EMANCIPATED FROM WHAT? MR. GOMPERS!!

The Chicago Chronicle, which is avowedly hostile to unionism, refuses to be reconciled by the action of the convention. It declares that the vote does not represent the sentiment of the body of union labor and that the Socialist resolutions were voted down because the delegates thought it expedient to do so rather than because they are opposed to Socialist doctrines.

The Chronicle sees the situation clearer than those newspapers that are getting Gompers and Mitchell on the back. Surely, if labor were emancipated, the trades union can no more emancipate it than the Parry's organization can, for it were as fatuous to talk of emancipating labor without abolishing the wage system as it would be to talk of emancipating the chattel slaves without abolishing the system that permitted one man to own another man.

Debs Writes of the Socialist Outlook,

And Makes Some Pertinent Comments on Various and Sundry Other Timely Topics.

The only reference to the Socialist vote in the press dispatches on the morning following the election was the loss in Massachusetts, and the capitalist press professes to see in this incident the precursor of Socialist disintegration and the speedy collapse of the entire movement.

The returns have finally filtered through sufficiently to enable us to determine that upon the whole we have every reason to be satisfied. The capitalist press is discreetly silent about the increase of about ten thousand votes in the state of New York.

What is the result? Twenty-five thousand solid Socialist party votes remain! The eight or nine thousand that were swept into the capitalist camp belong there, because they are not and never were Socialists.

We are under obligation to the capitalist politicians for combining against us, and to their hessians and all their other allies for relieving us of every vote that is susceptible to any capitalist influence whatsoever.

Colorado is the only other state that shows any material loss. The cause of this is due largely to the fact that Colorado Socialists are not united, and that many who sometimes think they are Socialists are in fact still Populists.

Lincoln said: "If you want that thing, why that's the thing you want." Peabodyism is in the saddle in Colorado. The working class have confirmed it and they can now eat and sleep and sweat and starve with it to their hearts' content.

President Parry and President Gompers are supposed to be deadly enemies. They call each other all kinds of names—on the economic field. But on the political field they are hand in hand—on the same side—equally opposed to Socialism and equally in favor of the wage-system.

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Berger Reviews the A. F. of L. Vote,

And Shows That Socialism is the Only Hope of the Wage-Working Class.

THE DUTCH took Holland—Gompers and his satellites ruled the convention of the American Federation of Labor in Boston. And Gompers and his satellites "turned down" Socialism as was expected—and there is great glee in the capitalist press.

But Socialism cannot be "turned down." It is always on top in the minds of the laboring people. Even Gompers would not deny—speaking from the standpoint of economic evolution, that the trades union men (and the city proletariat in general), the miners, the railroaders and the country proletariat are ready for Socialism now—that is they are ready for collectivism in a great many branches.

Now it is clear that the time is fast approaching when the laboring people and especially the union men will use their united political power for a change of the industrial conditions, instead of remaining a plaything in the hands of capitalist politicians who occasionally help them to "settle by arbitration the differences with their masters" in one strike or the other.

When Gompers and his satellites say that they are against politics, they do not mean capitalistic politics—they are always in favor of that—they mean Socialism.

Fellow workers! Refuse to listen to tirades of capitalistic politicians in labor's rank who want to keep you in everlasting wage slavery; with its strikes and boycotts, its black lists, idleness, pauperism and misery. Refuse to believe the capitalistic papers who glorify these capitalistic politicians in the ranks of misery.

Speaking of the ten per cent reduction in wages among the steel and cotton workers, the New York Evening Post says, complacently, "It is the inevitable which has occurred. The cost of production must be reduced, and wages as is usually the case, must suffer first."

No cold blooded murder is more horrible than this cold blooded butchery by soldiers who cannot ply their trade unless there is a chance to take human life.

Wright got frightened and reissued the bulletin giving the figures as they should have been—but this was done late enough so that the campaign effect of the lying tables could do its fell work.

THE PACE THAT KILLS.

Says a writer in the November Bulletin of the U. S. Bureau of Labor, "The strenuous life is already a well worn term in our country, but it contains the secret of living for the present generation of Americans."

The secret of living, indeed! More properly he should have said "the secret of death!"

Strenuous living for the capitalist sends him to the sanitarium or the insane asylum just at the time, generally, when he is most needed in the business he is building up for himself.

Strenuous living for the business man means death or disaster in the long run. True, he may be the architect of a fortune meantime, but the fortune falls to someone else to enjoy.

All over the land today are asylums, sanitariums, infirmaries and mad-houses, just because we are a strenuous people and from necessity travel the pace that kills.

Right here such an article as this, in a capitalist paper, would stop. To their view the people consist of capitalists and business men.

