wounded. Some of these were simply passengers. The attack was entirely unexpected and unprovoked. But few of the
strikers were armed and these only for•self-defense as it had been rumored that they would not be allowed to land. Not for a moment did they dream that they would be met by an army of man-killers under command of the sheriff and armed with Winchester rifles, and not for a moment did they believe it possible that they could by armed force be prevented from going to Everett as they would go to any other community, in a peaceable and law-abiding manner.

But after the infamous attack was made upon them and a number of them lay weltering in their blood, there followed the greatest outrage of all. Three hundred workingmen at Seattle and Everett were arrested, thrown into jail, and charged with murder. The whole affair is monstrous enough to stagger the imagination, but the latter part of it is simply unbelievable. And yet it is absolutely true. The fellow-workers of the murdered victims are in jail charged with the murder by the murderers themselves. Could anything possibly be more astounding and infamous?

There is not space here for detail. Our readers are more or less familiar with this latest crime of monopolized wealth against the working class and it should arouse their most intense indignation. The dead may not be brought to life again, but the wounded must be cared for and the imprisoned must be defended. For this purpose a defense committee has been chosen and funds are urgently needed.

This case cries aloud to the working class. What one of us can turn a deaf ear to this appeal? Let us all do our share to save the living from even a more cruel fate than that of the dead. Let us at least see to it that their lives and their liberty are not forfeited for the want of proper legal defense. All contributions should be promptly forwarded to Everett Defense Committee. There is nothing grander on earth than the man or woman who holds principle and conviction dear enough to stand up and fight for them at whatever cost and to whatever end.

## THE CRIME OF LYNCHING AND "WHITE SUPREMACY"

It is the boast of American people that they believe in law and order, that they are opposed to violence, and they are swift to condemn as anarchists and criminals all who fall under their displeasure for the real or fancied violation of their law and order code.

And yet, strange as it may appear, these same people are not greatly disturbed when innocent negroes are lynched by blood thirsty white mobs. Their serenity in such cases is no doubt due to the moral influence of "white supremacy."

The fact is that lynching under any circumstances is shocking and disgraceful, an impeachment of civilized government, and the utter repudiation of law and order, and when the victims are innocent, lynching becomes an atrocious and revolting crime, and as long as the American people suffer this crime to be perpetrated they have no moral right to raise their voice in protest against crimes committed against Belgians, Armenians and other victims by other nations.

A record has been kept of the crimes perpetrated in recent years against the colored race by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and this record is sufficient to bring the blush of shame to the cheek of every American citizen.

In commenting on the lynching outrages in the South the Terre Haute Star, referring to specific instances, has this to say:
'There was, for example, the lynching of the Lake family in Lee County, Ga., a few months ago. A negro farmer, named McQuinn, shot at by a mob, ran for his life and took refuge in the Lake home. When the sheriff came for him the Lakes being out of the house, he was shot by McQuinn. The latter was then taken out and hanged. THE NEXT NIGHT A MOB CAME AND TOOK THE LAKES, FATHER, THREE SONS AND A NEPHEW AND HANGED THEM TO ONE TREE, THOUGH KNOWING THAT THEY HAD NO CONNECTION WITH THE SHOOTING.'
This was simply cold-blooded murder of innocent people in its most abhorrent form and upon this basis the mob established its claim to "white supremacy."

The Star also cites the following instance of brutal murder of innocent colored people by a mob of white brutes:
"In Florida a negro, charged with hog stealing, shot the sheriff and escaped. In retribution the mob hanged the man's wife, James Dennis and his wife and son, neighbors, and one Baskin, a colored preacher, also to teach white supremacy."
Suppose a negro mob should be guilty of perpetrating such an infamous outrage upon innocent white people, what would be the effect upon the "white supremacy" of the South? The whole country would seethe with the mob spirit and there would be a frantic uprising and insistent demand for the summary extermination of the whole colored population.

The Star in further comment on these unspeakable atrocities against innocent persons for no other reason than that their creator gave them black skins, black as the hearts of their cold-blooded assassins, says:
"The negro association mentioned, has a photograph of the five Georgia victims as they hung from the tree and are putting it in circulation as an illustration of white man's civilization. It is a ghastly picture which should cause every decent American to hang his. head in shame. When you read the further record and note that five men in one year, 1915, were burned at the stake and that out of the eighty in that year who were lynched in one way or another only nine victims were charged with the crime against women commonly made the excuse for mob violence, he may well ask himself by what right we assume to criticise the acts even of the Mexican bandits while our own record is so evil."
If, as scripture teaches, they who take up the sword should perish by the sword, then they who stain their hands with innocent blood by committing the cowardly crime of lynching should themselves fall victims to the same ignominious fate.

The community that tolerates lynching, especially of an innocent victim, is still in the brute stage of its development. It is even lower than that for there are no brutes in the animal kingdom that wantonly kill their own kind for the mere sake of gratifying the brute lust of killing.

When one reads of these unspeakable crimes in the high noon of what is called Christian civilization in the supposedly most advanced nation on earth, one is painfully impressed with our white degeneracy instead of our vaunted white supremacy and a man who is really white almost feels as if he should take off his hat when he meets a colored man and apologize to him for the crimes of his race.

From the time the first negroes were stolen from their native land by heartless white pirates and traders in human flesh until now, the colored people have been the victims of infinite cruelties and erimes at the hands of their white superiors, (!) and now that they are no longer in chains, no longer owned as chattels, the only way to impress them with the "supremacy" of white civilization is to turn blood-thirsty mobs loose upon them, innocent though they be, and hang them and even their wives and children to trees and let them dangle there for the glory of their cold-blooded murderers.

Oh, yes, we are a Christian nation and we are highly civilized; we have our pious faces set like flint against violence and anarchy, for we believe, we who have established "white supremacy," we
believe in LAW AND ORDER!

Do you sometimes feel discouraged? That is the very time for you to brace up and speak a word of cheer to your discouraged fellow-man.

