# Suppression of Free Speech, Free Press and Rights of Assemblage

Rhoades of the Federal Reserve Board of Philadelphia; Oswald Garrison Villard, president of the New York Evening Post; Jane Addams, Lillian D. Wald; Amos R. E. Pinchot; Paul U. Kellogg; Owen H. Lovejoy, secretary of the National Child Labor committee; Mrs. Glendower Evans of Boston; L. Hollingsworth Wood; Emily Green Balch; Max Eastman; Dr. John Lovejoy Elliott; Norman M. Thomas; Celia Lewisohn; Agnes B. Leach; Rabbi Stephen S. Wise and Prof. Henry R. Mussey of Columbia university. Many of these were among the President's most ardent supporters during the campaign.

The text of the letter, in full, was as follows:

"We are deeply concerned lest America, having declared a state of war, should sacrifice certain safeguards fundamental to the life of her democracy.

> "What we ask of you, Mr. President, whose utterances at this time must command the earnest attention of the country, is to make an impressive statement that will reach, not only the officials of the federal government scattered throughout the union, but the officials of the several states and of the cities, towns and villages of the country, reminding them of the peculiar obligation devolving upon all Americans in this war to uphold, in every way our constitutional rights and liberties. This will give assurance that in attempting to administer war-time laws, the spirit of democracy will not be broken. Such a statement sent throughout the country would reenforce your declaration that this is a war for democracy and liberty. We are sure that you will believe that only because this matter seems of paramount public importance that we venture to bring it to you at this time for

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## **EDITORIALS**

#### THE EMERGENCY CONVENTION

The special convention of the Socialist party held in St. Louis in April, marked an important epoch in the party's history. It was a notable gathering and it had before it a task of supreme importance.

Would the delegates measure up to the demand of the hour and boldly declare the true international position of the Socialists in the face of the overwhelming manufactured war sentiment which was then sweeping the country? The delegates did not long leave the party in suspense. The great majority had a clear idea of what the party's attitude should be and they had the high-hearted courage to declare that attitude to the world.

The keynote speech of Morris Hillquit in opening the convention was an eloquent interpretation of the duty of the hour and a clear and cogent statement of the party's attitude toward war and toward the system responsible for war.

The convention paid a high and deserved compliment to Comrade Kate Richards O'Hare in placing her at the head of the committee whose task it was to formulate the plan of meeting the war issue and to draft the party's declaration on that all important question. The debate in the convention waxed warm and earnestly but the issue of a sound declaration was never in doubt a moment.

From first to last it was a rank and file convention and not one of leaders. The delegates, the great majority of them, knew what they wanted and what those they represented wanted, and were determined to have it. Bosses, or would-be bosses, cut no figure. They were swept aside and the voice of the rank and file was heard and their demand heeded in all the deliberations of the convention.

The anti-war declaration of the party, published in full elewhere, accords perfectly with the true international position of the Socialist movement. Upon the basis of that declaration the International can be revived, re-organized, and made stronger than ever before. It is a ringing declaration of the fact that the workers of this country have no grievance against the workers of any other country and that the only war they have any interest in is the war against war and the brutal system that exploits the workers of all countries and then pits them against each other along national lines in murderous and destructive warfare.

The emergency convention of the Socialist party was in all regards a most gratifying success and the party is to be congratulated heartily upon its splendid results. There was no cowardly compromising spirit in evidence, no shilly-shallying, no attempt to dodge or evade, but on the contrary an almost unanimous determination to face the issue squarely and to vindicate the character and standing of the party as the revolutionary party of the proletariat in the worldwide struggle for emancipation.

Now that the party has taken its stand squarely in the interest of the working class upon every issue of interest to the working class it becomes the duty of the working class to rally to its standard and to give it the support that is required to enable it to carry out its program and to fulfill its mission to the workers of the world.

From this time henceforth every Socialist should put forth his most earnest and steadfast efforts to increase the membership of the party, build up its press, multiply its locals and do all else that is possible to make the Socialist party the party it ought to be and must be to fight the battles of the workers and to wipe out the iniquitous system which has so long robbed and degraded them.

#### THE RUSSIAN REVOLUTION

One of the most extraordinary events in history and one of world-wide significance and consequence was and is the revolution in Russia which at a stroke abolished absolutism, pitched the czar from the throne, abolished the Romanoff dynasty, and ushered in and democracy, toward freedom and justice, toward brotherhood the era of the people.