But right here, on the contrary, is just where the discussion of strenuous life should begin. It is the working class that is the real strenuous class in our capitalist society.

A man who would go into a foot race and throw all his energies into the first mile and then be no good for the rest of the race would be looked on by all good sports as a particularly pitiful specimen of a chump.

But it isn't a matter in which he is allowed any choice. If he doesn't want to travel the pace that kills, why bless you! there are plenty who will, and be glad of the chance.

Rebellion against this sort of strenuous tyranny under modern methods of production, under the lash of capitalism, is beyond the possibilities. But the worker who is in the toils of this great "exhauster" of life, who does a little thinking during the long toilsome day that begins almost before daylight and ends long after dark, is not absolutely in a hopeless situation.

This paper is sincerely and deeply interested in the fight of labor to secure an increasing amount of the wealth it creates but which is legally wrested from it by capitalism under the workings of the competitive wage system.

Officers of the Milwaukee Maltng Co. and Milwaukee Boiler Co., give Bribes and go free. But two Ex-Aldermen go to jail!
SCANDALOUS METHODS OF DEALING OUT JUSTICE.

Now we have a sensation! Some of the big fellows are being uncovered, although they will slip through the law as nicely as an eel through a gill-net, in fact they have already been granted immunity from arrest. On Monday the Citizens' Committee made known the fact that the Milwaukee Maltng Company, Anton Asmuth, president, George J. Zimmerman, vice president and Bruno E. Fink, secretary, had been found to have given a bribe of \$1,000 to ex-Ald. Robert Rudolph, when he was in the city council, through Charles Esau, a real estate dealer, as a go-between. Rudolph was promptly arrested. The bribers—Zimmerman claims that it was he who paid the money—will go free, although it is a state prison offense to give as well as to accept a bribe.

On Tuesday the Citizens' Committee made known the fact that the Milwaukee Boiler Company, Edwin Reynolds, president, James S. Church, vice president, had been found to have given a bribe of \$1,000 to ex-Ald. Charles Cooke, while he was in the board of aldermen, and Cooke was arrested, while the bribers—John E. Fitzgerald, a director of the boiler company, says he handed over the money—will be granted immunity from arrest. Church, who is vice-president of the company, is also a mining company president. Reynolds is the well known capitalist and head man of the Allis-Chalmers company.

Under the law a person giving information of a crime can be promised immunity from arrest in connection therewith by the authorities. This is the way things are

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going in the present uncovering of boodling in Milwaukee. When our "leading citizens" took it into their heads that they had better stand for the exposure of boodling in the city, they were in rather a tight fix. Where boodle is given somebody must give it, and manifestly no poor man is in position to buy legislation. Therefore it was plain that if boodling was exposed the names of the bribe-givers as well as the bribe-takers would have to come out. What was to be done? "Leading citizens" naturally shrink from exposing "leading citizens." But the provision of the law already noted came to the rescue. A nephew of Senator Vilas was secured by the Citizens' Committee to act as a detective. Certain cases were suspected. All he had to do was to go to the leading citizens implicated and promise immunity from arrest if they would tell all. It is much better to "tell all" and go free than to keep mum and get found out and have to go to prison.

We Socialists believe that it is much more humane to change conditions so that crime will not exist, but we certainly believe that wrongdoers should be exposed. But we protest against this game of saving the hides of the big rascals, because they wear silk stockings, and leaving the officials who have been tempted into crime to be punished alone.

Capitalistic crookedness knows no differences of race, creed or old party politics. Zimmerman is a Republican and Fitzgerald a Democrat. Cooke is a Democrat, an Irishman and a Catholic. Rudolph is a Republican, a German and was formerly prominent as an A. P. A. The thing that is going on is in accord with our predictions. The biggest rascals are the leading citizens—just the kind of men who were chosen as vice-presidents for that great mass meeting that was held at the West Side Turner Hall a few months ago.

Anyway, the Maltng company and the Boiler company have their sidetracks, and are safe in their possession, even if they did get them by resorting to crime. They are not only secure from punishment, but will be allowed to keep the stolen goods. It pays to be a "good" citizen!

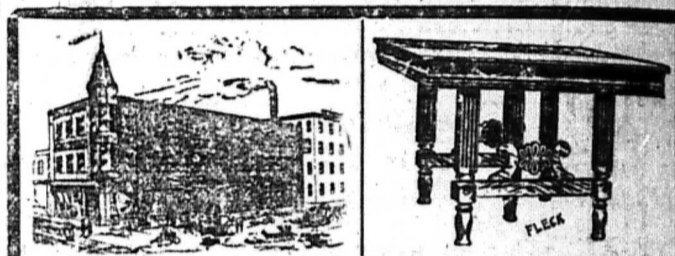
