Citizenship Assaulted!

Foundrymen Now Discharge Men Who Vote Their Convictions!

20 MOLDERS OUT AT POWER MACHINERY PLANT!

Just as we go to press comes word that TWENTY molders employed by the Power Mining & Machinery company, at Cudahy, have been discharged because they did not work on election day. The reason was entirely political, although the foreman, when asked what the wholesale discharge meant, replied, "Don't ask me." It seems that on Monday, the day before election, word went round the plant in the form of rumour that men who did not put in full time on election day would be discharged. It can not be claimed that the men were let out for lack of work, as all of them had all the work they could do. Here is a fine condition of affairs. On one hand the street railway company gave a number of its men a day off with pay and money on election day in return for work they were supposed to do for Boden and the Republican ticket. But on the other hand the Power company outrages the citizenship of nearly two dozen men simply because they were exercising the right of American citizenship, and were even willing to forfeit their pay in order to do so. The task-masters think they own the bodies of their slaves in Milwaukee. The action of the Cudahy company presents modern work slavery in its most hideous aspect. American manhood will not brook very much of such high-handed work. Must there be more Boston Tea Parties! The president of the Power Machinery Co. is Benjamin Guggenheim, an absentee capitalist. The secretary is "our leading fellow citizen," Benjamin T. Luezarder, who will smile out of the windows of his rich apartments at the Hotel Pfister at the misery of his victims. The treasurer of the company is Leon P. Feustman, who lives on aristocratic Juneau avenue. Arthur Niedermeyer, the manager, lives on Howell avenue. Action will be taken by the labor bodies. Let all true citizens be heard in the matter!

It is understood that Otto Harrass, the Republican assemblyman elected in the Second Milwaukee district, will work with the Social-Democrats at Madison. He is a union bricklayer. their invited guests—to become the helpless victims of the most shameful extortion that it was possible for individuals posing as business people to practice upon strangers in their midst. The charges made for hotel accommodations were in some instances nothing short of highway robbery, and this notwithstanding the definite promise in the letter of invitation sent to the Buffalo convention that "None of our hotels ever raise rates to convention visitors." It is doubtful if any organization known as a "business league" or association of any kind ever more flagrantly violated a straight business understanding than did the Citizens' Business League of Milwaukee when it failed to live up to its proposition to provide our convention with a hall free of charge and forced the Brotherhood to pay \$75 per day for a hall that was exceedingly defective in its acoustic properties and decidedly undesirable in other ways for such a gathering as was our convention. The following sentence appearing in the letter from the Citizens' Business League of Milwaukee to our Buffalo convention contains as clearly and unmistakably as it could be printed, the promise of a free convention hall as an inducement to our ninth biennial convention to decide upon Milwaukee as the next convention city: "We have also a very fine convention hall which the people of Milwaukee will be glad to tender you free of expense while in Milwaukee," etc. It is doubtful if the press of a city has ever shown less interest in, and more absolute indifference towards a convention, than was manifested towards our tenth biennial gathering by the press of Milwaukee. Beyond a comparatively brief reference or two during its early days the newspapers of

Cudahy and Town of Greenfield we rose to second party. We have received the following letter from Congressman Otjen: The Editor, SOCIAL-DEMOCRATIC HERALD.