The agitation, chiefly political and led by the Socialists, of more than half a century, finds culmination here in an upheaval without a parallel in history. Siberia and all its horrors are atoned for in this colossal historic achievement. Every drop of blood of every Russian martyr, every sigh of despair of every Russian exile, and every lash of the knout upon the bleeding back of a Russian rebel is here accounted for and has here its glorious compensation.

The proletariat and the Social Democracy of Russia may well unfurl their colors and fling them to the breeze. It is a glorious day for them and they stand as heroes before the world. Not only this but their inspiring example will go down in history and be honored by posterity through the ages yet to come.

The revolution is not yet complete but certain it is that it will not go backward. Absolutism is dead in Russia, the Romanoff tyrants and bloodsuckers are gone never to return, and henceforth the people will work out their own destiny along the lines of democracy and self-government.

Well may Kaiser William now shake in his military boots. His knell and the knell of his breed was sounded in the Russian revolution. Now is the time for the Germans and the Austrians to prove themselves by rising from the dust as did the Russian masses, driving their kaisers and rulers from power, abolishing the odious Hohenzollerns and Hapsburgs, and ushering in the era of the people.

All hail the Russian revolution, the signal for the overthrow of every throne in Europe and for the wiping out of king rule throughout the world!

Catherine Breshkovskaya, the grand old heroine of the Russian revolution, is now at liberty after more than 43 years of relentless persecution and exile. All hail to this grand old warrior of the revolution! Her name will forever be an inspiration to the toiling masses struggling for emancipation.

#### THE WORLD-WIDE TENDENCY

Toward democracy, industrial, political and social, is the tendency of the whole modern world. It means the awakening of the masses and the coming of the people. It means popular freedom and self-government.

Whatever else this tendency may mean it certainly means the death of "divine right" as applied to czars, emperors and kings, and the end of class rule. It means that the people shall be sovereign, that equal rights and opportunities shall prevail, and that social justice shall at last have its place among men.

Long enough have kings and tyrants trampled upon humanity. long enough have exploiters lived in princely style out of the sweat and misery of their hapless victims. The time has come for the complete re-moulding and re-shaping of human society so that it shall be human indeed instead of bitterly and mockingly inhuman as it has been in the past.

At last the common man, the only real man, is to have his day. He has waited for it through the centuries, of times despairing if his day would ever come, but thanks to the evolutionary and revolutionary forces underlying society it is dawning at last.

Responsive to the appeal of the International Socialist Movement the workers of all lands are getting together, clasping hands, recognizing their common identity of interests, and preparing to enter upon their heritage. They demand the earth and the fullness thereof for all and they will not be content until they have completely conquered the enemy and taken possession of their own.

#### RAILROAD WORKERS WIN THE DAY

The four brotherhoods in winning the eight-hour day have achieved a distinct advance for their member and paved the way to a similar advance for all other employes in the railroad service.

It was the critical situation growing out of the threatened war with Germany which gave the brotherhoods their chance and when they declared their determination to strike and to strike without delay regardless of consequences, the railroads capitulated and the day was won. Close on the heels of the surrender of the railroads came the decision of the supreme court declaring the Adamson law constitutional, thus granting the eight-hour day to the employes which had already been conceded to them by the railroads. It is more than probable that the railroads anticipated the decision of the supreme court and that the supreme court anticipated the decision of the railroads. However this may be, it is easy enough to understand the relation between the supreme court and those who compose it and the railroads which constitute such a powerful factor in the combination of powers which create supreme courts and mould their decisions to suit their interests.

We heartily congratuate the brotherhoods upon their victory in securing the eight-hour day. We only regret that it was not

secured for all the employes in the service.

It was an extremely fortunate circumstance for the brotherhoods that war threatened the nation and that they were not compelled to strike. The railroads would never have surrendered in any other situation. # The Proclamation on War and Militarism

Adopted by the

### **Emergency National Convention** of the Socialist Party held at St. Louis

1. The Socialist Party of the United States in the present grave crisis, solemnly reaffirms its allegiance to the principle of internationalism and working class solidarity the world over, and proclaims its unalterable opposition to the

war just declared by the government of the United States.