## FALSE LEADERS OF THE WORKERS

The labor movement has suffered more from false leadership than from any other one cause. Leaders, so-called, have from its inception been a curse to organized labor. This does not mean that all leaders are ignorant or dishonest, nor does it mean that leadership can be entirely dispensed with, but it does mean that until the rank and file understand the true function of leadership and vest such leadership in those only who are fit and worthy of it, they will continue to be betrayed and see their best efforts as organized workers come to naught.

Some of the men who have in the past led (?) and are now leading (?) organized labor are utterly ignorant of the labor movement and its mission, others are reactionary without themselves knowing it, others are ward politicians and utterly corrupt, while still others there are who have the intelligence and ability to serve but who are lacking in moral stamina and use their influence as leaders to further their own selfish and sordid ends. These latter ones are the most plausible and the most dangerous of all. They are radical to the radicals, conservative to the conservatives, and they know exactly how to keep themselves on good terms with the bosses without arousing the suspicion of their dupes. When the real test of their leadership comes it is always found that their influence is on the side that furthers their own individual ends without reference to the welfare of their followers. Such men are utterly lacking in conscience, for of all base born time-servers there are none more contemptible than those who pose as leaders of labor and traffic in the confidence of the rank and file who place them in office and pay them liberal salaries to safeguard their interests.

We are led to these reflections by some specific instances of false leadership which came to our attention during the recent national campaign. There was one Stewart, president of the United Mine Workers of Indiana, who just prior to the election issued an appeal to the workers in general, his dupes in particular, to vote the republican ticket whose candidate for congress was the attorney of the traction company which had forbidden its employes to organize, and who are still unorganized, and when they went out on strike had its cars equipped with electric man-kilters to shock them to death if they attempted to board the cars they had been running. This so-called leader betrayed and outraged, if he did not actually sell out, the members of his union, but through the friendly support of the coal operators he so well served he has been re-elected to office.

The republican traction attorney, the deadly enemy of organized labor, was elected to congress by Stewart and his ilk and dupes, backed by the operators and other exploiters of the working class.

Another instance of false leadership is that of John H. Walker of Illinois, all the more reprehensible because he is lacking in neither intelligence nor capacity to lead the workers in their struggle against their oppressors. Walker who is now the president of the Illinois Federation of Labor has in the past been signally honored by the Socialist party. He was once its candidate for congress of Illinois. In the recent campaign Walker went over to the democratic party and appealed to the workers of the country to turn apostates to themselves and their class by giving their political support to the party of their bosses and exploiters. This act of treachery on the part of Walker, and it is not his first one, should fix his status as a false leader and make it impossible for him ever to betray the workers again.

It was Walker who tried to save Mitchell when the miners got their eyes open to the significance of his Civic Federation connection and who stuck to this reactionary leader to the last on the ground that he "used to play marbles with him." And it was Walker who went to the rescue of Farrington, another false leader, now president of the United Mine Workers of Illinois, when he was charged with corruption and about to be exposed by the honest men who were seeking to purge the organization of such vicious leadership.

Walker and Farrington! There is no differeence between them. Both are of the brand of leaders that organized labor must get rid of if it ever expects to develop actual power and make real progress toward emancipation.

Walker was the competitor of John White in the recent election for the national presidency of the United Mine Workers. At this writing the returns are not yet complete but the indications are that Walker is defeated. We hope so. The election of White is bad enough. That of Walker would have been worse. White at least never posed as a socialist. He is quite consistently a union reactionary and a political supporter of the capitalistic democratic party. As between White and Walker, the one thoroughly reactionary and the other hypocritically revolutionary, White is the fitter if such a word is applicable to such alleged leadership.

Spot your crooked leaders, you organized workers, sear them with the branding iron of treason, and throw them bodily out of
your ranks if you would have power, command respect, and free your ranks if you would have power, command respect, and free yourselyes from slavery!

## TICHENOR'S "CREED OF CONSTANTINE'

The complete title of this latest book of Harry Tichenor, the best contribution from his virile and versatile pen to current radical New Religion." The Creed of Constantine; Or the World Needs a New Religion." In its opening chapters it is a companion volume thousands of readers of the latter work will be interested in the "Creed of Constantine."

The style of the author lends itself readily to the popular treatment of almost any subject, however dry it might appear to other writers, and in this latest work he has invested the early history of the Christian church with the liveliest interest and with all the glamor of romantic literature. He opens his narrative with the following novel statement which he proceeds to prove by quotations and facts from contemporary history and from the writings of commentators down to the present day:
"The prophet of Christendom is not the gentle Jesus; neither is the gospel of brotherhood and peace the Christian creed. The prophet of Christendom is the Emperor Constantine, and the Christian creed is the decision of the First Council of Nice.,"
The Council of Nice was held in the year 325 . This was a few years after Constantine's "conversion" to Christianity, or, more properly speaking, Christianity's conversion to Roman paganism. The manner in which the early Christian movement founded by Jesus was captured by the wily Constantine and converted to a ruling class "religion" is narrated in detail and supported by copious extracts from many of the ablest writers and commentators of ancient and modern history. It is a thrilling story, also a tragic and revolting one, and the author of the "Creed of Constantine," in his own graphic style and with irrefutable logic, scathing satire, withering sarcasm, relieved by flashes of wit and ridicule, does it entire justice.

The story, in the telling of which Gibbon, Froude, Comte, Darwin, Haeckel and other historians and scientists are freely quoted, must be read to be understood and appreciated. Scarcely more than a hint of its interest and value can be given in the space of an ordinary review.

