

FACTS ABOUT THE WELSH STRIKE

Charged Electric Wires the Latest Weapon Used Against Coal Strikers.

(Special Correspondence.) LONDON, Nov. 18.—A highly important debate on the use of political force in the strike districts of Wales took place on the opening day of the new parliamentary session, November 15, on the initiative of Keir Hardie.

As a labor man and member for one of the South Wales constituencies he did no more than his duty in raising the question of the presence and behavior of the Cossacks in those districts and demanding a public inquiry into the causes of the bloodshed that occurred there at the beginning of last week.

Truth came out in the course of the debates last Tuesday. This, in brief, is what really took place. At Tonypandy in the Rhondda Valley, affected by the dispute with the Cambrian trust, the men had been for several days carrying on picketing in a perfectly legal and peaceful way.

Band of Organized Hooligans. Considering that among the victims of these disturbances were some shopkeepers who had been known as ardent sympathizers with the men on strike, and that while the window-smashing proceeded not a single policeman was seen in the streets, it is clear that these hooligans must have been organized either by the masters or the police with a view to discrediting the strikers.

King Alarmed About Horses. The king himself was greatly interested in the fate of these animals and inquired by telegraph whether they could be saved.

Live Wires for Strikers. His colleague Mr. Jones added a few more highly interesting details. In the Aberdare valley, he said, the men on strike decided to see if there were blacklegs being employed in the washery.

It ought to be known how many barrels of beer had been sent down to them, and how much there was for each man.

Of course nothing came out of the debate. Mr. Churchill, as befitted a sturdy Radical, defended his action, refused to recall the troops or even the London police, and did not think a public inquiry was necessary.

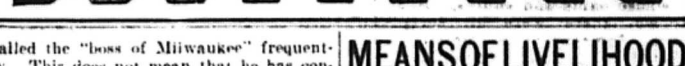

tically confiscates a man's labor power, which is often his only property, and gives him no redress.

Itrilian Operators Immune. "The Italian operators have been declared immune from the provisions of the Higgins law, owing to a treaty between the United States and Italy made in 1871, which provided for the right of Italians to hold property, whether citizens or not.

As to the reason for the law being passed no one seems to know very clearly, but the consensus of opinion is that it is a scheme to give the capitalist politicians more political patronage.

Is It Political Graft? This view of the matter is summed up in the following taken from Film Reports, a trade moving picture weekly, whose editor, Leon J. Rubinstein, is conducting an energetic fight in behalf of the operators.

"It is a fact that the lobby-men, ushers and other kinds of employes in hundreds of theaters and picture houses are put on their jobs or discharged from them at the request of district leaders from the political party in power.

Measure Should Be Fought. "Now the grafters are trying to shape the great body of operators so that the location of a few picture houses in a district may mean additional prestige.

"During the regime of Mayor McCiellan, politics played a strong part in the destiny of moving pictures in this city one fateful Christmas day.

The sudden enforcement of the amendment would throw hundreds of hard working, and in many cases highly efficient operators out of employment.