Modern wars as a rule have been caused by the commercial and financial rivalry and intrigues of the capitalist interests in the different countries. Whether they have been frankly waged as wars of aggression or have been hypocritically represented as wars of "defense," they have always been made by the classes and fought by the masses. Wars bring wealth and power to the ruling classes. and suffering, death and demoralization to the workers.

They breed a sinister spirit of passion, unreason, race hatred and false patriotism. They obscure the struggles of the workers, for life, liberty and social justice. They tend to sever the vital bonds of solidarity between them and their brothers in other countries, to destroy their organizations and to curtail their civic and political rights and liberties.

2. The Socialist Party of the United States is unalterably opposed to the system of exploitation and class rule which is upheld and strengthened by military power and sham national patriotism. We, therefore, call upon the workers of all countries to refuse support to their governments in their wars. The wars of the contending national groups of capitalists are not the concern of the workers. The only struggle which would justify the workers in taking up arms is the great struggle of the working class of the world to free itself from economic exploitation and political oppression, and we particularly warn the workers against the snare and delusion of defensive warfare. As against the false doctrine of national patriotism we uphold the ideal of international workingclass solidarity. In support of capitalism, we will not willingly give a single life or a single dollar; in support of the struggle of the workers for freedom we

The mad orgy of death and destruction which is now convulsing unfortunate Europe was caused by the conflict of capitalist interests in the European

countries.

In each of these countries, the workers were oppressed and exploited. They produced enormous wealth but the builk of it was withheld from them by the owners of the industries. The workers were thus deprived of the means to

repurchase the wealth, which they themselves had created.

The capitalist class of each country was forced to look for foreign markets to dispose of the accumulated "surplus" wealth. The huge profits made by the capitalists could no longer be profitably reinvested in their own countries, hence, they were driven to look for foreign fields of investment. The geographical boundaries of each modern capitalist country thus became too narrow for the industrial and commercial operations of its capitalist class.

The efforts of the capitalists of all leading nations were therefore centered upon the domination of the world markets. Imperialism became the dominant note in the politics of Europe. The acquisition of colonial possessions and the extension of spheres of commercial and political influence became the object of diplomatic intrigues and the cause of constant clashes between nations.

The acute competition between the capitalist powers of the earth, their jealousies and distrusts of one another and the fear of the rising power of the working class forced each of them to arm to the teeth. This led to the mad rivalry of armament, which, years before the outbreak of the present war, had turned the leading countries of Europe into armed camps with standing armies of many millions, drilled and equipped for war in times of "peace."

Capitalism, imperialism, and militarism had thus laid the foundation of an inevitable general conflict in Europe. The ghastly war in Europe was not caused by an accidental event, nor by the policy or institutions of any single nation. It was the logical outcome of the competitive capitalist system.

The six million men of all countries and races who have been ruthlessly slain in the first thirty months of this war, the millions of other who have been crippled and maimed, the vast treasures of wealth that have been destroyed, the untold misery and sufferings of Europe, have not been sacrifices exacted in a struggle for principles or ideals, but wanton offerings upon the altar of private profit.

The forces of capitalism which have led to the war in Europe are even more hideously transparent in the war recently provoked by the ruling class

of this country.

When Belgium was invaded, the government enjoined upon the people of this country the duty of remaining neutral, thus clearly demonstrating that Committee to initiate an organized movement of Socialists, organized workers, the "dictates of humanity," and the fate of small nations and of democratic institutions were matters that did not concern it. But when our enormous war traffic was seriously threatened, our government calls upon us to rally to

"defense of democracy and civilization."

Our entrance into the European war was instigated by the predatory capitalists in the United States who boast of the enormous profit of seven billion dollars from the manufacture and sale of munitions and war supplies and from the exportation of American foodstuffs and other necessaries. They are also deeply interested in the continuance of war and the success of the allied arms through their huge loans to the governments of the allied powers and through other commercial ties. It is the same interests which strive for imperialistic domination of the Western Hemisphere.

The war of the United States against Germany cannot be justified even on the plea that it is a war in defense of American rights or American "honor." Ruthless as the unrestricted submarine war policy of the German government was and is, it is not an invasion of the rights of the American people as such. but only an interference with the opportunity of certain groups of American capitalists to coin cold profits out of the blood and sufferings of our fellow men

in the warring countries of Europe.