But it is in the closing chapters in which the author presents his "New Religion," that the solid worth of his work appears. In these pages he reveals himself as a prophetic so
and he writes as one inspired. Listen to him:
"Once, long ago, came one who voiced the hope and longing of
the race with infinite love and passion. He told of a Source of Life
and Love that the world had never known, of a common Father of
a common humanity. He dreamed of a society strange and beau-
tiful-the Brotherhood of Man. His teachings were garbled and
doctored by the priests that wrote of him years after his tragic death,
yet will we but search the sweet message that he taught, the burden of
his soul can be found. He was not the tortured god of the dogmatic

in an humble home lived Mary and Martha. There I can still hear
the music of his voice, the simple story of love and brotherhood,
as on the vine-clad porch he told it time and again. And the little
children, how they swarmed to meet him! He was their comrade,
their lover and the companion of their childhood. And now another
voice, perhaps more stern than his, cries glad tidings to the woman
and her child. It is the world-wide call of Socialism. Women,
children, when every chain is broken yours shall be the greater
freedom, for yours has been the greater slavery!"

## CHAPTER THREE

The toad under the harrow knows just where the sharp pointed teeth are and the slave knows where the shackles gall, and perhaps that is the reason why the first defender of womankind who placed us higher than the cattle, should have been one of the most despised members of a downtrodden, slave race. Possibly it was because Jesus KNEW what it was to be despised and enslaved that he found courage to face the whole world of his day and let one ray of hope and love gleam into the darkened lives of woman.

I often wonder if Jesus might not have been like Jimmie Masters, a schoolmate of my girlhood days. Jimmie was the illegitimate child of old Jüdge Halliday's son Hugh, and Sallie Masters who was Lawyer Cook's hired girl. I don't remember Jimmie's advent into this vale of tears, but I do remember that my grandmother told me when I was old enough to understand that Sallie was a light minded chit and Hugh a gay young blade who flattered her vanity. One day the Judge hurried Hugh off to college and old man Masters bundled Sallie out of the home bag and baggage, then Jimmie was born at the county poor farm. When the scandal had blown over Hugh came back home, Lawyer Cook who was the Judge's bitter rival and a shocking agnostic took Sallie into his home as a maid of all work and Jimmie grew up with the lawyer's colts and puppies.

Jimmie was a queer looking boy with spindly shanks, head much too large for his skinney neck and goggling eyes as brown as those of the collie puppies with whom he played. His spindle shanks swaggered but his collie eyes were always hungry looking as if he were beseeching love and he was so uncannily bright and shrewd beyond his years that we children were afraid of him. Of course the good, christian mothers of our town made it quite clear to us that we could not play with Jimmie and we let him severely alone, except when we needed some help with our lessons, then we coaxed him in at the back gate and shooed him out again as soon as the work was done. Most of the time he wandered about the village like a goggle-eyed ghost and always seemed to be asking your pardon for being alive. I never remember of seeing him fight but once and then he was a veritable little wildcat. Tommie Wright who was two years older than Jimmie and four years larger, saw Sallie Masters passing the schoolhouse and called to Jimmie: "Hi, you bastard there goes your strumpet mammy." Then the wisps of hair flew and
the gore ran and Tommie's howls of anguish brought all the teachers out to quell the riot. I remember that I espoused Jimmie's cause and forever wrecked my senses of proper modesty by telling the Principal exactly what Tommie had said, and from that day on Jimmie was my adorer and no knight ever served his lady more whole heartedly.
The many changes of swift passing years swept us apart and I lost all trace of Jimmie. A few years ago I lectured in a Pacific Coast city and at the close of the lecture a man asked permission to take up a collection for the laundry girls who were out on a strike. Permission was given and the man launched into such a burning, passionate, heart wrenching discussion of the wrongs of women that I, like all the audience sat spellbound by its force and logic and moving power. Gradually it dawned on me that there was something familiar about the speaker. He was spindle shanked and skinney necked and goggle eyed, but he was the spirit of revolt incarnate and suddenly I knew it was Jimmie. Men will tell you in that Western city that James Masters is the ablest laywer in the state and if he wasn't cracked on the women question and always wasting his time fighting the battles of the working girls he would be in Congress now. But Jimmie KNOWS you see and that is why he fights for women.

And Jesus, the carpenter of Nazareth KNEW. He knew the pinch of poverty, the weight of oppression, the bitterness of unrighted wrongs, the heavy sorrows of a slave working class, but best of all he knew the double distilled wrongs and bitterness of his mother's position. Perhaps it was this knowledge that kept him from being safe and sane and conservative and lashed brain and soul until he became a fanatic and attacked the "established order" with the burning sword of his scathing tongue until the pious and respectable members of society, squelched him on the hill of Golgatha.

Fragmentary as the records are, distorted and emasculated by translator and priesthood, the spirit of that early labor agitator and original equal suffragist still shines forth like a ruby of love and justice in a gutter of licentiousness and oppression, for he always fought the battles of the working class and the women.
In the twenty-third chapter of St. Matthew, Jesus pays his respects to the captains of industry and their servants the clergy, of his day in no uncertain manner, and for clarity and force and ginger it has never

been improved upon by any moders labor agitator. He chose his disciples from the fishermen and common laborers, His associates were camel drivers and tentmakers. He ate with saloonkeepers and bartenders and the courtesans found in Him a firm and faithful friend. Jesus knew what it was to be hungry, so when the disciples plucked the ears of corn from some lord's field and ate them on the Sabbath day, He said; all right boys, eat your fill. And when some smug, well fed Pharisee objected, Jesus answered: "Have ye not read what David did, when he was hungered, and they that were with him; How he entered the house of God, and did eat the
shewbread which was not lawful shewbread which was not lawful
for him to eat, neither for them that were with him, but only for the priests." This is a shocking example of contempt for "law and order (administered by the master class) and one that is conveniently forgotten by most clergymen.

