ERNST HAECKEL QUILTS THE GERMAN CHURCH

Famous Scientist Declares Against Reaction and Hypocrisy.

The New York Times yesterday contained the following dispatch from Berlin: Professor Ernst Haeckel, the celebrated German Darwinian, author of "The Riddle of the Universe," has announced his withdrawal from the Evangelical Church as a protest against the political trend of the times. Germany's famous monist telegraphs the Berliner Zeitung am Mittag. "The reasons why I have left the church are as follows: The conviction that the separation of church and state as well as church and school is becoming more and more an urgent demand of civilization; furthermore, the growth of political reaction through the predominant influence of the Black and Blue Bloc (the Catholic-Conservative parliamentary coalition) and compulsory education in religious hypocrisy; finally my personal indignation over the continued Jesuitical accusations of the Clerical and Conservative press alleging the forgery of photographs of embryos."

RUSSIAN EDUCATION

Duma Considers Bill for Free Instruction—A Far-reaching Measure. WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—W. W. Rockhill, American ambassador at St. Petersburg, advised the State Department today that the Russian duma has under consideration a bill providing for universal free primary education. The bill stipulates that instruction is to be given on 180 days of the year in cities and 160 days in the country districts.