It is not a war against the militarist regime of the Central Powers. Militarism can never be abolished by militarism.

It is not a war to advance the cause of democracy in Europe. Democracy can never be imposed upon any country by a foreign power by force of arms. It is cant and hypocrisy to say that the war is not directed against the German people, but against the Imperial Government of Germany. If we send an armed force to the battlefields of Europe, its cannon will mow down the

masses of the German people and not the Imperial German Government. Our entrance into the European conflict at this time will serve only to multiply the horrors of the war, to increase the toll of death and destruction and to prolong the fiendish slaughter. It will bring death, suffering and destitution to the people of the United States and particularly to the working

class. It will give the powers of reaction in this country the pretext for an attempt to throttle our rights and to crush our democratic institutions, and to fasten upon this country a permanent militarism.

The working class of the United States has no quarrel with the working class of Germany or of any other country. The people of the United States have no quarrel with the people of Germany or of any other country American people did not want and do not want this war. They have not been consulted about the war and have had no part in declaring war. They have been plunged into this war by the trickery and treachery of the ruling class of the country through its representatives in the National Administration and National Congress, its demogagic agitators, its subsidized press, and other servile instruments of public expression.

We brand the declaration of war by our government as a crime against

the people of the United States and against the nations of the world.

In all modern history there has been no war more unjustifiable than the war in which we are about to engage

No greater dishonor has ever been forced upon a people than that which the capitalist class is forcing upon this nation against its will.

In harmony with these principles, the Socialist Party emphatically rejects the proposal that in time of war the workers should suspend their struggle for better conditions. On the contrary, the acute situation created by war calls for an even more vigorous prosecution of the class struggle, and we recommend to the workers and pledge ourselves to the following course of action.

1. Continuous, active, and public opposition to the war, through demon-

strations, mass petitions, and all other means within our power.

Unyielding opposition to all proposed legislation for military or industrial conscription. Should such conscription be forced upon the people, we pledge ourselves to continuous efforts for the repeal of such laws and to the support of all mass movements in opposition to conscription. We pledge ourselves to oppose with all our strength any attempt to raise money for payment of war expense by taxing the necessaries of life or issuing bonds which will put the burden upon future generations. We demand that the capitalist class, which is responsible for the war, pay its cost. Let those who kindled the fire.

3. Vigorous resistance to all reactionary measures, such as censorship of press and mails, restriction of the rights of free speech, assemblage, and organi-

zation, or compulsory arbitration and limitation of the right to strike 4. Consistent propaganda against military training and militaristic teach-

ing in the public schools.

5. Extension of the campaign of education among the workers to organize them into strong, class-conscious, and closely unified political and industrial organizations, to enable them by concerted and harmonious mass action to shorten this war and to establish lasting peace.

6. Widespread educational propaganda to enlighten the masses as to the true relation between capitalism and war, and to rouse and organize them for action, not only against present war evils, but for the prevention of future wars and for the destruction of the causes of war.

7. To protect the masses of the American people from the pressing danger of starvation which the war in Europe has brought upon them, and which the

entry of the United States has already accentuated, we demand-

(a) The restriction of food exports so long as the present shortage continues, the fixing of maximum prices, and whatever measures may be necessary to prevent the food speculators from holding back the supplies now in their hands

(b) The socialization and democratic management of the great industries concerned with the production, transportation, storage and the marketing of

food and other necessaries of life;

(c) The socialization and democratic management of all land and other natural resources now held out of use for monopolistic or speculative profit.

These measures are presented as means of protecting the workers against the evil results of the present war. The danger of recurrence of war will exist as long as the capitalist system of industry remains in existence. The end of wars will come with the establishment of socialized industry and industrial democracy the world over. The Socialist Party calls upon all the workers to join it in its struggle to reach this goal, and thus bring into the world a new society in which peace, fraternity, and human brotherhood will be the dominant

Recommendations.

1. We recommend that the convention instruct our elected representatives in Congress, in the State Legislatures, and in local bodies, to vote against all proposed appropriations or loans for military, naval, and other war purposes.

We recommend that this convention instruct the National Executive Committee to extend and improve the propaganda among women, because they as house-wives and as mothers are now particularly ready to accept our

message.