In his attitude towards divorce Jesus was most revolutionary and showed the greatest tenderness and sympathy for women and the most scathing contempt for "law" and "creed." He knew that caused men to divorce their helpless wives but downright brutality urged on by lust. . He knew that women were econom-
ically slaves and that if a husband divorced his wife in order to get a younger and handsomer one, she would be thrown out to die like a cur of hunger and want if she were old, and if she were young enough for other men
to lust for, she must become a harlot and sell her womanhood for a scrap of bread and a few
rags to cover her nakedness He knew "that the hypocrites of his day like the hypocrites of ours, were zealous for the letter of the law, but weak in the chapter and twenty-eighth verse, he said: "But I say unto you, that whosoever looketh on a woman to lust after her hath committed adultery with her already in his heart."
That Jesus had contempt for the social conventions of his day is shown by the fact that he as highly as his men, and associated with them on terms of perfect equality. This was a a
frightful breech of etiquette, for in the days of Jesus as in my own childhood,
of the "mothers of Israel" to stay in the kitchen and wield the pots and pans and provide the "comforts of the inner man" when the preacher came home for Sunday dinner. How well I remember those Sunday dinners of my childhood. Mother squirmed through the sermon, knelt with her eyes peeking at the clock through the prayer and had one foot in the aisle ready to
flee the moment the benediction
was pronounced. With hasty greetings to other mothers who scuttled bome like frightened hens, she tratted down the alley, dashed in at the back gate, hung her Sunday bonnet over the almanac, snatched an apron from behind the kitchen door and hastily marshailed the piles of food that should "comfort and refresh", the preacher after the "labors" of the day. And while mother fried the chicken and dripped the coffee and sliced the cake and cut the pie, father and the brethren sojourned in the parlor. Then when the piles of food had been reduced to seattered fragments, the men sat on the front gallery and smoked and rested while mother cleared away the wreckage. Sometimes after all the pots and pans and dishes had been washed, mother would creep out and listen to the ponderous wisdom exhaled by the "servant of the Nazarene," but usually she was so tired she dozed
off to sleep and thereby allowed the great chunks of golden wisdom slip off her weary nodding head like water off a duck's back.
I understand now just how Martha
Lazarus invited Jesus and all felt. Lazarus invited Jesus and all
the disciples home for Sunday dinner with that sublime faith that all men have "that the women will manage somehow to feed them all." When
Jesus entered the little home he included Mary in the conversation and treated her just as if she were a man.
Martha had no doubt trotted out Martha had no doubt trotted out
before the last Amen and hurried home to get the dinner cooking. She could not understand why Mary should be so iorward as to tarry with the men
on the front gallery and so néglectful as to forget that there were more than a dozen hungry male animals to be fed. Quite naturally Mary asked ness, for it would have been most impolite for her to have left without permission. Then esus no doubt
told Martha to never mind about the food, just give us a cold hand-out and sit down and discuss the real things of life: "Mary hath chosen that good
part which shall not be taken away from her.'
In no other way did Jesus show the tender, loving soul and the great, understanding heart so vividly as in
his attitude towards the "fallen his attitude towards the "fallen
women" of his day. He knew that the man made law declared that the women taken in adultery should be stoned to death. And all the respectable members of society, the scribes and priests and Pharisees and money chang-
ers knew it also. These respectable gentlemen also knew just how much contempt Jesus had for "law" and
they thought they might trap him into making a statement that might be used against him. (St. John, 8:3-11.) These smug, self righteous church-
men brought to Jesus a woman taken in adultery, and with pious mien and
godly bearing said: "Master this godly bearing said: "Master this
woman was taken in adultery, in the very act. Now Moses and the law commanded us that such should be stoned; but what sayest thou?" It is
entirely in line with masculine logic and justice that the godly churchmen did not mention the man in the case,
though how a woman could be "taken in the very act" without a man being present is beyond me. Then the story runs that Jesus made an appea "He that is without sin among you let him first cast a stone at her,' But the appeal of Jesus to the sense of justice of the self righteous old
saints, had just as much effect as saints, had just as much effect as
churchmen that the working class has made all these years.. It simply did not dent them. Then Jesus knew that an appeal for justice was without avail for pious men rarely know justice and he took another method of reaching, not their hearts but their respectability. He stopped and wrote something in the dust at his feet, and as he wrote every pious and gody churchman sneaked off down When Jesus lifted himself up, and saw none but the woman, he said to her, "Woman, where are thy accusers? Hath no man condemned thee?" She said: No man, Lord. And Jesus said unto her, neither do I condemn thee: Go thy way and sin no more."
In my Sunday school days I was much perplexed over this story. I always wanted to know what it. was that Jesus wrote in the dust that had such marked effect on the smug saints. I remember that $I$ made a nuisance of myself asking my Sunday school teacher and my pastor to ex-
plain what the magic words were, and they rebuked me for my curiousity and told me it was woman's besetting sin. I am older now and know more of smug saints and "fallen women" and I understand. My pastor used us toll me that if it were best for
us what Jesus wrote, St. John would have told us. This might be true, but there is a more reasonable and logical explanation and that is that St. John and all the men who translated and edited the Bible were men, and men never tell on themselves or each other. It seems very possible to me that the smug saints disappeared so quickly and did not stop to argue the matter because Jesus wrote in the dust at his feet the name of the bawdy house the smug saints had crept out of about two o'clock that morning.
In the seventh chapter of St. Luke In the seventh chapter of St. Luke was called Mary of Magdelene.
pious old Pharisee invited Jesus home dinner, but knowing He belonged to the working class, none of the courtesies with which the Pharisee would have welcomed one of his own class was offered Jesus. He gave Jesus no water to wash his feet, nor oil to annoint his head and neither did he give a kiss of welcome. Then Mary came with a box of ointment and she washed the feet of Jesus with her tears, wiped them on her hair and kissed the bruises that the stones of the road had made. She expressed in the only way she knew such love and gratitude as only a harlot can know for the man who gives her justice.

