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## Must Aid Kentucky Miners Win Strike

HUNGER MARCHERS PUSH DRIVE FOR JOBLESS WINTER RELIEF

## FEB. 4 DAY OF **DEMONSTRATN'** OF UNEMPLOYED

The 1,670 Hunger Marchers who took part in the demonstration at Washington for unemployment in-surance and immediate winter relief at the opening of Congress, are urged to speed up the campaign. A letter was sent to each of the Hun-ger Marchers from the National Committee of the Unemployed Councils and to all the Unemployed Councils throughout the country warning against the danger of slackening activities after the high point reached by the march to Washington.

The letter says in part:

The mass movement represented and tirred up by the Hunger March can esuit in many immediate con-cessions for the unemployed and in decisive advance towards the establishment of a system of unemployment insurance as demanded in our bill if properly followed up by an intensification of our organizational activity and struggle.

Develop Through Struggles
"The success of the National Unemployment Insurance day, February 4, as well as of all our campaigns, will depend upon our ability to con-tinue and intensify the local struggles around the immediate daily needs of the unemployed."

Organize Striking Mine

A local of the National Miners' Union has been established at Cumberland Bend Mine, Gatliff, Ky., where the men have been on strike for three weeks against an attempted wage cut from \$2.50 to \$1.50 a day for labor. The men went on strike without any leadership ercept their own and requested to be or-ganized into the N.M.U.

#### Fight Yellow Dog

At some mines the bosses have attempted to get the men to sign yellow dog contracts in an effort to prevent their mine being involved in the strike, but at a number of such places the men have been organized 100 percent. All sorts of intimidation is used to try to stop the rapid building of organization machinery to carry on the strike, but the men are going right ahead and are determined to smash the terror and establish de-

cent working and living conditions.

The coal operators are still carry ing on the campaign of evictions and are trying to drive active union organizers from the coal fields, but those evicted simply move in with other miners who do not live in company houses and carry on the work

## HATCH MURDER INTERNATION'L WORKERS' AID ISSUES APPEAL

NEW YORK -The International Workers' Aid, the world-wide relief organization for helping the working class and all the oppressed peoples in strikes, lock-outs, and disasters by sending in financial aid, food, clothing, medical aid, establishing kitchens, etc., has issued a call for support of the Kentucky miners who are awaiting zero hour to respond to the strike call as this issue of the Southern Worker goes to press.

Against Terror and Hunger

The call to action of the Interna-tional Workers' Aid follows:

On January 1st 18,000 Kentucky miners will be called on strike under the leadership of the National Miners Union. They will strike against the terror and starvation decreed by the mightiest powers of American capi-talism—the Rockefeller, Insull and Ford interest who own the Kentucky coal fields, lock, stock and barrel.

Jewell, two of the bright and shining lights of Dayton, Tenn., prohibition and fun-medalist menagerie, were arrested Wednesday night on charges of public drunkenness. And that right in the shadow (or rather moonshine) of the institution of ignorance founed in memory of the late unlamented William Jennings Bryan.

The site of the famous "monkey trial," when the denizens of Dayton tried to deny their ancestry and jail a school teacher because it was thrown up to them, is in an uproar over the arrests.

The arrests took place at the office of Attorney Jewell, where a booze party was in progress. Hizzoner, Judge McKenzie, is charged with public drunkenness, public profanity, resisting an officer.

McKenzie's father, also a judge, charges that the arrests are the re-sult of a political fight. The implica-tion being that the sheriff would have let the two gentlemen get as drunk as they wanted to and raise as much hell as they like if they hadbeen political enemies.

Anyway the mess serves to further enlighten intelligent people on the antics of the inhabitants of Dayton, famed for its boastful ignorance throughout the world.

The torture inflicted upon pris ers is beyond description, according to the story of the convict, who has been in prison for more than 16 years. "Men in the penitentiaries do not care what happens to them. They have reached the point where they do not fear the strap or solitary confineall because they realize they are being treated worse than dumb animals," the prisoner is reported to have declared. ## ATLANTA GANG Forces Release LYNCHES BRAVE of O. Spartaco NEGRO WORKER

ATLANTA, Ga .- A mob of Atlanta lynchers, under the leadership of an individual closely connected with the police force, butchered a Negro worker, bringing the list of known lynchings this year to 107.

At first a number of policemen, for no known reason, exept the general policy of terrorizing Negro workers, were torturing a worker, John Stokes. The Negro worker succeeded in scizing the gun of one of the policemen who was torturing him and shot and killed one of them.

#### Hunted Down: Lynched

Stokes succeeded in escaping and in eluding a posse with bloodhounds. He was hiding in the home of a woman aquaintance when the police seized an acquaintane of Stokes and tortured him, until for fear of his own life, he exposed the hiding

The lynch gang crept up on place, surrounded it and riddled Stokes' face and body with bullets. The leader of the lynchers was the brother of the police thug who was killed by Stokes in self defense.

## **Cotton Growers** Facing Hunger

(By a Farmer Correspondent)

GREENVILLE S. C. -The actual cost of growing cotton is about 20c a pound. It takes around 12 months to grow it and gather it. The present crop which the farmers have to sell at 5 and 6 cents a pound won't pay for anything more than the fertilizer. Fertilizer costs from \$20 to \$25 a ton-then 10 per cent is added to that when the farmers buy it on credit. The average land makes about a half bale to the acre. The landowner can afford to store up the cotton he buys, and sell next year when the price goes up. The poor cropper and renter, though, already in debt, are forced to sell now. All they get out of a year's work is a little fatback and beans, and a pair of overalls or two. This winter a lot of poor farmers will have their fatback and beans cut off from them until crop time again. They'll be starving this winter.

