IS FOUND OUT IN UTAH ALSO AND TAKES TO THE WOODS.

A Sketch That Militants Should Study as a Precaution—The Type of Men Who Bunco and the Type That Is Buncoed—Also Interesting as to S. P. Private Ownership of Press.

Salt Lake City, December 14.—For the guidance of Socialist Labor party men elsewhere and for the edification of the Western Federation of Miners in particular, I beg leave to offer the following information relative to several stunts performed by W. S. Dalton, erstwhile editor of the now defunct "Crisis."

GOLDFIELD MINERS. Hear Vincent St. John and Reconsider Anti-Convention Attitude. Goldfield, Nev., December 12.—I believe our industrial brothers in the East are desirous to know of conditions in the West. I shall endeavor to inform you what is going on in the desert mining camp, of Goldfield, Nevada.

The wages here are comparatively high, when expressed in dollars and cents, but on the market the exchange value is below par. Water is worth two cents a gallon; rent for \$20 for a shack 12x14 and up; wood per cord \$40, and coal from \$35 to \$40 a ton.

When Dalton saw that the damned S. L. P. men had effectually blocked his little game, he decided to "cast an anchor to windward" in the direction of the American party in order to secure his "get-away money."