Then the Pharisee sneered at Jesus because he had not recognized Mary for the sinner that she was and treated her with the vindictive hatred that smug saints are wont to display towards the weak and erring. "And he (Jesus) turned to the woman and said unto Simon, seest thou this woman? I entered into thine house, thou gavest me no water for my feet; but she hath washed my feet with her tears, and wiped them with the hairs of her head. Thou gavest me no kiss; but this woman since I came in hath not ceased to kiss my feet. My head thou didst not annoint; but this woman hath Whointed my feet with ointment. Wherefore I say- unto thee, her sins, which are many are forgiven; for she It is a marvelous testimony of woman's loyalty and love that in the was his women friends who were steadfast and faithful. When Jesus had betrayed his teacher and Peter had denied Him thrice, when the male moneychanger had demanded. His blood, and Pilate the cowardly judge had bowed to the demands of the master class; it was Mary the mother
and Mary the Magdalene who waited outside the judgment chamber in fear and agony. When the disciples had slunk away, too cowardly to even help Him bear His cross, the women followed at His heels and whispered
words of love and consolation. While the soldiers gambled for his garments and the disciples skulked about like curs, the women stood close beside the
foot of the cross. It was Mary the mother and Mary the Magdalene that filled the last lucid moments as the tortured life passed out of the pain racked body.
The beautiful, tender, sweet message and spirit of Jesus was far be-
yond the comprehension of the men who lived nearest him and those who have followed after. There is nothing to show that the disciples and apostles ever comprehended it, cognized the economic teaching of Jesus, nor his attitude towards women.
Paul was a lawyer and an old bachelor and that tells the whole story of his attitude towards the working class and women. He always exhorted the workers to be obedient to their masters, and the masters to be merciful to their slaves and was the sum total of his conception of human justice. that he insisted that the best and most pious thing for a man to do was not to marry at all. But if they found the unmarried state too uncomfortable, then as a lesser evil they might get
married. In the eleventh chapter of Corinthians Paul says: "Forasmuch as he (man) is the image and glory of God; but the woman is the glory of the man. Neither was the man created for the women; but the woman for the man." In the fifth chapter of Ephesians Paul says: "Wives submit
yourselves to your husbands, as unto yourselves to your husbands, as unto
the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church, and he is the saviour of the body." In the fourteenth chapter of Corinthians Paul says: "Let you women keep silent in the churches; for it is not permitted unto them to speak, but they are com-
manded to be under obedience, as also saith the law. And if they will learn anything, let them ask their husbands at home; for it is a shame for a woman to speak in church.'
For an old bachelor Paul was suspiciously well informed as to the wiles of widows. He wrote to Timothy:
$(5-9)$ "let not a widow be taken into the number (church) under threescore years old, having been the wife of
one man, one man, refuse; for when they have begun to refuse; for when they have begun to
wax wanton against Christ they will marry." Paul does not explain whether all the women who marry more than one man and the young widows shall be lost eternally or not. But it does seem hard on the women who marry
more than once and all the yeung widows to be shut out from salvation simply because Paul had a bad liver, or had dallied with the wrong widow.
But the hardness of the great apostles heart against the widows was mild compared to what he thought about Corinthians he says: "If a man think Corinthians he says: "If a man think his virgin, if she pass the flower of her age, and he need so require, let him do what he will, he sinneth not.' I occupied a pulpit in an Oklahoma church some years ago and after I
had finished my discourse one old deacon asked another what he thought of my sermon. He replied: "Wael, she is a right smart talker, but I am agin her. Paul says wimmin should keep silent in church." Then the Paul did say that, but I dont take much stock in what Paul said about wimmin. I allers found that ye cud mighty aeart tell jist what kind of jíneral idears on 'em, and I reckin Paul must heve trotted with the wrong bunch." And what m

Peter seems to have patterned after Paul in exhorting the slaves to be content with their lot and women to be subject to their husbands.
James was more humane. He seemed to have a deep compassion for

James was more vitriolic in his condemnation of the rich than the most rampant I. W. W. agitator that ever graced a soapbox. In bitter wrath he cried out against the injustice of the rich. (James: 5: 1-6) "Go now ye rich men and weep and howl for your miseries that shall come upon you. Your riches are corrupted, and your garments are moth eaten. Your gold and silver is cankered; and the rust of them shall be witness against you,
and shall eat your flesh as it were fire and shall eat your flesh as it were fire. Ye have heaped treasures together for the last days. Behold the hire of the labourers who have reaped down your fields, which is of you kept back by
fraud, crieth: and the cries of them which are entered into the ears of the Lord of sabaoth. Ye have lived in pleasure on the earth, and been wanton, ye have nourished your hearts condemned and killed the just and he doth not resist you."

So must have felt those who witnessed the first flutterings of the human voice over Alexander Graham Bell's first telephone, or seen the dull glow of Edison's first incandescent light, or heard the crackling sputter of a message conveyed on the air by wireless as Marconi first tested his invention, or the thrill that marked the first flight of Wright's air bird as he launched it to prove to the world that flying in heavier than air machines was a solved success.

designing it and when it was completed he gave up his business connections and came to Chicago.

A factory site was secured and the first Powdered Coal Power Plant was started. complete installation was made, including a powdering and drying equipment and a reverberatory furnace such as is used in the treatment of metals.

It was the first plant of PRACTICAL size built and the first firing of it marked an event. A ton of mine waste, the tailings of the mines which has a value at the mine of 80 to 90 cents a ton, was bought; the first few pounds were dried, then run through the powdering machine, the powdered coal was sifted through a screen so fine that there were 200 meshes to the inch, and then fed into the hopper.
The machine was started, a handful of oil soaked waste thrown in and ignited and the feed started. It was exceedingly low grade, containing not over one-tenth of an ounce of gold and in some instances as much as two ounces of silver. But he found his strangest results. The ore was heavy with concentrates and from a given weight of ore he woud save in panning fully one half the weight in concentrates. Always, after fusion, the mass was solid metal of a light eolor and when broken it was crystallized, not unlike the fracture of steel. This remark seemed so incredible

The make-good system has made us a nation of laggards. Only the most competent are regularly employed. I know you will say talents are diversified and that there is a place which every man can competently fill, but, chances are, before he finds that place he will starve to death. What I am trying to prove is that the make-goods, the most competent
because the strongest, are the busy bees in our industrial hive; and that the majority of us, weakened by the pace-setter, are drones-social laggards.
"It was my lot to have been a member of a trades-union, and in that union we found a great difference in the amount of labor produced. Some men could do half again as much as others less competent. The great argument of the employers was that the union did not furnish competent men; that they paid the man who was a poor workman as much as the expert. This was not just, they argued, and incompetents should be barred. For many years this was a much mooted question, which was finally settled by the union adopting a 'dead-line'a degree of competency-and workers must make good, or, if discharged, the fact that they had not reached the dead-line was just cause for dismissal, against which the union would not enter protest. The result was that the
most competent reached the dead-lines but never over it, unless extra compensation was forthcoming.