We recommend that the convention instruct the National Executive and other anti-war forces for concerted action along the lines of this program.

#### Deaths from Childbirth

Miss Julia Lathrop, in the course of a paper on maternal insurance read before the American Association of Labor Legislation, said that the number of deaths in childbirth in the registration area in a year was 15,000. What is even more disturbing is that the situation is not improving. Among the well to do there is practically no childbirth death rate. This means that childbirth can be made safe.

About one-half of the deaths in child-birth are from childbed fever. This is a form of wound infection. In surgery deaths from wound infection in civil life practically never occur now, and such has been the rule for ten years. The fact is that death from infection in a surgical operation where there has been time for preparation is almost unknown. Then why is it that women are still dying by the thousands from infection during labor-a wound infection in persons who have had nine months to get everything ready? Why is it that in spite of all we know about the prevention of wound infections, the death rate from infection during labor is not decreasing.

The answer is indicated by one

chester, N. H. Ninety-three per cent of the babies born are offspring of persons receiving small wages. The women whose husbands received power of the organized workers fact developed in a survey of Mantremely small wages are cared for in labor by midwives. Of those not cared for by midwives a portion are cared for by physicians who, getting in protest and raised at once little for what they do, give little

The Johnstown (Pa.) survey showed that 20 per cent of the women in that city, with its large foreign population, go through childbirth without having the services of either a physician or a midwife. The fact is that the proven methods of preventing wound infection, though in universal use elsewhere, have not filtered down to the poor woman in childbirth. The women are still having babies on the last cen-

But better care during childbirth is only a part of the problem. When a person is approaching an operation he gives some time and care to preparation. To get through childbirth safely there must be pre-natal care. And, finally, there must be post-natal

The woman must have a chance to recover from the operation of having a baby. Maternal insurance aims to get better care for women during labor, to give them some chance to get ready for labor, and to make it possible for them to rest after the operation.

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
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# Moulding a Nation

This was impossible because the growth of capitalism is assimillation and the weaker set of capitalists controlling the finances of weaker nations saw only assimillation of themselves in a universal alliance of capitalists. But labor was internationalizing, which fact spelled death to capitalism. Perhaps it will never be known just what particular incident precipitated the war, but we do know the general cause—the necessity of national capitalists to dispose of surplus values in foreign markets. Labor was distancing capitalists in the race for solidarity. The ruling powers; which were as always the economic powers, faced the competition of other national capitalists and a threatened dethronement by international labor organizations. It was either markets for surplus values—which would mean war with opposing capitalists—or revolution at home if they failed to supply jobs to labor which was rapidly becoming class-conscious. Whether these nations chose the war of capitalists against capitalists or whether it just happened to happen matters not. The one thing we must look at is internationalization of capitalism, which has been consummated. Europe fought to physical and financial exhaustion and now our American capitalists are the financial autocrats of the world. They are the economic power of the universe, and as such, control the government machinery; they possess the power to declare unconstitutional any political movement calculated to harm them. This being the case, is it not idle to suppose political action will destroy capitalism? Could you imagine a wilder dream? No; economic power can only be overcome by greater economic power. We can picture a solidified working-class, but it will still remain a picture. Here is an economic power which controls the means of life of the working-class. Loyalty to capitalism means jobs; opposition means starvation or jails. Disillusionize yourself. What have you to overcome the job-giving power? Had the Socialist party been able to offer something for the immediate economic interests of the workers-had it been able to offset the economic power of the owners of jobsindustrial democracy would have been a reality years ago; but it had nothing but an appeal to class-consciousness; it could not fill empty stomachs, and

Here on trucks are the sturdy steel frames, around which hustle alert mechanics fitting in parts, rivetting them together, installing the engines and rivetting on the supports for the lamps, running boards, body,

You pass through this department and enter the body department. Here great sheets of blue steel are fed into the cutting machines and stamped out into the sections that compose the body. Rivetters and solderers put the sections together and then they are hammered by a huge electrical. "Bumper" into the beautiful curves of the Multi-Powered Crow-Elkhart. It is a place of much noise. 



# Why We Have Tired, Worn-Out Nerves and Thin Blood in the Springtime



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



#### NEVADA COLONY INVESTIGATED BY STOCKHOLDERS

The stockholders' investigating and auditing committee completed its labors on February 26th, after working continuously since the 7th of the month.

