Gaylord's Tour a Triumph!

the Gaylord meeting in West Bend, for it was the biggest political gathering of the campaign. The politicians are still in a panic, and in desperation have even tried to use the church to try and stem the tide.

Comrade Gaylord ran in to Milwaukee to speak at Rack's hall the following night and then out again to entice a big meeting at Oshkosh on Saturday evening. It was the largest meeting he ever addressed there. Good Templars' hall was crowded, and the crowd was twice as large as the one that turned out to hear the millionaire pluck-me store candidate, Connor, a few nights before. He said:

"Jim" Davidson and John Aylward are running for governor on the Republican and Democratic tickets. But neither of them will ever have as much power in the state of Wisconsin as W. D. Connor, millionaire lumberman and Republican boss, has right now."

"When the LaFollette fight was finished two years ago, and money was needed to meet the expenses of that campaign, Governor Connor sent word to his subjects whom he really 'rules', in the lumber town of Stratford, Wis., that the wages of the men were to be cut 25 cents per day until further notice."

Last Sunday our candidate spoke before a crowd of farmers at

Mequon, in Ozaukee county, four miles from the railroad, and they gave him fine attention and there was no mistaking their sympathetic attitude. In the evening he spoke at the big Lincoln hall meeting in Milwaukee, sharing the time with Comrades Strickland and Thiel. An announcement that he would handle the dirty slanders of Boden at the W. St. Side Turn hall meeting on this Friday night called forth cheers. In the course of his address he said:

"Mr. Aylward is objecting to the state supervision of road-building on the ground that it will be used by Connor to pay the wages of men who will simply be organized into another political party machine for the Republican boss. Mr. Aylward ought to know—that the Social-Democrats already know—that whether it is game-wardens or road superintendents, factory inspectors or state board of barber examiners, somehow and somewhere the people of Wisconsin will be paying the wages of the men who make up the political machine of whichever capitalist party is in power. Mr. Aylward may not be as good a builder of political machines as Boss Connor, but every workman knows that he would try his hand at it if he should be elected."

"There has been a great deal of howling about the 'confiscation of property' by the Social-Democrats, on the part of the old party politicians and editors. And now comes the great Teddy with the big stick, and says that when a man's income gets too big part of it must be 'con-

fiscated by the income tax, and when some man dies and leaves too many millions to his heirs a slice of it must be confiscated by the government and put into the general treasury for the common benefit. Roosevelt does not call it confiscation, but what else is it? And the very meaning of 'regulation' is nothing else but the regulation of the property of one class for the benefit of another class—which again is confiscation of profits."

This Friday evening (this issue will reach some readers on Friday) Gaylord answers Boden, saying among other things the following:

"Mr. Frank X. Boden has 'challenged' me to produce any authority on Socialism who believes in 'monogamy.'"

"Mr. Boden is giving the impression that he has read the literature of the Socialist movement. If he has read our literature, he has deliberately misrepresenting it. He has not read it, he ought not to talk about the subject out loud in public. It hurts his party. It only makes more Social-Democrats in the long run. So I hope he will keep it up."

"Now for the answer:

"If Mr. Boden is familiar with Socialist authors on this subject he has seen the following from Kautsky:

"Free mistress of herself, the equal of man, woman will put a speedy end to all manner of prostitution, legalized as well as unlegalized, and then for the first time in the world's history will she be able to establish, as an actual, not a fictitious fact, the oneness of husband and wife."—The Socialist Republic.

"Mr. Boden mentions Engels, and so he ought to be familiar with Engels' work on the 'Origin of the Family.' Why has he never quoted the following from that great author on Socialism?"

"Remove the economic considerations that now force woman to submit to the customary disloyalty of men, and you will place women on an equal footing with men. All present experiences prove that this will tend much more strongly to make men truly monogamous."

"The fact that these passages can be found in Socialist authors of repute, and could have been used in a public debate, is a sufficient reason why Mr. Boden has had the discretion to avoid a public discussion with me on this subject, under circumstances where he and I would have an equal opportunity to show our respective positions, and quote authorities."

He got the matter sent back to the committee, and won out, as the committee Monday reported for that amount. But since then certain facts have come to light, and a still lower price will undoubtedly be secured. It pays to have Social-Democrats on guard.