NEW YORK. — The American Workers' Delegation to the Soviet Union (Russia) has returned home and is now reporting its findings to the working class. Saturday a meet-ing was held in Philadelphia, where the workers enthusiastically greeted the speakers of the delegation who related the magnificent achievements of the Five Year Plan of Socialist construction and compared it to the inemployment, misery and suffering of the masses in the capitalist world especially in the United States. A huge mass meeting was held Sunday night in the New Star Casino in this city. The delegation is to tour the country for two months holding similar meetings.

Letter Gives Facts

A recent letter from the Soviet Union, written by Mrs. Lillian Lynch, one of the four Negro delegates, and head of the Women's Auxiliaries in the Pittsburgh area, expresses her enthusiasm over conditions in the So-viet Union. The letter, addressed to the Friends of the Soviet Union, says in part:

"Just a few lines to let you all hear from me while I am seeing the Five-Year Plan fulfilled in four years. 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#### Wants Free Hand In Lynchings

That ancient hag, the Chattanooga Daily Times, wants the Interna tional Labor Defense to "discontinue its activities in this section," so that the "race situation in the South can be solved much more quickly."

The Times, like all other denizens of the jornalistic red light district, attempts to make the suppression of the Negro worker in the cities and the exploitation of the Negro majority on the land in the Back Belt appear as a racial question. It is a CLASS QUESTION and a question of the SELF-DE-TERMINATION OF A SUBJECT NATION; the masses of the Black Belt must become the allies of the working class in the fight against the capi-

What the Times wants is clear. It wants the I.L.D. to stop activities here so that the ruling class can carry out its lynching campaigns without meeting with asy resistance on the part of the workers and farmers. Like many other criminals, especially of the Jesuit stamp, the ancient hag that has been prostitute to every form of reaction for more than half a century, tries to accuse its enemies of the very crimes of which it is guilty. It tries to accuse its enemies of the very climes of which it is gard, accuse especially venomous when the local jackal pack of lynchers failed to whip up a race riot in Chattanooga as the aftermath of the killing of two policemen in underworld fights. It failed then to connect up the Reds with the bootleggers, the dope peddlers, the prostitutes, and those who live off the proceeds of prostitution. That attempt was made because the whole ruling class of the South is still cringing under the blows delivered it by the toiling masses of the world in behalf of the framed-up Scottsboro boys; its fury knew no bounds when the Insternational Labor Defense exposed the Willie Peterson frame-up, the Orphan Jones frame-up. No sooner had the attempt to foment a race riot in Chattanooga failed than the ruling class and its newspaper harlots on such papers as the Times launched another at-tack. This time the attack has even less force than previous ones. But it demands an answer, nevertheless. The Times uses the case of John Moore, Negro worker of Salem, N. C., as a starting point for its attack on the ILD. because that organization is fighting against a death sentence imposed by a jury on a Negro accused of stealing a pair of shoes. The technical legal question is raised that the death sentence was imposed not for stealing shoes, but for "breaking and entering a home." Granted that the work er, hungy and in rage because, like 12,000,000 others, could not find work and did break an entry, he did so because the greed and avarice of a parasitic ruling class denied him food, clothing and shelter—for no other reason. To try to use the legal quibble that the stealing of the shoes was only incidental to the "meters arise", it has also been considered. incidental to the "greater crime" of housebreaking is ridiculous and only petty-fogging lawyer or a fomenter of lynching, legal and illegal, would regard it otherwise. Because the International Labor Defense says that it will fight against the attempt to burn alive an unemployed worker accused of taking a pair of shoes, the Times froths at the mouth and screeches:

"Tactics like those of this trouble-making organization do not disturb informed, thoughtful people, but they make bad matters worse by misleading ignorant Negroes and inflaming ignorant, hot-headed white. But these appear to be precisely the things the agency is trying to accomplish.

While the Southern Worker cannot speak offiiially for the International Labor Defense we can say emphatically that the Communists bers of that non-Party working class organization will decisively reject the invitation to stop activities in the South.

All workers who can think are quite aware that all questions involv-Negro workers, and also white for that matter, would be solved "much more quickly" if there were no fighting organizations to resist the ruling class "solutions." Probably also with "much less disturbance"—for the boss

class. Yes, much less disturbance, but much more shedding of workers' blood! We refuse to listen to the "advice" of the Times and the lynch gang for which it speaks, just as we scorn and defy their threats. We are here and here we will remain. We reject the boss class "solution" of what it calls the race problem. We will continue in the future, as in the past, to fight with every effective means at hand to defeat lynchings, legal or otherwise, and crush the lynchers. The Times may flatter itself and the rest of the ignorant, vicious lynch gang by labelling itself "informed, thoughtful" and indulging in other forms of self-praise, while scornfully referring to workers as "ignorant Negroes" and "ignorant, hot-headed whites," but it will not succeed in cajoling or frightening revolutionary workers to aban don activity in the South or anywhere else for that matter. Such activity will stop when the masses, white and black, have crushed the lynch gang and the lynch system that spawned them—then and not until then.

Lest the Times, with its customary lies and trickery, tries to make it ap-

pear that stealing shoes is a plank in the "Red" platform, we state em-phatically that never, at any time or place or under any conditions, has the revolutionary movement sanctioned individual action of any kind. We point out to the unemployed and hungry workers that working class problems can never be solved on the basis of individual action, but only through mass action. Not by burglary, but by organizing masses of workers and farmers to wage a fight for full wages for unemployed and part-time workers, for immediate winter relief of \$150 for each unemployed worker and \$50 for each dependent as general demands and fighting for local demands and against the charity fakers will the workers be able now to overcome some of the effects of unemployment.

Although we know that stealing a pair of shoes or any other necessity will not solve the unemployed problem for even one worker, we will not botheade tolerate with a stern fight the lynching of a worker who, in desperation, manently.


