### RED BELLS FOR THE CHRISTMAS TREE

is queer that even progressive and Socialist papers in their "Christmas Thoughts" usually start out with Bethlehem and the manger.

The festival of Christmas has really nothing to do with this It is true that Christmas is now celebrated because the Christ Child is supposed to have been born on December 25. Yet up to the middle of the fourth century this festival was not known in the Christian church. It originated and extended with the victory of the Athanasians over the Arians, who were mainly Goths and other Germanic tribes-- and January 6 was then accepted as the date.

However, Christianity, in its propaganda always took note of old customs and religious, and only put a new meaning into the old forms. Usually it turned the old heathen beauty into a Christian monster-made a new devil out of the old god. Thus Apollo, Venus, Freya, Holle and Wotan were degraded to devils by the Christian

And it is characteristic that the Christian priests did not at all deny the existence of these heathen gods. Only they declared that they were demons from hell.

But with the feasts and holidays this change was not such an easy matter.

The common heathen, be be a Roman or a German, was willing enough to give up his heathen god. But it was hard for him to forget the good things he had to cat and to drink, and the nice presents he had received on that God's holiday. But the Chritian priests knew how to help themselves—They simply adopted the feast and dedicated it to some Christian saint.

So the Yule Tide-the Yule feast-thus received a new meaning in Germanic countries. It became the birth of the Christ Child and the date was changed accordingly to December 25th.

Also the old sun god, in whose honor presents were made every year, could not easily be turned into a satan—and therefore they made a saint of him, St. Nieholas, also called Santa Claus, who, moreover, drives to this very day the reindeer of the sun god.

The festival of the Yule Tide originated in an old German heathen celebration of the return of the sun.

In the far north and in the extreme south, in consequence of the oval form of the earth, the days and nights are much shorter and much longer than elsewhere on earth.

In the most northern part of Norway there is only one day and one night in the year. Even in the inhabited parts the "long nights" continue more than six weeks.

Before civilization penetrated these regions, the heathen Germanic inhabitants continually feared the total disappearance of the sun. They feared that the Fenris welf, who had been tied by the gods would break his chains and swallow it-the saga predicted that would happen some day.

The return of the sun at the time of its first appearance, therefore, always gave occasions to great festivities. Everybody was glad, and ate, and drank, and gave presents to his friends and lighted a bon-fire. This "high old time" was called the Yule Tide.

And Christmas is called Yule Tide in Sweden and Norway and

in some parts of England until this very day,

And for a long time they still burned the Yule Log in memory of the bonfire. As late as the 17th century the Christmas tree, with its candles and lights, was substituted for it in Germany—civilization and better housing not being conducive to the burning of Yule Logs.

Some of the customs, by the way, also came from the Roman Saturnalias, which had been celebrated (before the Christian era) about

the same time of the year. Particularly certain cakes, like, for in-stance, poppy seed cakes and the "Christ-Stollen" and some others.

However this may be, Christmas has remained the favorite festival for all the northern countries—though it is not celebrated to any great extent in southern countries like Italy, Spain, Portugal, etc. And Christmas ought to be enjoyed by all those who can and may enjoy it.
