BUTCHERS CONVENE AT NIAGARA FALLS

NIAGARA FALLS, Sept. 21.—Ten local unions sent delegates to the convention of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters' and Butcher Workmen's Union, which opened at the Empire Hotel, in this city.

The convention concerned itself chiefly, during the first day, with devising ways and means of preventing the regeneration of the so-called Lepp bill, which would make the opening of butcher shops on Sunday legal.

The following officers were elected: Aug. Moller, Buffalo, president; James J. O'Meara, Albany, first vice president; Edward Hirt, Utica, second vice president; Tom P. Cammody, Rochester, third vice president; Peter Goebel, Syracuse, fourth vice president; C. H. Halsheln, Buffalo, fifth vice president; Homer W. Cull, secretary-treasurer; A. Kuch, J. O'Meara and R. Modest were appointed as a legislative committee.

The state convention of the cigar makers is also in this city. Fifteen delegates are present.

MINERS TO OPPOSE LEWIS' RE-ELECTION

CHICAGO, Sept. 21.—Active opposition to Thomas L. Lewis as president of the United Mine Workers asserted itself yesterday, when the anti-Lewis faction announced its slate for the election which takes place on December 12.

This announcement was made in a circular letter, in which John P. White, president of the Iowa district, launched his candidacy for the presidency against Lewis. William Green, ex-president of the Ohio district, who drafted the substitute report at the miners' special convention in Indianapolis last month, which took control of the convention from Lewis, is the candidate for secretary-treasurer.

WORKMEN'S STATE CONVENTION OPENS

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Sept. 21.—The fourteenth annual convention of the Workmen's Federation of New York State was opened in this city yesterday. The address of welcome was made by ex-Mayor Cutler, who told the laboring men to go into politics and vote for the "best man."

The convention was opened by President Daniel Harris. John Nichols, secretary of the Central Trades Council of Niagara Falls, also made an address in which he said that organized labor had not the strength in Niagara which it should have, and he hoped that the convention would infuse new life into the labor movement here.

WOMAN ACCUSED OF MURDER COLLAPSES

LUNENBURG, Vt., Sept. 21.—Brought down by the charge of murder on which she is held here, Mrs. Florence W. Dodge, a wealthy widow who was arrested after William Heath, a painter, was shot dead in her home, is today in a state of complete collapse. So serious is the condition of the woman, who is the center figure in Vermont's strangest murder mystery, that two nurses from a St. Johnsbury, Vermont, hospital were brought here today to aid the doctors.

ALLEGES SISTER IS DETAINED ILLEGALLY

NEW CASTLE, Pa., Sept. 21.—Alleging that his sister, Julia P. Quinn, is unlawfully imprisoned and deprived of her liberty by Katherine Tingley, Clark Thurston and L. F. Wood at the Point Loma, Cal., "Homestead," George L. Patterson, the local banker who is contesting the will of his mother, Mrs. Harriet P. Thurston, which gave Mrs. Tingley, High Priestess of the Theosophical Society, a legacy of \$150,000, has applied for a writ of habeas corpus in San Diego, California, according to a message received here today.

MAY PROBE DEALERS ON FISH AND FRUIT

BOSTON, Sept. 21.—It may be that the grand jury of the federal court, which has been investigating the fresh beef and rendering business in New England, may be called upon to broaden its scope of inquiry to include firms and corporations dealing with foodstuffs and other necessities.

CONSUL MACMASTER IS EXONERATED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—William B. MacMaster, vice and deputy consul at Cartagena, Colombia, has been exonerated for the second time of all responsibility for assaulting two natives about a year and a half ago. Arthur H. Franier, charge d'affaires at the legation at Bogota, advised the State Department today that the trial judge to whom the case was remanded for a retrial had reaffirmed the original decision, exonerating MacMaster and placing the blame upon the natives, who attacked the vice-consul.

SAY MRS. MARTIN IS INCURABLY INSANE

NEWARK, N. J., Sept. 21.—When the petition of the attorneys for Mrs. Caroline Martin, accused of murder, for a fall of Mrs. Orey M. Sneed, asking she be declared insane, was presented to Judge Jay Ten Eyck today, counsel for the state objected. Attorney Hood, special prosecutor in the case, contended that the petition was inadmissible and Judge Ten Eyck deferred decision.

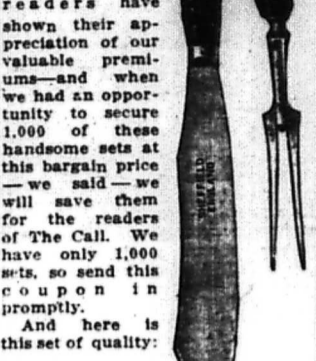
