CLOSING YEAR HARD FOR NEW YORK'S POOR

Increased Cost of Living Was Cause of Many Calls for Help.

In a report addressed to the 7,500 contributors who support its activities, the New York Association for Improving the Conditions of the Poor says the closing year has been a hard one for the city's poor.

On one page of its report the A. I. C. P. says that it regards "every dollar given to it as a trust." Accordingly, it has given a complete statement of its finances and its showing is gratifying.

The increased cost of living to the very poor is shown to be 19 per cent, by statistics and comparisons presented by the association last March to the United States senate committee on wages and prices of commodities.

The association's clinic nurses visited 16,900 patients last year and visited more than 600 homes. One enterprising nurse has established a counter in her clinic where utensils and materials for preparing baby food can be had at cost.

"On October 1, 1909," says the report, "the relief department began a year in which the prices of commodities, even at wholesale, were to be as high as in any year since the year 1898.

STRIKE ON FERRIES PARALYZES ISLAND

Firemen Get Action After Being Out Only Six Hours.

The ferry service to Staten Island and South Brooklyn was paralyzed for six hours yesterday morning when 414 firemen, oilers, and tenders suddenly struck and refused to man the boats.

The walkout occurred shortly before 9 o'clock while thousands of Staten Islanders were crowding the terminals hurrying to get to business in New York.

The men could not have selected a better time to show their meant business. They got action at once. There was no fooling around, no jockeying, no "nothing to arbitrate" something simply had to be done and that right quick.

Commissioner Tomkins, of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and Commander Sears, who has charge of the ferries, made haste to discover under what conditions the men could be got back to work.

### COP CONVICTED OF KILLING YOUNG MAN

### Manslaughter Verdict—Two Others Escape With \$50 Fines.

The conviction of Policeman James Dillon, of the Adams street station, Brooklyn, of manslaughter in the first degree for having shot and killed Louis Prober, nineteen years old, on Sunday morning, May 2, 1909, was affirmed yesterday by the Appellate Division.

The next morning Dillon, in patrolling his post, called again at the store and directed that some vegetables that were exposed for sale out on the sidewalk should be taken inside.

The Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, Brooklyn, handed down two decisions yesterday, in which they annul the findings of former Police Commissioner William F. Baker in the cases of Policeman James H. DeLeon, of the Hamburg avenue police station, and Policeman John Kelly, of the Stagg street police station, both of whom were dismissed from the force for beating citizens, as alleged.

The court directs that both policemen be reinstated with \$50 costs and disbursements. The charges against DeLeon were that at 2 o'clock on the night of January 11 last, at the corner of Myrtle avenue and Broadway, he struck one Gregory with a club and finally wound up with arresting Gregory and preferring charges against him.

John Kelly, the other policeman who was reinstated yesterday under orders of the court, was by the police commission found "guilty of conduct unbecoming an officer in having assaulted two boys, both under the age of twelve, without cause, striking one three times in the face with his hat and throwing the other violently to the ground."

### PEOPLE SEIZE STREET CARS OVER EXTRA FARE

CHICAGO, Dec. 30.—Judge Grosscup threatens to set aside an order made Tuesday which deprived 200,000 people outside of the city limits of street car transportation into the city unless they paid two fares.

Immediately the order was entered the Chicago railways dumped passengers at the limits and the County Traction Company refused service without an additional fare.