The union's strength depended upon the solidarity of the drafts membership, and it would have been suicidal to have placed the dead-line at too high a standard, else the incompetents should be mustered and used to ${ }^{*}$ dissolve the union in case of a strike.
"I will admit that the average degree of competency is not high among American mechanics, but that is accounted for from the fact that the average boy is forced into a trade for which he has no particular fitness simply because an opportunity or opening in that trade happens and he sees a chance to make a living. In other words, economic necessity forces the young man to accept the first reasonable opening presented, just as economic necessity forces the young woman into a marriage with the first man who offers himself, provided he is not intolerable and she thinks he can make a living for a fámily.'

Then a letter came from Jim Stark, State Secretary of the Socialist Party of Kentucky extending us an invitation to be the guest of Comrade Jim Redman of Glasgow Junction, Ky. We were very hazy as to what this place might be like but we "tock a chance.

On our way to Glasgow Junction we stopped for two days in Louisville and there we met some of the hill people who had been caught in the net of capitalism and carried away to become city workers. There was Jim Stark who hustles baggage for a rail-

Captain Keen who collects tickets for the same railroad and collects men for a higher and better civilization; "Uncle Sandy," the old negro bootblack, who polishes up men's brains with his homely philosophy and keen wit while he shines their shoes; John Stilli who preaches the gospel from his pulpit that the poor hear gladly; the busy contractor who was not too busy to whisk us about the city in his little Ford; the smiling hotel clerk whose "Good Morning" was a ray of sunshine and whose "Good Night" was a benediction. And every one smoothed a tired kink out of our nerves and sent a warm thrill through our tired bodies.

Then we journeyed south into the heart of the hill country. I have traveled much and many of the beauty spots of this and other countries and I was astonished to find that the trip between Louisville and Nashville on a day train is a never ending joy, and for sheer natural beauty cannot be surpassed. It is not only beautiful from the scenic standpoint, but it retains the very best of the old South and the many of the best specimens of real American home architecture.

We drew out of the Union

Station at Louisville in the mel low haze of an Indian summer afternoon and as we slipped out of the noise and grime of the yards and into the sweet, fragrant quiet of the country it was like passing into a new world. Every twist and turn of the winding railroad brought us a new picture and our camera shutters clicked until the last film was gone.

## Karl Liebknecht, Germany's Conquering

 HeroBy Eugene V. Debs

Karl Liebknecht in prison as conquerable soul shine forth in expatriate is a more formidable foe to the German Kaiser and to Prussian Junkerdom than he was when he sat as representative in the Reichstag. From the beginning of the war to the present hour he has held the most trying position of any of the Socialist leaders in Germany and to his lasting honor be it recorded that never for a moment has he weakened under persecution or shown the white feather in the face of peril. He is the one Socialist leader in Germany who has stood boldly and without quibbling or evasion for the true international position, and for this he is as much hated by the Socialist dough-faces who, unfortunately, had the movement in control when the war was declared, as he is by the kaiser and the junkers themselves.
It is in the fire of fierce conflict that true manhood is developed and true leadership vindicated. Karl Liebknecht has proven himself beyond question to be the son of his stern and uncompromising father, whose faith face was set like granite against all compromise.

Since his conviction and incarceration Karl Liebknecht, leader of the revolutionary minority, has maintained his position in the face of the most shameless persecution to which he has been subjected by the government, backed, to their eternal disgrace, by the majority of dough-faces who at the crack of the kaiser's whip, leapt like hounds into the fray for their (?) fatherland and for the glory of their exploiting masters. It is these milk-andwater reformers who so long masqueraded as Socialists and who showed when the crisis came that they were for the kaiser and the ruling class of Germany first, rather than for the international Socialist movement, who are largely responsible for the present war and entirely responsible for the collapse of the international movement. another country with the approval of their own masters, are not Socialists, but pitiful retainers of their own rulers. Such a policy creates war and is not helping the class struggle
'The international Socialist, of course, has the right to attack foreign capitalists, as he does the capitalists in his own country. But there can always be found enough of that kind of leaders, demagogues, and shams at home, so that every power of attack can be directed against the home government; at least to offset its worst designs.

Therefore it is not my duty to point out the faults of strangers, but those of the German Govern ment, and it is part of my work to correct as far as I can the false information that has been spread about foreign governments, and to fight error whenever and wherever opportunity affords, for by spreading lies governments keep up the war madness, and by nothing more.

## Shuns Arousing War Spirit

Whenever possible, $I$ have opposed foreign governments in the open, and I did the same at home. But I will never do this when it may result in arousing a war spirit against any nation.

Because of my opposition to the policy of the German Government to support the Czar in his Russian policy I have been attacked by the authorities here for many years. Before the war these ideals of mine were hated by the Prussian representatives in the Reichstag. When the war broke out I was found guilty of just the contrary

As part of the recognized international war of the classes the Socialist expects the support of the Socialists of other nations, and he realizes that his Comrades in other lands are pursuing the same course against their capitalist enemies as he does in his country.

Uncertainty, indecision and compromises that hinder the opposition of these conflicting elements hampers the class war. And it is the task of those who believe in these doctrines to explain this fundamental error and to propagate the opposition of the international Socialist movement against war."

These are the ringing words of a defiant and uncompromising social revolutionist. He does not quibble or evade, or simply mouth phrases. He toes the mark of duty squarely and every sentence he utters is clean-cut and to the point. He vindicates in fearless terms from behind prison bars the true international position. He is opposed to the war and boldly declares himself the archfoe of national patriotism. He is for the working class of the world and against the capitalist class of the world. He is not one whit less hostile to the ruling class nor one whit less loyal to the working class of Germany
than to any other nation on earth. That is the true position and the infallible test of international socialism.

