

How Were Ohio Delegates Instructed?

The state referendum which instructed Ohio delegates to the Emergency

National Convention, carried overwhelmingly.

Ohio delegates were instructed to go to the Emergency National Convention of the Socialist Party and if that convention proved reactionary, if it refused to seat the ousted Left Wing factions, to then go to the September 1st

What September 1st convention was referred to when this resolution instructing the Ohio delegates was placed before the state convention?