Ald. Melms also introduced an ordinance, based on the Chicago ordinance, which recently received the endorsement of the Illinois Supreme court, providing that the street cars must not be overcrowded—that is, that the company must run cars enough to handle the business, that all cars must go clear through to the terminal instead of making passengers get out from one car into another, and that the temperature in winter must not be below 50 degrees, a thermometer to be placed in every car.

This is relief that the people of Milwaukee can have just as soon as they stop voting for the candidates of the capitalists. The city has the charter right to regulate the public service corporations if it wants to—or, if the men it elects to do its business for it do not belong to its enemies, the corporations and big capitalists!

Railroad Highwaymen.

The investigations of the Interstate Commerce Committee into the operations of the elevator combine is throwing a flood of light upon the ruthless manner in which the plutocrats have been crushing out the small capitalists during the past few years. One witness testifies that he had the names of 7,000 men who were ruined by the grain combine, while many individuals took the stand and testified that they had been bankrupted by the big capitalists. Because a Mr. Carr invented a device by the operation of which grain could be loaded on cars without being first placed in warehouses, and millions of dollars could be saved to the farmers that now go into the coffers of the railway and grain monopolists, he was driven out of business. Yet these big rascals, who deliberately ruin small competitors and steal their business, yell "Socialism!" "confiscation!" when the propriety of nationalizing the railways and putting an end to their thievery is discussed. And there are a lot of hungry little skates who shout with these plutes as though they really had something to say.—Cleveland Citizen.

Why Law Crushes Labor.

Organized laborers parade on Labor Day half a million strong, and they are addressed by lawyers, and they in turn elect these lawyers to be judges. In turn they are sent to jail by these lawyers. With all the strength you show on Labor Day you haven't a representative in congress, and you vote for one or the other of the old political parties because your grandfathers did so before you.

Judges in ninety-nine cases out of a hundred are picked from the office of some great corporation. Good lawyers work for big fees and the corporations get these lawyers.

With the lawyers of corporations elected to judgeships it is but natural that the judges should go on the bench with all the prejudices of the corporations. These judges believe the capitalist is everything and the laboring man is nothing.

If one of these corporations

wants to enjoin 10,000 men from striking the judge enjoins them, and they call forward the president of the labor union and put him in jail without the need of a jury. They tell us this is within the law, and it is within the law. All over this broad land we cannot pick one of these judges who has an interest in organized labor. We are told that we must not criticize the courts. When did it occur in America that a man became so powerful that he must not be criticized? You men elect these courts, and yet you wonder why they send you to jail without trial by jury.

There was a time when to ask for higher wages was a criminal offense. It was also a jailable offense for two laborers to meet on the highway and discuss higher wages. The laborer was a cruel menace and the first labor unions were organized in caves and in the forests, where bloodhounds could not follow the organizers. Every step that labor has made has been taken at a fearful cost. In America progress has been made against the courts and in spite of the courts. In Pennsylvania a man was sent to jail without trial by jury because he asked an employer to employ union labor instead of non-union labor. In Chicago they have sent men to jail because they have asked men to lay down their tools and strike for higher wages.—Clarence Darrow.

"Of all the institutions now existing, if you want to see the ones which come the nearest to being models of efficiency, take a peep into the publicly owned and operated postoffice, the publicly owned and operated public schools, the publicly owned and operated fire departments, the publicly owned and operated water departments, etc. These institutions have been operated under very unfavorable circumstances. They have been operated in the interest of the capitalist class. And they have been set down in a system reeking with graft and corruption. They have been almost entirely without safeguards from corruption. And yet they are the best models of efficiency now in existence."

Socialists in Action!

Milwaukee: At the Monday meeting of the city council the proposal of Ald. Smith (Dem.) to redistrict the city in accordance with the law, so as to provide equal representation for the voters in the different wards, was killed, 24 to 22. The papers tried to make it appear that the Democrats were to blame for the adverse vote, but the Republican aldermen did their share also against this demand of popular government. The reason for this is not far to find. The big wards, where the people are unfairly represented in the board of aldermen, have so many Socialists that it would mean more Social-Democratic aldermen to cut them up. For instance, the Eleventh ward has a larger population than the Third, Second and Seventh wards combined, yet the people of the Eleventh are represented by but two aldermen, and the people in the other wards are represented by six aldermen. And so on. And to show how little the word democracy means to men who parade under the name of the so-

called Democratic party, both Ald. Lomanski and Connelly, who are running on the Democratic county ticket, voted against the redistricting.