Their report shows that title to the 1,640 acres of land is good and sufficient that the colony has the right to transact all kinds of business and that all of the colony contracts have been legally and justly made.

it is being conducted on safe business principles.

The committee was composed of Dr. Allen C. Adams, for many years a member of the Socialist state committee of Oklahoma; Marle Woodson, formerly professor of the state agricultural college of Oklahoma and for six years with the Oklahoma state board of agriculture in charge of the experimental farms; and J. Edward Feltnor, a graduate of an Arkansas business college and a man of considerable business experience.

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

True, these small-fry capitalist politicians do not know the meaning of these words, but they make a great noise with them. They ask for heavy taxes on incomes, particularly on the bigger incomes, and some 50 or more in the House are ready to vote for the confiscation of all incomes above \$100,000 a year.

George Lunn of Schenectady, former Socialist mayor, now strong Wilson Democrat, who voted for the declaration of war in spite of his lifelong opposition to war, is among the men who say they will make a fight for conscription of the incomes of the very rich. He does not, however, promise to refuse to vote for the rest of the war bilis until this conscription of incomes is assured. As Lunn is perhaps the most radical of the Democrats, and as he fairly represents the sentiment of a majority of the "progressive" Republicans on this point, his opinion is not taken seriously by the capitalist managers of the governmental show.

Curiously enough, it appears that President Wilson himself, after con-sultation with his son-in-law, Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo, was responsible for starting the agitation for conscription of the excess part of the biggest incomes. He suggested the \$100,000 limit for pin-money for any of our "best people." He gave out the hint from which has grown the "radical" agitation for seizure of the war-time incomes of the very rich—that is, the part above a beggarly allowance of \$100,000 a year—for the benefit of the national war funds. His reason for making this move is believed to be the same as his reason for tying up his declaration of war with a declaration against monarchical despotisms abroad-he wanted to throw political anchors to windward. He had taken a good long look at the Russian revolution, and he saw the possibilities of political revolution in America if the country should be plunged into war and famine and into heightened capitalist exploitation at the same time.

Meyer London says that he will offer an amendment to this tax bill, calling for the direct conscription of vast quantities of private property —not as a matter of taxation of income, but as a seizure for the public welfare of a lot of surplus wealth held in the great fortunes of the United States. He points out that what Socialists know to be necessary to the destruction of capitalism is the transfer to the public of the ownership of the sources of wealth—the industries which produce wealth. He would conscript the ownership of the industries, in so far as this ownership is held in the hands of a few.

If London carries out this threat, nobody will pay any serious heed at first. Only as the war debt grows larger, and the necessities of the war shall force the government to take control of more and more industrial enterprises, will the idea becom respectable. A year from now the anci nt sacredness of the right of private property will have become considerably discredited in America.

For, behold the food situation! Two months ago the Manchu head of the Department of Agriculture, Mr Houston, announced that there was no danger of a food shortage. A month ago he retracted this statement, and made some trifling suggestions as to better methods of disinfecting seeds before planting. Today he is pleading, in big posters and press publicity and speeches and emergency conferences, for the production of more crops and the saving of every ounce of the food that is raised. More than that, a food dictator has been appointed in this country. You may not have noticed that fact, but you will notice it more and more as April turns into May, and May gives way to June, July and August.

Herbet Hoover is the new food dictator. He has been director of the Belgian Relief Commission, and has been feeding ten millions of Belgians, these past two years, with a "socialistic" organization that dwarfed the biggest relief efforts of the Red Cross. Now he has been named by the Council of National Defense as chairman of its Food Commission.

Hoover is going to take vigorous measures to bring idle land into cultivation. Private property rights are jolted. He is going to reorganize the whole system of marketing of crops, not by pleading, but by issuance of instructions to railroads and markets. Private property rights will get off the sidewalk. He is going to see that a standard price is established for each product of the farm; that a standard quickness of shipment is secured, that a standard percentage of profit in each locality is made the maximum profit for food dealers. Private property rights will please hold up their hands. He is going to see that waste of food in the big city hotels and restaurants shall stop; that waste of grain in the manufacture of whiskey during the period of food shortage shall be re-duced; that waste of food by long storage on the part of speculators shall be prohibited. 
