Bishop M'Cormick Asks if Church is Innocent!

It is said that the church is always on the side of capital; that she is monarchial and aristocratic in her organization; that she is chiefly interested in maintaining the status quo; that she interferes with discontent and progress by teaching patience and submission; that she is otherworldly and remote, aloof from modern affairs, out of step with science and civilization, and but lukewarmly concerned with the betterment of social and industrial conditions. Laboring men do not hesitate to declare that the church cares more for the one sheep safe in her fold than for the ninety and nine in the wilderness; that she emphasizes individual salvation and the individual conscience, and cares little for social salvation and the social conscience; that she lives only to preserve herself; to narcotize her members and to maintain her paid ministers in positions of ease and influence; that she stands not for the golden rule, but for the rule of gold; that though she calls herself the church of Christ, she has lost the simplicity of Christ, the democracy of Christ, the loving-kindness of Christ, and, above all, the justice and the righteous indignation of Christ.

If any of the contents in this terrible indictment are true, and just in so far as any of them are true, every Christian must bow his head in shame. It is a frightful calamity not only to labor, but to the world, if the sad face of the Savior of mankind upon the cross sees only this after the passion of two thousand years. And, certainly, if these charges are even partly true, self-respecting labor may be pardoned if it considers its interests to be dissimilar and divergent from those of the church.—Churchman.

Horrible, Simply Horrible!

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—Stricken as never before by the astounding revelations over the manner in which babies, hardly out of arms, are forced to work in the tenements of this and other cities of the state, members of the state factory investigation commission were today considering remedial legislation. It was admittedly a difficult task.

Women workers who had told of the evil, frankly declared that in many instances the children had to work or the entire family would face starvation.

With the price of the necessities of life higher than ever before, and with the earnings of the tenement dwellers so low that even with entire families working the average was less than \$7 a week, the commission agreed that the incoming legislature would have to frame legislation so that they would not impose even greater hardships on the wage-earners.

HUNGER AND MISERY.

The stories related under oath to the commission which will report to the legislature in January have been almost unbelievable in their recital of hunger and misery. They dealt with women working side by side with men in iron foundries, performing tasks far beyond their strength and subject to sudden changes in temperature, which resulted in many instances in tuberculosis; of women working 8 to 14 hours nightly in factories and mills; of mere children working in canneries until long into the night, and the stories of the tenement workers.

COMMERCIAL CANNIBALISM.

Babies of 18 months were being trained to sort out artificial flower petals, according to the sworn statements now before the commission. Tender babies less than 5 were being used to take advantage of the Christmas "holiday" season. They were made to extract meat from the nuts used to produce many of the nut-candies sold at low figures during the coming "festive" days and to sew on cloth, by needles and women's fancy hand-knives that were later offered for sale in the shopping district.

Miss Elizabeth C. Watson, investigator for the child's labor bureau, who has investigated the matter, also intended to show that because of the congestion in the tenements, tuberculosis and other extremely contagious diseases are fairly transmitted from the workers to the ultimate purchasers of the goods.

"The worst thing which can happen to a social community is to have no social order at all, where every man is for himself and the devil may take the hindmost. Generally in such a community he takes the front rank as well as the stragglers. The phrase, 'Every man for himself,' is one of the maxims in the gospel, according to Beelzebub. The devil's game with men is to divide and conquer them. Isolate your man from obligations to a social order, and in most cases his soul drops into the pit like a rotten apple from the tree of life."

Lord Adamaley (interposing)—I do not think you need press any further on that point. We are quite clear that whatever else he has been preaching it is not Christianity.

An Unusual Court Inquiry with a Usual Rev. Mammon-Server on the Stand

In the middle court of judiciary today, before a full bench of the outer house, a rather curious case was tried. In the dock stood a long lean, but dapper clergyman, called the Rev. Daniel McWhine, charged with accepting money under false pretenses.

The court was crowded—ministers from all parts of Scotland being present, and following the case with great interest, as it is understood that the decision today will be a guiding one.

Counsel for the crown intimated that this was the first case of its kind in Scotland, and that doubtless it would not have been taken but for the sensational representations made by the Truth society. Accused was charged with violating his induction oaths, with uttering Pagan doctrine (while posing as a Christian and taking Christian money), and with so conducting himself as to bring Christianity into disrepute.

Evidence for the prosecution consisted in copious readings from quite orthodox sermons, after which accused was examined by counsel for the crown.

CHAPTER XI. The Small Boats. The ships carried according to their size a goodly number of boats that were hoisted on davits from the mainmast.

CHAPTER XIII. Snobbery in Navy. Among the crew were many veterans of the civil war, and also among the officers were to be found a few volunteer officers.

CHAPTER XIV. The Miserable Food. The food was very bad. Salt pork, salt beef, canned beef (soup and bully as the men used to call it), beans, peas, some canned carrots, tea and coffee, together with sea biscuits (hard tack) was the fare at sea.
