rg Streets Heaped Waist Hig With Wheat.

PITTSBURG, Nov. 8,-Railro tracks and streets in the vicinity looked like a golden granary today following the spectacular fire that de-stroyed the Iron City Grain Elevators

Tons of grain sleved from the blassing structures and heaped high in the tracks and streets. A conservative estimate places the loss at \$150,000.

While the flames raged the grain began to trickle down the structure. Gradually the flames widened the apertures, and soon the tons upon tons of the product was pouring out with a rush, scattering over a wide area. Firemen stood almost waist deep in grain and fought the blaze, which threatened the West Eng car barns and the W. W. Lawrence Paint Company's plant.