Karl Liebknecht is against war, against militarism, and against preparedness so far as war and militarism and preparedness have to do with the working class of one country fighting the working class of another country under any pretense whatsoever. He has no patience with and makes no exception of so-called wars of invasion and defense. He knows that these catch-phrases are used by cunning knaves to delude their ignorant dupes and that such wars are without exception capitalist wars and waged for capitalist conquest and for working class subjugation.

It is this position of absolute, uncompromising and eternal hostility to military preparedness and ruling class wars that the international socialist movement is bound to take and maintain at all hazards if it is to recover its lost prestige, vindicate its smirched integrity, and take its historic place in the international

the elements he loved; his splendid genuis is returned to the mystic sea. Too young to die, and yet in those
few years humanity finds far greater few years humanity finds far greater
worth, the riches that do not perish, than in all the long, empty, sordid lives of the world's honored humbugs. He touched the lowly side of hife with a pen born of love and
bitter experience. Jack was a newsbitter experience. Jack was a news-
boy, Jack was a coal shoveler, Jack was a sailor before the mast, Jack was a tramp, Jack was in jail. He lived with down and outs, and animals; and he wrote their tragic lives as no human ever wrote them before. His place is vacant-it cannot be filled. As long as there are human hearts that feel the tender touch of love, as long as there are honest souls that revolt at cruelty and oppression, so long will Jack London's books and stories live and be read.
He went while the midday sun was yet in the horizon; he did his work in the early morn, before the
shadows fell from the West, while shadows fell from the West, while
leaf and flower still turned for warmth and life toward the East. He might have done more had he lived; but what he did was beyond measure, and immortal.

By John Hand.
(Staff Correspondent of Nat'l Rip-Saw.) WASHINGTON, Dec.-President Wilson came up to the capitol building on the second day of session of Congress, and told the Representatives and Senators, face to face, just what he wanted them to do this winter The Democrats cheered and slapped each other's backs, and the Republicans looked envious of the pork-fed smiles of their Democratic pals, and down in the middle of the room Meyer London, the only Socialist member, looked sick of his company.

He had good reason for looking sick. Wilson had just told them that they should go ahead and prohibit strikes by law-that is, they should make it a crime to quit work when a government commission was engaged in "investigating" the facts of the dispute with the employers involved in the case. Of course that is smooth diplomatic language for saying that nobody must strike until his boss has had six months' notice to put up barbed wire stockades, bring in gunmen and scabs, and get ready to evict the strikers from any houses the employer may own. Then, when delay has broken the spirit of the men and has made the boss perfectly safe, the strike can proceed.

What a howl arose, next day, from Mr. Gompers and other labor leaders who backed Wilson in the recent campaign! Some of the other union-card people who backed that red-eyed radical, Hughes, grinned an "I-told-you-so" grin at the Wilsonites and let it go at that. Days of wild scurrying around the town by the officers of the American Federation of Labor followed. There were rumors that the President was faking; that he merely was keeping straight the written pledge he made last summer, to try to get Congress to prevent railroad strikes in future; that he was expecting the American Federation of Labor to protest so hard that his proposal would be dropped. There were reports from the other side that the President was in dead earnest and that he didn't care a hoot for the opposition of the "labor skates," so long as he could stop by las the calling of a strike on the railroads of the country.
Up to date, nobody but Mr. Wilson knows what is really his purpose. But he did stir up a hornet's nest, and the chances are that the bill won't be put through.

Nothing will be done toward a real settlement of the railroad situation, of course. An absurd farce, known as the hearings of the joint committees of Congress on Interstate Commerce, to consider the needs of the railroads, and what the government should do about it, has been staged here
for two weeks past. It went far
enough to admit one witness who demanded government ownership and operation, and then its sittings were suspended until January 12th. This one witness was a country editor from Iowa, named Brookhart, and he showed that on the items of interest rate, and the saving of duplicated service the nation would make a gain of twelve hundred million dollars in the first year, by taking over the railroads.

That was dangerous doctrine. Brookhart presented the facts from the German government reports, to show that German government railways are making these hundreds of millions every year through simply cutting out the graft of the investors and stock gamblers, and by having just one railroad system for the whole country. Senator Newlands of Nevada, who is chairman of this fake investigation, decided that the committee must go at some other work for a while. Government ownership could wait. And it will.

Meyer London, Socialist member of the House, is downcast. He says that nothing will be done by Congress this winter on any important matter, unless it be the piling up of more monstrous appropriations for our mankilling departments than last year. War and navy estimates run toward a billion dollars this time, and it looks as though the "Peace and Prosperity" administration will even try to get the children in the public schools forced to do military drill-a crime against childhood that not even Germany had committed up to the outbreak of the European war.
But London might as well cheer up. Lots of things are waiting to be done. For instance, dear old Senator Shields of Tennessee is waiting to "put across" his free gift of the people's waterpower, worth a billion dollars, to the waterpower combine. This is the bill that gives away forever to the General Electric Company and its forty allied corporations, without a dollar of payment to the public, enough water power to meet the needs of two hundred millions of people. Like all of the rotten deals that are of fered in Congress, this is painted over its face with a pretense of being a fifty-year grant; as a matter of cold fact, it simply gives the government fifty years in which to buy up, and beat in all the courts, the company to which it gives away the power. The head of the National Conservation Association, Gifford Pinchot, has sent out a warning that "no worse assault on the rights of the people has been committed in Congress for many years than the passage of the Shields Water Power grabbing bill by the Senate.'

He has framed up an amendment to a general bill which proposes to give leases to prospectors on government oil lands, and this amendment surrenders. all title by the public to the best of the naval oil lands that were withdrawn from distribution by President Taft, six or seven years ago.

