The German Social Democratic Congress.

By VICTOR L. BERGER.

THE GERMAN SOCIAL DEMOCRACY was originally formed of two large divided and hostile camps—the Lassalleans and the Eisenachers (Marxists). The Lassalleans were the more fanatic and more "radical" in their ways, but less scientific and less radical in their theories.

Marxism in itself is revolutionary and evolutionary—or more correctly expressed: it is based on the economic evolution, which is essentially revolutionary, and to some extent is revolutionizing the world before our eyes.

Now when the German Socialist movement was young, that is in the sixties and seventies, the matter was understood quite differently. German proletarian leaders had seen and experienced in person the betrayal of the revolution and of political freedom by the bourgeois in France and Germany in 1848.

This idea changed perceptibly at the time of the anti-Socialist law. The twelve years of persecution of course gave the Socialists an idea of the still tremendous power of the ruling classes and of the strength of capitalist society.

After the abolition of the anti-Socialist law a small portion of the party, especially students and so-called "intellectuals," were ready at once to return to the "old revolutionary tactics."

The clash came at the conventions in Halle in 1890 and Erfurt in 1891. Liebknecht and Bebel conquered. Wildberger, Werner and some other "revolutionists" who were unwilling to submit, withdrew from the party.

From that time there have been two tendencies in the German Social Democracy. This has been quite noticeable at every convention. The issues have been various—sometimes labor unions were discussed, sometimes an Agrarian program, or participation in the Prussian Landtag elections, then again purely theoretic questions.

At last the matter went so far that the whole Marxian theory was declared to need revision. The theorists of the party, especially Edward Bernstein, laid down the much disputed principle: Constant development in the economic and political fields must be the guiding star and all practical political work which is guided by Socialist principles, is a step towards the final aim, therefore the weight of all party activity should be applied to the "immediate demands."

It is especially unfortunate that the representatives of this tendency have been and are mostly "college bred" young men, many of whom have paid positions in the party and therefore must take pains not to offend party traditions and party prejudices.

A few words may be necessary to explain this matter.

"Laws on the statute book, like the Sherman Anti-Trust Law and the legislation of the last congress which attempted to re-enforce it, are in our judgment of little avail. They will work once, but it is doubtful if they will ever work again.

"We must make combinations unprofitable. How? 1. We can tax them to death, or we can tax them till their growth is impeded. (Class legislation—the income tax was pronounced unconstitutional by the courts—Ed. Herald.)

2. We can compel them to render better and cheaper service. (?) 3. If necessary, the state itself can enter the industrial field as a producer and restore the force of competition to its former supremacy by becoming itself a competitor of the great trusts.

Is the Right to Work Always Sacred? Society's Right Greater Than The Individual's.

By Arthur Brisbane.

A number of correspondents have asked us to answer the following questions, which we condense: "Must not the right to work under all circumstances remain inviolable and sacred?"

But in this country we will not allow a man to sell his life. We admit that he owns it, but we refuse to let him sell it. He can give it away in behalf of the general welfare when war breaks out, but he must not make merchandise of it.

life or to sell the labor of his whole life, has he not a perfect right to dispose of it piecemeal as he sees fit? At first sight we again answer "Yes."

Undoubtedly this question is based upon the rulings of labor unions in the organized efforts to prevent the employment of nonunion men—or, rather, to put it accurately, the effort to prevent certain individuals from working too cheaply, cutting the price of labor and jeopardizing the welfare of the majority.

It is evident that although a man owns his own life the consensus of opinion is that he cannot do what he likes with it, that he must consider the welfare of others.

In certain states—Colorado, for instance—a man cannot work under more than a certain number of hours per day. Many men would be willing to sell their sacred labor for an extra number of hours, but the law will not allow it.

We do not propose to discuss the question from any union labor point of view, however, but from the point of view of actual facts.

But about the right to labor. Well, each one of us owns his own labor. But no one of us is allowed to sell himself into slavery, which would mean selling your labor for the rest of your natural life.

Many men would be willing for a consideration to operate machinery lacking these safeguards. They ought apparently to have the sacred right to sell their labor on any kind of a machine, but the law will not let them.

What We Social Democrats Are After.

(Adopted by the Socialist Party in National Convention at Indianapolis, Ind., July 31, 1901.) The Socialist party, in national convention assembled, reaffirms its adherence to the principles of International Socialism, and declares its aim to be the organization of the working class, and those in sympathy with it, into a political party, with the object of conquering the powers of government and using them for the purpose of transforming the present system of private ownership of the means of production and distribution into collective ownership by the entire people.

Formerly the tools of production were simple and owned by the individual worker. Today the machine, which is but an improved and more developed tool of production, is owned by the capitalists and not by the workers. This ownership enables the capitalists to control the product and keep the workers dependent upon them.

Private ownership of the means of production and distribution is responsible for the ever-increasing uncertainty of livelihood and the poverty and misery of the working class, and it divides society into two hostile classes—the capitalists and wage-workers. The once powerful middle class is rapidly disappearing in a mill of competition.

The economic interests of the capitalist class dominate our entire social system; the lives of the working class are recklessly sacrificed for profit, war are fomented between nations, indiscriminate slaughter is encouraged and the destruction of whole races is sanctioned in order that the capitalists may extend their commercial dominion abroad and enhance their supremacy at home.

The workers can most effectively act as a class in their struggle against the collective powers of capitalism by constituting themselves into a political party, distinct from and opposed to all parties formed by the propertied classes.

As such means we advocate: 1. The collective ownership of all means of transportation and communication and all other public utilities as well as of all industries controlled by monopolies, trusts and combines.

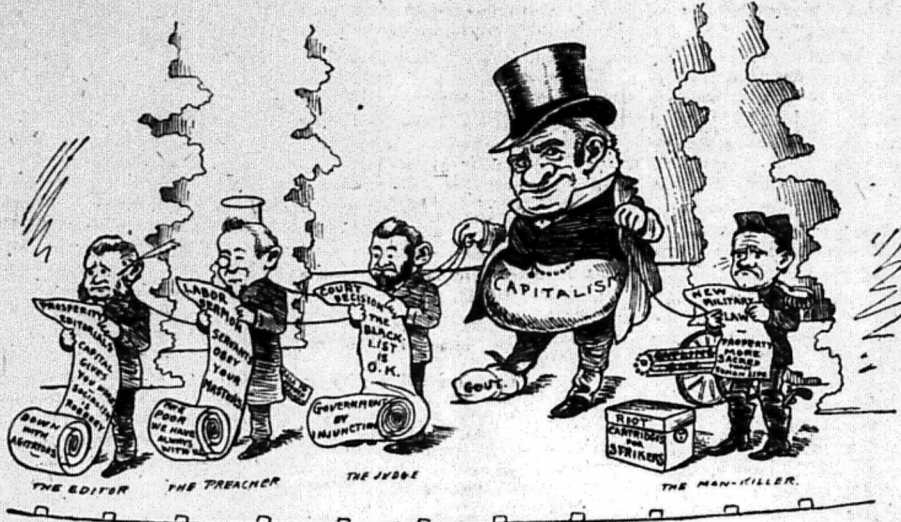