The proposition to pay the street railway company \$70 per light for the light the city has used since the contract ran out, and the company and the city have been looking horns, was sent back to the committee on motion of the Social-Democrats, Ald. Melms reminding the council that the company would soap have its annual meeting, and the developments might show that a lower and fairer rate still could be fought for. Here the work of the Socialists is again shown up in its advantage to the city. A \$70 rate would mean a saving of \$10,000. When the committee first began to dicker with Bezgas he wanted \$99 and \$81 for his lights, and blustered loudly about court proceedings. Then the committee, to still the public indignation, decided on a \$78 rate, and some of the papers said it was reasonable. Melms fought it with a minority report, holding for \$70.

THE WISCONSIN STATE PLATFORM.

The Social-Democratic party is the American political expression of the international movement of the modern working class for better food, better houses, sufficient sleep, more leisure, more education, and more culture.

Under the present system, society is rapidly dividing into two classes—the rich and the poor, the capitalist class and the proletariat. The one toils without enjoying, the other enjoys without toiling.

In the wage earner and the farmer, we recognize the types of the producing elements of this country. Under our present economic system, both are exploited for the benefit of the capitalist class, the laborer on the sale of his labor power and the farmer on the sale of his products. Both are again exploited in the purchase of practically all the necessities of life.

The final aim of the Social-Democratic party is the emancipation of the producers and the abolition of the capitalist system. For that purpose, we organize the producing classes in city and country into a political party to take control of the powers of government.

The most characteristic expression of the present economic system is the trust and the monopoly.

Electricity, steam, and many modern inventions have struck the death blow at production of a small scale. Competition has wiped out competition. Production on a large scale makes monopoly a necessary condition. The trust and the monopoly are here, whether we wish it or not. The only question is whether they shall be public or private monopolies.

Private monopoly is a curse to the nation. Thus we see the coal trust making untold millions out of the sufferings of the poor, the oil trust piling up the greatest fortune the world has ever seen upon the ruins of innumerable small dealers and in defiance of all laws and courts of justice, the meat trust sending thousands of unsuspecting human beings to an early grave by selling diseased meat simply to make dividends and heap up millions. Similar statements could be proven against all the other trusts.

Therefore the Social-Democratic party demands that the production of this country shall be taken away from the control of a small number of irresponsible men, whose only aim is to exploit us to the last limit of our endurance, without regard to human life or welfare.

There is no relief to be expected from any of the old parties.

Formerly, the Republican party was the favorite political organization of capitalism, while the Democratic party stood for the middle class. But since the trusts have bought the Democratic party, there is no difference between the two. They both stand for capitalism and the present economic system.

With this in view, the Social-Democratic party of Wisconsin reaffirms its allegiance to the principles of international Socialism and declares its adherence to the platform of the national Socialist party, adopted at the convention in Chicago, and pledges itself at the present time to the following measures:

1. That the state legislature, the governor and our representatives in Congress shall take such action as is calculated:

1. To bring about the nationalization of all the trusts, notably the coal, the meat, the oil, the sugar, the farming machinery trusts, and others of the same kind.
2. To bring about the national ownership of the railroads, telegraph,

telephones and express companies and steamship lines.

3. To enact a law, granting every wage-worker over 60 years of age, who has earned less than \$1,000 a year and has been a citizen of the United States for sixteen years at least, a pension of not less than \$10 a month for the rest of his life.
4. To bring about the enactment of a national law by which the government of the United States shall lend the cities and townships money on bonds issued by said cities and townships. Such loans shall be made in legal tender and without interest, the refund to take place in twenty years in equal shares. The money shall have its intrinsic value secured by the bonds and the assessed valuation of the city or township that receives the loan and it shall be canceled with the bonds as fast as the loan is refunded.
5. To amend the United States constitution so as to abolish the United States Senate, which is a bulwark of capitalism and trustocracy—the general referendum of all the people to take its place as a check under proper provisions. Furthermore to elect the United States judges by the people of their respective districts, for terms not to exceed six years—instead of having the appointment by the president—in order to make an end of government by injunction.
6. To establish life-insurance by the national government.

