There will be an indemnity of five billion dollars to be settled after this war. It cannot be collected of any one nation, for none will have a decided victory. For this reason, it will have to be paid. These men will find their old debts working class by women, and will be told to work at about one-half of the old rate—rest must be paid for the war debt.
