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A LITTLE HISTORY AS TO THE INJUNCTION AS A CAPITALIST CLUB.

Under English and American jurisprudence an injunction is a command issued out of a court of equity requiring the person to whom it is addressed to do or refrain from doing a particular act.

An injunction has always been regarded as an extraordinary method of relief, and Chancellor Kent called it the "very strong arm of a court of equity."

It has always been recognized that an injunction should not be issued merely to prevent the commission of crime, because a court of equity has no criminal jurisdiction.

The practice of issuing an injunction in a labor dispute originated in an English case decided in 1808. In that case members of a labor union were restrained from testing placards which requested "all well wishers" of the union "not to trouble or cause any annoyance to the Springfield Spinning Company Lees by knocking at the door of their offices until the dispute between them and the self actor minders is finally terminated."

Consider the protection with which the law as a result of centuries of struggle and experience safeguards the liberty of the lowliest citizen.

How different is the new method introduced by these injunctions. A judge sitting at his chambers upon the ex parte application of a private person or corporation makes an order commanding not only the defendant in the suit, but all the world to do or refrain from doing certain things which are specified in the order.

Under this system a person can be punished twice for the same offense. He may be fined or imprisoned summarily for contempt in disobeying an injunction issued against him, and for the criminal offense charged he may be tried and found guilty and be subjected again to fine or imprisonment or both.

The sweeping character of these injunctions may be realized when it is recalled that they are issued not merely against the parties to the action, but against all mankind.

The famous "starvation" injunction issued last summer prohibiting workmen from giving food and assistance to their associates during a strike has been followed by a recent injunction prohibiting the payment of benefit moneys by a labor union to its members pending a strike.

These injunctions and many others of the same character which have been issued during the last few years violate fundamental rights. Assuming for the sake of argument that in every instance the workmen were engaged in acts in violation of the criminal law, these injunctions were unnecessary and unjustifiable.

Whereas, All "radical and reform" parties, including the so-called "Union Labor Parties," have after a brief existence, uniformly succumbed to the influence of the old political parties and have proven disastrous to the ultimate end of the labor movement.

Whereas, Any alliance, direct or indirect, with such parties is dangerous to the political integrity and the very existence of the Socialist party and the Socialist movement.

Resolved, That no state or local organization, or member of the party shall, under any circumstances, fuse, combine or compromise with any political party or organization, or refrain from making nominations in order to further the interests of candidates of such parties or organizations.

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WHAT WE SOCIAL DEMOCRATS ARE AFTER.

(Adopted by the Socialist Party in National Convention at Indianapolis, Ind., July 31, 1901.)

The Socialist party, in national convention assembled, reaffirms its adherence to the principles of International Socialism, and declares its aim to be the organization of the working class, and those in sympathy with it, into a political party, with the object of conquering the power of government and using them for the purpose of transforming the present system of private ownership of the means of production and distribution into collective ownership by the entire people.

Formerly the tools of production were simple and owned by the individual worker. Today the machine, which is but an improved and more developed tool of production, is owned by the capitalists and not by the workers. This ownership enables the capitalists to control the product and keep the workers dependent upon them.

Private ownership of the means of production and distribution is responsible for the ever-increasing uncertainty of livelihood and the poverty and misery of the working class, and it divides society into two hostile classes—the capitalists and wage-workers. The once powerful middle class is rapidly disappearing in the mill of competition. The struggle is now between the capitalist class and the working class. The possession of the means of livelihood gives to the capitalist the control of the government, the press, the pulpit and the schools, and enables them to reduce the workingmen to a state of intellectual, physical and social inferiority, political subservience and virtual slavery.

The economic interests of the capitalist class dominate our entire social system; the lives of the working class are recklessly sacrificed for profit, wars are fomented between nations, indiscriminate slaughter is encouraged and the destruction of whole races is sanctioned in order that the capitalists may extend their commercial dominion abroad and enhance their supremacy at home.

But the same economic causes which developed capitalism are leading to Socialism, which will abolish both the capitalist class and the class of wage-workers. And the active force in bringing about this new and higher order of society is the working class. All other classes, despite their apparent or actual conflicts, are alike interested in the upholding of the system of private ownership of the instruments of wealth production. The Democratic, Republican, the bourgeois public ownership parties, and all other parties which do not stand for the complete overthrow of the capitalist system of production, are alike political representatives of the capitalist class.