We also demand,

7. That all elective officers, national, state, and municipal, shall be made subject to the imperative mandate, and to a recall, by the expressed wish of three-fourths of their constituency.
8. That no city in Wisconsin shall have the right to sell, lease or give away public franchises. Provided, however, that in cases where existing laws and public necessity make a franchise unavoidable, it shall be granted only upon such terms as will guarantee justice to the people in the matter of rates, and fair treatment of the workers in respect to hours of labor, wages, etc., and especially shall provide for the transfer of the utility to public ownership at the earliest possible hour. Or, provided further, that the granting of such franchise shall first be approved by general referendum of the respective city or township.
9. Every city in Wisconsin shall have the right to take possession of all its public utilities by paying to the present owners the price of the properties involved as fixed by an impartial jury, the same not to include any franchise values; every city and town-

PULL THE FOURTH LEVER!

A Foundrymen's Slugging Game Thwarted!

Sensational Developments! Two Thugs Imported from a Chicago Detective Agency to Bruise Striking Molders. Head of Detective Agency Caught Red-Handed and Locked up. Capitalistic Officials Let Him Off! The News is kept from the Public!

There have been some remarkable developments in the molders' strike situation the past week, although Milwaukeeans have been given no inkling of it in the daily papers. The Foundrymen's association of Milwaukee imported two Chicago detective agency men here with instructions to slug the leaders of the strikers, detectives of our police department caught one of the proprietors of the detective agency paying them their wages and locked him up at the Central Police station, and next day District Attorney McGovern refused to prosecute him on the advice of Chief Janssen, who held that the word of the detective agency proprietor (who claimed that he hired the men only as spies) was worth more than that of the two men who swore they were hired for the purpose of slugging!

Some time ago Charles E. Sammond, president of the Foundrymen's association, made a statement to one of the molders, at the time that a case was up in court, that he

members of the bosses' association had wanted to import sluggers but he had forced them to drop the idea. Later he denied making such a statement. Recent events tell their tale, however. Last Saturday two men were sent to Milwaukee by the Burr & Herr Detective Agency of Chicago, with instructions to slug some of the strike leaders.

One of the men was a bartender who had been recommended to the agency for such work. His name was O'Connors. He hired the other man, McGarry.

O'Connors, however, had been a molder and had a card. When he arrived in Milwaukee he decided to play a double game and sought out Business Agent Schwab and told him the whole plan. He said the two were hired at ten dollars a day and were given a list containing the names of William Schwab, John Lutz, Peter Kramer, W. Krellwitz, A. Heys and Edw. Bryant, who were to be drawn into quarrels and slugged. The men

were to be paid each evening by Herr, of the agency, who would stay in Milwaukee, and who had ridden with them, but in a seat ahead.

The molders sent men to watch at night and saw Herr meet O'Connors near the Emergency hospital and pass money to him, at the same time receiving a verbal report.

They then went to the police department and next evening Detective Peck and two other plainclothes men watched and caught Herr as he handed the pay to O'Connors near the Public Service building. He was arrested and locked up over night at the station.

When Janssen reached the city hall he took the position that the word of the man Herr was to be believed in preference to that of the men, because the firm had a reputation for supplying men to the big railroads and corporations all over the country whenever they had labor

troubles! With this backing, the district attorney, McGovern, refused a warrant, and Herr was discharged, while the two men, O'Connors and McGarry, were ordered out of town. The molders feel that this was one-sided justice and another proof of the fact that there is one law for the rich and another for the working people.

If the case had been reversed, and it had been one molder's word against that of two sluggers, the two sluggers would have been believed all right!

As to the reliability of the man Herr it is said by the molders that he is the man who offered the strike leaders in the big Racine molders' strike money, "and plenty of it," if they would sell out, a year or so ago.

It is reported that a self-appointed committee of Foundrymen is going the rounds of the factories asking the proprietors to try to induce their men to vote any old party ticket for fear the Social-

Democrats will get in. The argument they use is that if the Social-Democrats win manufacturers will not be able to control the district attorney.

A son of Inspector Riemer, of the police department, is one of the proprietors of 'the Merchants' Police, one of whose thugs murdered the striking molder, Feeley.

