To the Sections of the City Greater New York. The Sections of the City of New York, having ratified by an overwhelming majority the suspension of the National Secretary and of the six members of the National Executive Committee, it devolves now upon said Sections to submit said action

and the reason thereof to the general vote of the Party, and to elect, by a general vote, temporary successors to the suspended officers. In accord with this provision of the constitution the acting National Executive Committee calls upon the Sections of the City of New York:

1. To elect delegates who are to formulate, at a joint meeting, the reasons for the suspension of the National Officers and submit same together with the act of suspension to the general vote of the Party.

Section Wisconsin. Section Milwaukee, S. L. P., had a meeting on Saturday, August 27, and adopted the following Resolutions: WHEREAS, According to gathered information the members of the Socialist Labor Party are of different opinions as to the expediency of the action taken by Section New York in depositing the National Executive Committee, which difference of opinion has been shown especially by the fact that some active Sections like Cleveland, Chicago, Philadelphia, etc., have been suspended because of having recognized the 'new' N. E. C.

amendment adopted by Section San Francisco, and furthermore be it RESOLVED, To demand from both the old and the new N. E. C. to issue the call for such referendum vote to all members and Sections who were in good standing at the time when the quarrel in New York started, viz., July 1.