The workers can most effectively act as a class in their struggle against the collective powers of capitalism by constituting themselves into a political party, distinct from and opposed to all parties formed by the propertied classes.

While we declare that the development of economic conditions tends to the overthrow of the capitalist system, we recognize that the time and manner of the transition to Socialism also depends upon the stage of development reached by the proletariat. We, therefore, consider it of the utmost importance for the Socialist party to support all active efforts of the working class to better its condition and to elect Socialists to political offices, in order to facilitate the attainment of this end.

As such means we advocate:

- 1. The collective ownership of all means of transportation and communication and all other public utilities as well as of all industries controlled by monopolies, trusts and combines. No part of the revenue of such industries to be applied to the reduction of taxes on property of the capitalist class, but to be applied wholly to the increase of wages and shortening of the hours of labor of the employees, to the improvement of the service and diminishing the rates to the consumers.
2. The progressive reduction of the hours of labor and the increase of wages in order to decrease the share of the capitalist and increase the share of the worker in the product of labor.
3. State or national insurance of working people in case of accidents, lack of employment, sickness and want in old age; the funds for this purpose to be furnished by the government and to be administered under the control of the working class.
4. The inauguration of a system of public industries, public credit to be used for that purpose in order that the workers be secured the full product of their labor.
5. The education of all children up to the age of 18 years, and state and municipal aid for books, clothing and food.
6. Equal civil and political rights for men and women.
7. The initiative and referendum, proportional representation and the right of recall of representatives by their constituents.
But in advocating these measures as steps in the overthrow of capitalism and the establishment of the co-operative commonwealth, we warn the working class against the so-called public ownership movements as an attempt of the capitalist class to secure governmental control of public utilities for the purpose of obtaining greater security in the exploitation of other industries and not in the amelioration of the conditions of the working class.

The Impossibility of Justice!

Under the capitalist system justice is an impossibility, and especially in just the place where justice is supposed to be dispensed, i. e., in the courts.

In the capitalist courts justice is a commodity, and as such it is purchasable. All you need is the price.

The courts are grinning skulls. Their smile is the smile of death. They are death's heads brutally reminding the poor man that he has no standing in society.

These eyeless skulls, typified by the blind goddess, have wonderful power of vision, nevertheless. They have an X-ray penetration.

It isn't only the anti-labor decisions and injunctions that constitute the shame of the courts under capitalism.

The poor man (and that means the working man, of course) is coming to see this pretty well. He knows that his class stand no show in the courts.

In the lower civil courts he appears to stand some show. They are open to him. Suppose he is a workman who has been mangled by machinery that was not repaired when the employer's attention was called to its condition.

But as a rule the case is carried to the higher court where the poor man cannot follow. And they call them courts of justice.

But even if the workman makes use of the courts, his opponent gets the sharpest and highest priced legal talent.

The president of a private street car monopoly in a large Western city not many miles from the publication office of this paper, made the following observations to a citizen who claimed to have been injured.

No one ever heard a judge come out in protest against this fatal flaw in the fabric of legal justice, yet they know well enough about it.

And you will notice that in the above we have been simply alluding to honest judges, not to the corrupt ones!

\$55,555 per day,
\$2,315 per hour,
\$38 per minute,
64c per second.

From this it will be seen that John could eat twenty-dollar gold pieces, one every minute, into the ocean and his income would overtake him.

Suppose you were a good, industrious, "thrifty" workman, born at

the time of Christ, and permitted to live to the present day, and had saved every cent you earned, and never ate a meal, bought a book or squandered a nickel for a glass of beer; in short, if you were the ideal type of workman that the masters dote on, how much would you have to save each day from that time to this to get the amount Rockefeller "earned" in one year?

It will be seen that John's capacity for "earning" wealth is equal to more than 42,000 workmen, as-

suming that the latter receive \$437 per year, which the census bureau gives as the average wages in this country. It is impossible to grasp the full significance of these figures, but one can get a slight conception of the enormous values which flow into the hands of a few men from the multitude of wage slaves wearing out their lives in the treadmill of capitalism.