Standard Oil is the real defendant in some 17 out of 23 of the suits that the government has brought to drive out "squatters' on this public oil-feserve, according to a government witness. Decline of the Socialist Vote

By Eugene V. Debs

For the first time since the has been a decline in the Socialist vote in a presidential year. As the complete returns from the several states are not yet in at this writing we are unable to state the exact extent of this decline but it appears to be not less than twenty-five percent from the vote cast four years ago, and this notwithstanding the woman's vote in the several states which granted the franchise to women since the last election, and which increase amounted to perhaps a couple of million votes.
It was freely predicted by prominent party leaders and by the party press that the vote of the Socialist party would reach the two million mark and few there were so pessimistic as to predict an actual decline instead of an increase in the vote.
With the natural increase in the national vote, to which was added the large vote of the enfranchised women, the party, to have held its own, should have polled at least a million votes, whereas it is doubtful if twothirds of that number were polled. For this sharp decline there must be a reason and it should be the purpose of the party to ascertain that reason and to provide against its recurrence in any future campaign.
There are doubtless a number of reasons why our vote declined so materially in the recent campaign but I think there is one principal and dominating reason and that this reason is responsible for all the rest. This reason is that the Socialist party has become too much of a political party and that in the late campaign it was controlled too largely by political considerations and paid too much attention to catching votes.

Gumshoeing and vote-chasing are as fatal to the Socialist party as they are indispensable to capitalist parties. The politician fits perfectly in the filthy game of capitalist politics; in working class political action he should have absolutely no place.

The moment the Socialist party leader becomes a politician, a
vote-chaser, an office-seeker, he vote-chaser, an office-seeker, he
renounces Socialist principles and ethics and turns traitor to the party, and when there is indication that this practice has a tendency to become general the party suffers by the desertion or disgust and consequent inactivity of the class-conscious and revolutionary element of the party, and this is exactly what happened in the last campaign and is the main reason for the astonishing decline in our vote.

The lesson of this decline is that the Socialist party must
pursue the straight and uncompromising course and steer clear of the vote-chasing, fusing, officeseeking, and grafting and boodling methods of capitalist parties.
The Socialist party; to be sure, is organized for political action in behalf of the workers, but it is more than a mere political party; it is the expression on the political field of the whole labor movement and as such its first duty is to preserve its integrity inviolate for without that it cannot live and if it could live it would be but to betray instead of emancipating the working class.
The Socialist party would better not poll a single vote than to desert or compromise its principles; better cease to exist entirely than to poll a large vote and thrive in treason to the working class.

If the Socialist party is not a working class party then it is no party at all; if it does not stand squarely on the class-struggle and if its avowed purpose is not to fight capitalism from start to finish and overthrow wage-slavery from foundation to turret-stone it has no business to exist. These are the fundamental principles and purposes of the Socialist party and these are to be kept in full view and fearlessly advocated in and out of season if the Socialist party is to appeal to the class-awakened workers, develop in them the revolutionary spirit and have their unflinching devotion and support thus becoming the fighting force on the political field that it must become if it is not to fail in its mission and fizzle out and disappear from the field entirely.
The party leaders who have so long insisted that the Socialist party is the political expression of Gompers' American Federation of Labor should be able, it is hoped, to profit to some extent by the small vote the party received in the late election. The returns show that where the local party leaders pandered most to the A. F. of L. craft unionists the vote suffered the sharpest decline. The latter element, to catch which our politicians set every trap and used every bait, reciprocated, as uniformly in the past, by voting the capitalist ticket.
The A. F. of L. leaders with scarcely an exception were in the field hand in hand with democraد tic politicians appealing to the workers to come to salvation through the Democratic party, and the rank and file of the A. F. of $L$. craft unionists voted almost solidly the Democratic ticket. Not only this, but many of them took delight in expressing their contempt (and unfortunately not without reason) for the Socialist

The Socialist party by its compromising attitude incurred the contempt and lost the votes of the A. F. of L. craft unionists to catch whom had been its special endeavor, even at the sacrifice of principle, while at the same
time, and for the same compromising reason, it forfeited the confidence, sacrificed the respect and quenched the enthusiasm of the militant Sobialists, the real revolutionists who held principles above votes and who refused to abandon the class-struggle to popularize the party with the unenlightened element that denies that struggle and still persists, in the face of the glaring facts of industrial development, in hugging the illusion of the brotherhood of capital and labor.
If the Socialist party takes its ground squarely as a working class party; if it stands unflinchingly for the class-struggle on both industrial and political fields and proclaims the necessity of revolutionary industrial as well as political organization; if it stands four square upon its fundamental principles, catering to no party and to no union, to nothing and to no one, it will at once begin to throb with new life, grow steadily and healthily, become virile and robust, and march steadily toward its goal.
One hundred thousand votes cast for such a party would-be worth more and accomplish more than a million votes cast for a milk-and-water party, a bourgeois reform movement.

We should know by this time that there is no short cut to the working class republic and that a Socialist party cannot be of mushroom growth without at the same time being of mushroom softness and instability.

The only way to build up is on the basis of principles and sound tactics, and the only way to stay built up is to stick to our program and defy compromise. The process will be a slower one but in the long run it will vindicate itself and prove to have been the most direct road to power and to have provided the speediest means of emancipation.

The federal government has taken over the protection of children in mills, factories, canneries, workshops, mines and quarries engaged in producing goods for interstate commerce; you are asked to work for the protection of the other children, the ones whom the Constitution bars from federal protection but leaves to the states.

There are, according to the National Child Labor Committee, $1,850,000$ such children in occupations having no connection with interstate com-
merce. Some of them may be working for your baker, your grocer, or your
milliner. Some of them may sell you newspapers; some of them may black
your shoes. Some of them are doing things you never dreamed that children could do, for the census of 1910 shows that children work in the most unexpected and apparently unsuitable occupations. There are, for instance
1,297 children between 10 and 15 listed as barbers. There are 365 little boys 10 to 13 , and over $2,000,14$ and 15, working on steam railionds. There are 1,567 hostlers and st. demen under 16 years of age. Besides thescthere are thousands of newsboys, messengers, errand-boys, and cash-girls who are
