Infants Must Strike. To THE PEOPLE.—A strike is in progress at Massillon, Ohio which a few years ago would have been considered remarkable, but which in these days of the Twentieth century "progress" provokes only a mirthful smile.

There is a labor law in Ohio prohibiting the employment of children under fifteen years of age, but information received by the writer from some of the boys, and other reliable sources corroborates the fact that fully half the boys are under fifteen and many of them as young as twelve years.

As young as these lads are they are running up against the same power of capitalism that grown men must meet in economic battle. Already the labor fakirs and the police have been employed.

Labor fakir N. P. Maler, organizer of the A. F. of L. called the boys together and asked them if they thought they could win the strike if they were organized; they thought they could.

He visits the bosses and returns to a meeting of the boys at the mayor's office and explains that the employers are obdurate. He then says: "All those who want to go back at the old price raise their hands." No hands go up. "All those who want to stay out raise their hands." All hands go up.

The bottle blower's union of the A. F. of L. are bitterly denouncing the boys whose strike makes them idle; and the manufacturers threaten to close down the factories until January 1, "because the beer-bottle market is overstocked, anyway."

When it is taken into consideration that aside from being deprived of their childhood and even a common education, these boys work in the fiercest heat for sixty cents a day, and have a usual "vacation" of two months in the year at a time when the schools are closed, and sometimes an additional lay-off, it will be seen to what lengths the capitalist class will go in squeezing out and sucking the young innocent life's blood of these children so as to coin it up into dollars.

A fouler blot on civilization i. e. capitalism cannot be shown. The Socialist Labor Party with its Socialist Trade and Labor Alliance must eradicate such blots by abolishing the class that makes them. Workingmen will have a chance to vote for or against that class next November.