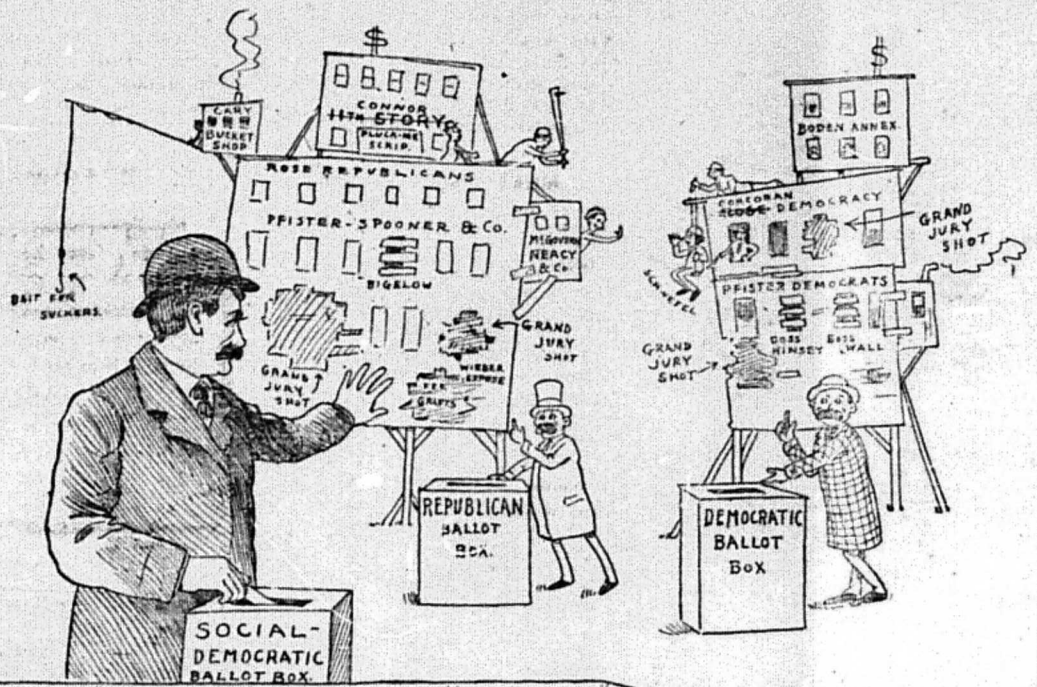

There is still time to think this over. Are you going to break away and be a man this year, or are you going to wait?

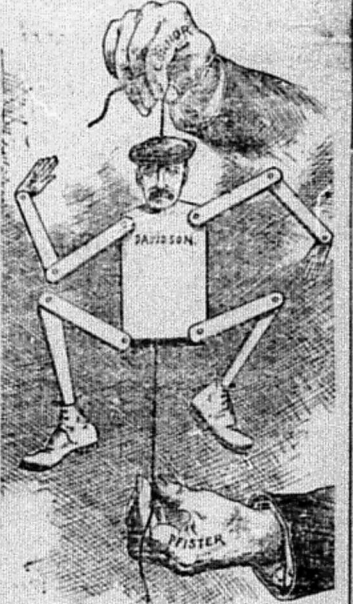

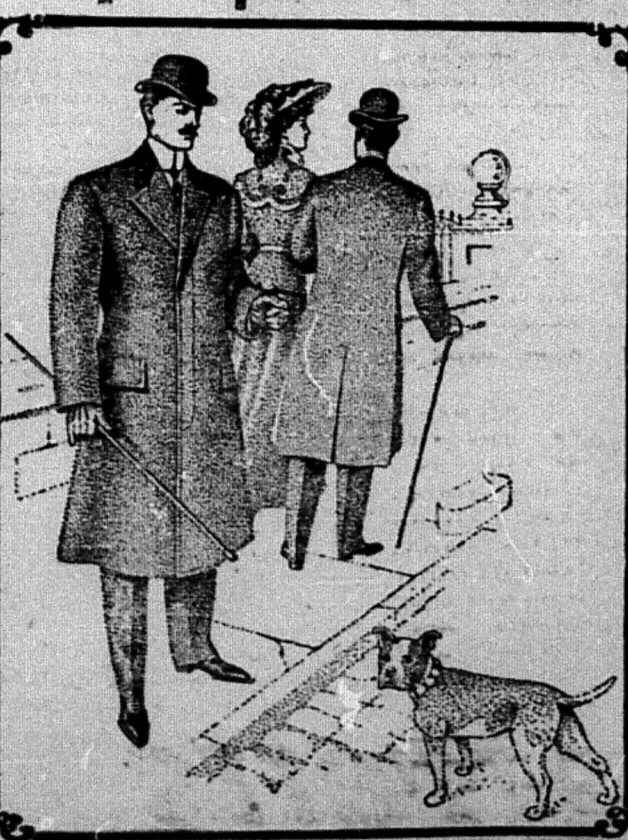
