VOTERS' LEAGUE A FRAUD!
HELPS THE CORRUPTIONISTS IN THE ELEVENTH WARD.

"TAKE AWAY THE WORKINGMAN'S RIGHT TO VOTE," SAYS ONE OF THE SPEAKERS!

The papers tell us that the Voters' League, a "good government" organization, has had its plans all mapped out by its executive committee. As this executive committee consists among others of such men as Ferd. Kieckhefer, the champion child labor skinner of the city, and Aug. Vogel, manager of the Pfister & Vogel tanneries, where men are paid dog's wages, it would seem that good government in Milwaukee needs to be delivered from its "friends!"

The University Settlement and Social Culture club have offered assistance to the Voters' League. Is this the way the Settlement expects to get the confidence of the working class? The Voters' League held a meeting under Republican auspices in the Eleventh ward the other night and one of the speakers said there would never be good government in Milwaukee as long as people without property were allowed to vote! Here is a business man who gets his living out of the working class and yet who wants to take the right of citizenship away from the working class. The same damnable spirit exists throughout the league, only the other members are too cowardly to speak out as plainly as this man.

The Milwaukee Voters' League, made up of the big hungry grey wolves of business life who are back of bribery and legislative corruption through paid lobbyists, is now ready for business, and has announced that it has begun the work of scrutinizing the men who are being proposed as candidates for the local election. As its secretary was one of Mayor Rose's spellbinders in the last election, it is altogether probable that Rose will be overlooked when the list of dishonest candidates is made up!

According to the official list of members issued secretly by the Parry organization, our esteemed fellow townsmen, August Vogel and Frederick W. Sivyer, members of the executive board of the Voters' League, are members of the great national association of union wreckers. A voter's league which assumes to scrutinize the various candidates for political office in Milwaukee in the present campaign, is a barefaced fraud. It is a capitalist scheme, aimed to keep the local political control in the hands of the capitalist class.

The foxy methods of the capitalist Voters' League are already coming to the surface. Although none of the parties have made nominations in the Eleventh ward, the league has already endorsed the Eleventh Ward Citizens' Club, and is making speeches in its interests, although our investigations show that not only is the club made up of Republicans, but of Stalwart Republicans at that! Knowing that they stand no show as Republicans to get official plums, these Eleventh ward statesmen of the Rudolph class have purchased their masquerade suits from the Voters' League. Mark our prediction well. All that we have charged against the Voters' League will be found to be true as the campaign progresses. When a man accepts an endorsement from the league look out for him as an enemy of the working class!

The other evening Dave Rose was made a member of the Hiawatha lodge of the Modern Woodmen, and, of course, was given a reception after the meeting. There was no politics, of course! Rose is now a member of nearly every secret society in town, and is alleged to have said that it is one of the best vote bringing schemes in existence.

The grand jury hasn't the deterrent effect that some simpletons hoped for. Here is "old sport" Diedrichsen, the school principal, with the Rose-Donovan gang behind him and the support of such "good government" Republicans as Director Augustyn, making a run for superintendent of our Milwaukee school system!

Next Thursday evening, Prof. J. C. Monaghan, a Republican politician and under study of Father Sherman in the eminently commercial business of damning the Socialists with filthy lies, will lecture under the auspices of the Milwaukee School Board, in the Fourth District school on "Socialism in Europe and the United States." Monaghan will also be the orator of the day at the St. Patrick's day celebration at the Pabst theater, March 17. To have such a capitalistic sponger hold forth in his honor ought to be enough to make the old saint turn in his grave, for St. Patrick is reputed to have been no lover of the oppressors of the poor.

The voting machines will be in place in the booths early next week and we urge all Social-Democrats to drop in as they pass the booths and experiment and familiarize

The special committee of the Milwaukee county board has recommended the penal farm plan advocated by organized labor, but the board laid the matter over till its next meeting. In connection with this matter it may be well to call attention to the fact that in 1896, when the Milwaukee house of correction had the contract to supply the Republican national convention at St. Louis with 8,000 prison made chairs, every man that could possibly be arrested was run in, in order to keep the chair factory of the house of correction running full capacity!
